The History of Post 218

While American Legion baseball has been played in Missouri since 1929, it wasn't added locally until 1947. That's when Washington American Legion Post 218 started its first team. Post 218 captured its first state title, winning the Missouri Department crown in 1957 when there was only one level. The program added its next Senior (AAA) championship in 1989.

The Golden Age for Post 218, to date, has been the 21st Century. From 2005-23, Post 218 has won three Senior state titles (2012, 2021, 2023), four Junior (AA) state titles (2005, 2015, 2016, 2022), two Junior regional titles (2005, 2016) and five Freshman (A) state crowns (2012, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2023). Additionally, the 2015 Senior team played in the Central Plains Regional, filling in for the Iowa champions. The program has drawn players from nearly every high school from a three-county area during its history. Besides the two city high schools, Washington and St. Francis Borgia, players from New Haven, Union, St. Clair, Pacific, Sullivan, Hermann, Owensville, Warrenton, Wright City and Francis Howell have played for Post 218.

The first Post 218 team called East End Diamond (now McLaughlin Field) home. Sponsored by Washington Motor Company, the team was organized by Post 218 Athletic Chairman Bernard Jett and managed by Johnny Breeden. The inaugural team dominated local competition, but lost the Ninth District title to O'Fallon in the best-of-three series, which went to the limit. Post 218 won its first state crown in 1957, going 14-3. Catcher Jim Wunderlich won the most outstanding player award in the state tournament. Traveling to Hobart, Oklahoma, the team dropped both regional games.

It was another 32 years before Post 218 struck again. The 1989 team, managed by former Post 218 and Buds player Larry Maune, won the state title at Ronsick Field with Derek Alferman being named the state tournament MVP. Post 218 went to North Platte, Nebras-ka, winning three games in the Central Regional. That included a 2-1 win over eventual regional winner Fargo, North Dakota, Post 2, 2-1. Maune's 13-year run as manager ended before Post 218 could win another title. But, it was time for a different level to come to the forefront.

Kent Getsee made his debut as manager of the Post 218 Freshmen, taking that team to the state tournament. In 2005, Post 218 won the Junior state title, defeating Manchester Post 208 in the winner-take-all game at the recently-renovated Ronsick Field. The tournament was played during one of the hottest stretches in this area. That was just a prelude for the Mid-States Regional in Crowley, Louisiana. The team ended 32-5, defeating the Shreveport A's in the winner-take-all game at Miller Stadium, 9-2. Patrick Byrne was the tournament's most outstanding player.

In 2012, Kevin Juergens piloted the Post 218 Freshmen (39-2) to their first state title with an 8-0 win over Ste. Genevieve Post 150 in Branson. The same year, Mike Gardner's Senior Legion team won the program's third state title, beating Creve Coeur Post 397 in Sedalia. Post 218 (39-10) lost to Retif Oil, the eventual World Series champion, in the opening round of the Mid-South Regional. In 2014, Post 218 added another Freshman title, again at Ronsick Field, with a win over Ste. Genevieve. It was the Junior Legion team's turn in 2015, when it won the state title and finished second in the regional, going 40-6. The Post 218 Seniors played in the Central Plains Regional as a replacement for Iowa after finishing as the Missouri runner-up. Post 218 defeated the host team in Bismarck, North Dakota. In 2016, the Freshmen (30-2) captured the state title by going unbeaten through the state tournament.

The Post 218 Juniors went 34-5 as Getsee guided the team to a second regional title. This time, it was the Central Plains Regional in Rapid City, South Dakota. The 2017 Post 218 Freshman team captured a title, going 26-3-2, and rallying from a 6-2 deficit to beat Festus Post 253 in Hannibal. The Post 218 Seniors (24-14) were an unlikely 2021 state champion, but the team caught fire at the right time and ended up winning two games at the Mid-South Regional in Hastings, Nebraska.

