KICKOFF: 6:00 p.m. (central time).

STADIUM: Memorial Stadium/Faurot Field (68,349 – FieldTurf surface). Opened in 1926. MU is 246-164-20 there alltime (4-1 in 2008) and has won 19 of its last 21 overall and is 29-7 there since 2003. The game is sold out.

RADIO: Tiger Network. Mike Kelly (play-by-play), John Kadlec (color), Chris Gervino (sidelines), Mark Mills (engineer). Carried on over 50 stations across the Midwest, and on the Internet at mutigers.com. The MU broadcast will also be on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 129).

TIGERS CLOSE 2008 HOME SEASON

The 13th-ranked Missouri Tigers (7-2 overall, 3-2 in Big 12 action) return to the friendly confines of Faurot Field/Memorial Stadium for one last time in 2008, as they close the home schedule by playing host to the Kansas State Wildcats (4-5, 1-4). Kickoff for the game is set for 6 p.m. (central) and will be televised nationally on Fox Sports Net.

The Tigers are coming off a hardfought 31-28 win at improving Baylor, in a game that saw MU hold off a late BU rally and drive for the game-winning field goal (from 34 yards by All-America/Groza Award candidate Jeff Wolfert) with 2:31 left. Then, the Tiger defense sealed the win when senior LB Brock Christopher grabbed the first interception ever off of Baylor QB Robert Griffin on the ensuing possession to seal the deal. The win was MU's 2nd straight.

Kansas State is looking to stop a 3-game losing streak as it comes to town Saturday night. The Wildcats dropped their Big 12 opener to Texas Tech (58-28 in Manhattan) and then claimed a 44-30 road win at Texas A&M to reach 1-1 in league play. Since then, however, the Wildcats have dropped consecutive ballgames at Colorado (L, 14-13), at home to Oklahoma (58-35) and at in-state rival Kansas last Saturday (L, 52-21). K-State is 1-3 on the road in 2008, with a 38-29 loss at Louisville in September joined to the above league road contests.

Kansas State features one of the nation's top passing attacks, led by QB Josh Freeman, who is 12th in the nation in total offense (304.89 ypg) while directing a Wildcat offense that ranks 13th nationally in passing (288.78 ypg) and 18th in scoring (36.56 ppg).

23 SENIORS TO TAKE FIELD ONE LAST TIME SATURDAY ON SENIOR NIGHT

Twenty-three Tiger seniors will suit up for one last time at Faurot Field Saturday when they don the Black & Gold for the 2008 home finale vs. Kansas State.

This class has been a very key group of players and leaders who have helped lead Mizzou to new heights. They have helped MU to 34 wins over the course of the 2005 season through now, and that represents a record for any four-year period of time, with last Saturday's win at Baylor giving them the mark (see chart below). This class is on pace to join the 1981 senior class as the only other in Tiger history to play in four bowl games in a four-year span (Mizzou played in bowls each year from 1978-81, and has done so each of the last three years, as well).

MIZZOU-KANSAS STATE SERIES

Mizzou and Kansas State will square off for the 94th time when they meet Saturday in Columbia, with MU holding a 57-31-5 lead overall in the prior 93 meetings.

The 57 wins is tied for the most by MU over any opponent, along with the 57 wins the Tigers hold alltime over fellow Big 12 North rival Iowa State (57-34-9 overall, with a Nov. 15th game to come in Ames next week).

While Missouri holds the historical edge in the series, the Tigers are still trying to play catch up from a recent period of domination by Kansas State. While the Tigers have won the last two times out (41-21 in Columbia in 2006 followed by a 49-32 win in Manhattan in 2007), K-State holds a 10-2 lead in the series since the Big 12 began play in 1996.

Mizzou's win in 2006 broke a 13-game losing streak to Kansas that dated from 1993-2005. The Tigers' win last season in Manhattan was historic as well, as it was MU's first there since 1989 — the first season for former KSU coaching legend Bill Snyder.

Prior to K-State's 13-year stranglehold on the series, Mizzou had dominated the rivalry, holding a 55-18-5 advantage in the series ledger after claiming a 27-14 win in Columbia in 1992.

Mizzou holds a 25-14-1 lead in games played in Memorial Stadium, and a 28-17-3 lead overall in games played in Columbia.

The Tigers will be going for their third straight win over the Wildcats, and if they achieve that Saturday, it will mark the first time since 1988-90 that the Tigers won three straight over Kansas State. That was on the tail end of a five-game MU win streak from 1986-90.

