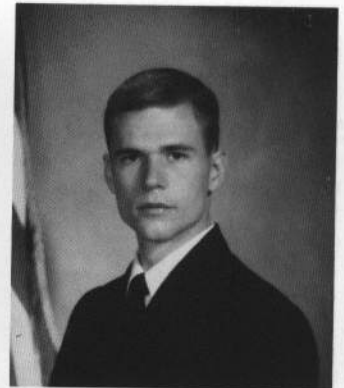
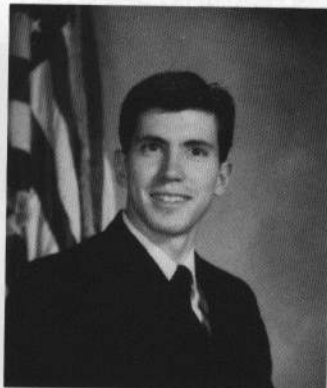
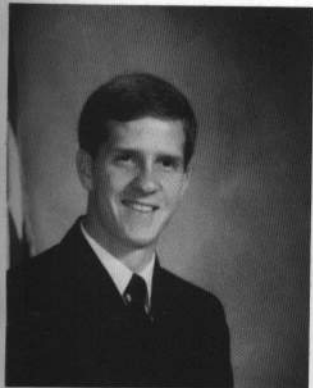
Oath Of Office

I (state your full name), having been appointed a commissioned officer in the United States (Navy) (Marine Corps), do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies foreign and domestic, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter, so help me God.

The goal of the Naval ROTC is to train men and women to become officers in the United States Navy and Marine Corps. In December, May and August of each academic year, several individuals complete the curriculum and are ready to take the Oath of Office and receive a commission into the Naval Service. Through this commission, the United States places "special faith and confidence" in these men and women. So help them God.

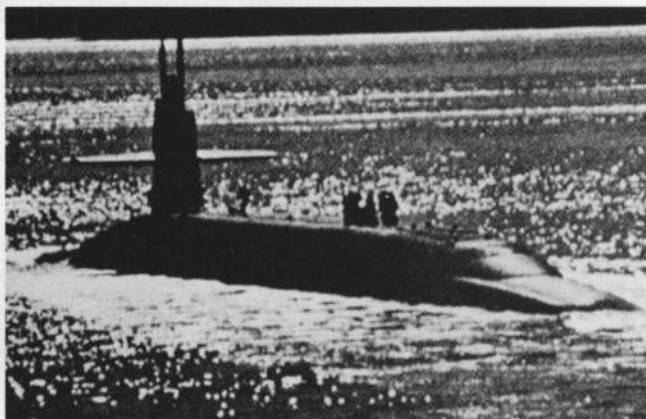

iology, a swim test in flight gear, and hops in helos and the T-34 trainer.

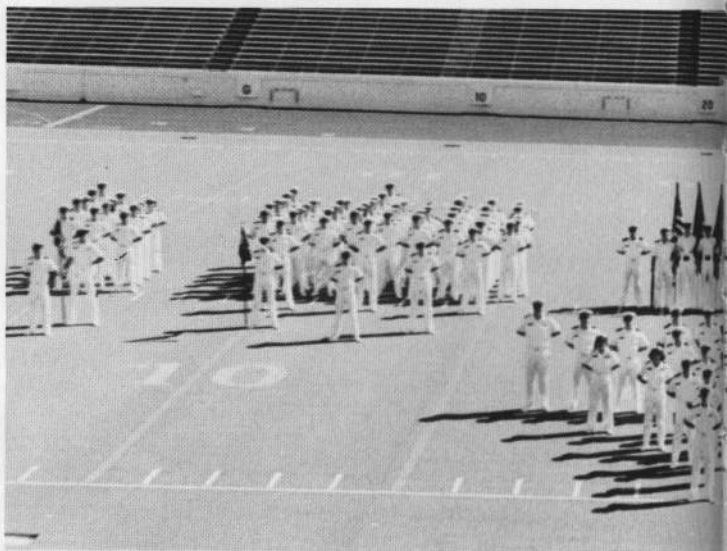

Navy and Marine Corps

On November 10, 1775, the Continental Congress resolved that two battalions of Marines be raised, and it is this date that Marines around the world celebrate as the birth of their Corps.