In 2022, the Post 218 Juniors (30-6) defeated rival Elsberry Post 226 Red for the state title. The teams played 10 times that season with Washington winning six times. In the most recent campaign, Post 218 won two more state titles with one runner-up team and a fifth-place finisher. The program fielded four teams with two at the Freshman level. The Freshman Red (25-4) went undefeated at the state tournament in Jackson, beating the host Post 158 Tribe, 6-4, for the crown. The Post 218 Seniors under Getsee went 38-3, winning the state title over Festus Post 253. at the Mid-South Regional in Pelham, Alabama, Post 218 won twice by shutouts, but a pair of losses to Arkansas champoin Paragould Post 17 ended the run.

The History of Ronsick Field

Making history. Or, rather, continuing history. That's what the 2024 Mid-States Regional is doing at Rotary Recreational Complex - Ronsick Field. From Cy Young to Satchel Paige, Ronsick Field has hosted some of the game's greatest players during its history stretching back to 1872, when a grandstand was built there, according to the Washington Historical Society. City Park Field hosted baseball games dating back to that time.

The 1875 Washington Eagles were declared "champion of the base ball world" after winning its league, beating Jefferson City and Sedalia for the Silver Ball.In 1899, Ronsick Field was the likely site of an exhibition game with the St. Louis Perfectos, formerly the St. Louis Browns and the future St. Louis Cardinals. After being sold to the Robison brothers, the April 1, 1899 game marked one of the first under new ownership, which rebranded the team in red and moved its best players from Cleveland, including Hall of Famers Cy Young, Jesse Burkett and Bobby Wallace.

Over the years, the field hosted many baseball games, from the vastly popular Washington Buds adult team to youth contests. Teams with colorful names such as the "Plowhandles" and "Stubble Stompers," American and Nationals played locally and Ronsick Field hosted large crowds for Sunday town games. The Washington Cobras were a "colored" team which played locally following World War II. Barnstorming teams, featuring players such as Satchel Paige, also visited.

"The Buds were a big part of the community," Larry Maune, who played for the Buds and Post 218 and managed both teams. "We always had large crowds at our games," he said. "I remember one year we played the Kansas City Monarchs, who were managed by Buck O'Neil, and we beat them. I met Buck O'Neil at a Legion tournament a few years ago and he remembered us beating him. I was just amazed that a man reaching 90 who has traveled all over the country remembered that game. What a charming man."

Washington Post 218 started its baseball program in 1947, playing at another diamond in town. The program moved to Ronsick Field, where it continued to field competitive teams. Entering 2024, the Post 218 Seniors (AAA) have won five state titles. The Juniors (AA) have captured four state and two regional crowns. The Freshmen (A) have won five Missouri titles. The Buds, started in 1955, became very popular as Washington's town team, Ronsick Field also hosted charity games hosted by Major League Baseball pitcher Morris "Lefty" Martin, who brought in many of his professional baseball friends to play in these annual events.

With Post 218 as well as Washington and St. Francis Borgia's high school teams playing there, the field was formally named for Edwin Ronsick, longtime parks superintendent and sports enthusiast Feb. 6, 1983. Ronsick Field has hosted the Washington Youth Sports Association, Crosspoint Christian School baseball, East Central College baseball, Washington Junior Football League and even the Missouri Vintage Base Ball Championships. In 2005, the field received a massive upgrade with the building of the current grandstand and concession/restrooms/announcers' booth building. The project cost \$479,494 with the Washington Rotary Club contributing \$100,000. At its peak, Ronsick Field hosted over 150 games annually, according to Washington Post 218 Manager Kent Getsee.

In 2020, Washington Post 218 hosted a COVID League, which was the only sports league taking place locally. Teams from as far away as Illinois came to Ronsick Field to play. The next upgrade, funded by a half-cent capital improvement sales tax, was putting in the turf infield and improvements to the bullpens, safety issues and outfield irrigation. The project was projected at \$370,000. The tax bill was passed in 2018 and the turf was put into place for the 2022 season. The next step was bringing this Mid-South Regional to Washington, adding to Ronsick Field's storied history.






