





Although Battalion activities require large amounts of time, academics are by far the major concern of a midshipman of the University of Texas. Studying is an art which all new midshipmen must master but the mere mention of the word sends some into shock. Many fall victim to the "D's" and "F's" and are brought before the review board or drop from the program. This year, however, the battalion launched an all-out campaign to improve the academic record. Study Halls became mandatory for freshmen in an attempt to get them in the habit of studying earlier. The success of this program, however, can be debated. Other programs included RASSL presentations and lectures stressing the importance of academics. To further enhance academic achievement, the Captain's list was instituted for recognition of the academic achievers.

It is often difficult to understand that academics will have a strong effect on our future, but its importance will soon be apparent to all of us.




Batt Comm chooses Charlie, Bravo

Drill, and More Drill







Presidential pass in review attracts distinguished visitors












Football

Volleyball






Buccaneers continue excellence




Newspaper staff produces great Orange






Color Guard serves Austin community

The captain left U.T. after the spring semester this year to serve as PNS at Virginia Polytechnic Institute in Blacksburg, Va.
