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MOLDED BY MY MENTORS DISTRICT DIRECTOR JONATHAN BOHM, DTM

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Our chief want in life is somebody who will make us do what we can. — Ralph Waldo Emerson

Didn't we all realize this when

we were very young? Once we learned to say "da-da" or "ma-ma", it was an uphill quest that we knew we could not do alone.

Looking back, I see that it was not just my parents, not the teachers, who molded me. Yes, they taught me how to tie my shoes and how to read. But it was the people who gave me perspective rather than knowledge who I remember. They are my mentors.

My piano teacher was my first mentor. You might expect that she taught me to read music, which she did, and play the piano, a futile effort. Every week, rather than fumble through pieces, we'd talk. We'd have intelligent discussions about history, politics, and best of all, art. I grasped that art is for the many and not the few. Alas, not all teachers hold the promise of mentoring. In Architecture school, my professors were needlers, ridiculers, tormentors, sadists. They were sadly ignorant of Plato's admonition:

Do not train a child to learn by force or harshness; but direct them to it by what amuses their minds, so that you may be better able to discover with accuracy the peculiar bent of the genius of each.

After the dreadful university years, I returned to San Francisco. As a designer at a large firm my drawing board was behind the man – my boss. Kaz, a Berkeley grad, was a great philosopher. What I learned from Kaz was not just the intricacies of concrete detailing. I savored the art of wood construction at his hand-built home high in the Berkeley hills.. I developed a life creed: design to live. Live well and don't get locked into dead end jobs. I followed Kaz to three firms over the years.

Early in this century I wanted to write. I went to Taos to study with Natalie Goldberg. Natalie teaches us to write without stopping the hand, without editing, digging unconsciously into wild mind. Her mentoring opened me to to listening, to observing, and to trusting my own voice.

In Toastmasters, mentors from Nova Scotia to South Dakota unstintingly mentor me, guiding my self-improvement. From my icebreaker to my leadership roles, I've had generous support and copious encouragement.

As I've been molded, I recall the sagacity of Benjamin Disraeli: "The greatest good you can do for another is not just to share your riches but to reveal to him his own."

THE PERSONAL INVITE

Is your club struggling to recruit new members? If so, you are not alone. Only about a third of the clubs have recruited at least 4 new members and only six have recruited at least 8 new members. You've heard about using social media to promote your club. A good website and effective use of Facebook can attract guests and it's then up to your club to convert them to members.

Many clubs and members, however, are overlooking the most effective way of recruiting new members. That method is simply asking people to attend a meeting. When you're giving a speech, invite friends, co-workers and family to join the meeting to watch your speech. Seeing what you've accomplished and how the meeting is run may be the incentive they need to join.

Are you part of another organization or of a group on Facebook? Perhaps you are part of neighbourhood group or you belong to a book club? Other members of these groups are all people you can invite. If they say no the first time, don't give up. Mention it every few weeks and they may eventually come. A Past District Director in another District was reluctant to join her corporate club. One of the members said he would invite every meeting as he had to go by her desk on the way to the meeting. It took six months but eventually she caved. She went from not wanting to join to becoming District Director. Show your persistence and persuasiveness in extending personal invitations to your club. You may be surprised how effective this simple method is in growing your club.

Spring will come and so will happiness. Hold on. Life will get warmer.

Are you or have you been a club officer? Have you used Club Central? Often, it is only the Vice President Education who uses it to submit awards, the Vice President Membership to add new members, the Treasurer to submit dues and the Secretary to submit the new officers.

There are many other reasons to visit Club Central. Did you know you can get a record of which members have contributed which awards to the club (if your club chartered? Depending on when your club chartered, the awards may not go back to the start. Again, depending on when your club chartered, you may be able to obtain a list of the charter members. These reports are available under Administrative Reports.

You can print an anniversary certificate which is available under Club
Achievements. You can view and update your club's meeting location along with other information. Note that if you change your meeting location, the map does not automatically update - you need to update it yourself.

HOW ARE YOU SHARING OUR GIFT?

Sharing the gift of Toastmasters is an important duty of all members. We want people to join our clubs to improve their skills and have fun with us! How are you telling the world about this wonderful gift? Are you using all the tools we have available to promote the benefits of Toastmasters and sharing how it has helped you improve your speaking and listening skills?

When you think about the reason you purchase a certain product or attend a movie, how do you make those choices? Perhaps it is because someone raved about how awesome it was and suggested that you should purchase it or watch it? It is the same with Toastmasters, we need to talk about it with people and share with them how awesome the educational program is and showcase the leadership opportunities! The personal ask is way more effective than a mass email. People want to feel special and saying no directly to you is that much harder!

A great way to share the Toastmasters opportunity is to host an open house for your club. Toastmasters International has tools on their website that you can edit to help promote your Open House event. To host a successful open house event, you want to have your members involved and get them to invite people in their network. Who should you invite to an open house? EVERYONE! The more people there, the merrier! To spread the word, you should have fliers created with the important information - date, time, location, and the details for a contact person in your club. Have members share these fliers on bulletin boards in your community and online.

