MISSOURI WOMEN OPEN BIG 12 SLATE IN LITTLE APPLE

The Missouri women's basketball team (9-2, 0-0 Big 12) hits the road for its Big 12 Conference opener Wednesday night at Kansas State. The Tigers are coming off a successful stretch of three wins in six days to close their non-conference schedule with a 9-2 mark. That ties the second-best record of a Cindy Stein-coached team along with the 2000-01 and 2001-02 squads; the 1999-2000 team finished 10-1 on the way to the WNIT, Mizzou's first postseason appearance in six years.

MU is seeking its first win in Manhattan since 2001, when the Tigers held off a 28-point, 40-minute effort from then-freshman Nicole Ohlde and started their run to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen.

MORE ON KANSAS STATE

The Wildcats, who were a preseason top-five pick, have been ranked no lower than 12th in the Associated Press poll all season. They are currently 11th and are riding a seven-game winning streak, including five in a row at Bramlage Coliseum. K-State's only losses have come at Purdue in the season-opener, and vs. Penn State in the Bahamas. Both opponents were ranked seventh at the time, and both are currently in the top 10.

MIZZOU QUICK HITS

- The Tigers are gunning for their fifth straight postseason berth, which would tie a school record first set from 1982-86. In this current streak, the Tigers have been to one NCAA Tournament (2001 Sweet 16), and three WNIT's (2000, 2002 and 2003).
- This season marks the 32nd and final season of basketball competition in the Hearnes Center. The Tigers will open a new basketball arena next year, just southwest of the current facility.
- Head Coach **Cindy Stein** earned her 150th career victory on Nov. 23, at Bradley, located in her hometown of Peoria, Ill.
- Stein and **Evan Unrau** represented the United States and the Big 12 Conference at the World University Games in Daegu, South Korea, this summer.

PLAYER QUICK HITS

- All-America candidate **Evan Unrau** is tied for the Big 12 Conference lead in rebounding (9.3 rpg), and is third in scoring (19.0). She has five double-doubles this season, and is averaging 19.3 points, 10 rebounds and four assists in the last four games.
- Sophomore **LaToya Bond** has taken the point-guard reigns following the graduation of three-year starter Kerensa Barr. Bond is currently the Tigers' third-leading scorer (12.2 ppg).
- Sophomore **Christelle N'Garsanet** earned her associate's degree from Illinois Central College in just one year, allowing her three years of eligibility at Mizzou. A Francophone (for those who don't have their Webster's handy, "French-speaker") in her native Ivory Coast, N'Garsanet is adjusting well to the rigors of English.

KSU is led by the trio of junior forward Kendra Wecker, who is averaging 16.5 points and 8.8 rebounds a game; Ohlde, who is averaging 14.4 points and 6.4 rebounds, and junior guard Laurie Koehn (14.0 ppg), who sat out both games last year due to injury.

EVAN UNRAU: THE BIG 12'S MOST VERSATILE PLAYER



Senior All-America candidate **Evan Unrau (Fort Collins, Colo. / Rocky Mountain HS)** is the engine that pulls the Tigers' train, leading the team with her scoring and rebounding averages of 19.7 points and 9.4 rebounds a game. *Those numbers rank third and tied for first, respectively, in the Big 12 Conference. In addition, the forward is tied for the Big 12 lead with five double-doubles.*

On top of her scoring and rebounding prowess, Unrau is ranked among the Big 12's top five players in three other diverse categories: 3-point FG Percentage (fifth, 45.7 pct.); Offensive Rebounds (first, 3.9 rpg); and Defensive Rebounds (fifth, 5.4 drpg). She is also ranked among the league leaders in 3-point FG Made (seventh, 1.9 3fgpg) and blocked shots (14th, 1.0 bpg). *Unrau is also just one assist shy of being ranked among the Big 12's leaders in assist-to-turnover ratio; her current mark of 1.68 would rank 10th this week.*

Unrau was selected to *Street & Smith's* preseason women's All-America team, and the four-year starter continues to impress this season. Unrau was one of 50 players listed by *Street & Smith's*, and one of 30 players given Preseason Honorable Mention All-America status by the magazine. Ten others were each named to the "Terrific 10" and High Honorable Mention lists.

Last year, Unrau became Mizzou's second First Team All-Big 12 Conference selection in the seven-year history of the conference. She led the Tigers in both scoring (16.0 ppg) and rebounding (7.7 rpg) in leading Mizzou to postseason play for the fourth straight year.

"I just have so much admiration and respect for Evan Unrau. We know she has established herself as one of the best players in the league. With Evan's versatility and consistency and strength and competitiveness, you know you're going to line up against one of the best, I think, playing the women's game."

MIZZOU'S ON THE TUBE

Wednesday's game will be broadcast over much of the FOX Sports Net Midwest regional footprint – ironically, it is only most of the state of Missouri that will NOT receive the game due to a conflict with the Mizzou men's game at Iowa State. Tiger fans in Kansas City and Columbia/Jefferson City will be able to view the game.

