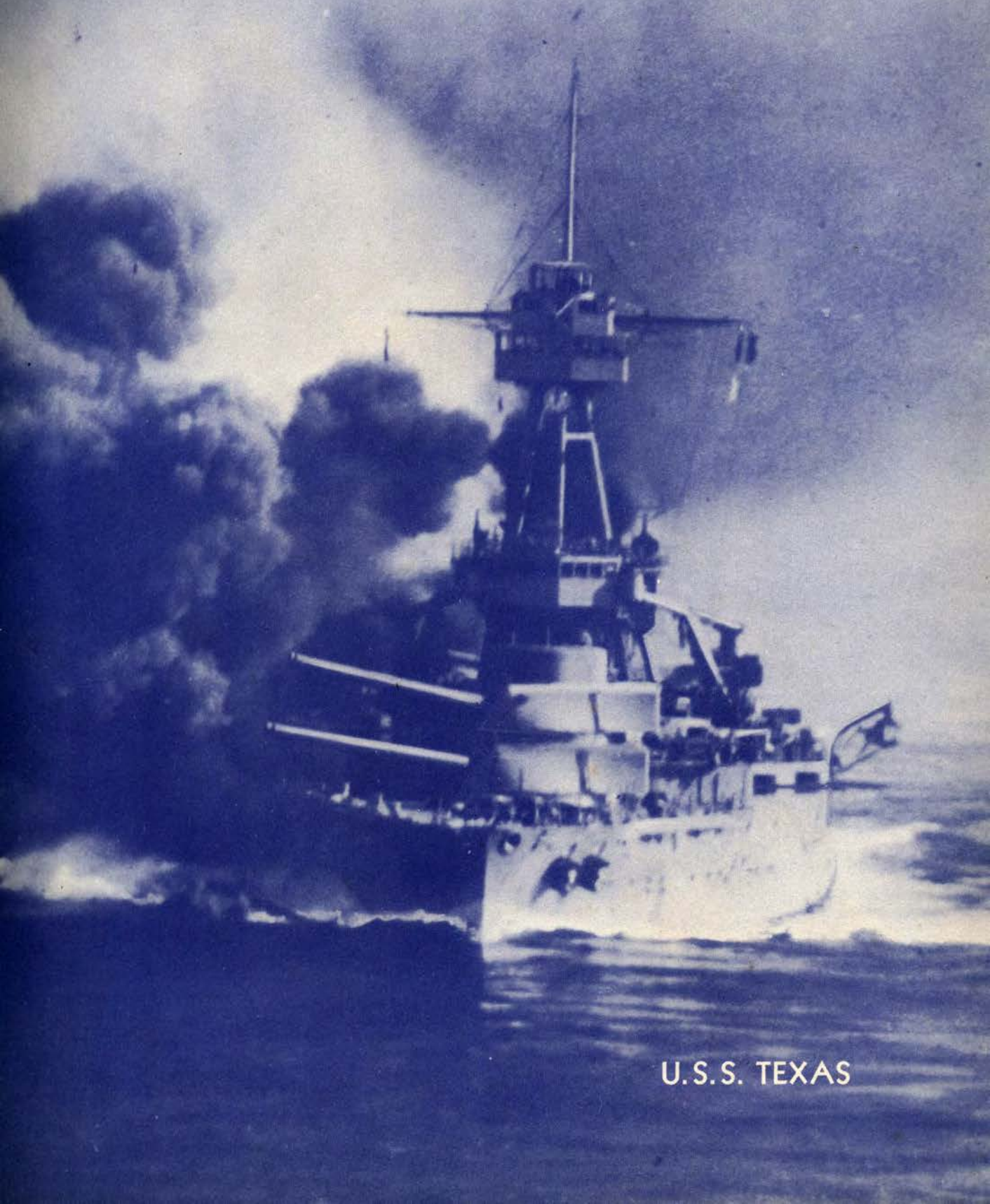

TEXAS TRADITION



Captain John J. London is a graduate of the Naval Academy, Class of 1905. He circled the globe in 1908 with Teddy Roosevelt's Great White Fleet and served in the last war. When the six original Naval R.O.T.C. Units were set up in 1926, he was the first Commanding Officer of the Unit at Georgia Tech. In this war, he served in all the theaters of war as Convoy Commodore before taking command of our Unit in November, 1942.

