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DISTRICT 45 IN THE PANDEMIC – HOW WE'VE GROWN



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How our world has changed. It's been almost a year since Toastmasters went online. Did we imagine then that a year later we would still be

meeting online -- and with no timeline for when in-person meetings might resume? I remember naively thinking last March that surely we have our conference in person, in Moncton. Now we are planning for our second online annual conference.

Abigail Adams, former First Lady of the United States, wrote: "Great necessities call out great virtues." Indeed, our District has risen to the occasion. Clubs that chose to go online grabbed the new virtual venue with gusto. Our contests have had greater and more enthusiastic participation. And online TLIs seem to be very popular.

However, most of our clubs took a membership hit in April last year, and again in October. Many are still struggling. Yet over 20% of our District 45 clubs have increased membership this year. One club has added 6 new members. Yes, we **can** bring in new members in this online environment. We have to accept that we will probably be meeting online until the fall or even perhaps the start of 2020. Don't wait for that time when you resume in-person meetings. The most effective way to bring in new members has always been one-on-one recruiting. This is just as true in these online times. In fact, it may be easier to bring a guest to a Zoom meeting than arranging the logistics of coming to an in-person meeting. No travel, no traffic, no parking problems.

District 45 has embraced change with gusto. We were first in the world in Pathways enrollments. The District's first ever online TLIs were well received and well attended. It is time to meet this new challenge with that energy and the pursuit of excellence.

I encourage you to look at the incentives in the January newsletter and on the D45 website. There is a plethora of awards to reward membership growth and educational achievement. Decide which of these incentives will fit your goals. Go forth with full enthusiasm, striving for the success that is yours to meet.

Zoom meetings present a new range of opportunity. So many people are now working online and Toastmasters Zoom meetings are a great place to learn the subtleties and intricacies of succeeding in the virtual world. These valuable skills are attracting guests and new members who want to develop and enhance their online presence.

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Club Growth Tip

COMMUNICATE, COMMUNICATE, COMMUNICATE

Communicate in all directions. Communicate to club members, to other clubs, to Area Directors, volunteers, and District officers. Ensure that members know about upcoming district events. Make sure your Area Director knows about club activities. Let your Area Director know about the Open House you are holding for the Smedley award. (You are holding an open house in September, aren't you?)

Club leaders must keep club members informed of important activities. Go beyond filling the agenda. Let your club know about upcoming activities. Humans tend to think that everyone knows what we know. The reality is that most of us need to hear information several times before we recognize its relevance. Don't just pass on a message. Describe why it is important to your audience. This is a skill you practice with every speech. Use this skill when communicating information to your fellow Toastmasters.

When you communicate in all directions, your team will work better. When you repeat information, your team will remember more. When you use your Toastmaster communication skills, your club will grow.

Nothing in all the world is more dangerous than sincere ignorance and conscientious stupidity. Martin Luther King, Jr. As of the middle of January, there have been 408 educational designations. These designations came from 79 clubs which is almost 75% of our clubs with one or more designation. The designations represented 234 members which is only about 18% of our District's membership. Each member should plan to achieve at least one Level in a Path. That is no more than 3 to 4 speeches in a year which should be achievable. What's your excuse for not achieving one Level?

Over 100 members have achieved more than one designation with three members completing 10 or more Levels. In some cases, members complete multiple Levels because of belonging to more than one club. In other cases, members may have held their achievements and submitted many Levels at one time. However, if 234 members can achieve at least one Level, what's your excuse?

<u> What's Your Excuse?</u>

It seems that some more experienced members are reluctant to give speeches on Zoom. Some members (although very few) are still struggling with Pathways. Some say they are "too old" to learn the new technology or to learn Pathways. Let's look at one club – the George Burton club in Division D. This is a club where most of the members are in their 70s, 80s and 90s. Six of the nine members have achieved a designation and in total, they have ten designations. They are using Zoom and they are working in Pathways. If they can do it, what's your excuse?

For those who have not yet completed a Level, make your plans to do so and tell yourself "I have no excuse".



