
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Broken Wheel Riding Club

The Wisconsin State FFA is looking for a Superintendent for Career Development Event (CDE) for Horse Evaluation

The Superintendent will be a person able to pull together and oversee the responsibilities listed in this handbook for conducting an event. https://wisconsinaged.org/horse

Wisconsin's Horse Evaluation CDE is held during and hosted by Midwest Horse Fair in Madison, Wisconsin.

Primary duties of Superintendent (but not the only duties):

- 1. Arrange for the live classes to be judged.
- 2. Arrange for an Official judge or committee to provide Official placings.
- 3. Generate an appropriate General Knowledge exam.
- 4. Create an appropriate Team Activity for scoring.
- 5. Arrange for volunteer Reasons judges of contestants.



PLEASE NOTE: the Midwest Horse Fair (MHF) is very helpful and they will provide the following:

- MHF will schedule the FFA State Horse Judging competition Friday, April 17th, 2026, for @2.5 hours from 8:30 a.m. 11:00 a.m. CST at the Alliant Energy Center in the Triple Crown Equine Nutrition Arena.
 Competitors will be able to leverage bleachers.
- MHF will provide two coordinators to assist with judging coordination at 2026 MHF. Coordinators will not be able to be involved as coaches or advisors of FFA competitors.
- MHF will help promote the FFA State Horse Judging Competition in the official printed program, website, via email and on social media.
- MHF will strive to provide horse participants based on FFA requirements and allow FFA superintendent access to horse participants as needed prior and during MHF.

PLEASE NOTE: all CDE superintendents in Wisconsin are volunteers.

MISSION STATEMENT:

To promote the horse through leadership, education, service, & communication

To take a proactive role in the future growth & development of the equine industry

Description

The Sponsorship Committee of Wisconsin Horse Council (WHC) looks for ways to promote the use and enjoyment of horses and ideas to educate horse people and the public at large - particularly youth. We welcome ideas for activities that allow people to interact with equines of all kinds. Maximum amount that could be approved for any one project or event is \$5,000. For requests more than \$5,000, the application has to go to our Board of Directors through the WHC President.

Requirements

- 1. Organizations applying for a WHC Sponsorship MUST BE A CURRENT MEMBER OF WHC.
- 2. Be sure to include an estimated budget for your project or event.
- 3. Include as much pertinent information with your application as possible.
- 4. It is also required that you submit a completion report due within a year of receiving your funds Which includes:
 - A financial statement of how sponsorship funding was spent (copies of receipts where applicable)
 - A copy, picture or link that shows WHC recognition for help with funding.
 - Pictures of completed projects (where applicable)
 See page 3 for an example of required information
- 5. If your sponsorship is approved, it is required the WHC be recognized as a contributor to your event or project.
 - For example –social media/web site recognition, hang a banner at your function, a sponsorship plaque, an article in the WHC newsletter, and if applicable have WHC mentioned during the announcements or in promotional materials.

A representative(s) from your organization may be asked to attend a WHC meeting to give a short presentation regarding the project or event that received funding.

If it is not possible to complete the project within the sponsorship year, you should prepare an interim report describing the components of the project completed to date and the expected completion date. A final report is required at the completion of the project.

*Those with previous incomplete sponsorships (including completion reports) will not be eligible for more funding until the obligation is met.

Application Deadline

Sponsorship applications MUST BE POSTMARKED BY February 28 or September 30.

An organization may receive only one sponsorship per calendar year.

Applications are analyzed and their merit assessed based upon the following criteria:

- * Educational value
- * Horse industry promotion value
- * How many people it will reach
- * Whether the project benefits youth
- * Whether the money will be well spent
- * The applicant's access to other funding
- * How well the project fits our mission statement

Examples of projects or events that have been funded:

- Educational events
- Therapeutic riding programs and horses
- Building repairs to existing facilities
- Travel expenses for clinicians and youth
- Printed material such as brochures, flyers, and handouts
- Clinics and seminars on various disciplines or other equine-related topics
- Events that promote interaction with people and equines

Please be aware that we do not provide money for:

- Normal operating expenses
- Horse show judges
- Awards
- Food
- Repairs to personal property
- New building construction
- Feed or hay



INTERNATIONAL TRAILS SYMPOSIUM NOTES

Several WHC Directors and members attended the International Trails Symposium held earlier this year in Madison, WI. We will be including reports from those individuals in the next couple of issues of our newsletter. Please enjoy this first installment.

