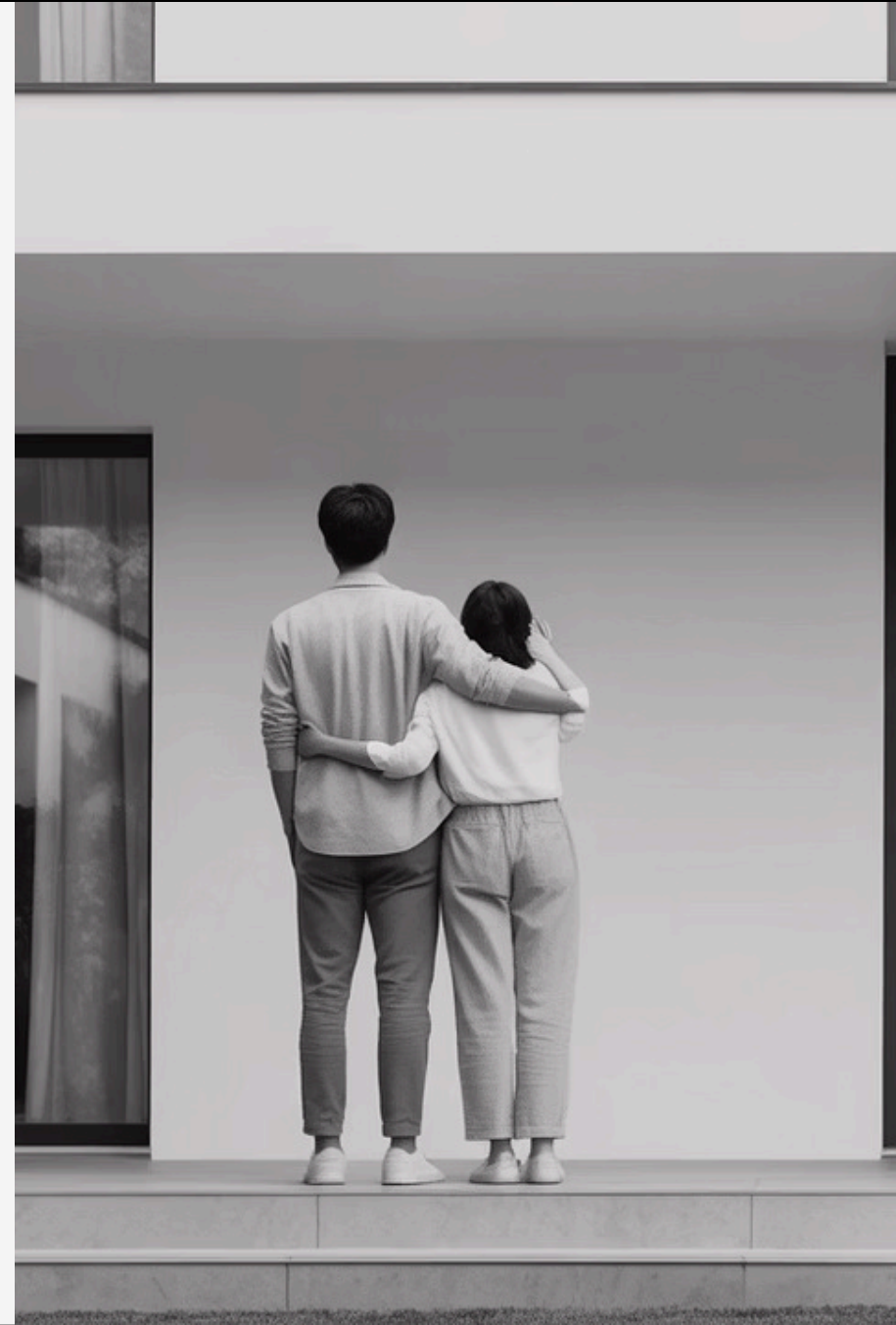


# Top 5 First-Time Buyer Mistakes (And How to Avoid Them)

If you're not careful, you can end up overpaying — and regretting it later if the valuation doesn't stack up.

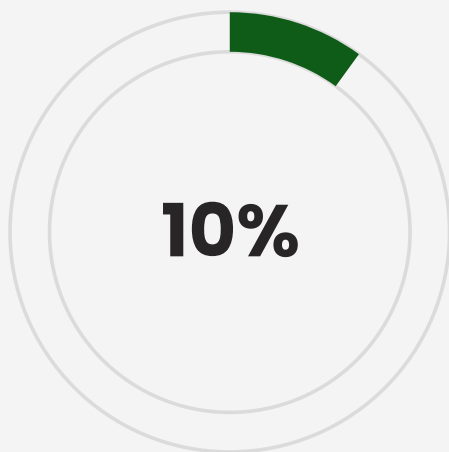


### How to Avoid It

Do your own homework. Compare similar sold prices. And get advice from someone who knows how to challenge a price when it matters.

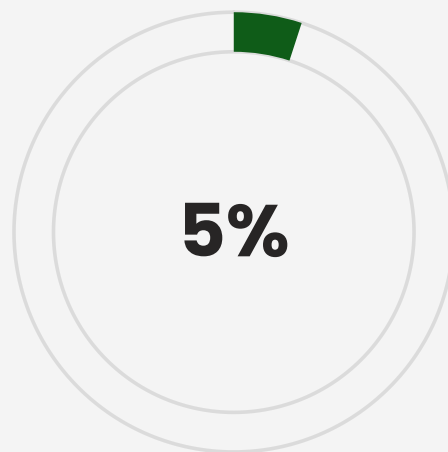
### 3. Ignoring the Extra Costs

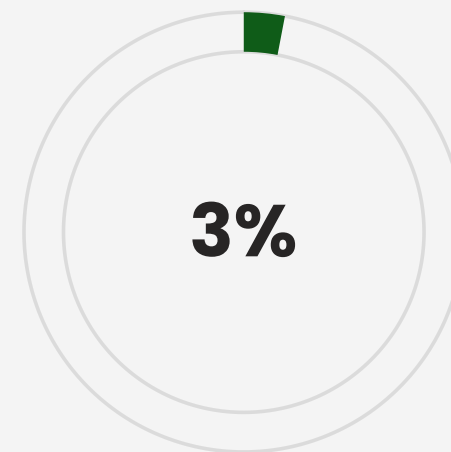
**Stamp Duty**

#### How to avoid it:

Start with a total budget, not just a deposit figure. Include fees, moving costs and a buffer. It's always better to be slightly under budget — not over and overwhelmed.

## 4. Forgetting to Check the Neighbours

### **How to avoid it:**
