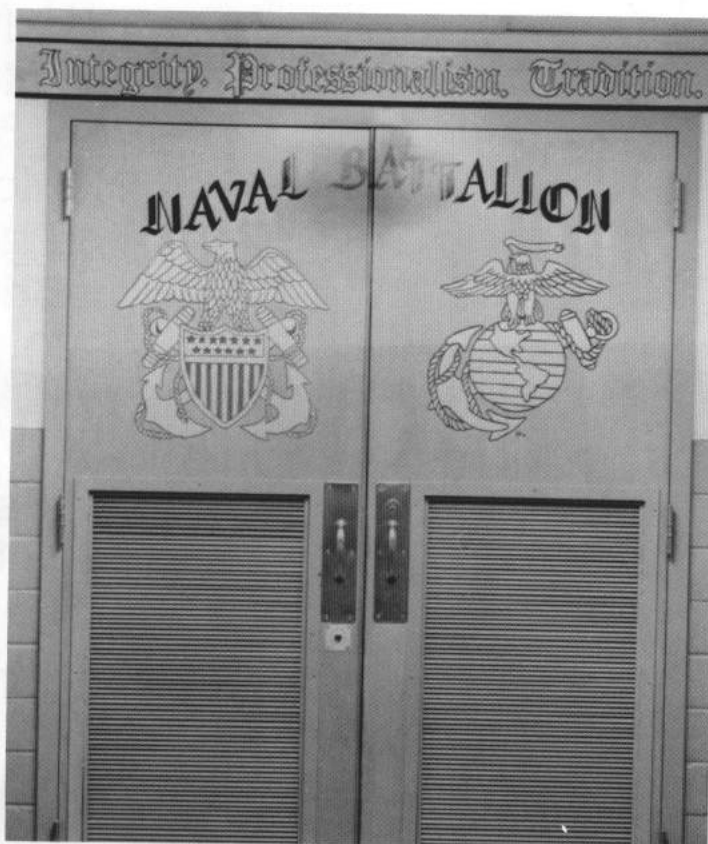

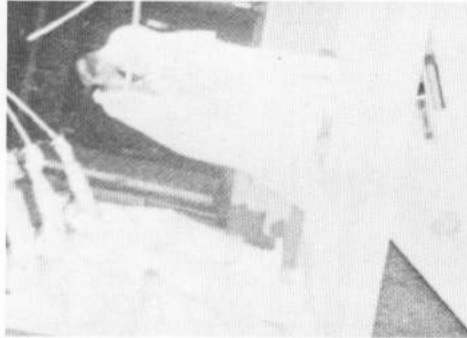

Colonel Steve Smith

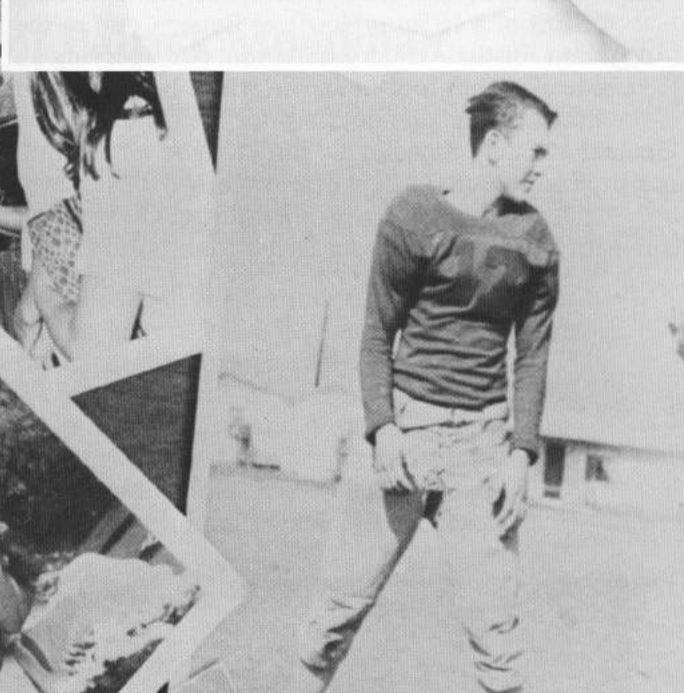
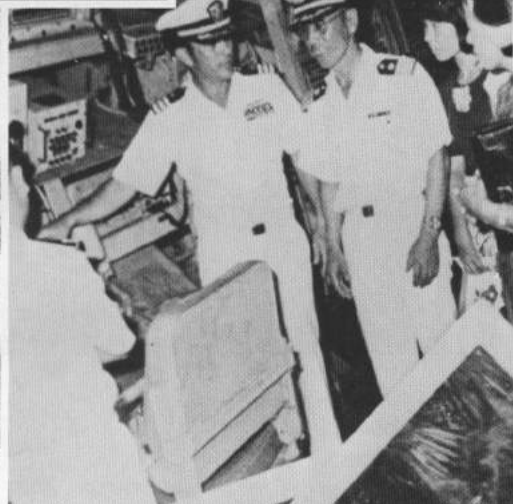
Colonel Smith, Commanding Officer and Professor of Naval Science, is a 1964 graduate of Hanover College and a veteran of two combat tours in the Republic of Vietnam. He assumed command of NROTC UT on 1 August 1986, and retired from the United States Marine Corps on 4 August 1989 after 25 years of service.