During the First World War, the Marines earned international acclaim as a fighting force. In June of 1918, at Belleau Wood, the Marines advanced under German machine gun fire. Gunnery Sgt. Dan Daly lead his troops forward crying, "Come on, you sons-of-bitches, do you want to live forever?"

Between the World Wars, the Marine Corps conceived and developed the new concepts of Amphibious Operations and the Fleet Marine Force, which were used by the United States in the long fight against Japan on Guadalcanal, Tarawa, Saipan, Bougainville and perhaps the most famous, Iwo Jima, where Admiral Nimitz said of the Marines "Uncommon valor was a common virtue."

During the Korean War, the Marines in North Korea were attacked and surrounded by eleven Chinese Army Divisions. But in the words of Colonel "Chesty" Puller, the Chinese made a mistake when they surrounded he and his Marines, "Those poor bastards, they've got us right where we want them. We can shoot in every direction now."

The traditions of the Marine Corps, of which this ceremony is one, serve to keep the pride and esprit of the Marine Corps high, so that the Corps can continue to improve, and exceed even its own successes.

Today's great United States Navy was born from humble beginnings. Frustrated by the supremacy of the British Navy, George Washington, on his own initiative, commissioned armed vessels and sent them to attack British shipping. It was a makeshift fleet and was dubbed "Washington's Navy." On 13 October, 1775, Congress established a Naval Committee to acquire and outfit vessels for sea. The next month the committee purchased two ships, two brigs, two sloops, and two schooners. Thus was born the Continental Navy.

The U.S. Navy has come a long way since the days of John Paul Jones. In the last 80 years we have been involved in two world wars, two Asiatic wars and a variety of lesser incidents. We have seen the advent of carrier warfare and the birth of the nuclear Navy.

Tradition, valor and victory are the Navy's heritage. To these may be added dedication, discipline, and vigilance as the watchwords of the present and the

future. Mobility, surprise, dispersal and offensive power are the keynotes of the new Navy. The roots of the Navy lie in a strong belief in the future, in continued dedication to our tasks, and in reflection on our heritage.

