



BBB Tip: 5 Top Vacation Scams

Many curtailed travel in the past few years and are now making up for lost time! When planning a trip, be cautious and wary of false promises and a sense of urgency that can fool you into paying for something that doesn't exist.

1. Vacation Rental Con:

Vacation rentals are a great option but not without risk. Watch for listings that are not for rent, don't exist, or are significantly different than pictured. Keep these tips in mind:

- Talk with the owner by phone. If not using a verification service, do not negotiate solely by email. Speak with the owner asking detailed questions; be suspicious of vague answers.
- Check public records. Investigate online by looking up the address and use Google Street View confirming the property matches.

2. "Free" Vacation Scams:

Advertising a "free" vacation may not mean without cost or restrictions. Watch for additional and undisclosed fees.

Red flags are:

- If you are told that you've won a trip without entering a contest
- Pricing, accommodations and amenities that seem overly inexpensive
- If pressured to accept an offer now or it's gone

3. Hotel Scams:

Be aware of techniques to get credit card information. Watch for these tricks:

- Fake Front Desk Calls: Scammers impersonating the front desk. The caller claims problems with the charges and asking for verification of card information.
- "Free" Wi-Fi Connections: Wi-fi "skimming" scams are a fake connection that skim and collect data transmitted. Avoid online banking when using open wi-fi.
- Fake Food Delivery: Scammers distribute fake menus to hotels. Travelers call and order. Credit card information is stolen and no food is delivered.

4. Third Party Booking Site Scams:

Use caution booking through a third-party. Scammers pretend to be brokers, requesting credit card and personally identifying information, a set up for identity theft.

5. Timeshare Reselling Cons:

A common scam is the timeshare resale con. There's a call from a real estate agent alleging to specialize in timeshare resale, requiring an upfront fee. The owner pays, but the agent never delivers.

Summer Pet Safety Tips

Flea and tick season is here. Choose a quality preventative from the start of spring such as oral tablets available from your veterinarian. Over-the-counter treatments rarely work, and waiting can make it much harder to get rid of them.

Heartworm in common in summertime. Make sure to have your pet tested at the beginning of summer and treat as needed.

Allergies affect pets just as much as humans. Signs include persistent scratching, chewing on paws or legs, and ear infections. Visit your veterinarian for treatment if you notice these signs. Toxic inquestion. Make sure to put

up and away toxins such as antifreeze and rat poison that will be deadly if ingested.

Prevent heat stroke. Avoid long walks on hot days and do not leave pets outside for long periods of time. Provide adequate shelter/shade and water when pets are outside. Look for these signs of a heat stroke. Excessive panting, wobbly walking, bright red tongue.

What to Do if Your Pet Overheats: Do: •Get them out of the elements (somewhere cool) •Try to give them some water •Spray paw pads with rubbing alcohol (safely brings body temp down) Don't: •Cool pet's temperature too quickly (with shower or hose) •Force them to drink water



Hands-Only CPR

Fact Sheet



Why Learn Hands-Only CPR?

Cardiac arrest – an electrical malfunction in the heart that causes an irregular heartbeat (arrhythmia) and disrupts the flow of blood to the brain, lungs and other organs – is a leading cause of death. Each year, more than 350,000 EMS-assessed out-of-hospital cardiac arrests occur in the United States.

When a person has a cardiac arrest, survival depends on immediately receiving CPR from someone nearby.

According to the American Heart Association, about 90 percent of people who suffer out-of-hospital cardiac arrests die. CPR, especially if performed immediately, can double or triple a cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival.

Be the Difference for Someone You Love

If you are called on to give CPR in an emergency, you will most likely be trying to save the life of someone you love: a child, a spouse, a parent or a friend.



Over 70 percent of out-of-hospital cardiac arrests happen in homes.



Only about 40% of people who experience an out-of-hospital cardiac arrest receive the immediate help that they need before professional help arrives.

Hands-Only CPR has been shown to be as effective in the first few minutes as conventional CPR for cardiac arrest at home, at work or in public.

Hands-Only CPR has just two easy steps, performed in this order:



Call 911 if you see a teen or adult suddenly collapse.







Push hard and fast in the center of the chest to the beat of a familiar song that has 100 to 120 beats per minute.

Call 911

The telecommunicator on the other end of the line can assist you while getting the emergency help you need on the way.

Music Can Save Lives

Song examples include "Stayin' Alive" by the Bee Gees, "Crazy in Love" by Beyoncé featuring Jay-Z, "Hips Don't Lie" by Shakira" or "Walk the Line" by Johnny Cash. People feel more confident performing Hands-Only CPR and are more likely to remember the correct rate when trained to the beat of a familiar song.

When performing CPR, you should push on the chest at a rate of 100 to 120 compressions per minute, which corresponds to the beat of the song examples above.

Take 90 Seconds to Learn How to Save a Life

Watch the 90-second video. Visit heart.org/handsonlycpr to watch the Hands-Only CPR instructional video and share it with the important people in your life. Hands-Only CPR is a natural introduction to CPR, and the AHA encourages everyone to learn conventional CPR as a next step. You can find a CPR class near you at heart.org/CPR.

NOTE: The AHA still recommends CPR with compressions and breaths for infants and children and victims of drowning, drug overdose, or people who collapse due to breathing problems.



Socialization: Integral Part of Seniors Health

- ·Social isolation and loneliness from losing a spouse

- · Boredom from a lack of routine activities
- Inability to accept medical or physical changes or limitations
- · Losing your driver's license
- · Inability to manage daily activities

For seniors these can have an even more noticeable impact on their over-all well-being. Acknowledging these problems is very important in determining what changes can be made to ensure a healthy lifestyle as you or your loved ones age. Educating yourself about your options is paramount. Many local organizations partner together to educate the community and to provide the appropriate solution for every unique situation. Whether it's simply providing a companion or assisting with daily living tasks, pulling resources to create personalized care at home or in a senior community is the key.

Be aware that many senior communities that offer recreation programs allow people from the public to participate at their leisure. Encouraging an aging adult to do this will help them to feel less lonely, improve cognitive and physical health through engagement, improve their quality of life, and ultimately help them to feel more comfortable in a community setting if they end up needing more assistance.

The Views Senior Living Communities host a number of activities from cooking demonstrations, bus outings, daily exercise class, art classes and more. This extensive activity program is also available for memory care residents but a chaperone would need to stay with the non-resident during the activity. Contact the closest location to you and tell them you want to learn more about enjoying their activities.



1 tbsp sugar

Pinch of salt

1/2 cup water

4 baby cucumbers sliced into thin round slices (optional - add a few red pepper flakes for a little kick)

Directions:

Add the smashed garlic, dill, and sliced cucumbers to a glass bowl or large mason jar.

In a saucepan, combine the apple cider vinegar, sugar, a pinch of salt, and water; heat to boiling. Once the vinegar mixture is boiling, remove from heat and carefully pour over the cucumbers and garlic.

Stir occasionally, leaving it to pickle for at least 30 minutes. Let come to room temperature and refrigerate. Enjoy!

Shake hard for 5-7 minutes or until the milk mixture is frozen. Use gloves because the bag will get very cold!