I so very much respect our club leaders who work to provide a stellar, respectful learning environment for their members. People join our clubs and become members. Members are then empowered to become more effective communicators and

leaders primarily by their engagement in their club. Our club leaders deserve accolades for their efforts to support their members and the club mission.

Beyond the club, serving as an Area Director (AD) is the first step into higher leadership in Toastmasters. The Area Director role exists to support club leaders and assist clubs to develop their environments for the benefit of their members. Toastmasters International recommends that District Directors appoint their Area Directors, so while District Leadership Committees do not nominate Area Directors, your DLC members are available to chat if you are interested to serve in 2021-2022 or in a future year.

Area Directors conduct club visits twice a year within their respective areas. An AD is also responsible to arrange area contests for those members who choose to compete in speech contests. Area Directors are expected to attend the Area Director training and attend District meetings as scheduled.

I vaguely remember my first visit to a club when I served as an Area Director back in the mid-1990s. For my first visit as an AD, I was nervous and wasn't sure what I would say to the club members, most of whom I hadn't met. I was received warmly and I gave a short speech during their meeting promoting upcoming district events, and complimenting them on being a warm, welcoming group. I'll note that if an AD wants to suggest an opportunity for improvement, that should be done privately with the club executive.

By educating yourself on the branding guidelines, you will be sure to communicate a consistent and professional message! It's contest season and many fellow toastmasters are deciding whether to compete or not. Allow me to give you three pieces of advice to help you with that decision:

- 1. Competition is not about your fellow competitors; although, you can learn valuable ways to becoming a better speaker by observing great communicators. The real competition is with yourself. You will become a better speaker after you compete whether you win or lose. The lessons you learn about yourself as a person and as a speaker far outweigh any trophy.
- 2. You don't have to do it alone. There are many people within your toastmaster family who are more than willing to help you reach for the stars. All you have to do is ask. There is truth in *two heads are better than one*. The key is to find mentors who have more knowledge and experience than you and who are willing to tell you the truth in a loving way. Jim Rohn once said, *you are the average of the five people you spend the most time with.* Choose those five people wisely.
- 3. Put your ego in park. There will be contests where you will lose and there will be contests where you will win. It's easy to win but when you lose, it will be easy to place blame on others instead of yourself. That is when your ego takes over. We all have one so don't feel bad. Don't allow your ego to get in the way of the lessons you need to learn to becoming a great speaker. If you want to move forward, take ownership for your successes and failure so you can uncover the gems hidden underneath your ego.

It's speech contest season; what to do? My advice; DO IT! You won't regret it. Remember to compete against yourself, don't do it alone, and park your ego.

The Civil Speakers Club in Fredericton, NB has embarked on a journey to travel *Around the World* – Toastmasters-style! In January, the club executive introduced a new strategic initiative in support of better meetings and membership growth. It launched a new award called *Around the World*, which will be awarded to members who take on each meeting role - at least once – between now and June 30th.

Club meeting data, compiled in the first half of the Toastmasters year, showed that a whopping 80% of our membership had evaluated a speech, but only 30% had served as meeting chair; 50% of members had completed a speech, meaning 50% had not presented a speech in the first half of the year. Regardless of tenure, from new recruits to seasoned members, there was a tendency for members to gravitate toward certain roles due to inexperience or personal preference for those roles.

At each of our regular bi-weekly meetings, there are thirteen opportunities to sign-up for speaking roles – a chance to learn and enhance our communication and leadership skills. The meeting roles are not only important because they make the club experience enjoyable, they are key to our member's success. They help build and improve not only public speaking skills but time management, critical thinking, facilitation skills and many, many more.

There are several benefits to be gained from going outside one's comfort zone on a personal and club level. It promotes member growth, it promotes member and club success and as an added bonus, it can make life easier for the Vice President of Education!

Particularly for new members, it can be intimidating or overwhelming to take on a brandnew role – but our club's **Around the World** award provides the motivation for every member to step up. For anyone unfamiliar with a role, Toastmasters has some terrific guidance various meeting roles, such as the *Toastmaster Wears Many Hats* manual on the TM website.