It marks Mizzou's second televised game of the season out of a school-record-tying seven guaranteed appearances this season. In fact, four of the Tigers' next five contests will hit the airwaves, including Saturday's home contest vs. Kansas on the Mizzou Sports Network.

Additional broadcast exposures are available on FOX Sports Net should the Tigers reach the quarterfinals and beyond of the Big 12 Conference women's basketball tournament. And for the second straight year, all 63 games of the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship Tournament will be aired by ESPN, ESPN2 and ESPN Pay-Per-View.

LAST TIME OUT: MIZZOU 65, SAINT LOUIS 62

Stretch James hit the game-winning jumper and had a pair blocks in the final minute of play, and the Missouri women hit crucial free throws down the stretch to stave off an upset bid by Saint Louis, 65-62, at the Bauman-Eberhardt Center Sunday afternoon.

THAT WAS CLOSE!

A closer look at Mizzou's three-point win at Saint Louis on Sunday shows just how much of a nail-biter the contest was. Neither team held greater than a three-point lead the entire second half; in fact, the game was a one-possession contest (i.e. a lead of three points or less or one team or the other) for an amazing 37:35 out of the 40 minutes.

Mizzou held a 4-0 lead for a total of 17 seconds at the start of the game, and led by five (15-10) for 23 seconds. The Billikens had their own four-point lead (28-24) for a relative lifetime – all of 1:35 late in the first half. The rest of the game put the fans at the Bauman-Eberhardt Center on one-possession pins and needles.

JAMES A PAIN AT BOTH ENDS OF THE FLOOR


Senior forward **Stretch James** (Columbus, Ohio / Northland HS / Tyler [Texas] JC) has shown the last several games that she's going to be a factor in both the offensive flow and defensive stops for Mizzou.

James is Mizzou's second-leading scorer, averaging 13.8 points per game. She's hitting shots at a 51.4 percent clip, which ranks her 15th in the league. She's hit for 20 or more points three times, and has twice made 11 field goals in a game (at UW-Green Bay, vs. Miami [Ohio]).

On the defensive end, James leads the Big 12 by a wide margin and is ranked among

COLUMBIA, Mo. – The trio of Megan Mahoney, Kendra Wecker and Megan Mahoney scored all but 10 of Kansas State's points and the fifth-ranked Wildcats staved off a furious second-half comeback by Missouri to win, 66-56, at the Hearn Center on Wednesday. With the win, the Wildcats (24-2, 13-1 Big 12) remain in a tie with Texas for the league lead, while the Tigers (13-10, 7-5) remain in sole possession of fifth.

Mahoney had a game-high 21 points to go with a game-high 12 rebounds, while Wecker, the Big 12's leading scorer, and Ohlde added 18 and 17 respectively. Ohlde added 11 rebounds.

Kerensa Barr led Missouri with 17 points on 7-of-9 shooting, including 3-of-4 from 3-point range. Evan Unrau added 15 points and six rebounds, while Stretch James had 10 points and seven boards.

After a bucket by James gave Mizzou a 4-2 lead, the Wildcats went on a 12-0 run to push the lead to 14-4 with 14 minutes left in the first half. A 3-pointer by Mahoney bumped the K-State lead to 21-8, and the Wildcats remained comfortably in front the rest of the half.

The Tigers made just 28.6 percent (8-of-28) of their shots in the first half, yet they also held the Wildcats to just 37.5 percent (12-of-32) in the opening 20 minutes. Kansas State sank five 3-pointers in the period, while Mizzou missed all eight of its treys as the Wildcats took a 34-17 lead into the locker room.

Barr started the second half with a jumper, and after a quick KSU run hit a 3-pointer to make it 39-22. After an Ohlde follow-up layup, the Tigers went on a quick 8-0 run with Unrau tacking all but one in the span. Mahoney, Ohlde and Wecker each hit buckets to push the Wildcat margin to 51-35 with 9:44 left, yet that is the last field goal K-State would score over the next 7 minutes.

Cherice Mack hit a pair of free throws, and Angie Carter hit a turnaround jumper to pull the Tigers to within single digits for the first time since early in the first half (51-43). James made it a 4-point game with 4:55 left to cap a 14-2 run, yet that is as close as the Tigers would get.

Mahoney made a pair of free throws, and Ohlde converted a "Hail Mary" pass from Wecker with a minute left to seal the win.

the national leaders in blocked shots. Her average of 2.91 blocks a game (32 blocks) are seven more than the next closest league player, Texas A&M's Lynn Classen.

James' 32 blocks are more than four Big 12 TEAMS (Iowa St., Kansas St., Colorado and Oklahoma).

In her last six games, James is averaging 16.0 points, 7.7 rebounds and 3.5 blocks per game. She also has a pair of double-doubles in that span, and has scored in double figures in five of the six games.

The former junior-college All-American can averaged 10.3 points and 5.6 rebounds a game last year for Mizzou.

In addition, James has moved into the Mizzou career top-10 in blocks. She has 77 in less than a year and a half, putting her in ninth place all-time.