Colonel Smith's personal decorations and awards include the Legion of Merit, Defense Superior Service Medal, Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V", Purple Heart Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V", and Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star.

Commander Tom Williams

Commander Williams, Executive Officer and Leadership and Management instructor, is a 1962 graduate of TCU and a Vietnam veteran qualified in Surface Warfare. He reported aboard NROTC UT in 1986, and retired from the United States Navy on 23 June 1989 after 27 years of service.



Commander Williams' personal decorations and awards include the Meritorious Service Medal with Combat "V" and Gold Star in lieu of second award, Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation, and Navy Expeditionary Medal.

Major Kevin Vietti

Major Vietti reported aboard as the Marine Officer Instructor in July of 1986. Born in Dumas, Texas, he attended Oklahoma State University, graduated and was commissioned in 1976. After the Basic School in Quantico, Virginia, and Field Artillery School at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, he reported to the 1st Battalion, 10th Marines, 2nd Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. There he served as a Forward Observer, Liaison Officer, Executive Officer, and Commanding Officer of a 105mm Howitzer Battery, and as the Adjutant for the Artillery Battalion. After serving an eighteen month tour in Japan, where he performed duties as the aide-de-camp for the Commanding General at Camp Smedley D. Butler, he reported for a tour in Washington, D.C., where he earned a Master of Arts degree in Government from Georgetown University. Major Vietti transferred from NROTC UT in June of 1989.



Lieutenant Michael Kidd

Lieutenant Kidd reported aboard NROTC UT in the summer of 1986 as the Alpha Company Advisor and Nuclear and Submarine Programs Officer. He is a 1981 graduate of the University of Texas, receiving a degree in Architectural Engineering, and a commission through the NROTC program. After completion of Nuclear Power training and the Submarine Officers' Basic Course, he served aboard the USS CASIMIR PULASKI (SSBN 633), a ballistic missile nuclear submarine based in Charleston, South Carolina. While assigned to the PULASKI, he served as the Radiological Control Assistant and "E" Division Officer. Lieutenant Kidd transferred from NROTC UT in December 1989.

Lieutenant Edward Takesuye

Lieutenant Takesuye joined the UT NROTC staff in January of 1989. He is a graduate of the United States Naval Academy, class of 1983, receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering. Upon completion of Nuclear Power training and the Submarine Officers' Basic Course, he was assigned to the USS DRUM (SSN 677), a fast-attack nuclear submarine homeported in San Diego, California. While aboard DRUM, he served as the Interior Communications Division Officer, Chemistry and Radiological Controls Assistant, Main Propulsion Assistant, Damage Control Assistant and Assistant Engineer. Lieutenant Takesuye is the instructor for the Naval Orientation and Engineering courses.



Lieutenant Patrick Moynihan

Lieutenant Moynihan is the Bravo Company Advisor and the Aviation Programs Officer. He received a BS in Chemical Engineering and a commission through the NROTC program at USC, completed Overwater Jet Navigation Training in Pensacola, Florida, and was designated a Naval Flight Officer in May 1983. He was then assigned to VS-41, North Island, Ca., for training in the S-3 VIKING carrier-based ASW aircraft. Joining the TOPCATS of VS-31 in May of 1984, he took part in numerous deployments, detachments and exercises aboard USS DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER (CVN 69), served as communications, schedules, avionics, aviation safety and NATOPS officer, was certified an "Ike Centurion", and was designated a mission commander. Lieutenant Moynihan is the Weapons Systems and Naval History/Seapower instructor for the NROTC unit.

Lieutenant Jeffery Mayger

Lieutenant Mayger reported aboard NROTC UT in September of 1987 as the Charlie Company Advisor and Surface Warfare Programs Officer. He received a BS degree in Mechanical Engineering and was commissioned at the University of Colorado. After attending Surface Warfare Officer School in Newport, Rhode Island, he reported aboard USS ENHANCE (MSO 437), where he served as Communications, Operations, and Engineer Officer. His second sea tour was aboard USS REID (FFG 30), where he served as ASW Officer and Ordnance Officer.

He came to the University of Texas from a deployment in the Persian Gulf. Lieutenant Mayger, a qualified Engineering Officer of the Watch (EOOW), ASW Evaluator and Tactical Action Officer (TAO) with a subspecialty in mine warfare, serves as the unit Navigation instructor.





