WE MAKE TOASTMASTERS A SECRET when we don't talk about our activities. You don't need to wait for a special event. Of course, when you have an event, be sure to mention it. Here are a few ideas on how to invite others to your club.

TM is holding an open house next week, I'd like you to be my guest.

TM is having a social, I'd like you to meet some of the people who have been a positive influence on me.

TM is conducting leadership training, come and learn about leading a volunteer organization.

TM is holding the largest public speaking contest in the world, it starts with club contests, come to our club and see where it all starts.

These ideas work for both online meetings as well as for in-person meetings. Too many clubs and members seem to be waiting for in-person meetings to resume to recruit. Members are learning skills with online meetings that are proving useful in the work environment. Share these benefits as well:

POWER OF CONTROL AND POWER OF INFLUENCE



Psychologist David McClelland believed that the specific needs of the individual are acquired over time and get molded with one's experience of one's life. He has identified three basic motivating needs we all have. One of them is

our *need for power*. He describes power as having the ability to induce or influence the behavior of others. Have you ever stopped to think for a minute how your *need for power* affects the influence you have on people? Are you aware of the type of *need for power* you are expressing? There are powers we express that can positively influence peoples and there are powers that push people away. John French and Bertram Raven both argued that power could be divided into *Five Powers which are:*

- 1. *Power by Reward* where rewards are offered as motivators.
- 2. Coercive Power where threats are used as motivators.
- 3. Legitimate Power is bestowed because of the position the leader holds.

These three powers are powers of control and become non-effective when dealing with volunteers. It seems the more we try to control others in our *need for power*, the more we push people away.

The other two types of power are:

- 4. Expert power is attained when we have a high level of knowledge or a set of specialized skills where others need to acquire to accomplish their personal goals. We are usually drawn to these individuals more than to someone just holding a formal position title.
- 5. Referent power is one of the most influential powers we can have. It is acquired by building strong interpersonal relationships with our people.

Investing time, value, and energy in people gives us power. *Expert* and *referent* powers are powers of influences that work in any type of environment. While referent power is, to some extent, bestowed upon us we can choose which of these powers is best to exercise in any given situation.

I have assembled the DLC team that will call for nominations, assess nomination papers, interview candidates, and then nominate a slate of candidates for your consideration at the District 45 Annual Business Meeting (ABM) in May 2021. The voters at the ABM are the Club Presidents and VPs Education in attendance. Because the District Council meeting will be held on line, Presidents and VPEs must be in attendance to vote. There is no proxy voting for an online meeting.

The District Leadership Committee has been finalized. There is a requirement for Divisions to be equally represented (excluding the

Chair) and this has been accomplished. Your Committee members who will be working hard to find the best candidates for elected District offices are:

I expect we'll invite nominations as soon as mid-December with a cut-off date for submissions of mid-January. Shortly thereafter interviews will begin, followed by deliberations and internal voting by the DLC members. We are expected to propose a slate of nominees to the District Director at least six weeks prior to the ABM in May. The slate of nominees will then be made available to you, the voters, at least four weeks prior to the ABM.

Change is all around us and it's inevitable. The rate of change is often so sweeping and so substantial that it can be difficult to know what to do. How do we prepare ourselves to deal with change? How do we use the winds of change and harness them for our advantage? There are five basic qualities of professionalism that can help us manage the change we face in all aspects of our lives and particularly the change we face in our clubs. The five qualities of professionalism are stated here along with some suggestions on how using those qualities in your club can help your club and your members be successful.

Learning

Learning must be ongoing or we quickly stagnate. Encourage life-long learning in your clubs by all members. Ensure the more senior members are continually active in a variety of ways so they continue to learn. Some of the ways in which you can encourage learning are:

- ✓ ensuring all speeches are project speeches
- conducting Speechcraft or Youth Leadership courses
- ✓ participating in joint meetings
- ✓ encouraging members to visit other clubs
- encouraging attendance at Area, Division and District events
- ensuring all officers and other interested members attend club officer training.

Salesmanship

If we are to succeed, we must be able to sell ourselves, our ideas and our organization. How do we do that? Find out what the needs of a potential member are and tell that person how Toastmasters can fulfill that need. The need may be speaking or it may be learning how to run a meeting, how to constructively evaluate, leadership skills or social opportunities. Always be positive about the organization - wear your Toastmasters pin. Let people know how you have benefited from your participation in Toastmasters.

Adaptability

Abraham Lincoln said, "As times are new, so we must think and act anew." The real test of a professional is to improvise, to make do, to adapt. Does your club adapt and do you help your members adapt, improvise and make do? Our meetings encourage adaptability through Table Topics. Table Topics can help members learn to improvise and to think "on their feet". Adaptability has been, and will need to continue to be, shown through the use on online meetings.

Putting People First

We must always remember to put people first. Remember, all club members are volunteers and their time and needs must be respected. Determine the member's needs and ensure the club program is meeting those needs. Determine the commitment that each member wants to make and respect that. Remember that members' needs and their commitment will change over time and that should be taken into account. As the members feel they are benefiting from the program, they will be more likely to take a greater interest and assume greater responsibility but they have to first see the benefit to themselves. Incorporating social opportunities also helps members get to know each other better which in turn leads to members feeling more valued.

Excellence

If we are going to be able to cope and to adjust and to use change, we must strive for excellence. We should strive for excellence in all aspects of our meetings. Club leaders and senior members should act as role models for newer members and approach each task with a view to how it could be done better than last time. Do not settle for mediocrity in the business meeting, in Table Topics, in speeches, in introductions or in evaluations. If the club executive set the standard in these areas, the members will respond accordingly.

As you progress in the levels of your path, you will notice that the projects get more detailed and the requirements change. Speeches tend to get longer and you are asked to plan, execute and evaluate events and projects. You may even need a committee to assist you with these projects. My challenge to you is to think outside of your club, Area and Division. You could present a topic at a Sunday night webinar; you could do a podcast or a blog and ask that it be featured on our new website; or you could ask to help plan the next series of officer training. There are many opportunities to step outside your comfort zone and improve your leadership skills. Seek out new and exciting opportunities outside of your club, all while working on your path!

The Active Listening project is an elective for most Paths in Level 3 and it's a required project in several Paths in Level 2. This project requires you to be Table Topics Master and show you are listening by commenting on each topic as you sequey to the next speaker. The Manage an Online Meeting project is an elective project in Level 4 for all Paths. All of our meetings are online now so if you are serving as Toastmaster or Chair of your meeting, you can be evaluated for this project.

Director. This award, the Wendy Harding **Award for Member Engagement** will be given to clubs that have 70% or more of their base membership achieve an educational award. The award is based on the number of members achieving Levels, not on the number of Levels achieved. For example, if your base membership is 20 you would need to have 14 members achieve at least one Level to qualify for the award. If you grew your membership to 25, you would still only need 14 members to achieve a Level as your base does not change. Achievements by new members count. Wendy always encouraged members to be fully engaged in the Toastmasters program. The intent of the award is to recognize Wendy's commitment to member engagement by asking clubs to engage their members in the Toastmasters educational program.

Website survey/contest