BOND MAKING HER POINT(S)



Sophomore point guard **LaToya Bond (Urbana, Ill. / Urbana HS)** has adjusted well to taking the reigns at the point-guard position for the Tigers this season. A year removed from a support role behind all-everything Kerensa Barr, Bond has seized the spotlight this season with her status as the MU's third-leading scorer (12.2 ppg).

A pair of dazzling performances last week against Iowa and Miami [Ohio] are the latest examples. Bond went off for career highs of 20 points, nine assists and a seven rebounds, and added four steals, which was just one off her best ever. **The nine assists were the most since Barr had the same number exactly three years previous to the day, against UW-Green Bay.**

Against the RedHawks last Friday, Bond had 13 points, a career-high eight rebounds, and eight more assists.

With her eight games of double-figure scoring in Mizzou's first 11 outings, she's already surpassed her double-figure output from last season, when she scored 11 points each vs. Illinois and IUPUI. Bond has also exceeded her totals for the entire season last year in scoring (134 points/12.2 ppg), field goals (42), 3-pointers (nine), free throws (41), assists (61), blocks (seven), and minutes played (346).

Bond came off the bench in 29 games last season in support of the departed Barr, and averaged 3.2 points and 1.3 rebounds a game. This season her numbers are higher across the board: 12.2 points, 5.5 assists, 3.9 rebounds, and 2.6 steals. She's also knocking down 84 percent of her free throws.

Bond is ranked in the Big 12 Conference in each of these three categories: assists (5.5 apg/third); steals (2.6 spg/third); and free-throw percentage (83.7 pct./fifth).

TIGERS SWATTING SHOTS AT A NATION-LEADING RATE

While it can be debated whether it is the product of good defense, or merely as a defense mechanism, this is not for debate: No one in the country is blocking shots at a higher rate than the Mizzou women, according to the latest NCAA statistics released Tuesday.

The Tigers have swatted 83 shots in their first 11 games, an average of 7.5 a contest. Tulsa is second at 6.7 bpg, followed by Western Illinois and Jackson State.

The Tigers are well ahead of a pace that would break the current school record of 128, set in 1999-2000. **In fact, only 10 previous teams have had more blocks in their entire seasons than this year's squad has had in its first 10 games.**

Three Tigers are ranked individually among the nation's leaders. **Stretch James** leads the Big 12, and is 12th in the country, in blocked shots (2.9 bpg). **Evan Unrau's** 19.0 points per game is 34th, and sophomore **G LaToya Bond (Urbana, Ill. / Urbana HS)** is averaging 5.5 assists per game, which is 29th.

PERKINS REJOINS TIGERS



Senior guard **MyEsha Perkins (Detroit, Mich. / Oak Park HS / Trinity [Texas] JC)** has provided extra scoring punch in the three games she's played since becoming eligible on Dec. 19.

Perkins, who was academically ineligible for the fall semester, has hit on seven of her first 10 shots this season, including a 5-for-7 showing against Iowa on Tuesday on her way to 11 points. Her best game as a Tiger last season also came against the Hawkeyes, when she netted a team-high 16 points with three 3-pointers.

Last season, Perkins was sixth on the team in scoring (4.4 ppg).

2003-04 IS HOOPS SWAN SONG FOR HEARNES

The University of Missouri broke ground on a new basketball arena – one that will be the finest on-campus facility in the nation when completed – on Sept. 21, 2002. The yet-to-be-named facility, which will seat just over 15,000 fans, is slated to open next fall, meaning this season will be the final one for the men's and women's basketball teams at the Hearnes Center. The women's basketball team sports an all-time record of 278-96 (.743) in the friendly confines.

Built in 1972, the Hearnes Center will continue to be utilized by MU's Olympic-sport programs such as volleyball, gymnastics, wrestling, and track and field.

A webcam of the arena construction site has been installed on top of the Hearnes Center, and it is providing live still images to the Missouri athletics website 24 hours a day. The webcam is located at ath.missouri.edu/arena, and it can also be accessed from the front page of www.MUTigers.com.

Slated to cost \$75 million, the new arena project was jump-started by a generous \$25 million donation by the Laurie family of Columbia. The State of Missouri will contribute \$35 million in bond appropriations, while the remaining \$15 million will be raised through athletic fundraising efforts.

TIGERS POLLED SEVENTH BY COACHES, MEDIA

Mizzou was picked to finish seventh in the Big 12 Conference this season in separate votes by the league's head coaches and media members.

In the coaches' poll, the Tigers received 55 votes, two more than eighth-place Iowa State. Defending champion Texas, which advanced to the 2003 NCAA Women's Final Four, received 10 of 11 possible first-place votes (coaches were not allowed to vote for their own team) and 120 overall points to pace the field. In addition, **Evan Unrau** received votes among the coaches' picks for the preseason All-Big 12 team.

With the exception of flip-flopping Texas A&M and Nebraska for 11th and 12th place, the media poll was exactly the same as the coaches' poll. In that, MU received 103 votes, six more than eighth-place Iowa State. Texas received 17 of the 18 first-place votes and 215 points to pace the field.

