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ROLES ON THE AGENDA

Are you taking roles on the agenda during your meeting? Did you know that some of these roles can be credited to pathways projects? When working the educational program, there are so many options to complete projects – don't miss out on an opportunity!

Do you love being the Table Topics Master? Good news – this role can be used as a project! One of the Level 3 electives is called "Active Listening" and you can complete this by taking on the Table Topics Master role. As Topicsmaster, comment on each speaker's Table Topics® speech to demonstrate your active listening skills. For example, you might say, "Thank you. That was a compelling opinion

on the benefits of gardening. I understand you feel strongly that everyone needs to spend some time doing something they love."

"Manage Online Meetings" is a Level 4 elective that can be used when you are the Toastmaster of the day for your club meeting. The assignment is to conduct a 20- to 25-minute online meeting with fellow Toastmasters or a 20- to 25-minute webinar with visual aids for fellow Toastmasters. You determine the topic of your meeting or webinar. Research and use software that best fits your needs and geographic area. Invite your evaluator to participate in the online meeting or webinar. Even though our club meetings are longer than 20-25 minutes, you can still make this project work when you take the role of Toastmaster.

When completing either of these roles, it is important to recruit a member to complete the written evaluation for the project. This is a great way to get constructive feedback on how you can improve when taking these roles on in the future, plus it completes a Pathways project!

YOU NEVER KNOW WHEN SOMEONE IS LOOKING!

SERVING YOUR CLUB

We provide a supportive and positive learning experience in which members are empowered to develop communication and leadership skills, resulting in greater selfconfidence and personal growth.

Our club mission statement talks about developing our communication and leadership skills. In Pathways, there is not a separate leadership track. It is built into multiple projects within various Paths. To be a good leader, you also need communication skills. How many of you are ready and willing to put those leadership skills into practice?

The most immediate way of using the leadership skills you develop is through taking a club officer role for the 2022 – 2023 club year starting on July 1. You even made a promise to do so. The Toastmaster's Promise is on the application form you signed when you joined. One of the 10 promises is "to serve my club as an officer when called upon to do so". The time is rapidly approaching when you may be called upon to do so.

The club elections should be held the first business meeting of May. If your club does not have regular business meetings, you will need to schedule time for the elections. The Immediate Past President is

generally the person tasked with chairing the nominating committee. Be ready to step forward and say yes when the chair approaches you (or even volunteer now).

The experience of being a club officer will further develop your leadership skills. You will learn more about what is needed to run a successful club. You will learn about the specific duties for each role. You will learn about executive meetings and their role in a successful club. No worries, though - you won't just be left on your own. There will be training for the incoming officers in June where you will learn about the specifics of your role and about other topics relevant to the success of your club. The district holds peer calls for Presidents, VPEs, VPMs and VPPRs. Your Area Director is always available to assist as well.

Some clubs only have enough members to fill the executive roles. Don't take the easy route and just take the same officer position. Take a new position and learn new skills. There is no minimum time you need to be a member to serve on the executive committee. It's good to have a balance of experienced members and newer members serving the club. Seize this opportunity to help yourself, your club, and your fellow members to focus on success.



RIDING A TOBOGGAN

Remember whizzing down a snow-covered hill on a toboggan? You might not have thought of the laws of physics as you zipped along, but there's an essential one that applies to speed: acceleration is directly related to mass. Simply put, the more people on the sled, the greater the mass and the faster you'll go.

The faster you go, the greater the kinetic energy. In physics, kinetic energy is the measure of work an object can do by virtue of its motion.

What does this have to do with club growth?

Quite simply, it boils down to this: bigger clubs have more energy. Your personal kinetic energy grows as your club grows.

As you bring in new members, you'll hear new voices. You'll have more opportunities to practice your listening skills. New voices bring new ideas, fresh thinking. And you'll have new ears to listen to your speeches, offering different angles for more diverse feedback. You'll get more effective evaluations, and better evaluations mean better speeches.

More members mean more roles can be filled, creating a truly vibrant meeting experience. You wouldn't have to be scattered by filling multiple roles. It can be tough to be a timer and the ah counter. Wouldn't it be great to take just one role and concentrate on doing it well?

