
Do you have a goal to reach the Distinguished Toastmaster (DTM) designation in the Pathways program? There are multiple steps to achieve this goal, so ensuring you have a plan is key! Keeping accurate records of your projects and leadership roles is an important part of achieving your DTM status.

When you are ready to submit your Distinguished Toastmaster Award application you will need the following details:



- 1. The names of the two paths you completed in Pathways, as well as the date of completion
- 2. The date you completed your Distinguished Toastmaster Project
- 3. The club officer role(s) you held and dates. You need to confirm you participated in preparing a Club Success Plan with month and year and provide the date that you attended club officer training.
- 4. The District Leader position you held, and the date served
- 5. The details of your role as club mentor OR club coach including date and club name
- 6. The Youth Leadership/ Speechcraft you held and date OR details of the new club you sponsored

After you have completed the form, you need to have a Club Officer verify and sign your application. Your application can be submitted by email, fax, or mail to Toastmasters International by the club officer. The application form can be found here:

And it's people like Anne Martin (some know her as Doris Anne). Anne was one of the Region directors my first two years as a District officer and John and I got to know her and her husband. She hosted me when I had to go to Washington for a conference, and John stayed at their place once when I was attending a Region conference. It's people like Lark Doley. Lark and I met when we were both Region Advisors. We got together to discuss a session we were presenting

jointly. That was the start of our friendship. I hope I was able to help her, like others had helped me, when her husband was dying. I know she's a great sounding board for me when I've needed someone to listen to ideas for District success.

It's people like Jim Heeren, Don Bittick, Jim Kohli, Monique Levesque-Pharoah and Ted Corcoran — Toastmasters I've met in and beyond the District — who have made time to talk to me when I needed it. I haven't seen these friends in person for several years. Yet we find ways to continue to connect and strengthen our bonds. Toastmasters was the start of the friendships; our shared ideas and values continue the friendship.

And of course, there's the members of the Senior Leadership team. I wouldn't even want to guess the number of hours we've spent together on the phone or on Zoom meetings and yes, sometimes even in person. In several cases, we've started out as coleaders but I certainly believe the relationships have developed into friendships.

Those are just a few of the many reasons why I stay in Toastmasters. I would not know any of them if I had never taken the risk of attending my first Toastmasters meeting. Many of them I would've never met if I had not attended my first District conference. It was through attending the District conferences that I saw the leadership possibilities available to me. I met most of those friends by taking the risk of District leadership and beyond. I'm sure most of these people will continue to be my friends for life.

ALIGNMENT COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 2022-2023

CLUB GROWTH DIRECTOR JONATHAN BOHM, DTM

During the 2021-2022 year, District 45 felt the impact of two years of the global pandemic which has disrupted membership and club operations. As we emerge, significant adjustments in the alignment of clubs are necessary to optimize the opportunities for member and club success in the future. The suggested changes will result in the elimination of four Areas and one Division. The changes will, however, result in stronger Areas and Divisions which means the District leaders can provide better service to the clubs. Realignment does not affect the day-to-day operations of any District club.

Division A and Division G

Current Status:

Division A:

- 15 clubs (2 dissolved in the current year)
- Division G: 16 clubs (1 dissolved in the current year)

Proposed Changes:

- Division A currently includes 16 clubs in New Hampshire. Division G includes 16 clubs in Vermont
 and southern New Hampshire. It is recommended that clubs be realigned within these two
 divisions to reflect the geography and club dispositions.
- Area 10: Ad Libs Toastmasters has dissolved, leaving only 3 clubs: Portsmouth, Tri-City and Exeter Speak Ups. It is proposed that Area 10 be dissolved and these clubs be transferred to other existing areas.
- Area 20: Area to be dissolved and the clubs transferred to Areas 7, 12, and 16.
- Area 7: Merrimasters has been dissolved. It is proposed that Exeter Speak Ups 8700 (A10) and Lakes Region Toastmasters 01421383 (A20) be moved into Area 7, and that this Area be moved from Division G to Division A.
- Area 12: Transfer Mt. Washington Valley Toastmasters 03596556 from Area 20 transferred to this Area.
- Area 16: Transfer Concord Toastmasters 6954 from Area 20 transferred to this Area.
- Area 25: It is proposed that this Area be dissolved and that the 3 clubs, Merrimack Motivators 04680273, Merrimakers 05409672, and Fidelity Orators 07294252 be transferred to Area 15.
- Area 15: Transfer 4 clubs to this Area. 3, Merrimack Motivators, Merrimakers, and Fidelity Orator from the dissolved Area 25 and I club, Souhegan Speakers and Leadership 5785, from Area 7.
- Area 20: It is proposed that this be transferred from Division A to Division G, with 2 clubs, Rutland Area Toastmasters 6205 and Toast of the Valley Club 9719, transferred from Area 15.

Division B

Current Status: 16 Clubs (two clubs merged in current year)

Proposed Changes:

- Area 5: Transfer 1 club, Toast of the Midcoast 7593337, to Area 14.
- Area 14: Transfer 1 club, Toast of the Midcoast, from Area 5
- Area 24: With the merging of two clubs, Running Hill and Portland Harborside, in Area 24, it is recommended that 2 clubs from A10, Portsmouth Toastmasters 1094 and Tri-City Toastmasters 7682, be transferred to this Area.