Did you know that District 45 has an incentive for boosting an open house? If you create an event on your club's Facebook social media page and boost the event, the District will reimburse you up to \$25.00 for that boost!

Boosting an event:

- Turns it into an ad that can appear in people's News Feed.
- Adds a Sponsored label at the top of the ad.
- Will let you include either a "Get Tickets" or "Interested" button
- You can target certain demographics.
- You can set your budget and determine approximately how many people your ad with reach.

Once your event has passed and you have the receipts from the event boost that Facebook provided (usually one receipt per day), you can send them to our Finance Manager, Heather Perkins for reimbursement up to \$25.00.

notable accomplishments in her more than 35 years as a Toastmaster include: obtaining the Distinguished Toastmaster

Recipients of this award are selected at the sole discretion of the International President.

2020-2021 District 45 Leadership Committee Chair

Have you heard the news? Speechcraft has gone digital! Toastmasters International has revamped Speechcraft and aligned it with Pathways online. Speechcraft is currently only available in English but Toastmasters International will add materials in additional languages as they continue to improve the Speechcraft program.

What is Speechcraft and how can you use it?

- A program that experienced members can host for adult participants.
- Focus is to help participants improve public speaking skills and provide a safe & supportive environment.
- Each Speechcraft can be four, six or eight sessions in length.
- Each Speechcraft bundle costs \$50.00 USD and accommodates five participants.
- Speechcraft must be hosted at the club level, not at Area, Division or District.
- Clubs can host Speechcraft to raise funds for the club and increase awareness of the club in the community.

As the coordinator you login to the Speechcraft Gateway and create an event to host Speechcraft and register participants. Once you have recruited your participants, the Coordinator adds participants into the Speechcraft Gateway event, and the participant will have to accept the registration. Using the Speechcraft Gateway, the Coordinator will be able to track and validate the Speechcrafters speeches and use the dashboard to track the movement of participants.

There are eight projects in Speechcraft:

- Choose a Topic
- Prepare to Present
- · Giving and Receiving Feedback
- Know Your Purpose
- Body Language
- How to Evaluate
- Vocal Variety
- Powerful Words

Speechcrafters will be awarded badges on Basecamp when they complete speeches. Each speech completed in Speechcraft will be counted as credit towards Pathways if the participant decides to join a club. There are three self-assessments for the participants to complete and the coordinator will have access to these to see how the participant feels about their experience and growth.

Speechcrafters access the learning materials through the Speechcraft Gateway portal in Basecamp. Participants will have access to the Speechcraft materials 90 days after the end date of the event.

5-7 mins...as a Toastmaster, these are our defining moments. Most of our speeches are 5-7 minutes. Most competitions are conducted in 5-7 minutes.

In the age of Zoom we are invited to adapt, and Toastmasters have done so with vigor! However, even the most stalwart among us get fatigued from time to time. Let's take a look at some of the opportunities as well as the challenges that go with accepting the role of Zoomer:

Opportunities

- 1. Tune in by turning on...your computer! Finished with your meeting? Simply walk into another room to relax. No snow, sleet, or cold wind on the agenda!
- Have access to a wider, even international network and audience. We get to experience ourselves as an international organization on a much deeper level.
- 3. As Toastmasters executives, we can get to know members of our clubs on a deeper level because we can regularly tune in to their meetings. We don't have to factor in long commutes to attend.
- 4. It is an opportunity to exercise our CHOPS to create a Challenge and Opportunity Strategy. This is our leadership challenge. How can I transform this challenge into an opportunity for everyone concerned?
- 5. From Boomer to Zoomer! For any of us born into the Baby Boom generation, we are now a part of Gen Z *Generation Zoom*!
- 6. We have a personal teleporter at our fingertips. Through the portal of our computer, we can Zoom all over the world! We can welcome guests from all over the world as well!
- 7. Cats and dogs can regularly attend Toastmasters meetings! Bonus!

Challenges

Poor internet connection. A major challenge, for sure.

2. I sit for work, I sit for Toastmasters.

Solution: Modern thought leader Brendon Burchard recommends taking regular breaks to increase productivity. Every hour, take a 5-7 min nature break! Not necessarily that kind of nature break...I'm talking about nature bathing – taking yourself outside and do a full-body immersion in nature for a few powerful moments. Other options are stretching/yoga, meditation, or one of my favorites – doing a few sets of squats and lunges with free weights.

3. Zoomed out or stressed out? Are you feeling mentally and physically drained because you are bombarded with invitations?

Solution: Parse your invitations! Utilize Stephen R. Covey's Time Management Matrix and prioritize your time.

4. Technologically inept? Reluctant to learn?

Solution: Always Lead with your Power Moves – (1) Just say Okay, I'll do it. (2) Be willing to Break those Barriers and learn new tricks. (3) Reach Out and connect – in collaboration, congratulations, and celebration with your fellow Toastmasters!