Toastmasters is a self-driven self-improvement program. But the more 'selves' in a club, the greater the collective and individual energy. You might be quite comfortable talking to your dog, but you've joined Toastmasters because you want to be able to impress people – your boss, your co-workers, your community committees – by giving excellent presentations. You've come to Toastmasters to practice connecting with an audience. The bigger the audience, the more you'll have to stretch to make that connection. The more you stretch, the faster you grow.

The more folks on that toboggan, the faster you go. It's the same in a Toastmasters club. Bigger clubs will build a stronger you, and a faster, fun filled ride!

As a former project manager for Adobe, Macromedia, and other software companies, Sandra can show you how to break down your goal into projects that Pathways will incrementally teach. In your club meetings, you can practice your pitch before going out in your best suit and presenting to a client or a committee. Using this methodology, you'll look at

Pathways as a tool for YOU to USE towards your goal(s).

On Saturday afternoon, our second presentation parting starts at 5:45pm ET/6:45pm AT, we have **Tom Goodwin** presenting, "Visionary Leadership" and **Shelley Petit** presenting, "Making Your Toastmaster Meeting TRULY accessible for Persons with Disabilities".

CREDENTIALS CHAIR REPORT

Notice from the **District 45 Credentials Chair** to all club Presidents and Vice Presidents of Education (VPE) and members of the District Executive Committee (DEC).

During the Spring District Conference on the 14th of May 2022 at 1345 AST (1245 EST) the district will hold the second of two District Council (DC) meetings of the 2021-2022 Toastmasters year. This business meeting is held to conduct essential district business and as a club president, VPE or member of the DEC, you have the responsibility to represent your club at this meeting.

The May meeting will be held online, and proxies are not permitted; each person must "carry" their own vote. Note: Each member of the DC may carry up to 3 votes at the District Council; one if you are a member of the DEC and up to two club votes (if for instance you are the President of one club and VPE for another). If you are, for instance, the president of three clubs you will only get two club votes unless you are also a member of the DEC.

As the District 45 Credentials Chair, it is my responsibility to determine if we have a quorum for the meeting and, if necessary, run the voting process. Once again, we will be using Election Buddy to facilitate our credentials process and to conduct any balloted votes if they are needed. On May 1st and May 8th, an email will be sent to each President, VPE, and DEC member from District 45 to remind them to watch for an email from Election Buddy (invitations@mail.electionbuddy.com) that will be sent out on May 9th. The email will contain the information required for you to register your intention to participate in the meeting and establish your vote. Please note that this is not a vote - just registration. Reminders to register will be sent out on the 13th and a final reminder the morning of the 14th. You must respond no later than 0900 AST (0800 EST) on May 14th to be registered to vote at the DC meeting.

On the day of the meeting, I will use the registration information collected in Election Buddy to establish quorum. Only those that have registered through Election Buddy will be allowed to vote if that is necessary.

Please do not share any emails you receive from Election Buddy. They contain your personal voter information and are to be used only by you to vote in the DC meeting.

DISTRICT INCENTIVES

Incentives

Membership Increase - Club increases its net membership (using club base) by 10% (rounded to the nearest full number) between January 1 and March 31 (with dues paid by March 31). Clubs will be entered into a draw for \$25 US/\$30 CDN [3 winners].

Club Coach Recognition - An important aspect of helping clubs achieve success is the assignment of club coach(s). Club coaches can be assigned to a club with 12 or few members. There are many clubs in District 45 who have 12 or fewer members. This incentive is to help these clubs achieve success by having members sign up to serve as a club coach for two (2) or more clubs.

To earn this incentive, you must serve as club coach for two (2) or more clubs and:

- Attend a meeting of the coached clubs at least once per quarter.
- Conduct a joint meeting with both/all clubs' executive committees once per month.
- Coaches must start in the club role no later than March 1st

The incentive is \$25 US/\$30 CDN per club served to be used for the benefit of Toastmasters.