MESSAGE FROM THE CAPTAIN:

In welcoming the Naval R.O.T.C. Unit to active duty last July, I outlined the program ahead and endeavored to prepare you for the things to come. I hope that you have profited by the advice given then. However, I should like to review briefly the highlights of that advice in the hope that it may be of further use to you.

As an incentive for greater endeavor on your part, you should now be considering situations that will confront you some day. This applies equally to your physical condition as well as to your mental preparation. For instance, are you an expert swimmer, and can you rescue a drowning man? Have you built up an endurance that will help you to remain afloat for many hours? Can you climb down a fifty-foot line without injury to yourself? Are you developing in yourself the qualities that will make you a valuable asset to the ship you may serve?

Remember that, as officers, you are to lead and set an example. How can you do this if you do not or cannot exercise self-discipline now? Have you exercised self-discipline in adjusting yourself to your new life? By this is meant, have you brought yourself to maintain proper and adequate study hours; to get the most out of the calisthenics and physical exercise program; to resist the temptation to dissipate, which would militate against study and physical training; and to accept your disappointments and petty privations as a part of your duty and responsibilities?

You owe it to yourself, the Navy, and your Country, to make every effort to answer the above questions in the affirmative. You should justify the particularly favored status in which you find yourself at present by maintaining a high standard of academic work, and by adjusting yourself to the uniform which you wear. This means, of course, maintaining the dignity of that uniform by the manner in which it is worn; your conduct and bearing while in that uniform; and the general observance of discipline which is demanded of a person wearing that uniform.

Some of the conditions which you have encountered since coming on active duty have been inconvenient, irksome, and sometimes bordering on hardship, but you must realize that it is the overcoming of these difficulties and the disciplining of yourself to these conditions that marks your true worth and is the measure of your success. I believe you realize the above and I know that most of you are doing your part.

Some forty-seven members of this Unit are receiving their commissions on February 28th, having successfully completed their Naval Science and Tactics course on an accelerated program. They are going directly aboard ship, prepared for the duties of a seagoing officer. Eighteen of their classmates have already received their commissions and are on active duty. I take this opportunity to congratulate them and welcome them as brother officers, feeling sure that in all things they will so conduct themselves as to merit the trust imposed in them.

NAVY AT TEXAS

When Captain Underwood arrived at his office early that morning in September, 1940, he found a long line already waiting. These were the first of the three hundred odd boys who attempted to get into the newly organized Texas Naval Reserve Officers' Training Corps Unit.

