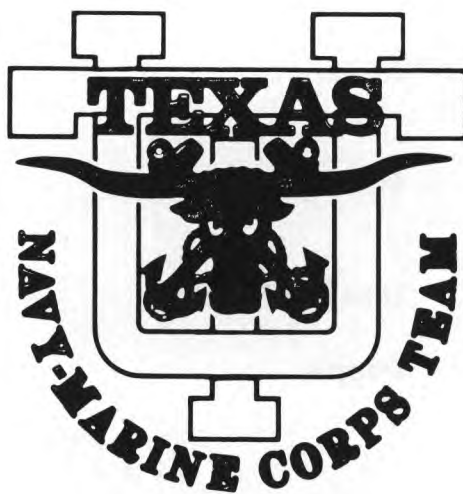

NROTC: The Making of an Officer

The Navy ROTC at The University of Texas at Austin means different things to different people. To those who are not in the unit, it is a group of uniform-clad "cadets" representing the military establishment. To the unit staff, it is a refreshing tour of duty. To the freshmen, it is a new challenge. To some battalion members, it is dull repetition, marching around the stadium with a rifle. To others, it is an organization comprised of many organizations, each with its own style of camaraderie. To those who do not complete the program it is an insurmountable obstacle. To those who do, it is a foundation on which to build a career.

UTNROTC was created to be a foundation. It is, after all, a commissioning program. Its various organizations and activities have been designed with this in mind. Naval science classes teach the academic knowledge necessary to be commissioned into the naval service. Morning P.T. develops fitness and motivation. *Esprit de corps* prevails in organizations like the Crow's Nest and the Buccaneer Drill Team. Social events, such as the Dining Outs and Cookie Calls help with the maintenance of sanity, while drill imparts self-discipline and teamwork. Responsibility is demonstrated and reinforced by the battalion commander, company commanders, and their supporting staffs. Organizational skill are developed and improved through the publication of the "Naval Orange" and *Lonehorn Log*. Each of these parts of the battalion provides midshipmen and officer candidates with leadership experience. Remember, though, that these are not ends in themselves, rather they are all means to an end.

That end is in itself a beginning. All of the naval science classes, the hours polishing brass, the P.T. sessions, the trips to the field — they do lead somewhere. The reward is realized when those gold bars can finally be worn. This marks the end, at least of the NROTC experience, but it marks the beginning of a naval profession.

We should all take what we have learned here from our classes, our friends, our successes and our failures, and be prepared to apply them in the service of our country. This, then, is what the UTNROTC is all about — preparation for the future.

Naval education and training lie at the foundation of naval success; and the power that neglects this essential element of strength will, when the battle is fought, find that its ships, however formidable, are but built for a more thoroughly trained and educated enemy.

Midshipmen Overcome Obstacles to Achieve Academic Success

Academics are every midshipman's concern here at The University of Texas. There are various extracurricular activities, however, particularly in the battalion, with time demands that can interfere with scholastic achievement. This is a constant battle, though many midshipmen have learned to overcome it and maintain high grade point averages. Unfortunately, there are also many midshipmen who have fallen below the minimum GPA requirements for NROTC. These battalion members must face academic review boards, with penalties ranging from warnings to disenrollment.

Recently CNET raised the GPA standards. Additionally, each midshipman is now required to take a Comprehensive Aptitude Test each year, covering all of the Naval Science courses taken so far.

To help students maintain these higher standards, the unit has had representatives from the Learning Skills Center lecture during professional labs on time management and other study skills, besides providing tutors for several math courses. To further enhance academic achievement, the Captain's List is instituted every semester for special recognition of outstanding scholastic performance.