Trail Skills Project: A New Resource for Building the Trail Workforce By Kricket Jewett, WHC Director & Trail Committee Co-Chair

At the 2025 International Trail Summit in Madison, I had the opportunity to learn firsthand about the **Trail Skills Project**, a new initiative from American Trails designed to support and professionalize the trail industry. Now live at www.TrailSkills.org, this powerful online tool offers a centralized hub for defining the knowledge, skills, and training needed for a wide range of trail jobs.

The site features a comprehensive database of trail-related job descriptions, from entry-level crew members to advanced planners and specialists. Each role is broken down into skill categories, making it easy for individuals, employers, and volunteer organizations to identify the core competencies needed for success in the field.

What makes the Trail Skills Project especially exciting is its national scope and collaborative design. It brings together input from agencies, nonprofits, and training providers to create a shared language and standards for trail work. The site also links directly to educational resources and training opportunities, helping to build clearer pathways for those entering - or advancing within - the trails workforce.

Whether you're managing a volunteer trail crew or looking to hire skilled professionals, the Trail Skills Project is a tool worth bookmarking. It's a major step forward in supporting the future of trails through workforce development and shared knowledge.

Recap: Fostering Trail Stewards from the Trailhead to the Toolshed

Another energizing session I attended at the 2025 International Trail Summit was "Fostering Trail Stewards from the Trailhead to the Toolshed," led by Stephanie Ley and Nikki Burtis from Friends of Acadia, alongside Pat Pero of the Dig !t Alliance. The presentation highlighted a creative and comprehensive model for building a stronger, more visible culture of trail stewardships, something every trail organization can learn from.

At Acadia National Park, where this program is based, more than 3.9 million visitors a year make caring for the trails a monumental task. Their solution? Create a stewardship path that

offers something for everyone—whether it's sharing Leave No Trace tips with visitors at the trailhead, maintaining boardwalks and fences, or leading volunteer trail crews with confidence.

The model includes paid **seasonal staff**, like Summit Stewards and Recreation Technicians, who mix hands-on trail work with visitor education. Volunteers are brought in through two main programs:

- **Drop-In Days**, held three times a week for anyone willing to lend a hand (no registration needed), and
- **Service Group Projects**, where larger groups can pre-register and even earn campsite perks in exchange for trail work.

One of the standout ideas was the **Volunteer Crew Leader** track, which allows repeat volunteers to step into leadership roles with proper training (including first aid and trail skills). It's a smart way to empower community members and grow stewardship from within.

From there, the Dig !t Alliance took things to the next level with a focus on **long-term volunteer engagement**, community identity, and data-driven reward systems. Their app-based platform encourages chapters to brand themselves, track hours, and recognize volunteers with fun titles (like "Trailhead," "Godfather," or "Mr. Sandwich"), local discounts, and gear rewards. Their message was clear: if you want people to keep showing up, you must make their work **visible, meaningful, and fun**.

Takeaways?

- Set regular, predictable workdays—3 to 4 hours max.
- Reward people early and often (think water bottles, shirts, and snacks).
- Track hours and show impact.
- Recognize that everyone has a role—from the trail clearer to the person who brings coffee.

The message resonated: stewardship doesn't start with a Pulaski—it starts with **belonging**. Let's create pathways for people to grow from curious volunteers to confident leaders—and make sure they feel seen every step of the way.



What's special about horses and ponies?

Horses and ponies can be wonderful, loving long-time companions. They have average lifespans of 25-30 years — some even live to be forty years old or older! They may also be willing riding partners for exercise, recreation, and competition.

What choices do you have in horses and ponies?

There are more than 200 breeds of horses and ponies in the world. Each breed has unique qualities and not all breeds are suitable for all riders and activities. There are also many breed combinations that produce an almost endless variety of mixed breed horses.

Because riding requires teamwork between the horse and rider, it that will not respond in far. Beginning riders should look for experiand riding style. A nervous, fearful rider should own a calm horse is important that you select a horse that suits your temperament enced, well-trained horses. An experienced rider may prefer a sensitive horse that responds to the slightest commands, or a young, inexperienced horse that can be trained. Before deciding to buy a horse of your own, you should have some riding experience or have taken riding lessons.

Once you understand your riding abilities and limitations, you will be in a much better position to choose a horse with the temperament and training that will suit you. Before buying, also consider what type of riding you intend to do --English or Western. 
