

The University of Texas is one of 53 universities having Naval ROTC Units, and is one of the 12 NROTC Units which offers a Supply Corps Option as well as a Marine Corps Option, adding those two career opportunities to the Navy Line which encompasses Naval Aviation, Submarines, and Surface Ships.

The Naval ROTC Unit is the oldest Reserve Officers Training Corps present on the University of Texas campus. Since the UT NROTC Unit first opened its doors in September of 1940, thousands of graduating students have received commissions in the United States Navy or Naval Reserve or commissions in the United States Marine Corps or Marine Corps Reserve, along with their bachelor's degrees.

The distinction between those graduates receiving commissions in the regular Navy or Marine Corps as opposed to their reserve components, depends upon whether the student was a Regular or Contract Midshipman.

The Regular Program: Regular Midshipmen are selected on the basis of a nationwide competitive examination, a physical examination, and interviews. The application deadline is mid-November. An appointment to an NROTC Unit as a Regular Midshipman covers the cost of tuition, lab and instructional fees, books for all college courses including Naval Science courses, required uniforms, and a retainer pay of \$50 a month which goes toward room and board.

The Contract Program: Contract Midshipmen are locally selected by the Professor of Naval Science on the basis of a written test, a physical examination, and a series of interviews conducted when the applicant arrives on campus to register as a freshman. Contract Midshipmen receive Naval Science textbooks and uniforms all four years, and during their junior and senior years they receive a \$40 per month retainer pay. The Contract Program was designed to procure Reserve Officers who would serve on active duty for a limited time. There are provisions, however, to permit Contract Midshipmen to transfer to the Regular Program, and for Reserve Officers to transfer to the Regular Navy or Marine Corps.

The Two Year Contract Plan: With the increasing number of men transferring into major universities at the upper division level, a new NROTC program was created to permit men to enter the Unit at the beginning of their Junior year. The application deadline is mid-April. Selection is based on the college transcript, a physical examination, and a series of interviews. Selectees are sent to Summer School to make up freshman and sophomore Naval Science courses so they can enter the Junior Class on an equal footing with other Contract Midshipmen.

COL Max H. LaGrone, USMC Professor of Naval Science

Colonel LaGrone is a native Texan and a graduate of Rice University. Before assuming command of the UT NROTC Unit in September, 1963, Colonel LaGrone served for two years as the Fleet Marine Officer on the staff of Commander Second Fleet. He has also served on the staff of the Commander-in-Chief, all Allied Forces, Northern Europe. The Colonel's combat record includes Guadalcanal, Bougainville, Saipan, and Okinawa in World War II; and the Korean War.

Commander Wood is also a native Texan, and is a graduate of East Texas State Teachers College. A naval aviator, Commander Wood received the Distinguished Flying Cross in World War II. His military record includes command of Utility Squadron Six. Commander Wood was the Executive Officer of NAAS Kingsville before coming to UT.

This was Colonel LaGrone's third year as the Professor of Naval Science and Commanding Officer of the University of Texas Naval ROTC Unit. Chief Redman reported aboard during the summer, and by September the new Marine Option Instructors, Major Strain and Gunnery Sergeant Burtsell, had joined the staff and Commander Wood had assumed the duties of Executive Officer.

When Mr. Blake left the unit in November to become a flight instructor at NAAS Kingsville, Commander Wood finished the freshmen's Fall Semester course, and Mr. Chris taught them in the Spring Semester. Mr. Sommer was promoted to Lieutenant Commander, de la Bosa made chief, and Chief Gober retired during the Spring Semester. LT McCann, the new Weapons Instructor, arrived from Vietnam in May.



CDR Thomas J. Wood Executive Officer

LT W. D. McCANN, USN Weapons Instructor

Mr. McCann graduated with honors from UT with a BA in Government in June, 1961. He spent his first 3 years of active duty on the USS WALKER (DD-517) as ASW Officer, then was transferred to Yale University as Weapons Instructor. After less than a year at Yale, LT McCann received emergency orders to Vietnam where he served as a Shiprider/Advisor in the Vietnamese Navy Sea Force for 12 months before joining the UT faculty in May.



LT R. G. BLAKE, USN Freshman Instructor

Mr. Blake graduated from the University of Utah with a business degree. He joined the University of Texas faculty in the fall of 1964 and was beginning his second year as Freshman Instructor when the increasing need for Naval Aviators in Southeast Asia started a chain reaction that included LT Blake's transfer to NAAS Kingsville where he is now a flight instructor.



LT H. J. CHRIS, USN Sophomore Instructor

Mr. Chris graduated from Tulane University in 1961 with a degree in Architecture. He came to the University of Texas from the USS YORKTOWN during which he had two, nine month deployments in the Pacific. Mr. Chris is the Social Committee Advisor and taught the Freshmen as well as the Sophomores after Mr. Blake left.



LCDR G. M. DEMPSEY, USN Senior Line Instructor

Mr. Dempsey is a graduate of the University of Santa Clarawho received a commission as a Naval Aviator through the NavCad program. An experienced carrier pilot, Mr. Dempsey has served as a Flight Instructor, Hangar Deck Officer, and Assistant Flight Deck Officer. He flew Crusaders in Utility Squadron 7 before joining the UT faculty in September of 1964.



LT J. B. MAYO, JR., USN Junior Line Instructor

Mr. Mayo completed the Regular NROTC Program at the University of North Carolina in 1960 with a Bachelor of Arts in Radio/Television. He was Operations Officer of the USS SABINE before coming to UT where he has completed a Master of Arts in Journalism. In June he will be transferred to New London, Conn., to be the Public Affairs Officer on the staff of Rear Admiral Joseph Williams, the deputy commander of the Submarine Force, Atlantic.




LCDR M. R. SOMMER, USN(SC) Supply Option Instructor






