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REFLECTIONS ON BEING DISTRICT DIRECTOR

When I started Toastmasters all those many years ago, I never dreamt I would be District Director. I

am now finishing my third go-around. You will see comments about the Area Directors saying how beneficial it was to do the role a second time. That's not as much the case for being District Director. Perhaps if I had repeated the role in quick succession, it may have been. It was 17 years between my first and second time and 15 years between my second time and now. Things have changed so much in that time. There are certain basics that haven't changed and knowledge of those basics of being District Director certainly helped me in my role. However, technology has changed how we communicate in so many ways.

One thing that has been reinforced for me this year is the need for personal connections. We have come to rely so much on emails and text and messenger that we fail to use our voice to communicate with each other. It's what we learn in our meetings, but we don't use the skills much for personal communication. A phone call or a Zoom call can help us make better connections with each other. And better connections are what so many of us are looking for. We tried to improve direct communication with our peer calls. I think the success of those have been proven and will continue for years. I hope that every Division and Area Director will seek

ways to make those personal connections within their Areas and Divisions. My goal this year was to stabilize the District and to build a solid foundation for growth in coming years. I believe we have done that and now the focus can be on rebuilding the District to what it was ten years ago. We had a District where 40% of our clubs were Distinguished, 50% had a membership of 20 or more, and only 20% had a membership of 12 or less. We can do that again and I'm sure the 2022 – 2023 will definitely map out a path to achieve those results.

The other item of importance that was reinforced for me during this year is the importance of teamwork. We had 6 Division Directors and 23 Area Directors who stepped up to do what was asked of them. We achieved records in the reporting of Area Director visits. These team members also helped with TLIs, the Fall Extravaganza and the annual conference. The Senior Leadership Team worked diligently to help clubs and members achieve success. Crystal, Jonathan, Anne, Albert and Ken all worked tirelessly throughout the year Nothing would have been achieved without their efforts.

I thank all the members who provided me with words of encouragement throughout the year. I appreciate your support and the willingness of many of you to step up when called upon. Please provide the same support and help to Crystal and her team next year. My hope is that every member and every club was able to achieve the success you wanted this year and that you will continue to succeed in Toastmasters and all aspects of your life.

REFLECTIONS ON BEING PROGRAM QUALITY DIRECTOR CRYSTAL COBB, VC1, DL5, EC5, PI5




The role of Program Quality

My first go-round as Area director was 4 years ago. It was a good experience; I enjoyed it. This year, knowing what to expect, was much more enjoyable. Being able to meet on Zoom allowed me to go to *all* my clubs' meetings. Full disclosure – I am a member of two of them. Area Director is an excellent way to hone your leadership skills, work on your follow through skills, learn to work with different personalities and most of all, get to know and help your area members attain their goals. You should do it!

My leadership skills have really grown this year! Holding the Area Director role for 2 years has done me well! 





The design, used with permission, is an adaptation of a carving over the door of the old Edinburgh Library. The Carnegie Club meets in the Saint John Art Centre, a former library built by Andrew Carnegie.
