- **Commitment.** Long term goals are easy to commit to, but committing NOW to personal goals is difficult when you have the needs of others to factor into your short term plan...*or is this the excuse I have always used to put off committing to my own goals?*
- **Change.** I struggled with setting goals for this Toastmaster year, with all the change that was happening in the organization: Virtual meetings, workshops and training...zoom!!!
- **Perfect Timing.** A million reasons exist daily to put off making my goals **my priority**. It is easy to 'stay busy' doing SOMETHING instead of getting busy doing THE RIGHT THINGS.


COVID19 has thrust a need for change upon us. Zoom is not going away any time soon. Getting back to normal is no longer a reason to put off

Corporate Club Recruiting Committee-*Source leads for new Corporate Clubs.*


Club Mentors, the Club Quality Chair (*position open*) will lead the following committee;

District Leadership 2020-2021



In early October, District 45 Director Jonathan Bohm announced that I will serve as District 45 Leadership Chair (DLC) for 2020-2021. I've served in many positions in

Toastmasters, but never on a District Leadership Committee; although I've held similar roles at the International level. I'm excited to work with this committee to invite candidates to offer, to assess their qualifications and past performance, and then nominate those who are best qualified for your consideration as a voter during our elections next May. Every club in our district has two votes in May. Votes are assigned to the President and VP-Education although they can each assign their proxy to any club member in attendance.

Speaking personally, serving as a district leader was instrumental in my development inside and outside of Toastmasters. Learning to understand and accept objectives like those in the Distinguished Club Plan (DCP) and working with teams of people who were either elected or appointed, helped me develop my interpersonal and leadership skills. The face-to-face training, and the support of senior Toastmasters leaders, that was offered to me as a new district leader opened my eyes to my potential. At our November 7th district wide workshop, I will share one or more stories about some of the training I received in exotic locations such as New Orleans and Palm Springs.


We elect district leaders and assign them two objectives; to work with and assist every club in the district to achieve excellence as defined by the DCP, and to grow the network of clubs so more people can benefit from Toastmasters. As large and diverse as Toastmasters is, our organization is quite simple; people join clubs to achieve their personal goals, and our clubs support member development. District leaders must focus their talent and our resources to enable our clubs and members to prosper.

I expect in December we will announce the members of the DLC and in late January to begin interviewing candidates. I invite you as a member of District 45 to suggest any questions that you might like our DLC to ask of the candidates. I can't promise we'll use your question, but we will consider each, as we will be nominating the most qualified candidates for election in May, and ultimately to serve you, your club and your members.

I was amazed when witnessing how the members grew from every positive encouraging evaluation. It was mind blowing observing how members would put themselves out there because such a fun, safe, inviting environment was being offered. Eventually I was invited to become part of this incredible phenomena. Even though I was terrified of public speaking, I felt honored when asked to become part of it, because of the values of what this club strived towards and projected: specifically, the four Toastmasters core values of integrity, respect, service and excellence. When I strived to honour the same values to become a better me, I also felt as if I was part of something great and good. I was proud to call the phenomena my club.

When the club members embrace Toastmasters core values and create a fun, safe and inviting environment for all, guests are drawn to the phenomenon. They too want to be part of something great and good, something they can be proud to call their club. That is member ownership taking place.

If you have experienced the phenomenon and know what creates it, you have what it takes to be a good Club Coach. Come share your knowledge with a struggling club.

If you are a club that has lost the phenomenon, reach out to see if your club qualifies for a club coach. Let someone help you bring it back.

University Assignment - Toastmasters



I teach at Mount Saint Vincent University and I am a member of Provincially Speaking Toastmasters in Halifax, Mad Toasters in New York and East Coast Online Advanced Toastmasters.

One of the courses I teach is “Introduction to the Nonprofit Sector”, which provides students with an overview of the non-profit sector. It is the first course in our Certificate in Nonprofit Leadership program. This program is open to students in all degrees or as a standalone program. My class this semester has thirty-two students, with the majority being from Nova Scotia but also with some from China, India and the Middle East.

One of the main objectives of the course is to understand the skills needed to work in the Nonprofit Sector. These skills include great communication, leadership and relationship-building skills. Since the best way I know to develop those skills is through Toastmasters, I created an assignment for my students to learn about Toastmasters.

The assignment consisted of three parts.

1. First, the students had to conduct their own research on Toastmasters.
2. Second, they had to attend one (or more) of three clubs – Provincially Speaking, Mad Toasters, and Gracefully Speaking.
3. Third, they had to submit a one-page report on their experience.

The assignment was worth ten marks and the results were GREAT. All students attended at least one club, and many attended more. Some even participated in Table Topics. The feedback has been excellent – students commented on how welcoming the clubs were and how educational the experience was. One student who is in Communication Studies commented,

“Why have I never heard about Toastmasters in my classes before?”

I am hoping that my students see the tremendous value in Toastmasters and consider becoming a member - if not now, then later. I believe this to be a very worthwhile assignment and plan to make it a regular component of my course every semester. My thanks to the three participating clubs and the assistance of Sherry MacDonald, Michael Lawlor and Vilmos Weywara.



Each Division can name their own Division level award, for example, for visiting 75% of Division B clubs (13 of 17), you earn the coveted Vacationland Award. For visiting 50% of District 45 clubs (52 of 104) you earn the Norumbega Award, and for those truly dedicated, the Wizened Traveler award visits 75% (78 out of 104) of District 45 clubs.

In Division B, once a member hits an award level, the member can contact their Area Director or myself to celebrate their accomplishment. This is not only be a great way to learn and enjoy District 45 club meetings, but can assist struggling clubs with filling roles, increase retention and recruiting efforts, and most of all share in the joy of Toastmasters with our entire Division. 

My next phase of Toastmasters will be to become a DTM again within the Pathways education system. I look forward to the next few years to attain a second DTM and be a mentor to all that wish to grow from Toastmasters.