Picked to finish eighth last year by the coaches and seventh by the media, Mizzou finished 9-7 in the league and tied for fifth to match the Tigers' highest-ever placing in the seven-year history of the Big 12 Conference. MU was 17-14 overall and reached the

The 2003-04 squad returns four starters and eight letterwinners, including five seniors, and welcomes a talented recruiting class involving four newcomers.

THREE PREP STANDOUTS SIGN WITH MIZZOU

A trio of Midwest prep standouts have signed National Letters of Intent to enroll at the University of Missouri and play basketball, head coach Cindy Stein announced on Nov. 12. The three will be the first recruits to play their entire careers in Mizzou's new basketball arena, which is slated to open next fall.

Brittany Mannings, a 6-foot-4 center from Duchesne HS in St. Louis; Kassie Drew, a 5-foot-9 guard from Anna-Jonesboro (Ill.) High, and Crystal Howard, a 5-foot-9 guard from Omaha (Neb.) Central High School will join Stein and the Tigers for the 2004-05 season.

Mannings is ranked as the No. 25 center in the country in the All-Star Girls Report's Top 100. She has twice earned All-America Honorable Mention plaudits from Street & Smith's, and was a an all-state second-team pick in 2002. Mannings was a third-team St. Louis Post-Dispatch All-Metro selection last year after averaging 16.4 points, 9.8 rebounds and 4.7 blocks a game. She helped lead the Pioneers to the Missouri Class 4 championship in March.

Drew comes with numerous credentials entering her senior season. She already has scored 2,096 points in her three-year career, which is currently tied for 55th in Illinois State High School Association (IHSA) history. She's also 10th on the all-time 3-pointer list with 259 heading into this year, and needs just 36 to move into second place. She tied a state record by sinking 11 3-pointers in a game last December on her way to a career-high 55-point outing. She is ranked as ASGR's No. 35 point guard in the country. Drew was a consensus first-team Class A all-state pick last season, and as a sophomore was named first-team all-state by the *Chicago Tribune* and *Chicago Sun-Times*.

Howard was a member of the all-class all-state team as a sophomore in 2002, and was honorable mention all-state as a freshman. She has scored in double figures in each of her three seasons, averaging 14 points as a freshman, 16.2 as a sophomore and 17.5 as a junior. Like Mannings and Drew, Howard also earned a Street & Smith's Honorable Mention All-America nod last year.

The signing of the trio of high-school standouts concludes Mizzou's recruiting efforts for the fall signing period. The women's basketball program will look to sign two more players during the spring period - April 14-May 19, 2004.

THE CINDY STEIN SHOW

Missouri Tiger fans who wish to speak with MU Women's Basketball Coach Cindy Stein can do so each Monday night through the facilities of the Tiger Network.

"The Cindy Stein Show" originates each Monday evening from 6-7 p.m. at Harpo's in downtown Columbia. Stein spends most of the hour fielding telephone calls from interested fans. Tiger players often appear as guests, as do coaches of MU opponents and others inside college athletics. "The Cindy Stein Show" is hosted by David Lile, the voice of Missouri Women's Basketball.

HEAD COACH CINDY STEIN

Recognized as one of the nation's top young women's basketball coaches, Cindy Stein earned her 150th career victory in her hometown of Peoria, Ill., on Sunday, Nov. 23 at Bradley. Stein has an 91-68 mark in her sixth season at MU and is 156-93 in her ninth overall as a collegiate head coach.

Her accomplishments have not gone unnoticed by the national basketball community, as this summer Stein served her country as an assistant coach with USA Basketball at the World University Games. She also was able to mentor one of her standout players, as senior forward Evan Unrau was a member of the squad that was comprised of Big 12 Conference all-stars. Unrau joins another Stein recruit, WNBA veteran Amanda Lassiter, as All-Big 12 First Team recipients since the league's formation seven years ago.

The season prior to Stein's arrival at MU, the Tigers posted an 11-16 record, yet the coach has turned the program around by guiding it to four straight postseason berths, including the 2001 NCAA Sweet Sixteen.

Mizzou Women's Basketball

MU 77, Bradley 58

Game#1 – Nov. 23, 2003 – Robertson Field House

PEORIA, Ill. – Last year, free-throws decided the outcome. This season, the Mizzou women's basketball team made sure that wouldn't be necessary.

LaToya Bond and Megan Roney both had career days, and the Tigers ran to a 77-58 win Sunday afternoon at Robertson Field House – Mizzou's largest non-conference road win since the 2000-01 season. The victory is the 150th of Head Coach Cindy Stein's career.

Bond scored a game-high 17 points and was 11-of-12 from the free-throw line, and Roney tallied 12 points and nine rebounds. All are career highs for the pair who played significant roles Sunday after coming off the bench last season.

Mizzou blocked 12 Bradley shots on the day – more than last year's single-game highs of eight in back-to-back games last January. In addition, the Tigers recorded 21 fast-break points to BU's six; Mizzou also had 20 points off turnovers while giving up 11. The Tigers held Bradley to just 32.4 percent (23-of-71) from the field for the game, yet hit 24-of-54 (44.4 percent) of its own. Mizzou was also 26-of-38 from the free-throw line (68.4 percent).

The Tigers (1-0) started out slowly, missing their first three shots and committing a pair of charging fouls in the first 4 minutes of the game as Bradley stalked to a 4-0 lead. Yet on consecutive possessions, Bond made a steal and went coast-to-coast for the layup, Evan Unrau made a steal and sank an 18-footer on the fast break, and Stretch James blocked a shot to Unrau, then took the return feed to give the Tigers a 6-4 lead.

The Tigers would soon go on a 9-0 run spanning more than 6 minutes – capped by a pair of baskets from Roney – to take a 16-6 lead with 9:27 to go in the first half. Roney added a put-back with 5:40 left to make the Mizzou lead 22-12.

Unrau made a nifty spin move off a defender and banked a shot off the glass to give the Tigers their final points of the half. Mizzou went into the locker room with a 12-point advantage (31-19).

Roney notched a trio of milestones early in the second half. With 18:38 left in the game, she hit her first career 3-pointer and broke her single-game scoring high (previously eight) in the process. The next time down the floor, Roney notched her first career assist on a dump-off to James to give MU a 42-21 lead. That was during a 16-2 run to open the half, which put the game out of reach.

James and Blair Hardiek each tallied 10 points for the Tigers, while Unrau had seven points and 12 rebounds. Amy Fuller had 13 points to lead BU (0-2).

Game#2 – Nov. 26, 2003 – Hearn Center

COLUMBIA – Evan Unrau posted her first double-double of the season, tallying game-highs of 21 points and 13 rebounds to lead the Missouri women's basketball team to a 79-43 rout of Southern at the Hearn Center Wednesday afternoon.

MU stormed out to a 10-0 lead in the first 2 minutes, 29 seconds, and took advantage as Southern (0-3) missed its first 11 shots. Game#3 – Nov. 28, 2003 – Resch Center

GREEN BAY, Wis. – Dominating play from the Mizzou defense has put the Tigers into the championship game of the Oneida Bingo & Casino Holiday Tournament following a 78-43 win over Austin Peay Friday at the Resch Center.

Mizzou, which has its first 3-0 start since 2001, finished the game with a tournament-record nine blocked shots after swatting seven away in the first half. Seven different Tigers recorded a block, with LaToya Bond and Stretch James each blocking a pair. In addition, the Tigers took advantage of 21 APSU turnovers, as Mizzou posted a 27-6 advantage in points off turnovers.

Bond had a game-high 16 points and five steals, with Evan Unrau adding 15 points, four rebounds and three assists and James chipping in 10 points, four rebounds and three steals.

The Tigers took a quick 10-4 lead on the strength of a pair of baskets from Unrau and another four points from Bond. Austin Peay pulled to within 13-10 on a 3-pointer by Alicia Watson, yet the Tigers reeled off nine straight points for a 22-10 lead with 10 minutes, 25 seconds remaining in the first half.

APSU got no closer than 10 points the rest of the half, and that came with 8:38 left at 22-12. After another short Mizzou run, the Lady Gavs pulled to within 13 with 2:00 left on a Carden Cobb bucket, yet the Tigers ran the break effectively down the stretch, throwing another 9-0 run – including an athletic Bond jumper as the buzzer sounded – to go into the locker room with a 41-19 halftime lead.

Melanie Fisher and Megan Roney both made important contributions in the first half, combining inside for 4-of-5 shooting, seven rebounds and five assists.

The Tigers had seven blocks at the break, just one off the tournament record for an entire game. More importantly, Mizzou held APSU to just 25 percent shooting (8-for-32) at the half while hitting on 52.9 percent (18-for-34) of its own shots. MU also held a 25-15 rebounding edge, including 17-8 on the defensive end.

The second half was just as dominating, as Mizzou went on a 17-4 run midway through the final 20 minutes to take a 69-33 lead with 6:56 left. Back-to-back jumpers by EeTisha Riddle were included in that span, as was a 7-for-7 performance from the free-throw line by the Tigers.

UW-Green Bay 74, MU 66

Game#4 – Nov. 29, 2003 – Resch Center

GREEN BAY, Wis. – Wisconsin-Green Bay shot lights-out in the first half, and hung on by sinking several key free throws down the stretch on its way to a 74-66 win over Missouri in the championship game of the Oneida Bingo & Casino Holiday Tournament Saturday night at the Resch Center.

The loss came despite combined game-high contributions of 44 points and 20 rebounds from the senior forward tandem of Evan Unrau and Stretch James. Unrau's 16 rebounds led all players to go with 20 points, and James' 24 points led all scorers. Both were named to the all-tournament team for their performances.

Tiffany Mor, who had 17 points and seven rebounds before seriously injuring her knee on a layup that was blocked by James with 9 minutes, 29 seconds left in the game, was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

After both teams traded baskets to start the game, the Phoenix (4-0) jumped out to a 9-2 lead. Despite 13 first-half turnovers – just four shy of their season average through three games – the Tigers (3-1) slowly chipped away at the UWGB lead, pulling to within 26-24 on a 3-pointer by Tracy Lozier.

The Phoenix responded after Lozier's trey, however, going on a 14-0 run to end the half and entered the locker room with a 40-24 advantage at the break. UWGB shot 59.3 percent (16-of-27) in the first half, including 5-of-9 shooting from 3-point distance.

Yet after a Mor 3-point play to start the second half, the Tigers quickly pulled to within 10 (43-33) with 15:24 to go after a 9-0 run sparked by five points from Unrau. The teams would see-saw over the next eight minutes, with the Phoenix extending the lead back to 17 and Mizzou reeling UWGB back in, before a jumper from LaToya Bond with 6:05 to play narrowed the gap to single digits.

That fueled the inside game by James, as she went 10-of-14 from the field in the second half, scoring 22 of her points in the final 20 minutes. She twice brought the Tigers to within four points – the latter with 1:32 to go – before the Phoenix was able to play keep-away and hit their free throws.

"Wisconsin-Green Bay deserved to win this game," said Head Coach Cindy Stein, who prefaced her opening comments with prayers for a speedy recovery for Mor. "We knew this was a very tough place to play, and they proved it. We're disappointed with the loss."

COLUMBIA – Five players scored in double figures and the Missouri women's basketball team posted its highest single-game point total since 2001 Friday night as the Tigers rolled over Alcorn State, 103-41, in the first round of the Unilever Tiger Tournament.

The Tigers' 103 points represents the team's largest single-game point total since they scored 106 on Eastern Illinois on Nov. 17, 2000. This win also marks the first occasion the Tigers have hit the century mark since defeating Arkansas-Pine Bluff, 102-47, on Dec. 20, 2001.

The Tigers got stellar play on the boards from Christelle N'Garsanet midway through the first half. N'Garsanet finished with a team-leading seven rebounds in just 14 minutes on the floor to go with 11 points.

A 29-0 run that spanned halftime put the game out of reach for the Lady Braves. With 5:32 remaining in the first half, Evan Unrau drained a 3-pointer, and Tracy Lozier and Megan Roney capped it off with back-to-back three's of their own to push the score to 62-15.

Unrau led all scorers with 22 points while also chipping in five rebounds and three assists. She was joined by four teammates in double figures, all with 11 points – Lozier, N'Garsanet, Cherice Mack and Carlynn Savant.

LaToya Bond led all players with eight assists and four steals, in addition to recording eight points. Unrau and Stretch James combined to lead the Tigers with two blocks each.

Tiffany Smith led Alcorn State, which shot just 27.3 percent from the field (15-for-55), with 10 points. The Tigers forced the Lady Braves into 26 turnovers, while posting a sparkling 31 assist-to-9 turnover ratio of its own.

Game#6 – Dec. 6, 2003 – Hearn Center

COLUMBIA – Behind 19 points, seven rebounds and five assists from tournament MVP Evan Unrau, the Missouri women's basketball team defeated Tulsa, 88-68, Saturday night in the title game of the Unilever Tiger Tournament. It is the 18th time in the 26-year history of the tournament that the trophy has remained in Columbia.

Tracy Lozier was 8-of-14 from the field, including 4-of-9 shooting from the 3-point line, in blasting her previous season-high of 11 points set Friday night vs. Alcorn State with 20 against the Golden Hurricane (3-1). Lozier's previous career-high of 19 points came in a breakout game last December at Northern Iowa.

Stretch James recorded her first double-double of the season for the Tigers (5-1) with 18 points and a team-high 11 rebounds, while also collecting three steals to pace the Tigers. This marks James' sixth career double-double in a Missouri uniform.

LaToya Bond tied with Unrau for the team lead in assists with five, giving her 13 assists in the two tournament games. Her 11 points also made her the fourth Tiger in double figures on the evening.

Joining Unrau on the Unilever All-Tournament Team were Lozier, Tulsa's Sarah Lundberg and Candace Brewer, UAB's Brittany Smith and Shirley Gooch from Alcorn State. UAB earned the consolation title with a 59-49 win over Alcorn State in the night's first game.

"I was very proud of a lot of things we did tonight, in claiming back the championship of our own tournament," said Head Coach Cindy Stein. "It feels good to finally have it back in our hands."

The Tigers outshot the Golden Hurricane 48.5 percent to 36.5 percent from the field, marking the third straight game Mizzou has eclipsed the 45-percent plateau. MU's 50 percent from beyond the arc is a first on the year. Missouri also outrebounded Tulsa 45-28, which is the fifth time in six games this season the Tigers have held a rebounding edge over their opponent.

The 191 points Missouri scored in its two tournament games this weekend are its highest two-game point total since the 1999 Unilever Tiger Tournament. Mizzou opened that weekend with a 111-31 win over Centenary, then followed with an 86-76 victory over Western Kentucky.

Game#7 — Dec. 10, 2003 — Hearnese Center

COLUMBIA — Evan Unrau and Stretch James combined for 49 points — including a game-high 28 for Unrau — yet the Southwest Missouri State women held on for a 79-70 win over Mizzou at the Hearnese Center Wednesday night.

Unrau was 10-of-18 from the field and 3-of-5 from 3-point range in falling just two points shy of her career high, set her sophomore year vs. Southwestern Louisiana. James followed with 21 points and a career-high-tying 13 rebounds for Mizzou (5-2).

Kari Koch scored 16 of her team-high 23 points in the second half for SMS (5-1), which broke a two-game losing streak to the Tigers.

James dominated the early minutes of the contest, personally out-scoring SMS 6-2 with four rebounds in the first 2 minutes, 6 seconds. The Lady Bears slowly chipped away, scoring six straight points to tie the game at 16-all on a K.C. Cowgill jumper with 11:43 left in the half. Less than a minute and a half later, SMS took its first lead with its first 3-pointer of the night, by Cowgill. SMS took a four-point lead (42-38) into the locker room.

Nicole Lehman hit the first two baskets of the second half to push the Lady Bear lead to eight points, then again to nine (53-44) on a pair of Kari Koch free-throws with 13:19 left. The Tigers went on a quick 8-0 run — capped by an Unrau free-throw following a technical foul on the SMS bench — over the next 65 seconds to pull within one at 53-52.

After the two teams traded buckets to keep the lead at one in favor of SMS, the Lady Bears erupted for a 13-2 run to take its largest lead of the game at 66-54. Mizzou would not get closer than five the rest of the way.

The Lady Bears, who came into the game ranked sixth in the country in 3-point shooting at 46.7 percent, were in danger of posting their worst 3-point performance of the season — a 36.3 percent effort in its lone loss to Georgia Tech. SMS finished at 40 percent with its 6-for-15 showing.

Two other significant career highs were set. Tracy Lozier had a game-high eight assists, and James had a school-record-tying seven blocks to go with her 13 boards.

Game#8 — Dec. 21, 2003 — Roberts Stadium

EVANSVILLE, Ind. — Buoyed by hot outside shooting at the end of the second half and excellent ball distribution in the second, the Mizzou women's basketball team registered a 78-72 win Sunday afternoon at Roberts Stadium.

Evan Unrau had a game-high 22 points and led all players with 10 rebounds for her third double-double of the season, and LaToya Bond tied her career high with eight assists.

In a game that saw eight ties and 11 lead changes, the Tigers (6-2) took their final lead with 9 minutes left on a jumper by Stretch James. That came during a span where James, who had 15 of her 17 points in the second half, had four straight buckets. Mizzou was aided by committing just two turnovers in the second half, and converted 16 assists in the final stanza.

"I was happy with finally taking control of the game, where we're in a position where they have to foul instead of the other way around," Head Coach Cindy Stein said. On the Tigers' turnaround in the second half, she said, "Our execution on offense and our intensity on defense were much better. We were just rushing things. We were too impatient, taking shots in the first 10 seconds instead of working the ball around."

Evansville (4-4) grabbed a quick 7-0 lead in the first 2:32, and held a lead until Unrau hit a layup with 15:34 left to take an 11-9 lead.

Minutes later, the Tigers would go on a cold-shooting stretch that would allow the Purple Aces to retake the lead. Mizzou scored just one field goal in a nine-minute span as Evansville grew the lead to 26-20. Unrau started Mizzou on a barrage of five 3-pointers in the final four minutes, though, capped by a trey from Bond to give the Tigers a 32-29 lead with 1:09 left in the half. Yet turnovers and a couple of Evansville rebounds allowed the Purple Aces to head into the locker room with a 35-32 advantage.

Unrau had 12 points and six rebounds in the first half, and Tracy Lozier led the Tigers to 6-of-11 shooting (54.5 percent) from behind the arc in the opening 20 minutes.

Bond forced the Purple Aces to take a timeout with 7:27 left in the game after a spectacular series. Bond knocked the ball away from UE's Denasha Mondy into the Mizzou frontcourt, and in an attempt to gain control of the ball went tumbling to the floor. Unrau stole the ball from Mondy at center court, and tipped the ball back to Bond, who had regained her footing at the free-throw line and went in for the layup.

Jamie Gray led all scorers with 25 points for the Purple Aces.

COLUMBIA — LaToya Bond had a career afternoon in leading the Mizzou women to a solid 75-65 win over Iowa Tuesday at the Hearnese Center. Bond set or tied career highs with 20 points, seven rebounds and nine assists, and also had four steals. The nine assists are the most since Kerensa Barr tallied nine against UW-Green Bay three years ago to the day.

All-America candidate Evan Unrau added 19 points and 12 rebounds for her fourth double-double of the season, and MyEsha Perkins chipped in 11 points for the Tigers (7-2).