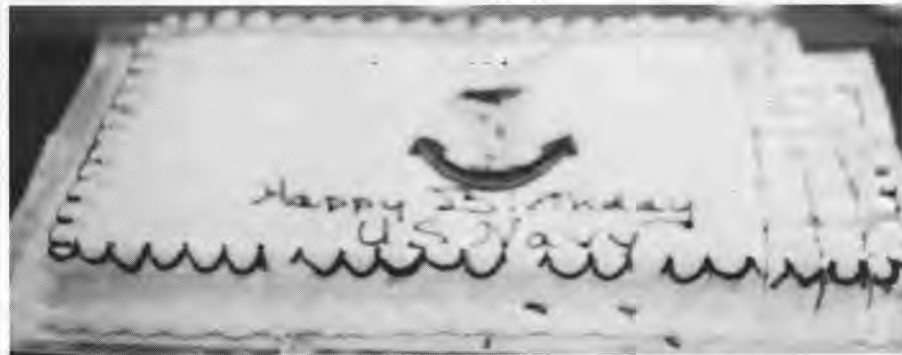

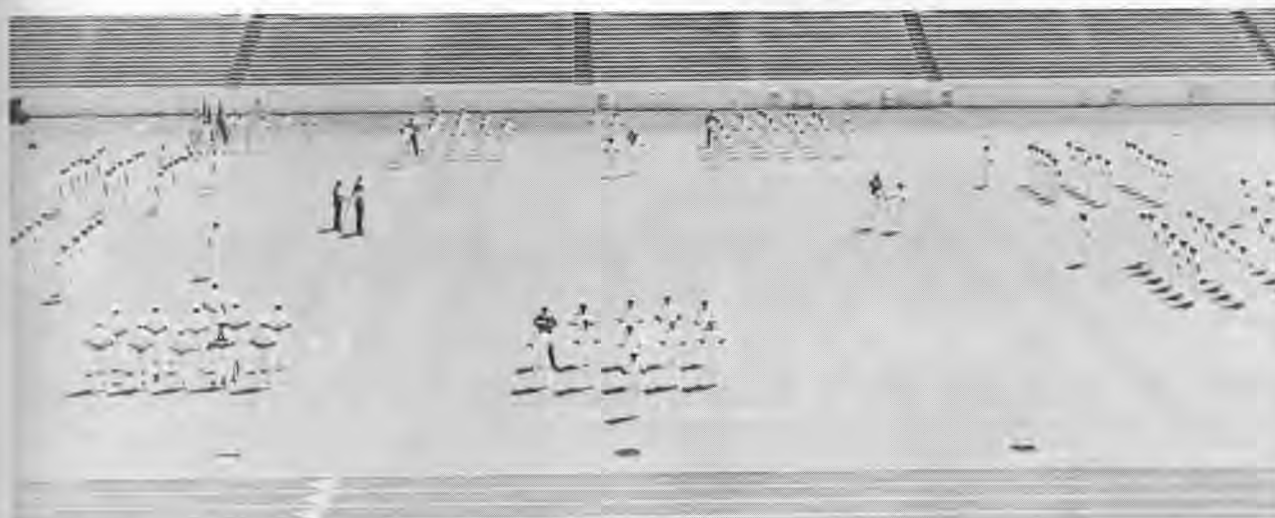
CNET, Others Inspect Battalion

Captain Lewis H. Thames has been the Commanding Officer of the NROTC program at the University of Texas since July, 1983. CAPT Thames served as Chief of Staff to Commander, Middle East Force from 1981 to 1983 before being assigned as the Professor of Naval Science at The University.

CAPT Thames began his career by enlisting in the Navy in 1953. He graduated from the Naval Academy in June 1960 after receiving an appointment from the Secretary of the Navy. He was assigned to the *USS Taylor* (DDE 468) followed by two tours aboard the *USS Carpenter* (DD 825) as Engineering Officer and Operations Officer. The Captain returned to his Alma Mater in 1965 as a Company Officer and, while there, received a MS degree from George Washington University.

From 1968 to 1970, CAPT Thames served in Vietnam as the River Squadron Task Group Commander in the Mekong Delta. He assumed command of the *USS Vernon County* (LST 1161) in 1970 followed by the *USS Richard B. Anderson* (DD 786) in 1973. He served on the staff of the CNO as Head Manpower Analysis and Systems Development Branch from 1976 to 1978. In 1978, CAPT Thames was assigned as the Director of Training/ Navy Liaison Officer at the Department of Defense Management Institute before leaving for the Middle East.

Commander John L. Baker Executive Officer

Commander John L. Baker has served as the Executive Officer of the UT NROTC Unit since September of 1982. Commander Baker enlisted in the Navy Reserve in 1957 and obtained an appointment to the Naval Academy from the Secretary of the Navy in 1958, graduating in 1962.

Having received his wings in March 1964, he reported to VA 125 and then to VA 146 aboard the *USS Constellation* (CV 64). From 1964 to 1970 he completed four combat cruises aboard the *Constellation*, the *USS Ranger* (CV 61), and the *USS Oriskany* (CV 34) flying a total of 332 combat missions.

CDR Baker graduated from the Naval War College in June, 1972. He served as Officer in Charge of the Human Resources Management Detachment. From 1975 to 1977, CDR Baker served as Administrative Officer, Operations Officer, and acting Executive Officer aboard the *USS John F. Kennedy* (CV 67).

