These were taken Wed 9/12 enroute to the Cessna 120/140 Convention in Benton Harbor with



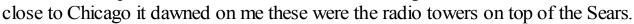

Chasing the Ford

Abbie and I just returned from our second tour with EAA's Ford Tri-Motor this year. Are we exhausted -- again? You betcha!! But, we both wear grins that probably won't disappear for at least another week. Before I tell you why, let me go back to the beginning.

This past spring, close friends (Jackie and Cody Welch who organize the Ford Tri-Motor tours for EAA's Flight Department), asked if Abbie and I would be willing to drive a L-o-o-ong one-ton, crew cab, long-bed diesel pick-up truck towing a good-sized merchandise sales trailer. We were to follow the tour stops of the Tri-Motor and become merchandise sales persons (that's the politically correct way of saying "store clerks". Each tour lasts for six weeks. We worked two weeks on the spring tour, we towed the trailer from Columbus, Ohio to New Philadelphia, Ohio. From there we drove to Harrisburg, PA and then to Sandusky Ohio. For three weeks of the fall tour, we drove from Oshkosh, Wisconsin to Louisville, Kentucky, then to Lawrenceville, Georgia, and finally to Little Rock, Arkansas. In order to do all this driving, Abbie and I had to pass a physical, that included drug testing, we had to attend a special driver training class,

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and receive driver training in the rig. The truck has a D.O.T. number printed on the side, we haul merchandise for sale, so, we had to keep driver logs, just like the 18-Wheelers.

You probably are saying to yourself, "Boy, the pay must be pretty good to put up with all that driving, then sell T-shirts and hats when you get there." Well you are right, the pay is great — but not in dollars. You see, when you work out of the merchandise trailer you meet some of the most interesting people that you can imagine. It's kind of like being a bartender. Only the bartender hears his customer's problems. We get to hear their aviation experiences and their fondest aviation memories. A number of people told us about riding the Tri-Motors of Island Airways to school between Port Clinton, Ohio, Put-in-bay and the islands of Lake Eire.



Others told of seeing the Tri-Motors of old at their local airport or watching in aw as a "huge" Ford flew overhead en route to some exciting destination.



Busy Day in Georgia

At one stop, one elderly black man would come to the airport every day and longingly watch the Ford take off and land. He would always come over to the trailer and talk to us and tell us of his aviation experiences. During this time, we learned that he was in the Air Corps during WWII and continued to a complete career in the Air Force afterwards. After a couple of days, Abbie asked if the gentleman was going to take a ride in the Ford since he was so taken with its presence. He explained, "No ma'm, I'm retired and the rides cost way too much." After hearing this, Abbie approached the members of the Ford Tour and we chipped in for a ticket. The gentleman was told that an

anonymous benefactor had bought him a ticket and he got his ride. I think he may have guessed who the benefactor was, because he went to each member of our Ford team, shook our hands, and thanked us each profusely for his wonderful experience.

Another gentleman who would frequent our sales window daily, was a B-17 pilot during WWII. Each day, he would talk at length of his experiences. On his last day, he brought his scrapbook of his military career, and showed us pictures of himself, his airplane, and other bits of his military experiences. What an interesting man! What an interesting experiences for us!

Then, there was the "indentured volunteer" that we met in Harrisburg. Her story began a week before the Ford arrived. The chapter was doing a Young Eagles Rally for handicapped kids. She noticed that a helicopter and a couple of airplanes were flying over her house with regularity all morning, so, that afternoon, she drove down to the airport to see just what was going on.

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Although she was not a kid, she was tiny, barely five feet tall, and cute as a button. They proceeded to put her on a plane and give her a ride anyway. She was so grateful for the ride that she asked what she should do. The rally chairman told her that she was now an "indentured volunteer" and that she must volunteer for all future events. Sure enough, she was briefing Tri-Motor passengers prior to each flight. She went to dinner with the Ford crew one night and I think she was planning to join EAA and the chapter in the near future.

Along the way, a couple of retired forestry service men that had been smoke jumpers turned up and purchased rides. They had actually jumped from our plane in its earlier history. Their reason for flying was that even though they had made numerous take-offs in the airplane, *they had never experienced a landing!!!*

In Lawrenceville, Georgia (just outside Atlanta) we met two Eastern Air Lines hostesses in their 80's. These charming ladies were wearing their uniforms (which still fit) and were just as bright and friendly as if they were ready to welcome us onboard their flight.



And the stories go on. There's not enough

room to tell of all our experiences this year. But this much I can tell you. If we are asked to do it again next year, you can bet we'll have our trucking logbooks dusted off, bags packed, and ready to go.



A Brief History of EAA's Tri-Motor

- 1. Aug 21, 1929 First certified and began Eastern Air Transport (predecessor to Eastern Air Lines.
- 2. Oct 30, 1930 Sold and inaugurated Cubana Airlines in Cuba.
- 3. Aug 1946 Sold to the Dominican Republic where it became Dominican "Air Force 1".
- 4. July 7, 1949 Imported back into the U.S.A. and was converted to a crop duster.
- 5. Feb 1, 1950 Began a 13-year career of flying smoke jumpers and serving as a borate bomber in the forest service.
- 6. March 1963 Used for one season again as a crop duster in Kansas.
- 7. Late 1964 Leased to Tallmantz Aviation in California to appear in the movie "Family Jewels" starring Jerry Lewis and Sebastian Cabot.
- 8. 1965-1973 Dale Glenn toured the airplane around the country offering rides to the public.
- 9. June 16, 1973 The airplane was destroyed by a thunderstorm in Burlington, Wisconsin. Fuselage was broken into three pieces. EAA bought the airplane from the insurance company as total loss scrap.
- 10. July 20, 1985 Airplane emerged from a 12-year restoration once again as brand new.
- 11. The Tri-Motor resided in the museum for 6 years, and then in 1991, she began regular passenger flights from EAA Museum's Pioneer Airport.
- 12. In 2003/4 the airplane received a complete makeover and paint job generously provided by Gulfstream Aerospace Corp. of Appleton, WI and EAA's own team of mechanics.

EAA's Ford is currently the only Tri-Motor offering rides to the general public. In addition to her flights from Pioneer Airport she also makes two 6-week tours each year under the sponsorship of local EAA Chapters around the country.