ALIGNMENT COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 2022-2023 CONT'D

Division C and Division E

Current Status:

- Division C: 12 clubs
- Division E: 11 clubs (1 dissolved in the current year)

Proposed Changes:

- Division E cannot be sustained as the club count does not meet the standards for Area and Division requirements (Areas must be at least 4 clubs and Divisions must be at least 3 Areas). It is proposed that this Division be dissolved, and the clubs be integrated into Division C.
- Area 4: One club, East Coast Online Advanced Toastmasters 7800586, to be transferred from Area 11 in Division D.
- Area 3: With only 3 clubs, it is proposed that this Area be dissolved and 2 clubs, Riverview Canusa 5382, and True Blue Toastmasters 6871, be moved to Area 2, and 1 club, Spotlight Toastmasters 9985, to Area 17.
- Area 2: Two clubs, Riverview Canusa and True Blue Toastmasters, transferred from Area 3, and Area moved to Division C.
- Area: 17: One club, Spotlight Toastmasters, transferred from Area 3, and Area moved to Division C.

Division D

Current Status: 22 clubs (3 suspended in current year)

Proposed Changes:

- Area 21: Two clubs suspended in current year.
 Dissolve Area and transfer 2 clubs, Dartmouth
 Toastmasters 3119 and Sackville Toastmasters
 4588, to Area 18, and one, Creatively Speaking
 2011635, to Area 11.
- Area 11: One club, Creatively Speaking, transferred from Area 21 and East Coast Online Advanced Toastmasters to Division C, Area 4.



ANNOUNCEMENT ON ZOOM

As clubs move to hybrid meetings and in-person meetings, the District will not be providing Area Directors with Zoom accounts for the 2022 – 2023 year. This means that clubs who want to use Zoom either for online or hybrid meetings will be responsible for providing their own Zoom account. This could be using an account that a member has or through buying an account for the club. Division Directors will have an account which will allow them to set up a meeting on an occasional basis if needed. Clubs should consider this change when doing their budget for the upcoming club year.

DISTRICT INCENTIVES



Open House – Has your club hosted an Open House yet? There's still time to organize one and benefit from this incentive. Hosting an Open

House for your club is a great way to invite guests or former members to visit and see what your club is all about! Boosting an event on Facebook will help your club reach a wider audience, and hopefully get new members. This incentive is to help you with boosting your Open House on Facebook. You need to set up the Open House as an event. Boost the event and then submit the bill for boosting. You will be reimbursed up to \$25 US/\$30 CDN. This can be for either an in-person or online Open House

TLI Attendance - Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI) is a one-day leadership training and networking event that benefits all Toastmasters. It will help you learn more about and prepare for your Toastmasters club officer role! Officers who attend can help their club earn a point in the Distinguished Club Program. It is also an opportunity to share your own ideas and experiences with other officers during the interactive club officer training, as well as learn from others. Statistically clubs are more successful if their officers are trained twice a year.

Clubs that have all officers attend the Summer 2022 TLI training session will be entered into a draw for a prize of \$25 US/ \$30 CDN. There will be six (6) winners.





Membership Increase - Club increases its net membership (using club base) by 10% (rounded to the nearest full number) between January 1 and March 31 (with dues paid by March 31). Clubs will be entered into a draw for \$25 US/\$30 CDN [3 winners].



Youth Leadership Program -

The Youth Leadership
Program is a workshop that
enable young people under
the age of 18 to develop
their communication and
leadership skills through
practical experience. This

workshop helps young people learn valuable skills including:

- Evaluating their own speaking ability
- Preparing and giving speeches
- Giving impromptu talks
- Controlling their voice, vocabulary and gestures
- Giving constructive feedback and more

This is a great opportunity to introduce the benefits of Toastmasters to our youth! Organizing a Youth Leadership Program is also a project in helping you achieve your Distinguished Toastmasters status. Be among the first twenty-five (25) Toastmasters to complete a Youth Leadership Program and get reimbursed for the cost of the Youth Leadership Program material.



Beat the Clock and Membership Recruitment Incentive

May begins the Beat the Clock campaign by Toastmasters International. And of course, the District has its concurrent membership recruitment campaign. If you recruit one or two new, dual or reinstated members during May or June, your club will be eligible for a draw of \$25 USD / \$30 CDN. Those clubs that recruit three or four new members will be entered into a draw for \$50 USD / \$60 CDN. If you recruit 5 or more new members during that period, you will receive recognition for Toastmasters International plus your

club will be entered into a draw for \$75 USD / \$90 CDN. The money can be used for anything that will benefit the club and its members. You can purchase from the TI store (after May 8) or use it locally. You can use to offset the cost of food for a social event or for supplies or awards/incentives for members. You need to submit a receipt for the purchase to the <u>Finance Manager</u> for reimbursement.

The best way that I can think of capturing this "magic in the bottle" is to develop a plan to do so. James Clear, in his #1 New York Times Bestseller, Atomic Habits - An easy and proven way to build good habits and break bad ones" says it best when he says "Tiny

Changes, Remarkable Results!" James has been so successful with this strategy that he formed "The Habits Academy" which is a premier training platform for building better habits in life and work.

What does this mean to you? II hope you can use this information to make small improvements so you can achieve those remarkable results! Some things that worked for our club include:

- Having all the roles filled for the next meeting at the end of the current one.
- Keep the start time a "hard start" and the end time a "hard finish"; we still sometimes struggle with this.
- Have a "social time," doesn't matter if it's online, in-person or hybrid - what matters is connecting either before or after.
- Consider having two Toastmasters/Hosts. (if it's a hybrid meeting) One for in-person and another for on-line.
- Have FUN while keeping your structure and discipline.

Please remember what our founder, Dr. Ralph Smedley told us almost 100 years ago: "We learn best in moments of enjoyment!"

been paying off. Concord Toastmasters has had an amazing showing both in person and on Zoom.


