# A FAREWELL TO ARMS



COL. MAX H. LAGRONE, USMC

For the past four years, the University of Texas Naval ROTC has been fortunate to have as Professor of Naval Science, a gentleman of outstanding leadership and foresight, Colonel Max H. LaGrone, United States Marine Corps.

Colonel LaGrone is a native Texan and a graduate with honors of Rice University. Before assuming this command in September, 1963, he served for two years as Fleet Marine Officer on the staff of Commander, Second Fleet. He had previously served on the staff of Commander-in-Chief, Allied Forces, Northern Europe. He came to the unit with an impressive combat record, including such significant World War II campaigns as Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Saipan, and Okinawa. In Korea, he was an infantry battalion commander in the bloody valleys of the Chosin Reservoir. The Colonel has unselfishly shared the knowledge gained from all these experiences in hopes of increasing the motivation and furthering the success of the midshipmen of this command.

Molding the character of future Naval Officers is no easy task. Much must be demanded of them so that in turn they may be relied upon to properly execute their complex and growing responsibilities. Colonel LaGrone has proven to be a strong believer in this principle, and a worthy taskmaster. Upon arrival, new midshipmen were greeted by their Commander; and, from the beginning, each knew he was expected to perform in a manner consistent with the proud traditions of the Naval Service. Moreover, the Colonel has exemplified the dignified conduct which the Navy expects of its Officers. His discretion and bearing, his vision and composure, his stature as a true man, have been manifestly evident in his daily life. He has been a leader.

In his tenure, Colonel LaGrone has earned the admiration and respect of all who have served under him. He has maintained an open-door policy, and no midshipman need ever have hesitated to ask help or advice on a personal basis. And when this has been done, the midshipmen have found a talented man who responded eagerly and offered many practical suggestions. No real worry was too insignificant if the Colonel could help and no problem insurmountable. The Colonel asked no thanks for his efforts--to him it was part of his job. An enduring thanks will exist in the hearts of the many fine Navy and Marine Corps Officers in whose careers he has played such a vital role.

On the more relaxed occasions--at the Sweetheart and Ring Dances, at the picnics--Colonel LaGrone, as well as his charming wife, Barbara, displayed a wit and personal warmth which would bring any group a little closer and make the times more enjoyable. In these moments, from his spirit would emanate that indefinable feeling of camaraderie.

At the termination of this semester, after 26 years of service, Colonel LaGrone will retire from the Marine Corps. It is with not a little sorrow that we shall render that final salute. But may he be assured of our best wishes for his continued success and family happiness. To Colonel Max H. LaGrone we dedicate this yearbook.