QMCS Alfred Paxton

Quartermaster Senior Chief Paxton joined the Navy in 1963 and was assigned to his first ship, the USS UMPQUA, where he served as a deck technician. He went on to serve as the Assistant Navigator aboard USS CREE (ATF 84), USS TEKELMA (ATF 113) and USS TRIPOLI (LPH 10). Before coming to UT, he also served as Executive Officer of a military police detachment in New Orleans and had a second tour aboard TRIPOLI, this time as the Senior Navigation Instructor. Senior Chief Paxton is the Unit Librarian and Assistant Navigation Instructor.

GYSGT Ronald Ostoj

Gunnery Sergeant Ostoj reported aboard NROTC UT in October of 1988. He joined the Corps in 1976, completed recruit training in San Diego, and served with the 1st Battalion, 3rd Marines, 1st Marine Brigade in Kaneohe Bay, Hawaii, in billets ranging from rifleman to platoon commander. In 1980, he left Hawaii to serve for a year as a recruiter in Minneapolis, followed by two years as a recruiter in the Chicago area. Next, he served with the 1st Battalion, 2nd Marines, 2nd Marine Division, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, as a weapons platoon sergeant and rifle platoon sergeant. He transferred in 1985 to MCRD San Diego and served with the Third Recruit Training Battalion as a Chief Drill Instructor. Gunnery Sergeant Ostoj is the Assistant Marine Officer Instructor.



SKC Michael Hart

Storekeeper Chief Hart, a native of Butte, Montana, joined the Navy in 1975 and completed "Boot Camp" at Recruit Training Command San Diego. During his fourteen years of active duty, he has served aboard USS BEAUFORT (ATS 2), USS MORTON (DD 948) and USS INCHON (LPH 12). He has also served in three independent duty billets ashore, with CBU 14 in Groton, Ct., MOMAG DET TWO in Scotland, and here at the NROTC Unit, UT Austin, where he reported in July of 1987. Chief Hart is the Unit Supply/Fiscal Officer.

YN1 Henry Mitchell

Yeoman First Class Mitchell reported aboard NROTC UT in March of 1985. Prior to coming to UT, he was stationed for two years with the United Nations Command, Combined Forces Command/8th U.S. Army Headquarters, Seoul, Korea. Before serving in Korea, he served as Yeoman for the Military Department aboard USNS PASSUMPSIC (T-AO 107). Petty Officer Mitchell is the Unit Yeoman.