Have you travelled *Around the World* lately? This year, members of Civil Speakers Toastmasters are going *Around the World* for greater personal growth and club success. Maybe it's an award your club will want to try too!

Civil Speakers – Around the World Award

Did you know that Base Camp Managers (President, VPE, Secretary) are the only ones who can approve a Level in Base Camp? However, ANY club officer can submit a Level through Club Central. This step needs to be done before the club gets credit for it. Although you can approve your own Level in Base Camp (best to have someone else do it), you CANNOT submit your own level in Club Central. It must be one of the other club officers who submits it for you.

If a member in your club is a dual member in one or more other clubs, it is good practice to check with that member before submitting the award through Club Central. It does not matter which club approves the Level in Base Camp but the member may want a particular club to receive credit in Club Central.

A suggestion for all members is to look ahead at the projects within your Path. Some of the Pathways projects require you to assemble a team and manage a project. The project you manage does not have to be in Toastmasters. Often, you may be asked to lead a project at work which would fit with one of your Pathways projects. This is a great way to connect Toastmasters and your work. The information contained in your Pathways project can help you better organize and manage your project at work. By looking ahead at the Pathways projects, it provides you with the opportunity to take advantage of projects that may come your way at work or in your community. Before you know it, it will be time for club elections. Club elections should be held at your first meeting of May (or first business meeting if not held the first meeting of the month). It is important to hold your club elections as early as possible in May so incoming officers can be made aware of the June TLIs. You need to prepare for these elections. The February 28th webinar will provide you with information on how to effectively prepare for these elections. Watch your email for more information on the session and on the presenter(s).

It is not known at this time if there will be a webinar on February 14th. Watch your email for more information from the Program Quality Director on a possible webinar on that date. Since it's Valentine's Day, perhaps there could be a webinar on "Showing Love to Your Club Officers" (3)

Webinars

Starting in March, webinars will be held on the second Friday of each month and the fourth Sunday of each month. This means that the March webinars will be March 12th and March 28th. This change is to allow those who are otherwise occupied on Sunday evenings to be able to attend one webinar a month. Fridays were chosen since no clubs currently meet on Friday evenings.



The following awards are the awards presented to clubs or individuals at the annual conference in May. Plan now for how your club or a member in your club might achieve one (or more) of these awards.

Awards for Which a Submission Must Be Made

Dave Rosvall Award — an award presented to a District 45 Toastmaster who has demonstrated long-term and meritorious service to the District above the club level. This can be for someone who has conducted Speechcraft or Youth Leadership programs, helped with sample meetings for a new club, has been a club sponsor, mentor or coach, served as a District leader at any level or for other activities beyond the club level. The recipient is determined each year by the Past District Governors and Directors. The recipient must have been a D45 Toastmaster for at least 10 years and must be planning to attend the conference. District Governors must have been out of office for at least 5 years before receiving the award. Although the award is chosen by PDGs/PDDs, if you know of a member you feel is eligible for this award, send the name along with the reasons why this person should receive the award to the Immediate Past District Director.

District Awards

Toastmaster of the Year award – given to a member who best exemplifies Toastmasters International values in supporting the District and club missions. The Toastmaster of the Year is expected to excel in a variety of leadership and communication; educational; and marketing and public relations activities. The time frame covered will be the previous May 1st to April 30th. Form 1113 Outstanding Toastmaster Guidelines (attached) must be completed and sent to your Area and Division Director as well as the District Director by May 5th.

Shirley Kelly Memorial award – presented to a member who exemplifies the mission and values of a Toastmaster and empowers fellow Toastmasters to be successful by sharing the spotlight. Nominees must be a DTM, served on the District Executive, have been a Toastmaster for at least 5 years, and served the District in various capacities. Nominations can be made by any member; however, recipients must be nominated by <u>at least two Toastmasters</u>. A Selection Committee, comprised of a representative from each province/state, and a family member (if available) will select the recipient. The Selection Committee is chaired by a Division Director.