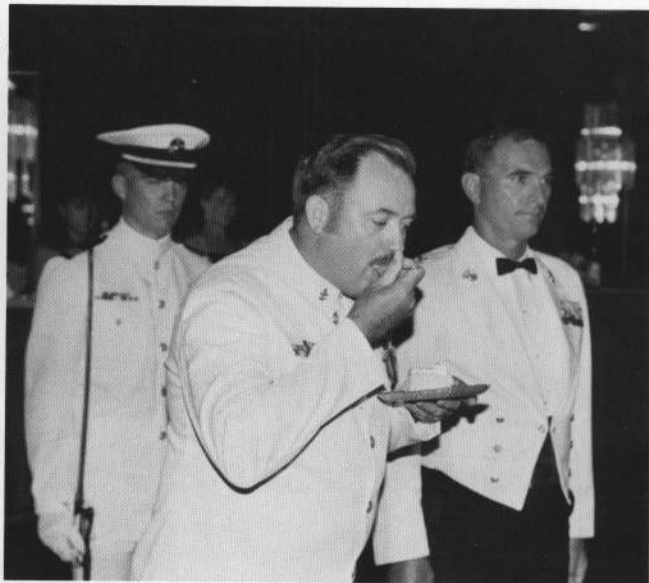

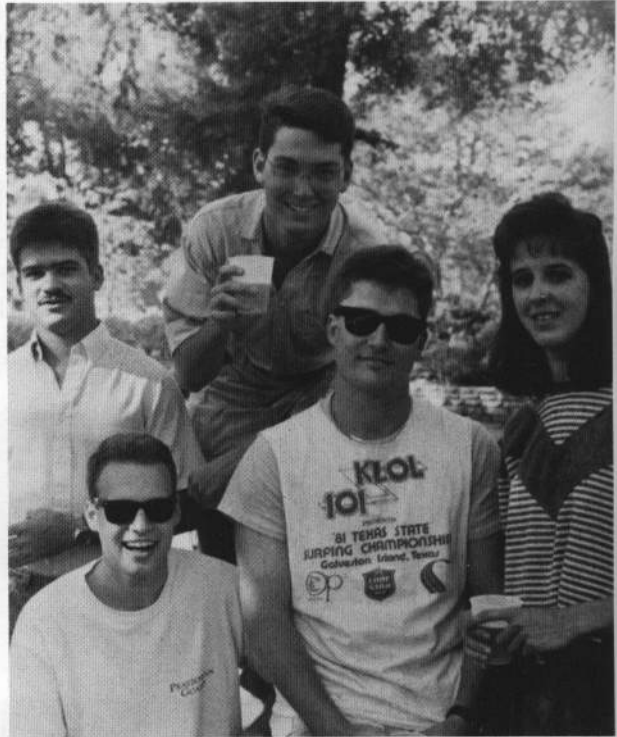

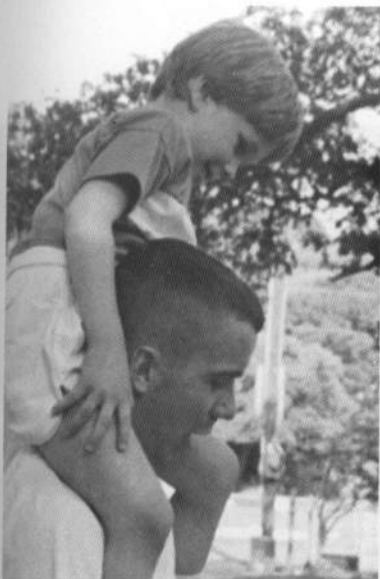
TGIFs

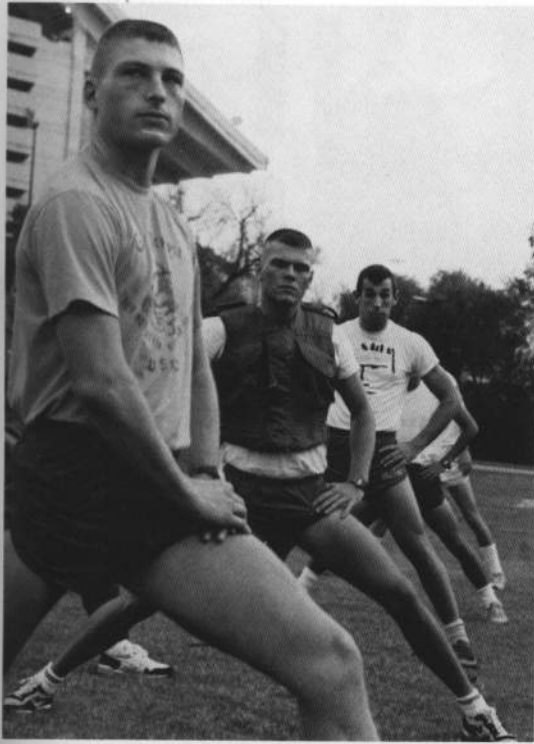

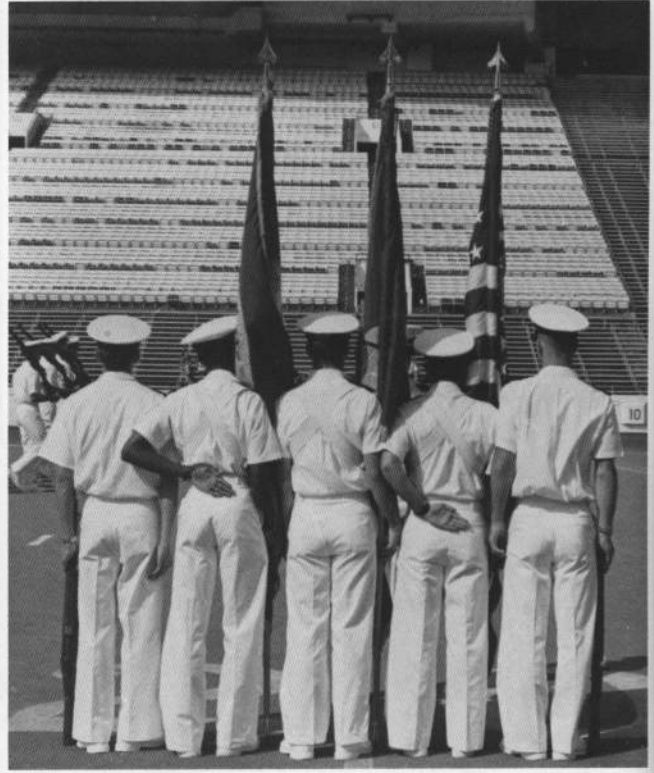


Color Guard

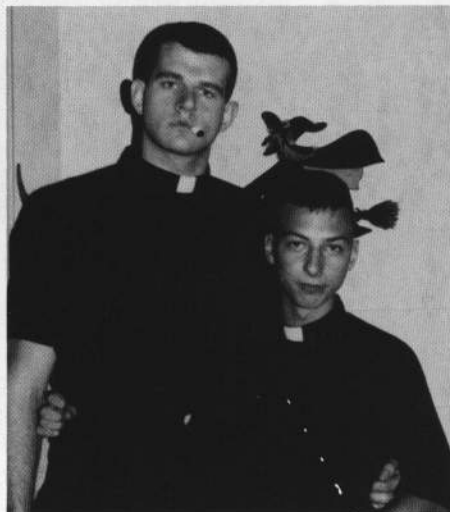
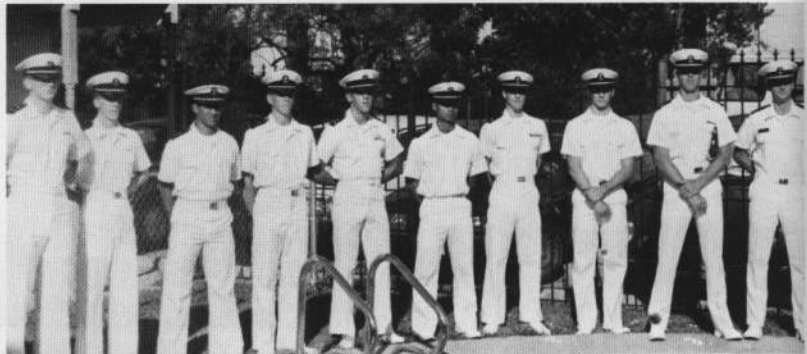