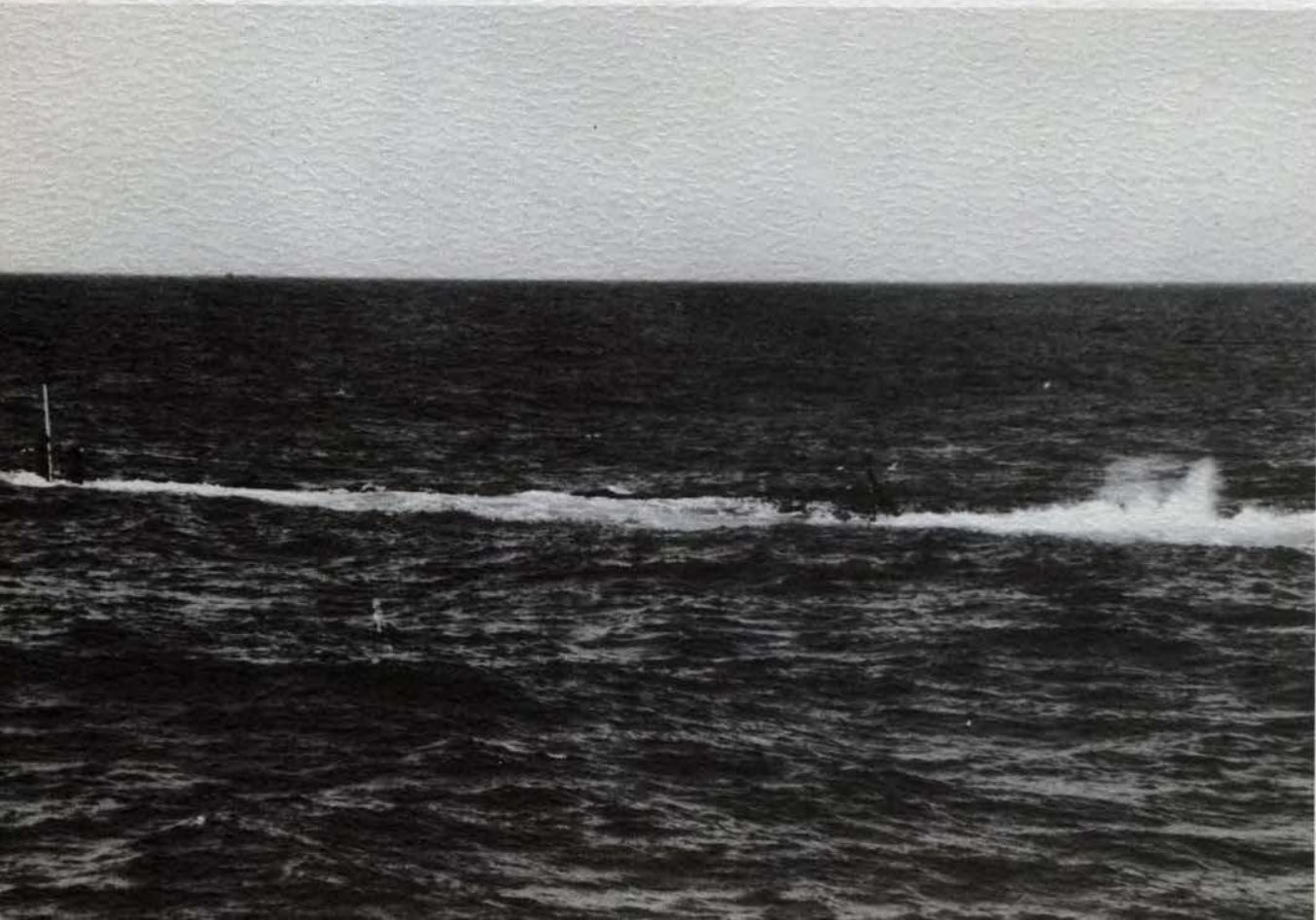
The hundred and ten who succeeded found themselves in a new world—that of the Navy—with a great many things to learn. They were guided and instructed in this by their officers: Captain Herbert W. Underwood and Lieutenants (now Commanders) Charles A. Whiteford and Robert F. Martin.

By the spring of '41, the Unit had begun to make a name for itself. The uniforms had of course made quite an impression on the campus, and the infantry drill never failed to draw an audience. The Naval Club was organized and the first three issues of the Unit magazine, THE SPUN YARN, were put out.

In June, about half the Unit went to the Naval Air Station at Corpus Christi for the Summer Training Cruise. Those that went will never forget the YP's, Borgeson's haircuts, the airplane rides, and Tulane pronunciation.

During the summer, Lieutenant Whiteford left, and our present Executive Officer, Lieutenant Commander (now commander) Deupree J. Friedell, and Lieutenant (now Commander) Kenneth A. Knowles arrived.

That fall there were two centers of interest: the new class of Freshmen, with the question of upperclass rates, which made the Class of '44 feel very important; and Navigation, which succeeded in sending many of the Sophomore Class to the Army Air Corps.





After Pearl Harbor, it was decided to take in a second group of Freshmen. The Navy also became physical fitness minded, and Chief Specialist Archie V. Connett was sent to start the program.

There was another Summer Training Cruise to Corpus that summer; this time the high spots were the blackouts, the PBY's, and the dime movie.

In July Captain Underwood was put in command of the WAVES at Smith College. By September, three new officers had joined the Unit: Lieutenant Commander Daniel B. Candler, Lieutenant Commander George W. Moyers, and Lieutenant Milton C. Britton. Under our new Skipper, Captain John J. London, who arrived shortly after, the third and last class under the pre-war organization was taken into the Unit. Thirteen members of the Class of '44 doubled up in their Junior and Senior work and were commissioned in June.