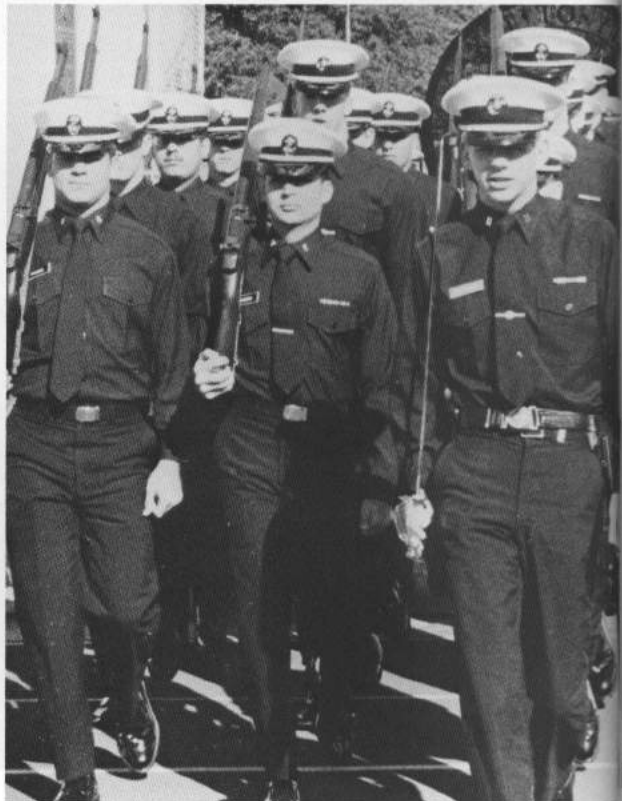

THE BENEFITS OF DRILL

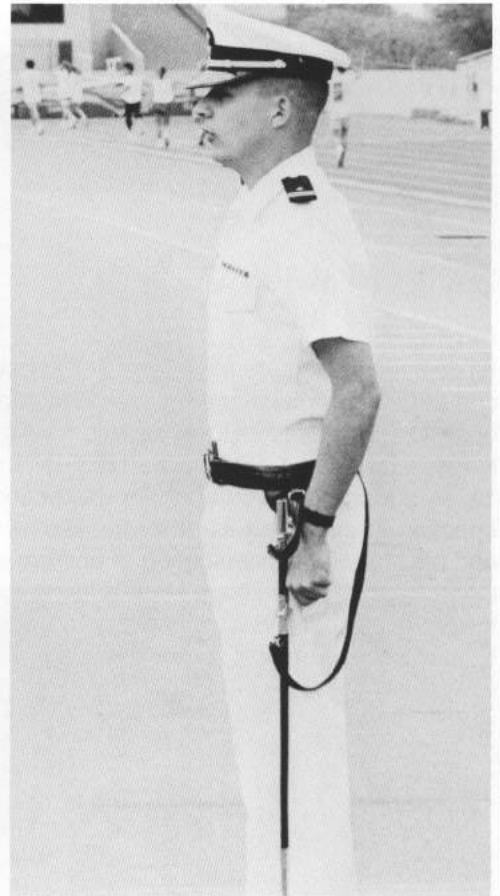

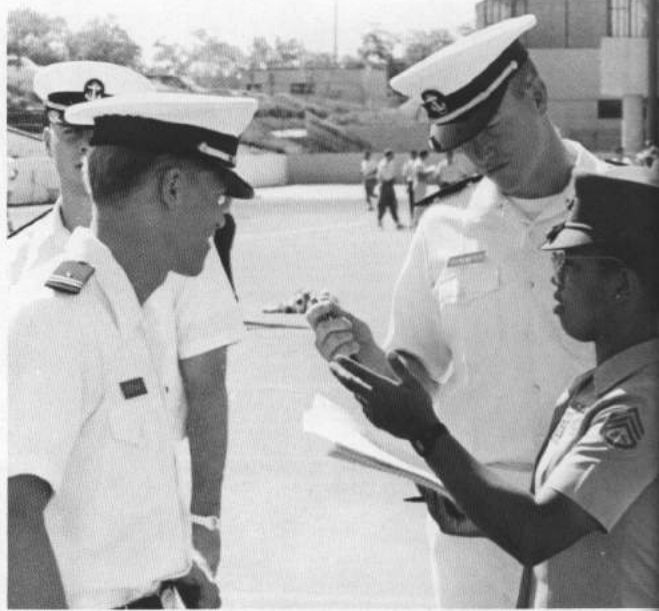

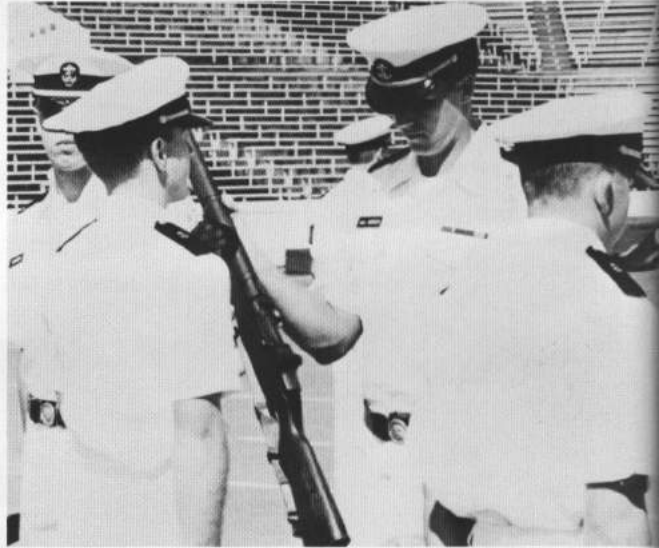

INSPECTIONS

While midshipmen are most frequently observed marching and performing rifle manual in Memorial Stadium, they can occasionally be seen at attention in neatly aligned ranks. 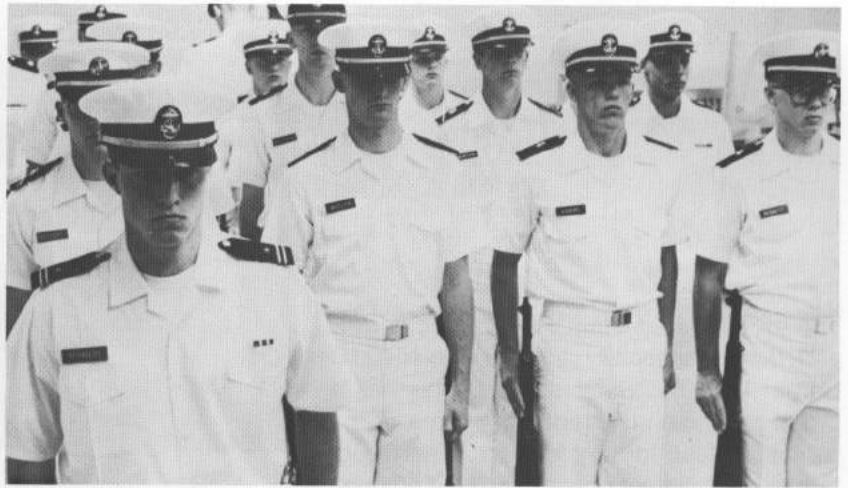

