While every carrier's residual disability rider may vary slightly, and some carriers have multiple options available within their offering-**Here's how it typically works:** When a client demonstrates a loss of income or job duties of 15%-20% over the elimination period, the residual benefit kicks in. For instance, if a client experiences a 30% loss of income, they receive 30% of their benefit. If the loss is 65%, they receive 65% of their benefit. Should the loss exceed 80%, the client may then qualify for full total disability benefits.
