The Court, having maturely considered the written recommended disposition filed with this Court on the 11<sup>th</sup> day of October, 2001, by the *Hearing Panel Subcommittee* of the Lawyer Disciplinary Board, pursuant to Rule 3.10 of the Rules of Lawyer Disciplinary Procedure, recommending that the license to practice law in the State of West Virginia of the respondent, Richard E.