On July 1 of 1943, after a third cruise failed to materialize, the Unit went on active duty in the V-12 Program. For the first time to many of them, the members of the N.R.O.T.C. were faced with military life. However, formations, the physical fitness program and not being able to cut classes became routine matters; and in November, the first semester under the new arrangement was completed with the commissioning of five Seniors who were able to finish their University work by that time.

And now, at last, the twenty-seven remaining from the original class of a hundred and ten, as well as twenty members of the Class of '45, have reached the end of the voyage. On February the 29th, they will drop the hook of the old U.S.S. TEXAS N.R.O.T.C. and report for duty aboard new ships—that is, all but two; they would rather walk the rest of the way with the Marines.

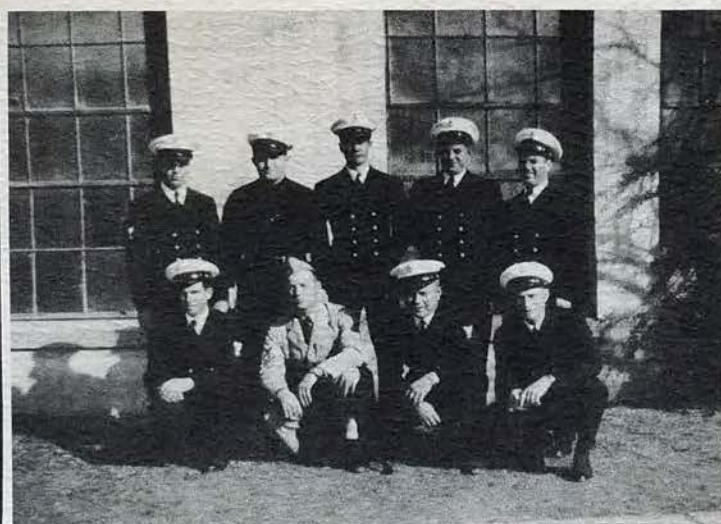

GENERAL INTRODUCTION

Important that a naval officer have a working knowledge of the law, varying degree, depending upon his rank and position. He must make certain laws himself by issuing orders to be obeyed by those under his command. He must see to the enforcement of naval regulations, the offenses or to punish courts and boards of inquiry or a board of investigation he will act as a judge advocate or recorder he will act as a prosecutor or defense counsel he may aid an accused person in the presentation of his case before the court. As a member of the court he will act in a dual capacity of judge and jury. As a reviewing authority he will review cases submitted to him as a court of review or appeal would do in civil cases. He will lack familiarity with naval law or are not properly vigorous in enforcing it, discipline will suffer. These naval laws are designed to be a part of the number of men to live and work efficiently and in a separate community. The man is presumed to be a law-abiding citizen and a law-abiding man is presumed to be a law-abiding citizen.

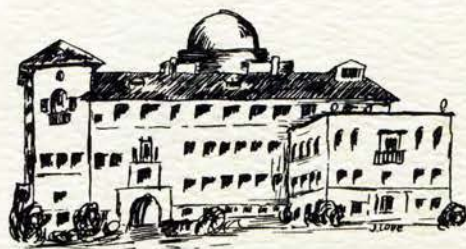

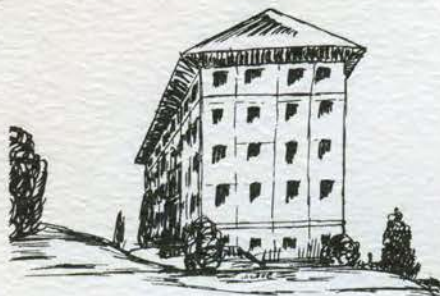

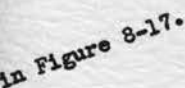

SINGLE-ACTING

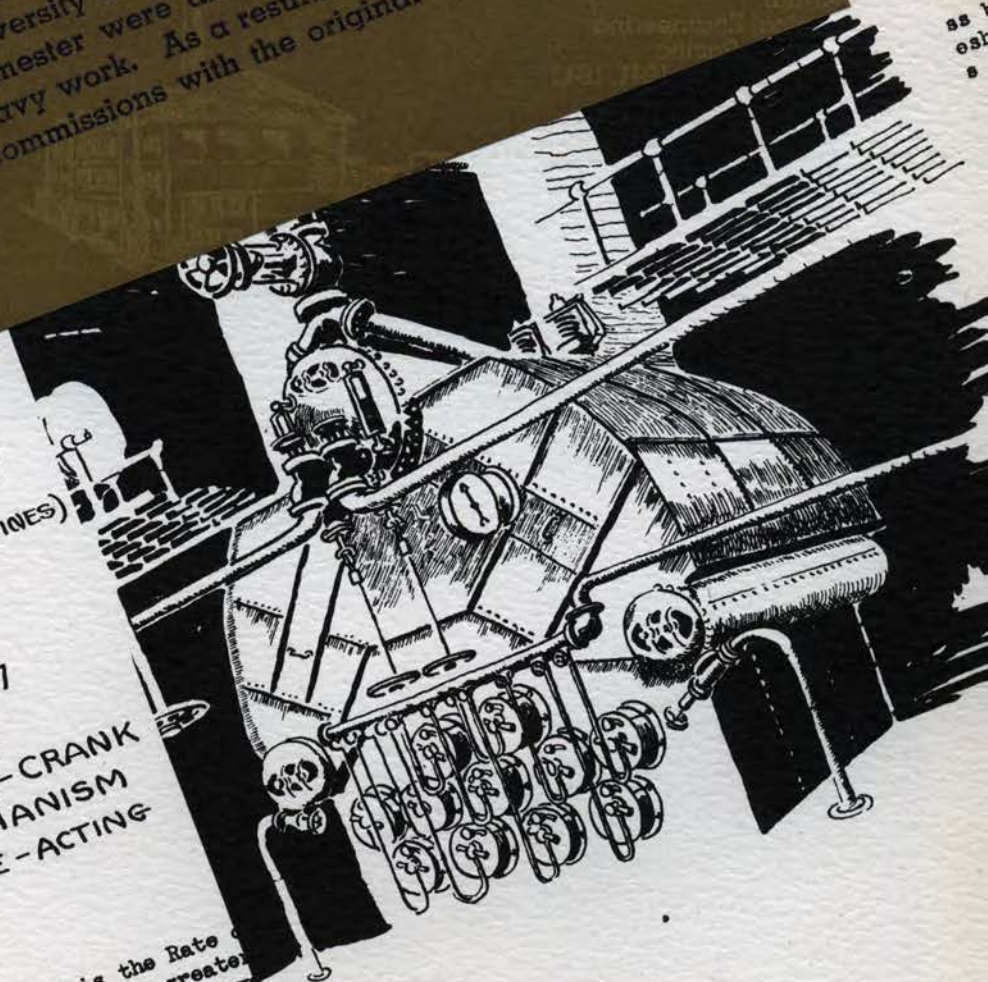

Boatright Leads Individual Scorers

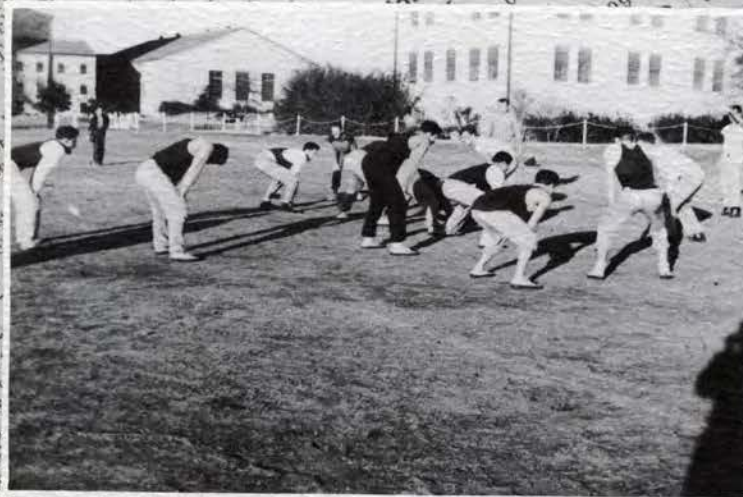