Are you working on a Path that requires you to complete projects? Look ahead to see what is needed as you may be able to connect a project with something else you are doing. Paths and Levels that may require a team or require you to make a plan (this list is far from exhaustive) include:

- Strategic Relationships Level 4, Public Relation Strategies
- Visionary Communication Level 3, Develop a Communication Plan
- Leadership Development Level 3, Planning and Implementation
- Motivational Strategies and Team Collaboration Level 4, Motivate Others
- Motivational Strategies Level 5, Team Building Innovative Planning Level 4, Manage Projects Successfully
- Dynamic Leadership and Team Collaboration Level 5, Lead in Any Situation
- Innovative Planning, Effective Coaching, Persuasive Influence Level 5, High Performance Leadership

Ideas for projects (these are but a few of the ideas that have been implemented) include:

- Developing a community garden
- Social media committee
- Developing a communication plan for an organization
- Organizing a speech contest

Did you know you can spotlight a speaker (there must be more than two people in a room to do this)? When you spotlight, as opposed to pinning, all those in the meeting will see the speaker spotlighted. By spotlighting, each member is not required to pin to be able to see the larger version of the speaker. You can spotlight up to nine participants. The ability to spotlight multiple participants is a great feature if you are doing a panel discussion or a role play. You could spotlight both the Toastmaster and the speaker while an introduction is being done and then remove the spotlight from the Toastmaster once the introduction is finished. Only a host or co-host can spotlight. Try it to determine how you can use this feature to enhance your meetings.

The first April webinar on April 9th (remember, it's Friday, not Sunday) will the third **Fireside Chat** with the District Senior Leadership Team. This is your chance to ask your questions of the team. Find out how the year is going – what have been the successes, what challenges still remain? It's also your opportunity to make suggestions on what the District leaders could do.



Webinars

The April 25th webinar will be **Parliamentary Procedure and Robert's Rules of Order**, and its use in Toastmasters

presented by Kristian Falkjar, CC, PM5, IP3, EH1. Kristian Falkjar joined Toastmasters in 2016 in Ottawa and transferred to Riverview Canusa Toastmasters in December 2019. He has held several roles within Toastmasters including club secretary, club sergeant-at-arms and now an Area Director. Kristian is excited to discuss Robert's Rules of Order and how it should be implemented in Toastmasters meetings. He will incorporate historical guidance from Toastmasters International on how to conduct a business meeting and explain the overall rationale and procedure for when it is one's turn to speak.

There will be no webinars in May because of the conference. In June, the first webinar will not be held because of the TLIs. The second webinar on June 27th will be an end-of-year social. More details will be available in upcoming issues of the newsletter.



DISTRICT AWARDS

The following are District awards for which a submission must be made.

Dave Rosvall Award — an award presented to a District 45 Toastmaster who has demonstrated long-term and meritorious service to the District above the club level. This can be for someone who has conducted Speechcraft or Youth Leadership programs, helped with sample meetings for a new club, has been a club sponsor, mentor or coach, served as a District leader at any level or for other activities beyond the club level. The recipient is determined each year by the Past District Governors and Directors. The recipient must have been a D45 Toastmaster for at least 10 years and must be planning to attend the conference. District Governors must have been out of office for at least 5 years before receiving the award. Although the award is chosen by PDGs/PDDs, if you know of a member you feel is eligible for this award, send the name along with the reasons why this person should receive the award to the Immediate Past District Director. To get a nomination form, contact Patricia MacNevin.

Toastmaster of the Year award — given to a member who best exemplifies Toastmasters International values in supporting the District and club missions. The Toastmaster of the Year is expected to excel in a variety of leadership and communication; educational; and marketing and public relations activities. The time frame covered will be the previous May 1st to April 30th. Form 1113 Outstanding Toastmaster Guidelines (attached) must be completed and sent to your Area and Division Director as well as the District Director by May 5th.

Shirley Kelly Memorial award —presented to a member who exemplifies the mission and values of a Toastmaster and empowers fellow Toastmasters to be successful by sharing the spotlight. Nominees must be a DTM, served on the District Executive, have been a Toastmaster for at least 5 years, and served the District in various capacities. Nominations can be made by any member; however, recipients must be nominated by at least two Toastmasters. Send your nominations to Division Director Alan Idler.

MultiMedia Omnipresence award - presented to the club judged to use all aspects of public relations to the best advantage of their club. Included could be: newspaper, newsletters, website, Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, etc. Clubs (usually the President or Vice President of Public Relations) submit a portfolio of 8-10 samples of their public relations efforts to the <u>District Public Relations Manager</u> covering the time frame July 1st to April 15th. Deadline for submission: April 16th.

The Darlene Dunn Outstanding Mentor Award is a new award. This new award will be given annually to recognize a member who has exhibited the heart and soul of what Toastmasters mentorship: "Encouraging success of others before self". Any member may nominate a mentor. All nominations must include a 200--500-word essay, focusing on 4 points:

- the commitment of your mentor
- how mentor helped you achieve your Toastmaster goals
- what you gained from the protégé/mentor relationship
- why you would recommend this mentor to others

The nominated mentor must have completed the Mentor Path in the Pathways.

Nominations must be submitted to Division E Director, Anne Doucette, by April 15.

INCENTIVES

One incentive announced in January was for TLI attendance. There were 11 clubs that had all their officers trained in the winter TLI. Six winners of \$25 District Dollars were randomly drawn and the winners are:




