

Actual participation in the ROTC program is less time consuming than a part-time job. Since most cadets spend less than six hours a week on ROTC-related functions, including three hours of classes and an hour on drill, they have time for intramural sports, extracurricular activities and the social events that other students enjoy. Most feel that the program is worthwhile because of the benefits the military offers. ROTC scholarships are among the most extensive at the University.

Many ROTC students do not enter the program with a life-time career in mind, but with an attitude that the scholarship and leadership benefits will be advantageous in any field they choose.