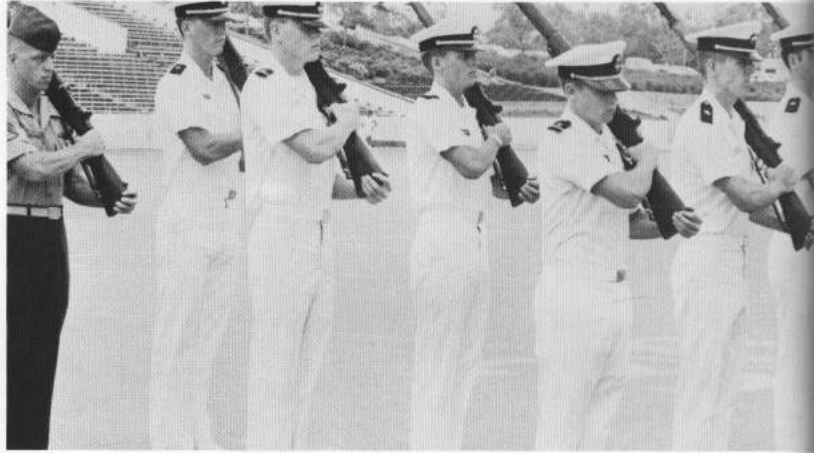

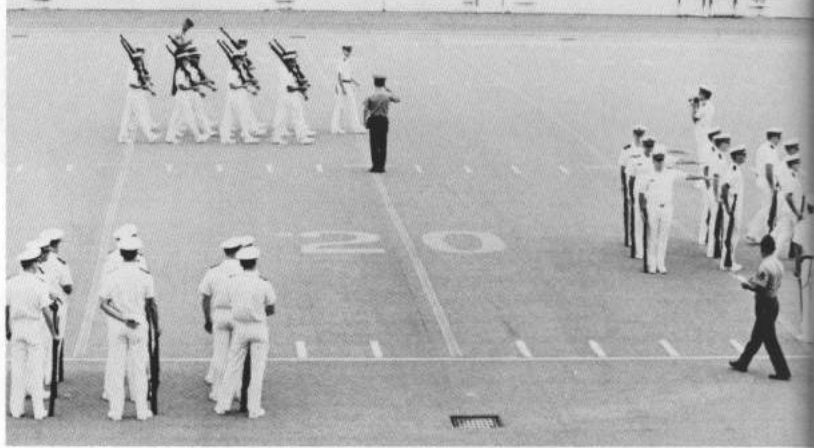

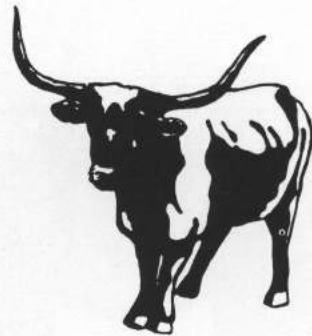

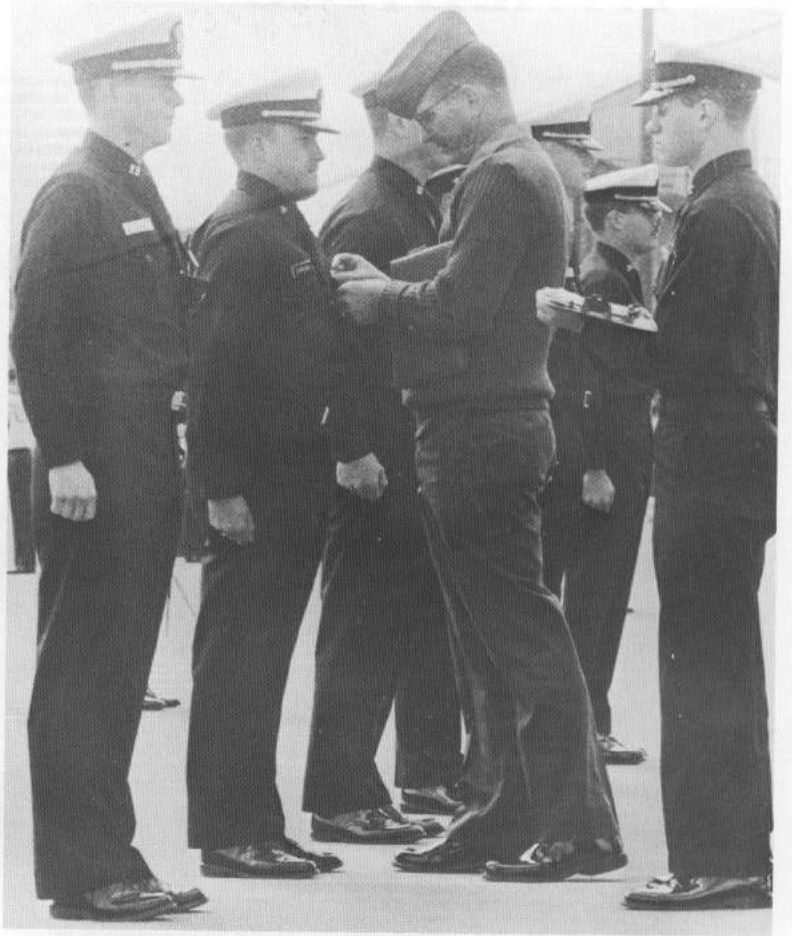

FALL PRT

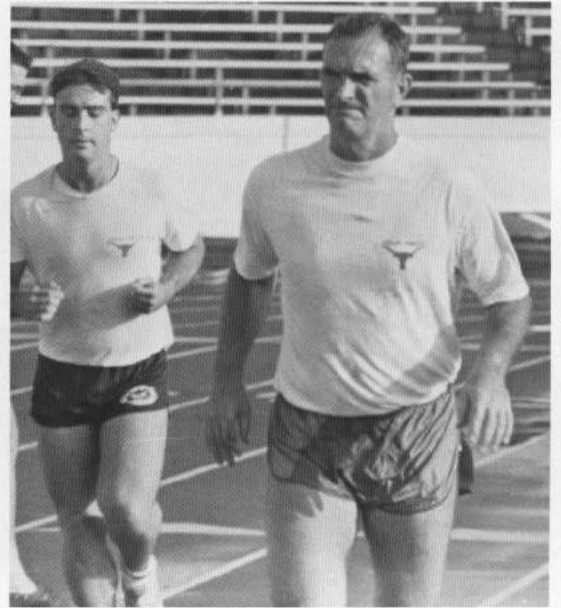
The fall PRT for many is the first bit of exercise they have had since the beginning of Summer Break. And after a hard summer of parties it takes time to get back into shape. Some more than others...