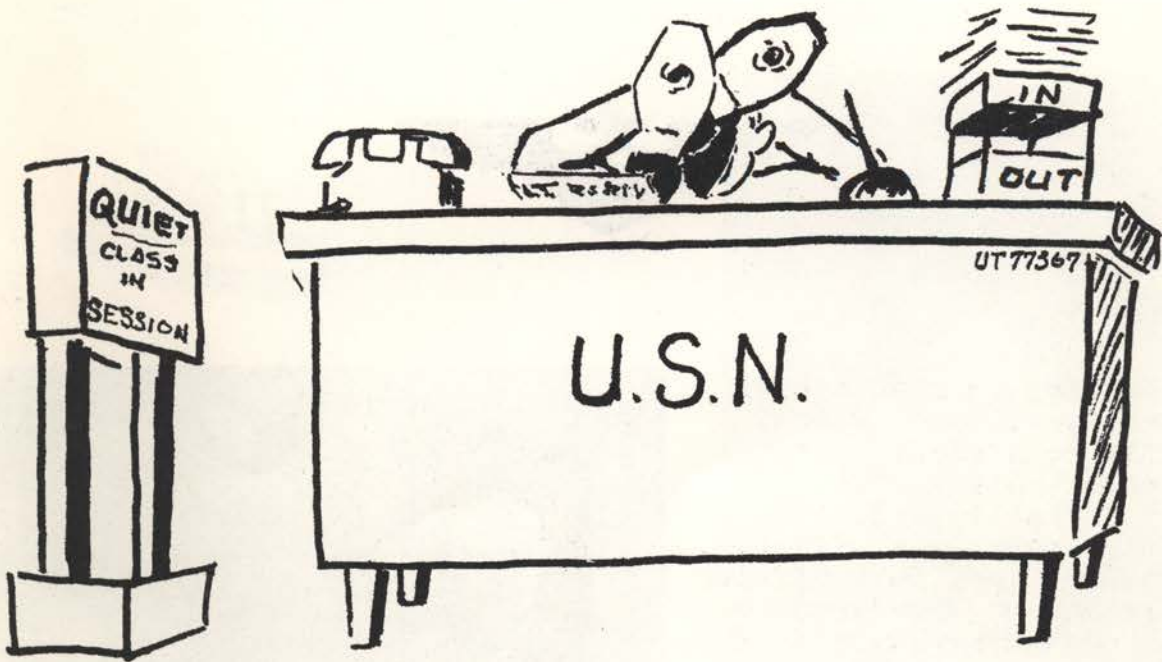

# Faculty

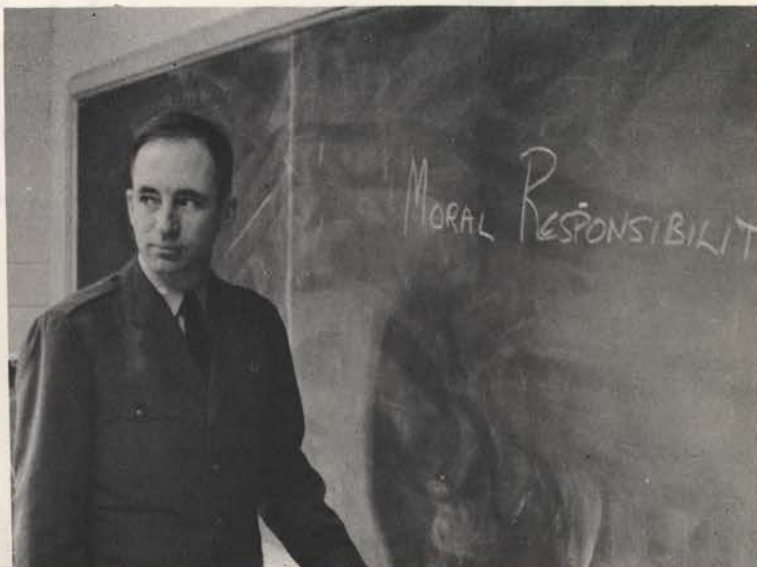

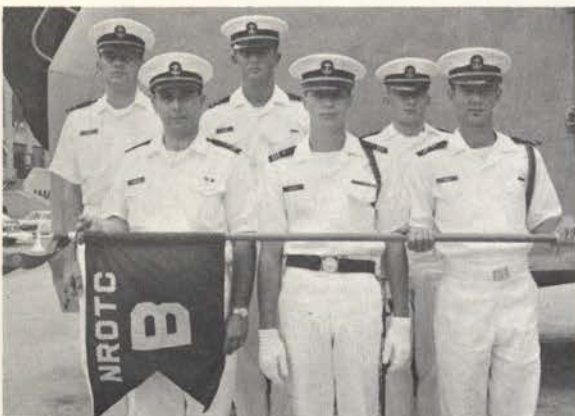

