

Commanding Officer Colonel Stephen K. Smith, USMC

Memories and accomplishments are all the more enjoyable if both are pleasant experiences. Such is not always the case, but the Longhorn Log for 1986-1987 has attempted to at least provide a snapshot for your memory that highlights battalion accomplishments during the past year. Obviously, all of you were contributors, but I would single out the Publications Officer and his staff, the Anchorettes, and the editor of this excellent publication for "making it happen." And to those who supported this edition through personal contributions, or advertisements, my sincere thanks.

Colonel Smith is the Commanding Officer and Professor of Naval Science at UT NROTC, having assumed command on 1 August 1986.

COL Smith attended Hanover College and graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree and was commissioned in 1964. He earned a Master of Science degree in Guidance and Counseling in 1975 from the University of Northern Colorado, completed the Marine Corps Amphibious Warfare School in 1970, and the Naval War College Command and Staff in 1978.

After completion of The Basic School and the Basic Artillery Officers Orientation Course in February, 1965, he reported to the 4th Battalion, 12th Marines, 3rd Marine Division which sailed for the Republic of Vietnam in June 1965. Following a 13 month tour in Vietnam, he reported to Marine Corps Supply Center, Albany, where he served as Commanding Officer for three different companies until reassigned in February 1967 to Marine Corps Recruit Depot, Parris Island, South Carolina. Returning to Vietnam in July 1968, he served as the Commanding Officer of three different combat units. Returning to the United States in July 1969, he completed the Amphibious Warfare School and was assigned as Assistant Inspector-Instructor, 4th/5th 155MM Gun Batteries (SP), USMCR, Denver, Colorado, where he served until September 1972 when transferred to the 1st Marine Brigade, Kanehoe Marine Corps Air Station, Oahu. In July 1976, he joined the Third




Marine Division as Operations Officer (S-3), 12th Marines.

In July 1977, COL Smith attended the Naval War College at Newport, Rhode Island, and was further assigned as Marine Officer Instructor, NROTC Unit, Purdue University where he served from 1978 to 1981. In August 1981, he was reassigned to Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps where he served as Head, Officer Procurement, Personnel Procurement Division. Reassigned in August 1984 to the Defense Nuclear Agency, he served as the Chief, Emergency Actions Division, responsible for emergency operations relating to nuclear weapons incidents.

COL Smith's personal decorations and awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" (gold star in lieu of second award), Purple Heart Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V" and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star.

COL Smith is married to the former Lorraine Kapes of Hazleton, Pennsylvania. They have two children: Andrew and Megan.

Executive Officer Commander Thomas D. Williams, USN



I am still extremely pleased to be here after two years. I have no reservation that this battalion is the best in the country. Commander Williams enlisted in the Naval Reserve in 1957. While in the Naval Reserve he was selected for the Reserve Officer Commissioning Program and received his officer training at Officer Candidate School, Newport, RI. While assigned to the Naval Reserves, he attended Texas Christian University and received a Bachelor of Science degree in Marketing in 1962 and was commissioned an Ensign in the Naval Reserve that same year.

On completion of OCS, CDR Williams was assigned to USS WESTCHESTER COUNTY (LST 1167), where he served as Gunnery and Combat Information Officer.

In 1964, he was ordered to the USS VANCE (DER 387) to serve as Weapons Officer. During this tour, he received a commission in the Regular Navy.

In October 1966, after completing Department Head School in Newport, RI, he was assigned to the USS BLACK (DD 666) as Engineering Officer.

His next assignment was to NROTC Unit, University of Louisville, KY, where he taught Naval Engineering, Naval Management, Naval Orientation and Naval History.

In 1971-72, CDR Williams attended the Naval War

College, Newport, RI. While there he obtained a Master's of Science degree in International and Public Affairs. In 1972, he was assigned duty as Officer-in-Charge, Mobile Training Team, Vietnam. In 1973, he left Vietnam and was temporarily assigned to Fleet Training Group, San Diego, CA.

After eight months at Fleet Training Group, he was assigned as Executive Officer, USS MEYERKORD (FF 1058). MEYERKORD completed a yard overhaul and full operational cycle during his assignment.

In 1976, he was assigned as Team Leader, Human Resource Management Center, San Diego, CA.

His next assignment was as Operations Officer, USS BLUE RIDGE (LCC 19) in May 1979.

Most recently, CDR Williams served in Naval Military Personnel Command as Leadership and Management Education and Training Program Manager for the Navy.

CDR Williams' awards include the Meritorious Service Medal with Combat "V," Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation and the Navy Expeditionary Medal.

CDR Williams is married to the former Catherine Seagraves. They have one son: Dagan.




CAPT Kevin A. Vietti

CAPT Vietti is married to the former Darcus Branch and has a seven year old son (Mathew) and a five year old daughter (Emily).




LT Michael E. Kidd

LT Kidd is the instructor for the Naval Orientation and Engineering courses and performs other duties, including Recruiting Officer and Crow's Nest Advisor.




LT Timothy E. Ritzert

LT Ritzert received a B.S. in Civil Engineering and a commission through the NROTC from VMI. Earning his wings in August, 1980, he then attended the Navy Electronic Warfare School in Pensacola and completed the SERE training in Brunswick, Maine. 


GYSGT Michael Gomez


Midshipmen Shoot For High GPA's






Naval ROTC Drill Platoon









Spring Dining Out



The first big event towards platoon competition each semester is the Battalion Commander's Inspection.



The Spring Inspection, held by 1/c Chris Scherer, was on 10 March and first place was taken by Alpha-3, commanded by 1/c John Gillum.














Navy and Marine Corps Birthdays


Pass-In-Review


Each Spring, the three ROTC units at UT end the year with the Presidential Pass-in-Review.

Aviation Field Trip




The Midshipmen did get the opportunity to go

All in all, those who made the trip had a great time and thought it was a wonderful learning experience.









This is accomplished by doing 67 push-ups and 100 sit-ups, both in 2 minutes, completing a one and half mile run in under 8 minutes and 10 seconds, and passing the toe-touch.