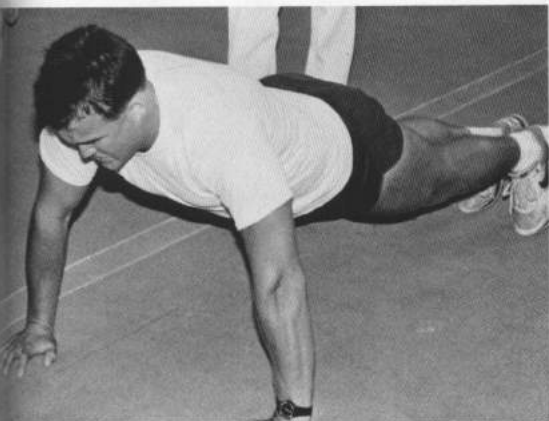

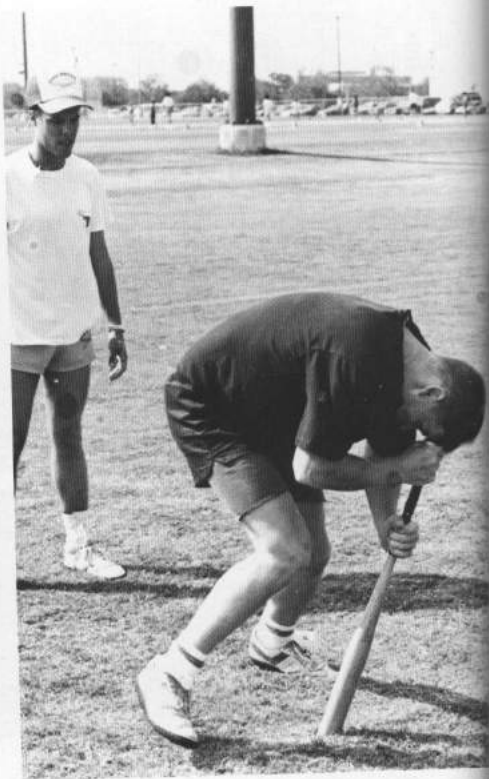

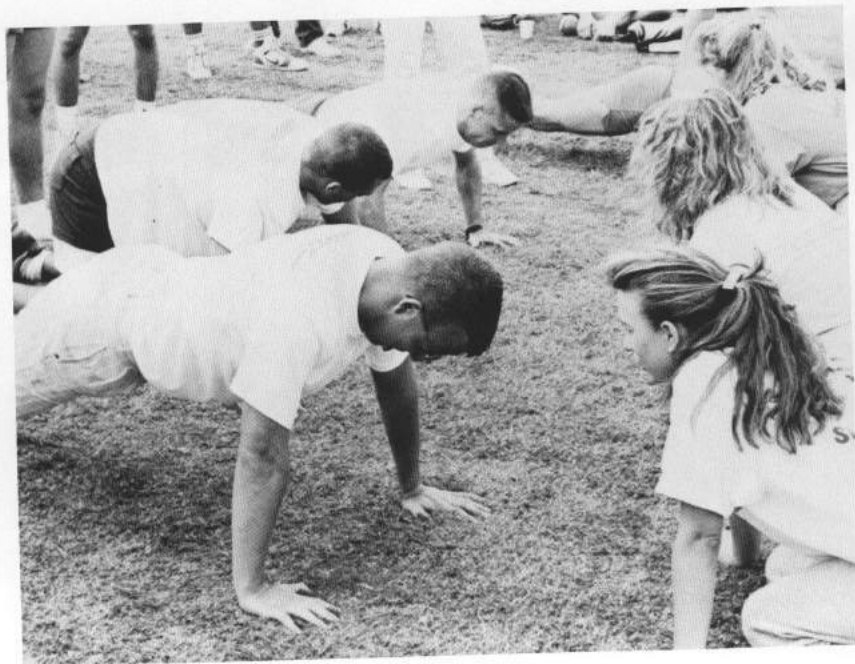

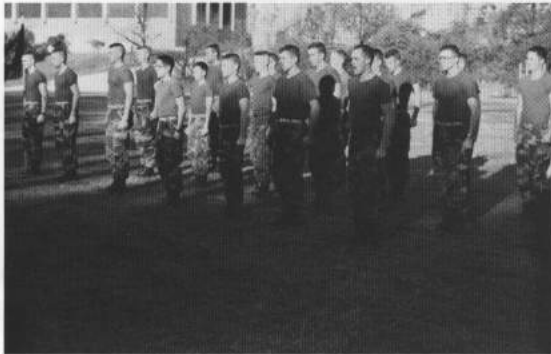

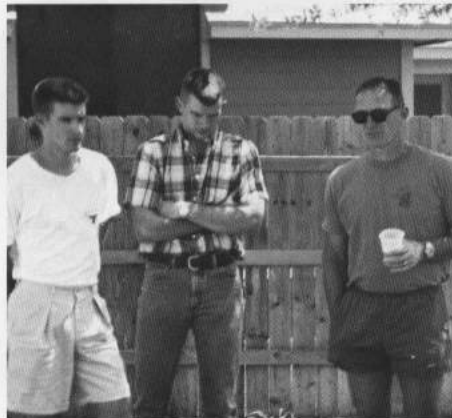
LEATHERNECKS

HAPPY ANNIVERSARY MUFFERS!! The MUFFERS (Marines United For Fun, Exercise, Relaxation, & Service) celebrated their 10 year anniversary in 1989. The organization was established in 1979 by then-Midn Myron Lasher (now a Captain in the USMC). At its inception the group was no more than a drinking society; however in ten years the group has evolved into a student organization. The groups sole purpose is to help Marine Options, MECEPS, PLC, and Navy Options who desire a commission in the USMC to attain that goal.

During its ten year existence, the MUFFERS have grown, prospered, and changed extensively. In this period, enrollment has more than doubled to a mid-semester high of 35 members. The group has also acquired much training equipment. The more notable pieces were a lounge, an IBM compatible computer, a military history library donated by JIM HANEN, new field training equipment, and, in MAY 1989, a name change to LEATHERNECKS.

Besides these much needed and appreciated acquisitions, the LEATHERNECKS worked to develop each member socially, mentally, and of course physically. The social area was cultivated in many ways. Members routinely worked as security guards, ushers, and bartenders. The money raised by the group was used to finance academic enhancers (computer with video games), distinguished graduating senior awards, and several brotherly bashes (Matt Shirley's party, USMC Birthday, Christmas, Major Vietti's party, and Pre-OCS party). However, this is not the only area of progress. The LEATHERNECKS members now possess a cumulative G.P.A. of 2.85. They also have a test file, computer, and library to assist in their academic endeavors. The final area of development is in the physical fitness of all members. This is accomplished by 3 day a week morning PT sessions (5 day a week PT for Pre-OCS members). These PT sessions involve warm-ups, UBD'S, Plt. runs, Fartleks, Run Circuits, USMC PRT'S and PFT'S. The group also went on several conditioning hikes, obstacle courses and reaction courses. A portion of the group also visited Quantico, Virginia over spring break on an Orientation Visit. These improvements enhanced the successful training of the LEATHERNECK Platoon.

Even though these improvements were required for the successful training program, a great deal of the credit belongs to the Freshmen class, who made significant contributions to the organization. Thus, the prospects for the future project a good forecast!!!

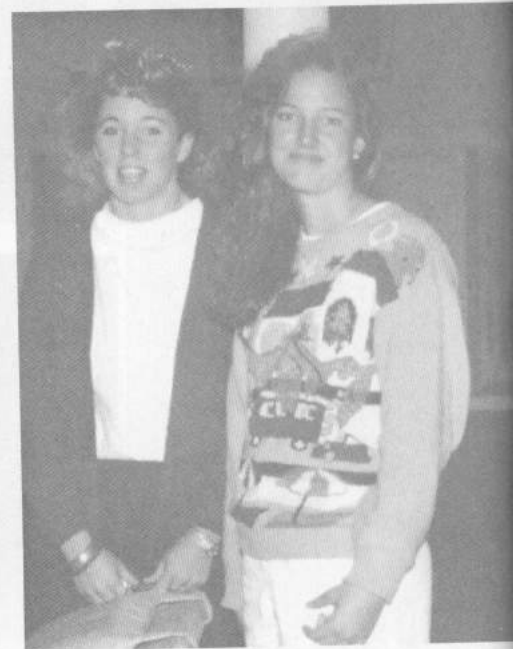

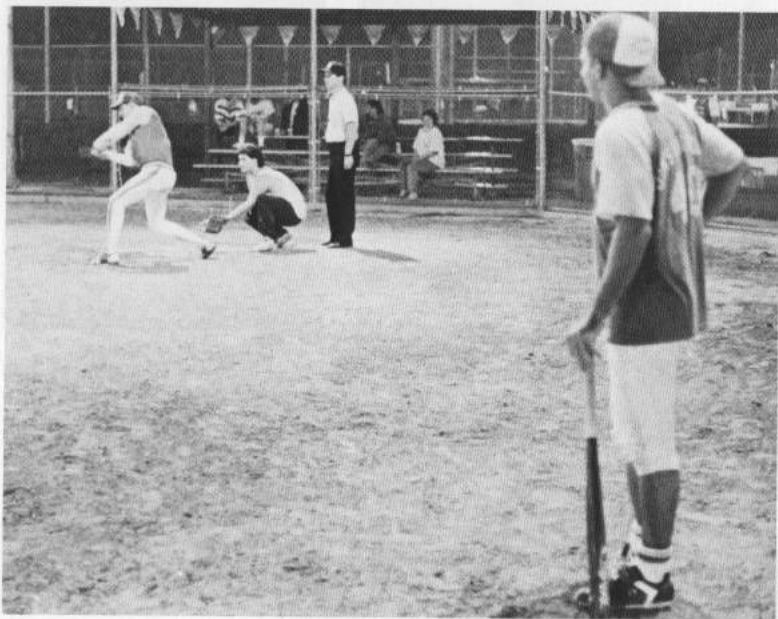

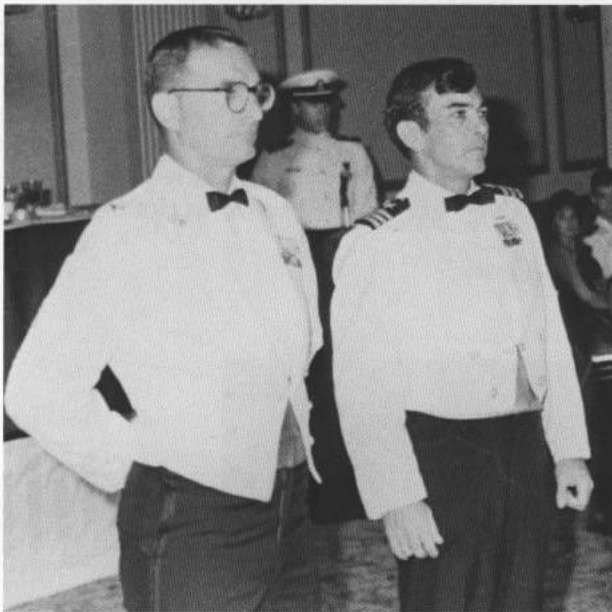

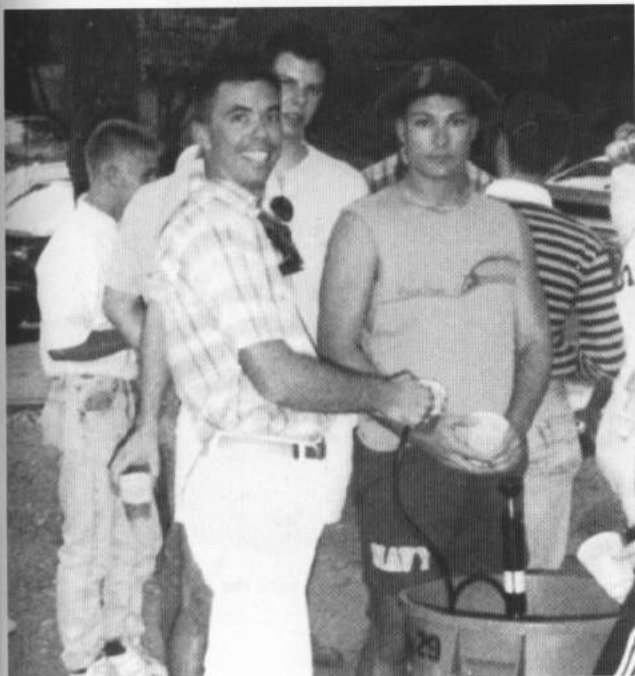