The next three years he was assigned to Headquarters, Allied Forces, Northern Europe. In 1980, CDR Baker reported aboard the *USS Dwight D. Eisenhower* (CV 69) as Weapons Officer before coming to Austin.



Major Jack E. Owen, Jr. Marine Officer Instructor

Major Jack E. Owen Jr., an Austin Native, was assigned to the UT NROTC as the Marine Officer Instructor in May, 1983. He was commissioned into the Marine Corps following his graduation from the Naval Academy in 1973. After completing The Basic School in Quantico, Virginia and Field Artillery School in Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, he joined the 1st Battalion, 12th Marines in Hawaii.

MAJ Owen graduated from Harvard Law School in 1979 and is a member of the State Bar of Texas. Following assignment in Okinawa, Japan, he reported to MCB, Camp Pendleton, California in 1981 as a Military Justice Officer. While there, he successfully defended a Marine Brig guard from the *USS Ranger* in a nationally publicized case.





LT Robert Thomas

Lieutenant Thomas is the Alpha Company advisor. He graduated from U.C. Berkeley in 1979 and entered the Navy via the NUPOC Collegiate Program. He was commissioned from OCS that same year. After completion of Nuclear Power Training and the Submarine Officers Basic course, LT Thomas served on board the *USS Guitarro* (SSN 665). While assigned to the *Guitarro*, he served as the Reactor Controls Assistant and Weapons Officer.

LT Richard Bosco

Lieutenant Bosco serves as the Charlie Company advisor. A native of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, he graduated from the Naval Academy in 1979. Upon receiving his commission, he attended the Surface Warfare Officers' School in Newport, Rhode Island. After graduation from SWOS in February, 1980, he was assigned to the *USS Charles F. Adams* (DDG 2) for three years during which he made a cruise to the Indian Ocean.



LT Timothy Ritzert

Lieutenant Ritzert serves as the Bravo Company advisor. LT Ritzert received a B.S. degree and his commission through the NROTC unit at Virginia Military Institute. After receiving his wings in August, 1980, he attended the Navy Electronic Warfare School and completed survival, evasion, resistance, and escape training at Brunswick, Maine. He was then assigned to Fleet Air Reconnaissance Squadron Two (VQ-2) in Rota, Spain. During his tour he deployed to forward bases throughout Europe, the Mediterranean, Indian Ocean, Africa, and the continental United States.



QMCS William Herbert

Senior Chief Herbert teaches navigation and is the unit librarian. He came to UT from the *USS Oliver Hazard Perry* (FFG 7), where he was assistant navigator for six years as well as Chief Master-at-Arms, SC-1 Division Officer, and a plankowner of the *Perry*. He has previously served on the *USS Jason*, *USS Klondike*, at the Coastal River Division 22, and as Port Services Officer in Bermuda.



GYSGT Michael Gomez

Gunnery Sergeant Gomez serves as the Assistant Marine Officer Instructor at UT NROTC. In 1974, he enlisted in the Marine Corps and proceeded directly to MCRD in San Diego. Gunny Gomez's next duty station was the Marine barracks in Rota, Spain, and then back to MCRD. While at MCRD, he was a squad leader in the 2nd battalion, 7th Marines, E Company and received a promotion to sergeant. Before detaching in 1984, Gunny Gomez went to Okinawa, Japan, the Philippines, and Korea for "Team Spirit 84."



SKC William Wilder

Chief Wilder is the unit storekeeper. SKC Wilder joined the Navy in 1966 and after boot camp in San Diego reported to the *USS Longbeach* (CGN -9) for three Western Pacific tours including duty off the coast of Vietnam. After rejoining the Navy in Los Angeles, he served on board the *USS Camden* (ADE-2), CINCPAC staff, *USS Yellowstone* (AD-43), and the *USS Acadia* (AD-42).

Commissionees Take Oath

"I do solemnly swear that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office upon which I am about to enter; SO HELP ME GOD."

The oath taken today by the young men and women being commissioned is essentially the same oath taken by American officers since 1776. Although the wording has changed a number of times, the vow to support and defend the Constitution remains constant . . . calling on the help of God in assuming faithful discharge of this awesome responsibility. This declaration of allegiance is the same as that administered to the holder of any office of honor in the civil and active military service.

These few words are the fundamental basis for the absolute integrity characteristic of the Officer Corps. Integrity is the cornerstone of the military system. Every subordinate has the right to expect that those appointed over him possess professional integrity and that orders they receive are legal and lawful. Any officer who acts without integrity in any manner, violates his oath and does a disservice to his subordinates, himself, and his fellow officers, and to those countless officers, who have honored this creed for two centuries.