Mentorship Incentive - Mentorship is an integral part of Toastmasters, with benefits that reach far beyond the club meeting. The Pathways Mentor Program is designed to help you build and reinforce the skills needed to provide a positive mentoring experience for protégés. For any member who complete the Pathways Mentorship Path by June 30, 2022, will receive a mentor pin and a recognition card.

TLI Attendance - Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI) is a one-day leadership training and networking event that benefits all Toastmasters. It will help you learn more about and prepare for your Toastmasters club officer role! Officers who attend can help their club earn a point in the Distinguished Club Program. It is also an opportunity to share your own ideas and experiences with other officers during the interactive club officer training, as well as learn from others. Statistically clubs are more successful if their officers are trained twice a year.

Clubs that have all officers attend the Summer 2022 TLI training session will be entered into a draw for a prize of \$25 US/ \$30 CDN. There will be six (6) winners.

Awards

Nomination deadline: April 15, 2022

Dave Rosvall Award – presented at the annual conference, this is an award presented to a District 45 Toastmaster who has demonstrated long-term and meritorious service to the district above the club level. This can be for someone who has conducted Speechcraft or Youth Leadership programs, helped with sample meetings for a new club, has been a club sponsor, mentor, or coach, served as a District leader at any level or for other activities beyond the club level. The recipient is determined each year by the Past District Governors and Directors. The recipient must have been a D45 Toastmaster for at least 10 years and must be planning to attend the conference. District Governors must have been out of office for at least 5 years before receiving the award. Although the award is chosen by PDGs, if you know of a member you feel is eligible for this award, send the name along with the reasons why this person should receive the award to the Immediate Past District Director at d45.jonathan.bohm@gmail.com.

Shirley Kelly Memorial award – presented at the annual conference. This award is presented to a member who exemplifies the mission and values of a Toastmaster and empowers fellow Toastmasters to be successful by sharing the spotlight. Nominees must be a DTM, served on the District Executive, have been a Toastmaster for at least 5 years, and served the district in various capacities. Nominations can be made by any member; however, recipients must be nominated by at least two Toastmasters. A Selection Committee, comprised of a representative from each province/state, and a family member (if available) will select the recipient. The Selection Committee is chaired by Division B Director, Thomas Macisso. Nominations can be sent to d45tommacisso@gmail.com.

The Darlene Dunn Outstanding Mentor Award – presented at the annual conference. This award recognizes a member who has exhibited the heart and soul of what Toastmasters mentorship: "Encouraging success of others before self". Any member may nominate a mentor. All nominations must include a 200--500-word essay, focusing on 4 points: the commitment of your mentor, how mentor helped you achieve your Toastmaster goals, what you gained from the protégé/mentor relationship, and why you would recommend this mentor to others. The nominated mentor must have completed the Mentor Path in the Pathways. The Selection Committee is chaired by Division E Director, Madhu Kanji. Nominations can be sent to d45.madhukanji@gmail.com.

Multimedia Omnipresence award - this award is presented at the annual conference to the club judged to use all aspects of public relations to the best advantage of their club. Included could be newspapers, newsletters, website, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Clubs (usually the President or Vice President of Public Relations) submit a portfolio of 8-10 samples of their public relations efforts to the District Public Relations Manager covering the time frame July 1st to April 15th. Deadline for submission: April 16th. The Public Relations Manager and a team comprised of Vice Presidents of Public Relations will review and decide on the winner. As a High School Special Education Teacher, I teach a class in "Soft Skills" the types of habits that many of us have learned at home, now teach at home, but far too often these days aren't practiced or taught to our children. One of my lessons is on "thank you" cards/notes. I typically start the lesson by asking "Why don't we just say thank you instead of going out of our way to write a hand-written card?

I reached out and joined again that next day!

Many of you have either mentored someone and/or currently have a great mentor. I currently have the privilege of mentoring a new member in Blueberry Hill. Claire gave her first icebreaker at our last club meeting; as typically is the case, she was somewhat anxious and nervous, but with the training that I received from Toastmasters and great mentors such as Angela Chute, Donna Tasker, Mike Harris, and Todd Rothstein among others, this is what she said:
