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# THE ROAD TO DISTINGUISHED TOASTMASTER

**PROGRAM QUALITY DIRECTOR JIM WISTED, DTM** 



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We are half way through the year and it has been on-line. This has offered a different approach and I am proud of how well everyone has adapted. I would like to discuss the

ptimes program options for the 2020 – 2021 year. For most of you, the only option for a DTM is through Pathways. For those who started in the Legacy Program prior to the 2019 – 2020 year, you can still achieve a Legacy DTM up to the end of June 30, 2021 as long as the only requirement you need is an Advanced Leader Silver. Here are each program's requirements for achieving DTM.

# PATHWAYS EDUCATION PROGRAM DTM

- 1. Complete two learning paths.
- 2. Serve as a club officer for 12 months. (You can fulfill this requirement by serving as a club officer two six-month terms, but you don't have to do it in consecutive terms.)
- 3. Serve a complete term as a district officer. A complete term is defined as having served at least from September 1 through June 30.
- 4. Serve successfully as a club mentor or coach.
- 5. Serve successfully as a club sponsor or conduct a Speechcraft or Youth Leadership.

complete the DTM project. (Members are required to create and implement a project of their own design, in which they demonstrate the skills and expertise they have gained.)

# **LEGACY EDUCATION PROGRAM**

Toastmasters International has extended the deadline for submitting the Advanced Leadership Silver (ALS). This extension allows:

- 1. Successful Club Coaches to file for Club Coach Credit AND Year of District Service.
- 2. Club Mentors, assigned no later than December 31, 2020.
- 3. Club Sponsors of new clubs can receive Sponsor credit.
- 4. Area Directors serving the 2020-2021 year can file for a year of District service for an ALS.
- 5. Complete a High Performance Leadership program.

All these MUST be filed by June 30, 2021 to receive credit.

Awards for Leadership Excellence (High Performance Leadership), and Distinguished Toastmaster in the traditional program must be submitted by June 30, 2021.

I look forward to a successful year with the help of all the members of District 45. We are strong and have many interesting and talented members.

# **USING PROCESS GOALS**

Your Club Growth Tip: use PROCESS GOALS to grow your club! Goal setting is an excellent way to focus the attention of your club. However, have you ever noticed that deadlines tend to slip as you reach them? If all of your goals are due on June 30, how do you know if you are on track to completing them?

PROCESS goals are the small steps you take to achieve your larger goal. PROCESS goals can help you stay on track because they are based on doing activities that help achieve your goal. For example, suppose your club sets a goal of gaining 10 new members this year. You set several progress goals to help accomplish this goal.

**Process Goal 1:** At every officer meeting, the VP Membership will report on number of new members and new member induction.

**Process Goal 2:** At every officer meeting, the VP PR will report on status of reaching potential members.

**Process Goal 3:** At each club meeting, the club President will greet all visitors and invite them to come back and join.

If you don't know what process goals will work, use the <u>Moments of Truth</u> at your next club meeting. This activity always brings up dozens of small things that your club could do. Make some of these ideas your process goals and use them to grow your club.

The New Year A time to say goodbye
and a time to say hello.



In December your District Leadership Committee (DLC) team issued a call for nominations to prospective candidates for district office in 2021-2022. The DLC responsibility is to assess any material and any interviews conducted with candidates, and

then nominate the best of those qualified for consideration of the voters at the May 2021 District Business Meeting. The voters are the 100+ Club Presidents and the 100+ Education Vice-Presidents from all of the clubs in District 45, and the members of the District Executive Committee which includes Area Directors, the District Director and all officers between these positions.

Nominations close on January 20, 2021. Typically, a candidate nominates himself or herself, but you may also nominate a candidate, whom the DLC will then approach and ask if they wish to accept and proceed with the nomination. Importantly, any candidate that offers for election in May 2021 \*must\* go through this process with the DLC. In olden days, sometimes members were inspired at the business meeting and spontaneously offered to run for election. Our bylaws have changed. The DLC may choose to not nominate one or more candidates, at which point those candidates who did not secure a nomination can declare their intent to run from the floor. To rephrase, the only floor candidates that can enter into the May election are candidates who submitted paperwork to the DLC, and were interviewed by the DLC, but were not nominated by the DLC.

Imagine going from being an active, vivacious young girl to someone, who when afflicted with a childhood illness, had to learn \*everything\* all over again, including learning to walk and to speak.

Shirley Kelly DTM was that young girl. Although she learned the physical aspects of recovery, finding her voice took some coaxing. When her brother Dale, who was a Toastmaster, insisted that she attend a meeting, she had no idea the impact she would have on members, not only in her home club of Riverview Canusa, but also in District 45 and indeed internationally.

Shirley Kelly was a quiet supporter and motivator of members everywhere. While not overt in her insistence, she continuously and gently encouraged members to be involved to

learn and explore leadership opportunities. On her journey through the Toastmasters program, achieving her Distinguished Toastmaster Status, she also went on to become the District 45 Governor in 2004. Her theme in her District Governor year to "Step into the Spotlight" was a goal she had for all Toastmasters.

When Shirley was diagnosed with Ovarian Cancer, she made it her mission to educate women everywhere on the symptoms, the causes and the treatment. She began fundraising for the Ovarian Cancer Walk of Hope in Moncton / Riverview, and the success of that drive grew every year under her leadership and vision.

Shirley had a keen drive for planning and organizing events. Through her vision and delegation, she drew out others to excel and succeed in their own niche. Being a great delegator included having the right person assigned to the right job. Her attention to detail was a skill that she excelled in and shared. She recognized the strengths in others, and offered opportunities for them to step out of their comfort zone and to grow as speakers and leaders.

Her energy was boundless – in promoting Toastmasters events throughout the "greater Riverview" area clubs and beyond, and in her emails that were sent at all hours of the day and night. One had to wonder if she ever slept!

Shirley offered support in evaluations, seeking the positive, and urging members to grow through encouraging words, and overcoming challenges. She encouraged members to develop their own personal communication styles.

Shirley's goal was always to Share the Spotlight! Shirley saw the potential in others and through her mentoring and encouragement drew out that potential – making sure you were comfortable and supported in your personal growth and development as a leader and speaker.

We have proudly inscribed on the lectern that Shirley's family kindly donated to the Advanced Spotlight Club in her memory:

Ken Hubley is a relatively new Toastmaster, joining Schooner Toastmasters #3978 in April 2020. When he approached the Present a Proposal project of Level 3 of the Innovative Planning Path, Ken wanted to use it to do some good in the world. He believes that if someone should do something why not him? Ken gave his speech in November and was so passionate he took twice the time he needed!

Ken wrote a proposal that his city, Halifax Regional Municipality (HRM), have a day to honor first responders and encourage parents and children to have a conversation about first responders. He called it Frontline Worker Day of Appreciation and Conversation. Ken's proposal is similar to a movement he is trying to create called Autograph of Heroes. Children learn that first responders are heroes and our friends and then ask them for their autographs. The objective to help First Responder feel appreciated and children to feel safe. His movement is starting to take root in Canada, United States and New Zealand.

Ken worked with the Mayor's office and it passed on the Council's Agenda on December 1. The proclamation declares December 14, 2020 Frontline workers Day of Appreciation and Conversation in HRM. Ken is appreciative of all front-line workers, especially the heroes that risk their safety to help us. 2020 has been a unique year and Ken is thankful for our front-line workers.

Ken is a children's book author whose books encourage parents and children to talk about important topics like bullying, Kids Help Phone, fitting in, and first responders. His website is www.autographofheroes.com.

Ken's efforts demonstrate how you can make a connection between Toastmasters and the community. It also shows that one person CAN make a difference.



Evaluation is what makes Toastmasters unique. Not only do we get evaluation of our speeches, we also get the meeting as a whole evaluated. Effective evaluations can be a determinant of club success. How can you ensure that your club members give effective evaluations? To help with this, you can periodically present the Successful Club Series module *Evaluate to Motivate*. An even better tool for improving evaluations is the Success/Communication program *Effective Evaluation*. This module will require a full two-hour meeting or could be split into two one-hour sessions. Evaluations often substantially improve after a club conducts this module. Each club should consider conducting this module once every two years. It is valuable information for new members and a good refresher for experienced members.

You can also improve your evaluations by keeping the following suggestions in mind:

Always give a recommendation for improvement, regardless of the experience level of the speaker. However, you should not overwhelm a speaker with suggestions but rather give one or two recommendations that the speaker can incorporate into the next speech.

**Base your speech evaluation on the objectives for the particular project.** A speaker may demonstrate great presentation skills but not meet most, or any, of the project objectives. The evaluation should not just focus on the presentation skills but also the organization, the message and whether the speaker met the objectives of the project.

**Address the evaluation to the speaker.** When evaluating, look at the speaker or mention the speaker's name. Without that, members can sometimes be left wondering which speaker was being evaluated.

**Do not evaluate based on "assumptions" about what makes a good presentation.** Too many evaluations criticize a speaker for using notes when using notes may have been appropriate. Rather, it's better to comment on how effectively the speaker used notes. As well, too many evaluations criticize the speaker for using the lectern. There is nothing wrong, per se, with using the lectern. If a speaker feels more comfortable using a lectern. Comment on how well they used the lectern – could they been seen, did they have appropriate body language, etc.?

**Remember that an evaluation is your opinion.** Use phrases such as "I feel", "I would like to see", etc. As a speaker, remember that if you don't agree with your evaluation, ask another member to give you their evaluation.

**Encourage all members to provide an evaluation.** Provide additional feedback to speakers or to a member fulfilling another meeting role. The more feedback we receive, the better our chances of improving.

Use these suggestions and you will *engage*, *educate* and *encourage* your members through effective evaluations.

When working towards a Distinguished Toastmaster (DTM) award in Pathways, you are required to complete a DTM project where you are asked to create and implement a project of your own design, in which you can demonstrate the skills and expertise that you have gained. To get access to the DTM project in Pathways, you have to complete Level 3 in your second path and then email <a href="mailto:educationprogram@toastmasters.org">educationprogram@toastmasters.org</a> to ask that the project be added to your transcript.

Remember that there are several projects that you can get credit for while fulfilling a role in your club meeting. The Active Listening Project (a required Level 2 project in some Paths and an elective for Level 3 in the other Paths) requires you to be Table Topics Master and show active listening skills by commenting on each Table Topic. Moderate an Online Meeting is an elective in Level 4 of each Path and you can achieve this by running your club meeting online. Since you no longer need to complete each Level in sequence you can skip to another Level to complete the project that goes with your role in the club meeting.

This webinar on January 24th will be hosted by Michael Thompson, DTM. Michael has been a member of Toastmasters since 2006; he belongs to two local clubs Schooner Toastmasters and Toast of the Coast. He has held various executive roles at the club level. At the District level Michael has been a Division Director and Area Governor/Director twice. Michael has also served as the District Parliamentarian, Conference Photographer and as a Pathways Ambassador.

Michael has gathered three experienced Toastmasters to form the panel for this webinar. This is an opportunity for you to learn the ins and outs of competing in a Toastmasters Speech Contest from fellow Toastmasters with a depth of knowledge that few of us possess. There will be several prepared questions for the panelists, and then you, the audience, will have the opportunity to ask some of your own questions.

Webinars

Engagement, education and encouragement are the keys to District 45 success. We realize that the first half of this Toastmasters year has been difficult for most of you. We applaud your efforts in continuing your meetings and in trying to recruit new members. To help you along during the second half of the Toastmasters year, we are offering a number of member and club incentives. By rewarding and recognizing engaged members for their educational achievements and clubs for their successes, we are encouraging everyone to excel.



The recognition and rewards will be in the form of District Dollars. What is a District Dollar? District Dollars are amounts are redeemable on selections from Toastmasters International. Winners make a selection from the TI store and notify the District leaders of their choice. The District will then order the selected item for shipping to the

recipient. If you receive more than one award, you may combine these awards in choosing items from the store.

Starting on January 1, 2021, District 45 is offering the following incentives:

# **EDUCATION AND TRAINING RECOGNITION**

- TLI Attendance Clubs that have all their officers attend the upcoming TLIs will be entered into a drawing. Six winners will be awarded \$25 District Dollars.
- Distinguished by April 30 Clubs that achieve any level of Distinguished status by April 30 will be entered into a drawing for a prize of \$50 District Dollars (one winner from each level of Distinguished).
- Excellence in Education Clubs that have achieved any of the first four (4) education points in the Distinguished Club Program for the past three (3) years will be entered into a draw for \$50 District Dollars (3 winners, one for each level).
- Excellence in Leadership Clubs that have achieved points 5 and 6 of the Distinguished Club Program and have had at least four (4) officers trained in each TLI period for the past three (3) years will be entered into a draw for \$25 District Dollars (3 winners).

# **ACHIEVING DISTINGUISHED CLUB POINTS**

- Clubs that achieve any level of Distinguished by the end of the year will be entered into a draw for \$75 District Dollars (3 winners, one for each level).
- Clubs that achieve Distinguished Club points (5 or 6 points but do not meet the membership requirement) will be eligible for \$10 District Dollars in a draw (5 winners).
- Clubs that achieve Select Distinguished points (7 or 8 points but do not meet the membership requirement) will be eligible for \$25 District Dollars in a draw (5 winners).
- Clubs that achieve President's Distinguished points (9 or 10 but do not meet the membership requirement) will be eligible for \$50 District Dollars in a draw (5 winners).

# **Membership Growth Recognition**

- There are two remaining Toastmasters International membership campaign which are Talk Up Toastmasters (February 1 - March 31) and Beat the Clock (May 1 - June 30). In addition to the TI awards for these campaigns, District 45 will award:
- Membership Increase January to end of March Clubs that increase their net membership (from the October dues) by 10% (rounded to the nearest full number) between January 1 and March 31 (with dues paid by March 31) will be awarded \$25 District Dollars.
- Membership Increase April to end of June Clubs that increase their membership by 15% (rounded to the nearest full number) between April 1 and June 30 will be awarded \$25 District Dollars.

# **OPEN HOUSE INCENTIVE**

- Set up your Open House as an event on Facebook.
- Boost the event.
- Submit the bill for boosting and you will be reimbursed up to \$25.00.

# **CLUB COACH RECOGNITION**

- Club Coach Because of the great need for Club Coaches, District 45 is offering a special recognition incentive for members willing to serve as coaches for 2 or more clubs.
   Qualifying coaches will receive \$25 District Dollars per club served. Requirements for this incentive are:
  - ✓ Such coaches will be required to attend a meeting of their coached clubs at least once per quarter.
  - ✓ In addition to those club visits, coaches must have a joint meeting with both/all clubs' executive committees once per month.
  - ✓ Coaches must start in the club role no later than March 1st

The District will, of course, continue to offer its regular recognition such as the Trailblazer pin, binders for first-time Trailblazer achievers, DTM pins and certificates for a number of activities. Awards will be outlined in the February issue of the newsletter.

**Things to Remember** 

How quickly do new members give their IceBreaker speech in your club? You should encourage a new member to give the speech as soon as possible. The earlier they give the speech, the more likely they are to continue speaking and assume other roles in the meeting. As a club officer, are you ensuring that all members are participating in all roles in the meeting? If you use a sign-up sheet, members may not sign up for roles with which they don't feel comfortable. However, if they don't do the role, they will never get comfortable doing the role. Evaluation is one in particular that members often feel uncomfortable with. Members cannot earn a Level 1 without having given a speech evaluation. Encourage new members and assure them that they already have evaluation skills. Giving an evaluation in Toastmasters only helps them to hone those skills. The more that you encourage members to participate in all roles, the more the member will gain from their membership and the more likely they are to stay with the club because they can see the benefits to them. Monitor what roles members are assuming and encourage everyone to be an active participant in every meeting. Don't be afraid to schedule members for roles. There is an assumption that members will resist and some might but you may be surprised how many members welcome the scheduling. Remember to encourage every member to achieve at least one Level each year.

# **AREA 19 UPDATE**



Greetings my fellow Toastmasters!

We have a unique opportunity to lead in a way that promotes real enthusiasm and exemplifies the true spirit of what it means to be a Toastmaster!

- 1. During this period of COVID-19, attracting guests has been more difficult as we aren't meeting in person.
- 2. As a result of this, some clubs have unusually low membership, which further reduces attendance.
- 3. Toastmasters meetings with low attendance can be draining for regular attendees and less inspiring for prospective members.

As Division C leaders, we have asked, What are we prepared to do about it? We, you and I, have the ability to help those who find themselves in clubs in which the membership has declined. 

Works with technical chair and conference chair to develop an overall "look" for the conference


# **Registration Chair**