The game's breakneck pace fueled a pair of buckets in the half's final seven seconds, including an 18-footer from Unrau as the halftime buzzer sounded to give Mizzou a 39-25 lead.

Only once did Iowa (6-5) trim the Tiger lead under 10 points, and that came on a chip-shot in the point from Cavey with 12:30 left in the game to cap a 9-0 run. Perkins knocked down a jumper and Unrau canned one of her two 3-pointers on the ensuing possessions to boost the lead back to 14. Mizzou would add three more treys down the stretch to finish with seven on the day.

"I'm very pleased with the way our team played," Head Coach Cindy Stein said. "I'm very proud of them, because you're always worried about how they're going to play after a long break. Our team came out ready to play, and we had such great play from everyone — out starters and off the bench."

COLUMBIA – Stretch James and Evan Unrau combined for 46 points and 18 rebounds in leading the University of Missouri women to a 92-68 win over Miami (Ohio) Friday night at the Hearn Center.

With the win, the Tigers run their record to 10-0 under Cindy Stein when scoring 90 or more points. It's the third time this season that both of Mizzou's starting forwards scored 20 or more in the same game. The other two times came in Mizzou's only losses this season – at UW-Green Bay and vs. SMS.

James had 10 points in the first 6 minutes, 16 seconds of the first half, and finished with 16 points in the opening 20 minutes on 8-of-9 shooting. She finished the game 11-of-14, good for 22 points and eight rebounds. Unrau picked up what was left of the slack in the second half, pouring in a team-high 24 points to go with a game-high 10 rebounds.

Colleen Day had a game-high 25 points and six rebounds for the RedHawks (6-5).

"I'm very pleased with our play. I thought that we were really competent at times, but I really like the way this team responded," said Head Coach Cindy Stein. "I like our play off the bench. [Unrau and James] were incredible the whole night, and unstoppable. I guess those two hours Evan spent shooting after the last game (in Mizzou's 10-point win over Iowa, when Unrau went 5-of-15 from the field) helped."

The RedHawks took their first lead on a 3-pointer by Nikki Motto with 8:02 left, and pushed the margin to three (31-28) on a jumper by Amanda Jackson less than a minute later.

Yet the Tigers (8-2) stormed back with a 10-2 run over the next 2:55, sparked by three more James buckets, for a 38-33 advantage. Aided by a jumper by Melanie Fisher and two free throws by Megan Roney in the final 27 seconds, Mizzou took a 47-39 halftime lead.

A 10-2 Mizzou run the first 5:15 of the second half – started by a pair of James layups, and finished with an Unrau jumper – boosted the margin to 16. Miami hung around for the next 8 minutes before the Tigers went on another 12-3 run to put the game out of reach.

LaToya Bond added 13 points, eight rebounds and eight assists to complement the seniors. The Tigers added to their nation-leading block total with 10 more swats Friday.

Game#11 – Jan. 4, 2004 – Bauman-Eberhardt Center

SAINT LOUIS – Stretch James hit the game-winning jumper and had a pair blocks in the final minute of play, and the Missouri women hit crucial free throws down the stretch to stave off an upset bid by Saint Louis, 65-62, at the Bauman-Eberhardt Center Sunday afternoon.

James finished with 10 points, three rebounds and four blocks, while Tracy Lozier hit three 3-pointers on the way to a team-high 14 points for the Tigers. Evan Unrau finished just two rebounds shy of her fourth straight double-double with 12 points and eight rebounds.

The Tigers continue their domination of the Billikens with their 15th win without a loss. Mizzou also extends its winning streak to four games and closes the non-conference portion of the schedule at 9-2.

"I really thought that was one of the uglier games we've played, but we out-ugled 'em," Head Coach Cindy Stein. "The bottom line is that we did what we had to do to get a win on the road. Our defense changed the game, and put the game in our control. We had five experienced players out there, and they did a great job of talking in that last minute."

Mizzou took a 6-4 lead after the first media timeout despite two quick fouls on James. Saint Louis got buckets from Angie Lewis and Stephanie Solomon to take an 8-6 lead before the Tigers went on a 9-2 run over the next 2 minutes, 26 seconds for a 15-10 lead.

The teams traded baskets until the Billikens used a 7-0 run to take a 28-24 lead with 5:08 left in the half. Despite getting just one field goal in the last 5:32 of the half, SLU took a 32-31 lead into the locker room on the strength of 7-of-8 shooting from the free-throw line. Three 3-pointers kept the Tigers in the game in the first half, yet Mizzou was plagued by 12 turnovers.

The second half was as close as the first, with neither team holding more than a three-point lead. Lewis and Solomon combined for eight straight SLU points as the Billikens took a 57-54 lead, then the Tigers fought back with their defense down the stretch.

With the score tied at 62-all following a fastbreak layup from Melanie Fisher, the Tigers forced a shot-clock violation with 49.9 seconds left. James got a bucket in the paint for the lead, and on the following possession blocked a pair of attempts from Lewis before Fisher got a rebound.

The Billikens (6-7) were led by 19 points by Lewis and 13 from Kirsti Holloway.