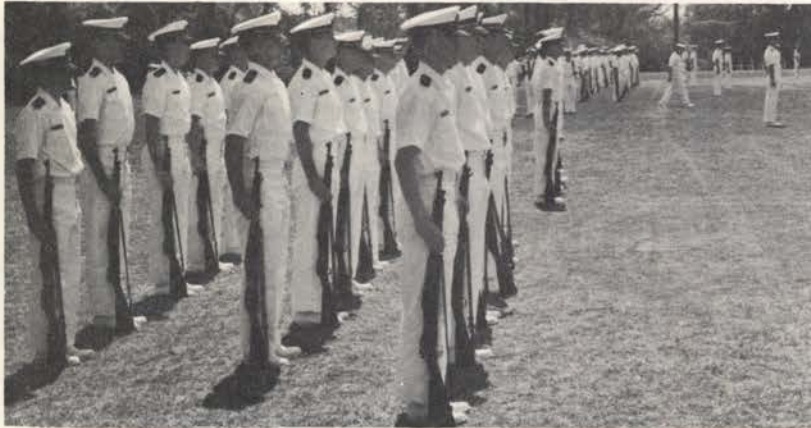

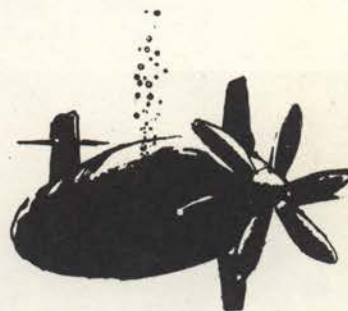

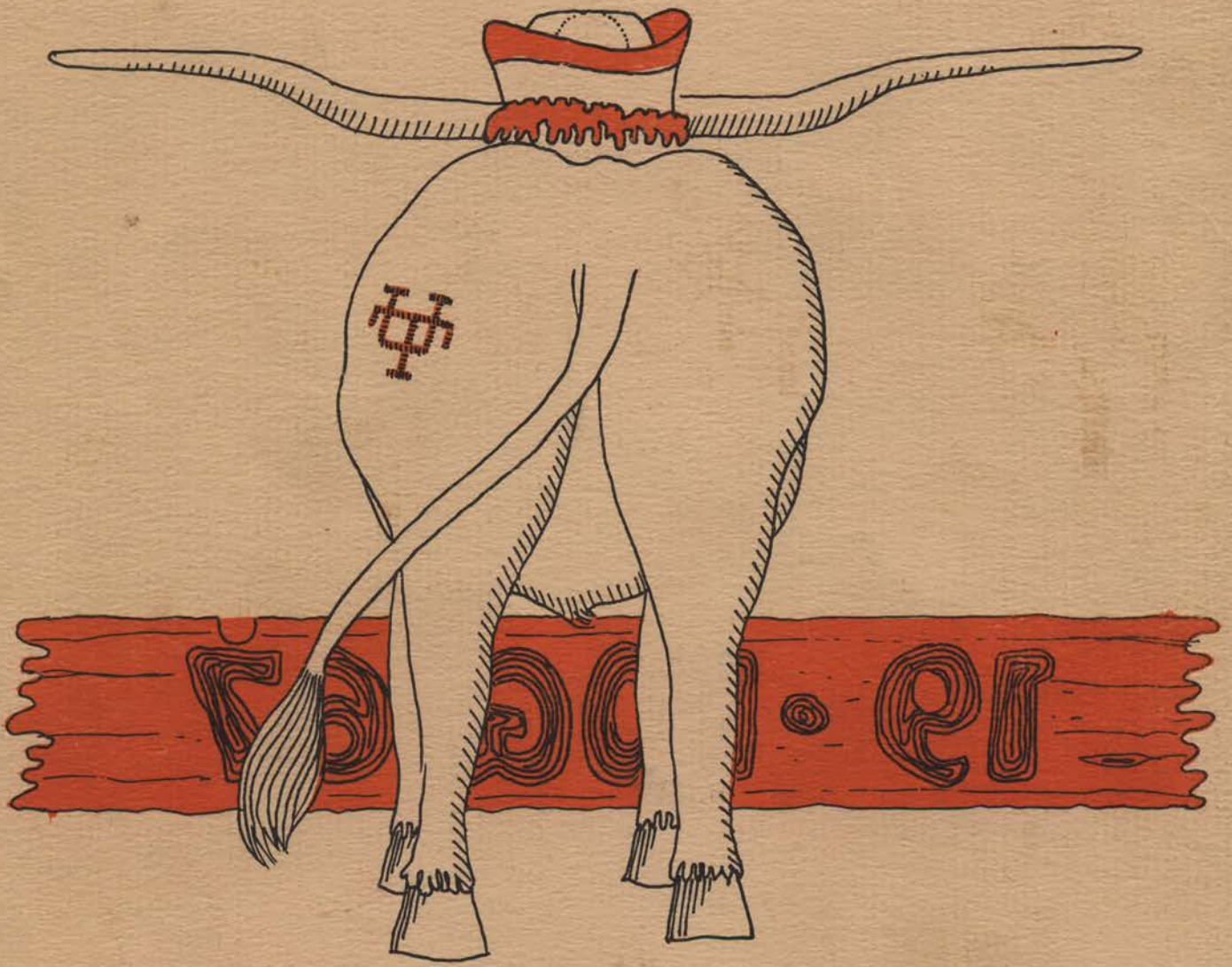