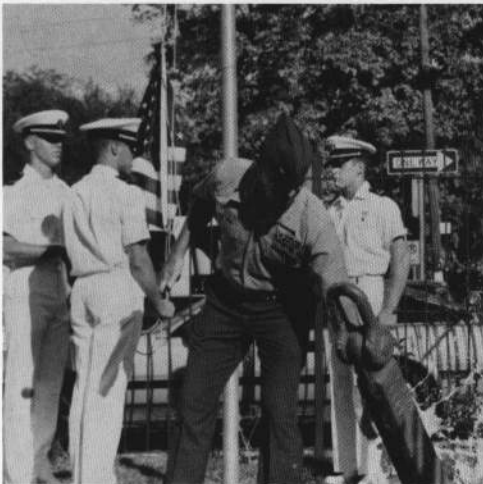


The Crow's Nest

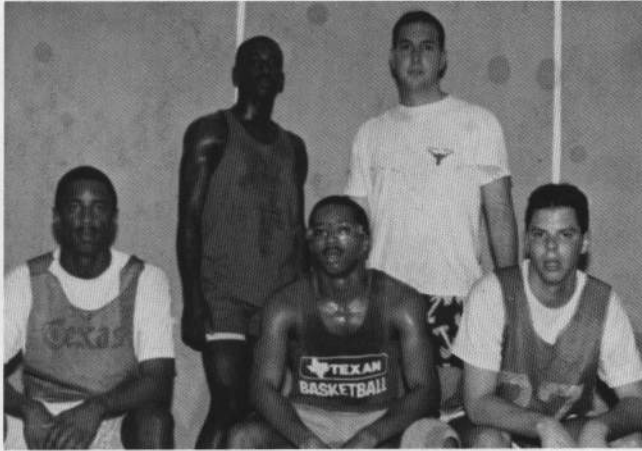
Intramural Sports

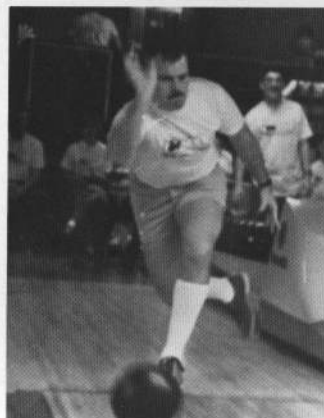


Bowl for Kids

Commanding Officer Colonel Stephen K. Smith



Colonel Smith is the Commanding Officer and Professor of Naval Science at UT NROTC, having assumed command on 1 August 1986.