MultiMedia Omnipresence award - presented to the club judged to use all aspects of public relations to the best advantage of their club. Included could be: newspaper, newsletters, website, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Clubs (usually the President or Vice President of Public Relations) submit a portfolio of 8-10 samples of their public relations efforts to the District Public Relations Manager covering the time frame July 1st to April 15th. Deadline for submission: April 16th. The Public Relations Manager and a team comprised of Vice Presidents of Public Relations would review and decide on the winner.

AWARDS CALCULATED BY THE DISTRICT

Excellence in Education Award - awarded to any club that has achieved any of the first four (4) education points in the Distinguished Club Program for the past three (3) years

Excellence in Leadership Award – awarded to any club that has achieved points 5 and 6 of the Distinguished Club Program and has had at least four (4) officers trained in each TLI period for the past three (3) years.

District Awards cont'd

Trailblazer Award – presented to individual members who achieve any 4 levels in Pathways during one Toastmaster year. The 4 levels do not have to be in the same path. First- time recipients receive a binder in which to store their certificates and a Trailblazer pin. Repeat recipients receive a certificate and a small gift. Only one Trailblazer award can be earned in one year.

Distinguished by April 30th Award –presented to any club that has achieved 5 or 6 points in the Distinguished Club Plan by April 30th and has the requisite number of members to qualify for Distinguished.

Select Distinguished by April 30th Award – presented to any club that has achieved 7 or 8 points in the Distinguished Club Plan by April 30th and has the requisite number of members to qualify for Distinguished.

President's Distinguished by April 30th Award –presented to any club that has achieved 9 or 10 points in the Distinguished Club Plan by April 30th and has the requisite number of members to qualify for Distinguished.

Terry Chinnery Award – presented to the club with the greatest percentage increase in members from the previous April.

Ted Nichols Award – presented to the club with the greatest membership retention. The base membership on July 1 is the starting point and is compared to the membership after the April renewals with new members being taken into account. A club must have a minimum membership number of 20 to qualify.

Wendy Harding Award for Member Engagement – given to clubs that have 70% or more of their base membership achieve an educational award. The award is based on the number of members achieving Levels, not on the number of Levels achieved. Achievements by new members count.



The Chair of the Nominating Committee is usually the Immediate Past President. It's time to start thinking about succession and who will be on the executive for 2021 - 2022.

Talk to members to find out what officer positions they might be interested in. Find out if there are any barriers keeping them from offering for an executive position. Perhaps they feel they are too new. Look at what skills they bring from their work or from another organization that will be applicable to one of the officer roles.

Encourage members to take the challenge of becoming an officer. Talk to them about the benefits of being an officer and what they will learn. Offer to be a mentor to them.

Fhings to Remembe

Don't minimize the role. Let them know there are expectations for the role and it requires some commitment outside of the club meeting. Executive meetings and TLIs are two examples. Don't stop looking just because you have one candidate. Think how exciting the election would be if each position had two or more candidates!

After your election, submit the names of the new officers to TI. Also, send the names to your current Division Director. They need this to publicize the TLI as names are not available through TI until the end of July. Successful elections will start the club off on the right foot for the new year.

TALK UP TOASTMASTERS

Talk Up Toastmasters begins today (February 1) and runs to March 31st. There are incentives offered by TI if you add 5 new, dual or reinstated members. District 45 is offering incentives in addition to those offered by TI. Those incentives are:

- ✓ \$25 District Dollars for clubs that gain 1 or 2 new members via a drawing. (6 winners).
- ✓ \$50 District Dollars for clubs that gain 3 or 4 new members via a drawing (6 winners).
- ✓ \$75 District Dollars for clubs that gain 5 or more new members via a drawing (6 winners).
 - Membership Increase January to end of March
 Clubs that increase their net membership (from the October dues) by 10% (rounded to the nearest full number) between January 1 and March 31 (with dues paid by March 31) will be awarded \$25 District Dollars.

INCENTIVES

In the January newsletter, under incentives, it was announced that the District would pay up to \$25 for boosting an Open House event. It is up to you to determine what constitutes an Open House. The main thing is that you invite non-Toastmasters and ensure they are informed about the Toastmasters program during this event.