COL Smith attended Hanover College and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Guidance and Counseling and was commissioned in 1965 from the University of Northern Colorado. 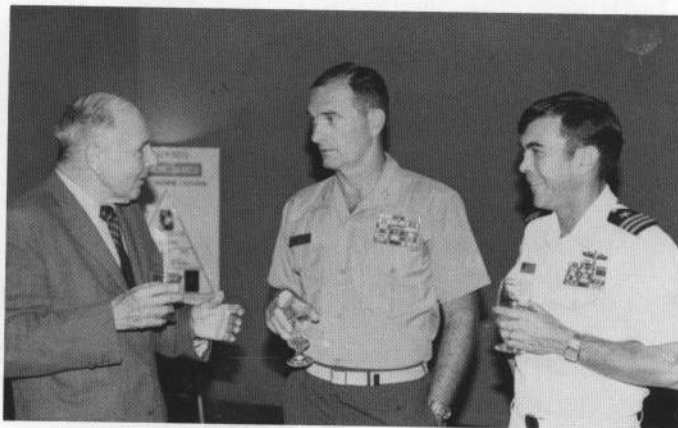

Following a 13 month tour in Vietnam, he reported to Marine Corps Supply Center, Albany, where he served as commanding officer for three different companies until reassigned in February 1967 to Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Paris Island, South Carolina. Returning to Vietnam in July 1968, he served as the Commanding Officer of three different combat units. Returning to the U.S. in July 1969, he completed the Amphibious Warfare School and was assigned as Assistant Inspector-Instructor, 4th/5th 155MM Gun Batteries (SP), USMCR, Denver, Colorado, where he served until Sep-

tember 1972. Col Smith was then transferred to the 1st Marine Brigade, Kanehoe Marine Corps Air Station, Oahu. In July 1976, he joined the Third Marine Division as Operations Officer (S-3), 12th Marines.

In July 1977, COL Smith attended the Naval War College at Newport, Rhode Island, and was further assigned as Marine Officer Instructor, NROTC Unit, Purdue University, where he served from 1978 to 1981. In August 1981, he was reassigned to Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps as Head Officer Procurement, Personnel Procurement Division. Reassigned in August 1984 to the Defense Nuclear Agency, he served as the Chief of Emergency Actions Division; responsible for emergency operations relating to nuclear weapons incidents.

COL Smith's personal decorations and awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" (gold star in lieu of second award), Purple Heart Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V" and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star.

COL Smith is married to the former Lorraine Kapes of Hazleton, Pennsylvania. They have two children: Andrew and Megan.



*Executive Officer***Commander Thomas D. Williams, USN**

Commander Williams enlisted in the Naval Reserve in 1957. While in the Naval Reserve he was selected for the Reserve Officer Commissioning Program and received his officer training at Officer Candidate School, Newport, RI. He attended Texas Christian University and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Marketing in 1962 and was commissioned an Ensign in the Naval Reserve that same year.

On completion of OCS, CDR Williams was assigned to the USS WESTCHESTER COUNTY (LST 1167), where he served as Gunnery and Combat Information Officer. In 1964, he was ordered to the USS VANCE (DER 387) to serve as Weapons Officer. During this tour, he received a commission in the Regular Navy. 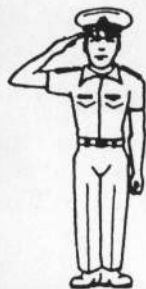
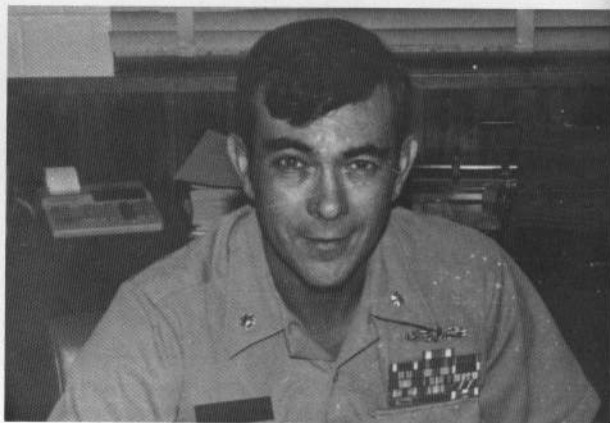
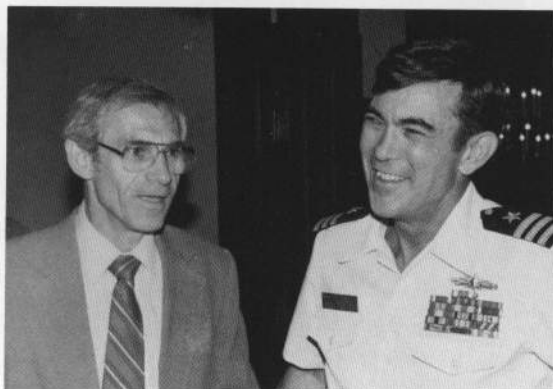
From 1971 to 1972, CDR Williams attended the Naval War College, New-

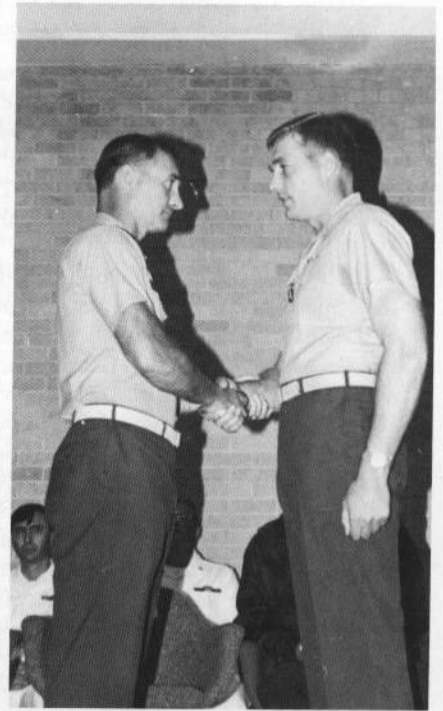
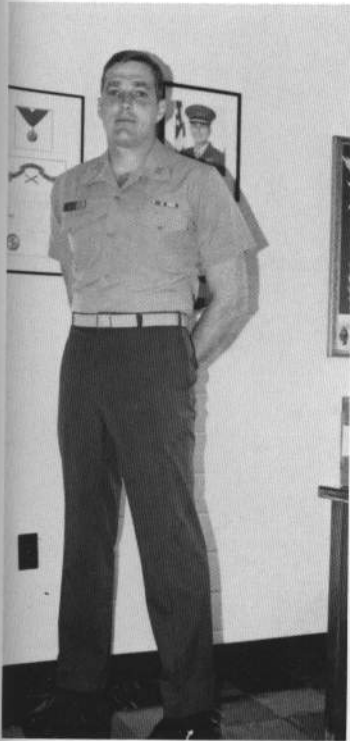


CAPT Kevin A. Vietti

As our newest addition to the UT NROTC Unit, we welcome LT Mayger!



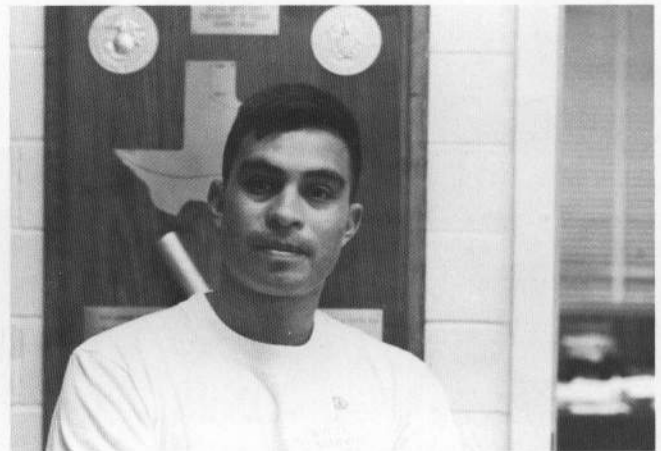
QMCS *Alfred Paxton*, USN