LAST YEAR IN MANHATTAN: #6 MIZZOU 49, KANSAS STATE 32

Jeremy Maclin scored three touchdowns and had a Missouri-record 360 all-purpose yards to set the NCAA single-season freshman record for all-purpose yardage, helping No. 6 Missouri set up a winner-take-all showdown the next week against rival and fellow top-10 team, Kansas, with a 49-32 win at Kansas State.

The Tigers took care of Kansas State by winning in Manhattan for the first time since 1989.

Quarterback Chase Daniel kept his burgeoning Heisman Trophy hopes alive with a solid day in the win, as he completed 28-of-41 passes for 284 yards and 4 touchdowns, with zero interceptions.

The Tigers took awhile to find their groove offensively, and also allowed a blocked punt return for a touchdown in a back-and-forth first half that ended with MU holding a slim 21-18 lead at halftime.

But Missouri pulled away early in the third quarter, with Daniel throwing a pair of touchdown passes to turn a 21-18 lead into a rout. The victory secured the second 10-win season in school history - first since 1960 - and gave the Tigers six conference wins for the first time since 1969.

Maclin caught an 8-yard TD pass 67 seconds into the game, making a sliding grab in the end zone two plays after William Moore intercepted Josh Freeman's second pass of the game. Maclin followed Brooks Rossman's 18-yard field goal by breaking two tackles and streaking down the sideline for a 99-yard touchdown on the ensuing kickoff to make it 14-3 Tigers.

It was Missouri's first kickoff return for a TD since Ricky Doby scored on a reverse against Oklahoma State in 1982, the nation's longest drought, and it broke a string of 287 games and 976 kickoff returns between touchdowns. That play also pushed him past the NCAA freshman season record of 2,026 all-purpose yards.

Maclin then put the game all but out of reach midway through the third quarter, somehow sneaking up the middle unnoticed for a 44-yard TD catch that put Missouri up 35-18.

LAST TIME OUT: #14 MIZZOU 31, BAYLOR 28

A fast start and a strong fourth quarter propelled the 14th-ranked Missouri Tigers to a 31-28 win at upstart Baylor, as the Tigers got a 34-yard field goal from dependable PK Jeff Wolfert with less than three minutes left to break a tie ballgame, and iced the game with the first interception of the season of Bear QB Robert Griffin on the next series.

It looked early on as if the Tigers would continue their momentum from the previous week's 58-0 shutout win over Colorado, as MU took the opening kickoff and promptly marched downfield for a quick 7-0 lead, as the Chase Daniel-to-Chase Coffman connection hooked up for the first of two beautiful TD passes on the day — this one from 3-yards out to close a 10-play, 65-yard drive. After the Tiger defense held, Daniel and company went 80 yards in just 6 plays consuming only 1:29 off the clock and after Tommy Saunders' 19-yard TD grab, it was 14-0 Mizzou just like that.

With the Tigers driving yet again for what looked like a knockout blow, on the 1st play of the 2nd quarter, Daniel was intercepted in the endzone on a 3rd-down pass from the Baylor 8-yardline. Instead of taking a 21-0 lead, or at worst, a 17-0 lead, the Tigers saw Baylor promptly go the other way on a long drive, as Griffin engineered a 13-play drive and scored from 4 yards out to get the Bears back into the game, at 14-7. After the teams traded possessions, Daniel led a 93-yard, 13-play drive just before half that ended on a 1-yard TD plunge by TB Jimmy Jackson to give the Tigers back their two-score lead, 21-7.

A funny thing happened in the 2nd half, as the Bears came out of the lockerroom determined to make their Homecoming game a memorable one. Instead of succumbing to the heavily-favored Tigers, Baylor dug in and made play after play over the next quarter-and-a-half to give the several thousand Tiger fans in attendance some consternation. The Bears showed early on that they were in it to win it, as they went for a risky 4th-and-2 from their own 39-yardline on their opening possession of the 2nd half, making it as Griffin kept for 4 yards. That propelled the Bears to a TD drive, and after MU went 3-and-out for just the 7th time in 2008, Baylor answered with another sustained drive for a TD to tie the game at 21-apiece late in the third.

Staggered momentarily, the Tigers got their rhythm back on offense and drove 76 yards for a TD to regain the lead, overcoming a 2nd-and-22 situation after being called for an illegal block during the drive. Daniel hit Coffman for their 2nd score of the day, this one from 13 yards out, on the first play of the 4th quarter as Coffman made yet another circus catch and toe tap in the back corner of the endzone for a 28-21 lead.

Once again, plucky Baylor wouldn't go away, as the Bears got some help from a roughing the passer penalty on MU freshman DE Jacques Smith on what was an incomplete pass on 3rd-and-14 from their own 16-yardline to extend their next drive. Floyd Casey Stadium erupted in loud cheers as Baylor tied the game with 9:54 left on a 36-yard catch-and-run by Jay Finley. Those cheers got even louder on MU's ensuing possession, as a promising Tiger drive was snuffed out on an interception near midfield after a tipped Daniel pass. But the Tiger defense dug in and held their ground, forcing a Baylor punt that was fair caught by MU's Jeremy Maclin at the MU 10-yardline with 6:27 left.

A Daniel 19-yard pass to WR Jared Perry was followed by an option keeper for 15 yards to get some breathing room, and a crucial 9-yard pass to Maclin on 3rd-and-5 just shy of midfield extended the promising drive. After

reaching the Baylor 15-yardline, the drive stalled. Trusty PK Jeff Wolfert was called on to get the lead back and he did just that, as he calmly booted a 34-yard field goal — despite icing tactics by Baylor coach Art Briles — to give MU a 31-28 lead with 2:31 left.

Starting deep in their own territory and without any timeouts left, Baylor quickly faced a 3rd-and-8 from their 23-yardline. Griffin, who had amassed 316 yards of total offense to that point in the game, finally made a mistake that went along with his overall inexperience, as he forced a pass over the middle that was picked off by wily MU veteran LB Brock Christopher at the Baylor 34-yardline with 1:40 left. Christopher's pickoff sealed the deal, as the Tigers took a knee three times to end the game and give Mizzou a hardfought 31-28 win to move to 7-2 overall and 3-2 in Big 12 Conference play, while Baylor fell to 3-6 and 1-4 on the year.

4TH QUARTER FOCUS THE DIFFERENCE IN WACO

It's always dangerous to let an underdog hang around, and that's just what was taking place last Saturday at Baylor, as the Bears parlayed a strong 3rd quarter that saw them outscore MU 14-0 into a lot of confidence. The Bears tied the game at 21-apiece in the 3rd, and responded with a long drive to tie it at 28-all midway through the 4th quarter to give BU fans hopes of a big upset win.

But the Tigers dug in and played like the veteran team they are, making the plays a seasoned club makes to win ballgames. All facets of the team contributed heavily in the last 8:54, as that's when Baylor took over just shy of midfield after intercepting a tipped Chase Daniel pass. Just when it looked like the Bears had the upper hand, the Tiger defense stiffened, holding the Bears to 6 yards on 3 rushing attempts, with DE Brian Coulter and S Justin Garrett combining for a huge stop for no gain on 3rd-and-4 to force a BU punt.

Mizzou's offense took over on its own 10-yardline with 6:27 left, knowing that one mistake could turn out disastrous. Undaunted, QB Chase Daniel calmly led the crew on a 13-play, 75-yard drive that ate just under 4 minutes off the clock before stalling out. That's when Mr. Dependable, PK Jeff Wolfert, trotted onto the field and drilled a 34-yard field goal to make it 31-28 with 2:31 left.

Special teams continued doing its job as Wolfert's ensuing kickoff went to the Baylor endzone, and the game nearly ended as Tiger LB Luke Lambert forced a fumble on the return, but the Bears recovered at their own 21-yardline with 2:31 left, where they started their last-ditch drive.

But the defense again rose to the occasion, as any potential game-winning drive was snuffed out by LB Brock Christopher, as he stepped in front of a Robert Griffin pass on 3rd-and-8 at the Baylor 34-yardline to ice the game.

The 4th-quarter heroics marked the first time since MU's thrilling 38-31 win over South Carolina in the 2005 Independence Bowl where Mizzou broke a tie with a game-winning drive in the final period to win a game.

MIZZOU-BAYLOR WRAP-UP NOTES

Some random news and notes to come from the Tigers' 31-28 win at Baylor last Saturday...

- — QB Chase Daniel had another solid day, going 30-of-38 passing for 318 yards and 3 TDs. He completed passes to 7 different receivers, and led the Tigers on a game-winning 4th-quarter drive that began at MU's 10-yardline with just 6:27 left in the game...

- — Senior WR Tommy Saunders had a career day, as he caught 7 passes for a career-best 109 yards, with one grab going for a 19-yard TD from Daniel in the 1st quarter that made it 14-0 Missouri. He had a 29-yarder late in the 1st quarter that he took inside the BU 10-yardline, and later in the game threw a 19-yard pass to TE Chase Coffman on a gadget play. Also serving as the team's sure-handed holder for place kicks, he was flawless in getting the ball down cleanly for PK Jeff Wolfert's game-winning 34-yard field goal with 2:36 left...

- — Senior LB Brock Christopher was the obvious defensive hero of the day as he intercepted Baylor QB Robert Griffin with 1:40 left on the BU 34-yardline to clinch the win for Mizzou. The pickoff was the first of Griffin's career, and put an end to his NCAA record run of 209 consecutive passes to begin a career without an interception. Christopher ended the game with 8 tackles and 1 pass breakup to go with his INT (the 4th of his career)...

- — Junior DE Bryan Coulter continues to make strides, and he was an unsung hero on the Tiger defense at Baylor, as he was credited with 6 tackles, including 1.5 QB sacks of BU QB Robert Griffin, who is actually a distant cousin of Coulter's (he didn't find that out until being told by family last week). Coulter got his first start as a Tiger at Baylor, subbing for the injured Tommy Chavis, and he now has a QB sack in consecutive games...

- — Mizzou's offense was its own worst enemy in the game, as it was forced to punt only one time by Baylor. In all, the Tigers scored on 5-of-9 possessions, with the other 3 non-scoring drives resulting in Tiger turnovers (2 interceptions and 1 fumble). All 3 turnovers came in Baylor territory, with 2 coming in the first half as MU couldn't capitalize on the chance to put the game away when they held a 14-0 lead early on...

TIGERS STAMPEDE BUFFALOES, 58-0 FOR 1ST SHUTOUT IN ANY BIG 12 GAME SINCE 2005

Coming off of consecutive losses and hungry to redeem itself, the 16th-ranked Missouri Tigers took out their frustrations, and then some, against the compliant Colorado Buffaloes, to the tune of 58-0 on Oct. 25th. The shutout marked the first time they held a Big 12 opponent scoreless and was the first shutout win against a conference foe for MU since blanking Kansas in 1986 (W, 48-0).

More impressively, it was the first shutout of any kind in Big 12 Conference play in nearly 3 full years, when Texas blanked Baylor by a 62-0 score in November of 2005.

The Tigers scored on 9-of-11 possessions with the #1 offense on the field, and tacked on a late TD by the reserves on a long run in the final 5 minutes to mark the largest win ever for Missouri in Conference play. Heisman hopeful QB Chase Daniel was on fire from the start, as he completed his first 13 passes of the night and ended 31-of-37 passing for 302 yards and a school-record tying 5 TDs.

Daniel's main accomplices were the usual suspects, in WR Jeremy Maclin (11 receptions, 134 yards, 2 TDs) and TE Chase Coffman (7 catches, 50 yards, 1 TD), while TB Derrick Washington got untracked after being held in check in the ground game the previous two weeks, as he contributed 83 rushing yards and 1 TD on 17 tries (4.9 avg.).

Coffman broke an NCAA record for career receptions by a TE in the game, as he entered with an MU-record 213 catches. His 7-catch night moved him past Louisville's Ibn Green, who held the record with 217 grabs from 1996-99. One of Coffman's catches was one of his countless highlight-reel catches that capped MU's 2nd possession, when he made a leaping, one-handed grab while falling out of the back of the endzone on a 3rd-and-1 play to give the Tigers a 14-0 lead.

As impressive as the Tiger offense was, the story of the night was Mizzou's defense, which was coming off a tough game at #1 Texas, where they allowed 56 points - the most ever allowed by a Gary Pinkel Tiger team. They made up for that in a hurry as they constantly harrassed a pair of CU quarterbacks and never allowed the Buffaloes to get any traction offensively. The Buffs ended the night with just 199 yards of total offense, and didn't have positive yards until midway through the 2nd quarter.

Mizzou's defense then permitted the Buffaloes to drive in the waning seconds to its 9-yardline before time ran out. The Buffaloes admirably eschewed a cheap field goal attempt just to avoid the shutout, which broke a string of 242 consecutive games in which CU had scored, dating back to their last shutout loss (1988 against Nebraska).

COFFMAN IS NCAA'S MOST PROLIFIC PASS-CATCHING TIGHT END IN HISTORY

Mizzou's John Mackey Award candidate TE Chase Coffman continued his All-American caliber play in last Saturday's win at Baylor, as he caught a game-high 10 passes for 75 yards and 2 beautiful TD grabs that were definitely key plays in MU's 31-28 win in Waco, Texas.

Coffman's two TD grabs, from 3 yards and 13 yards out in the 1st quarter and 4th quarter, respectively, both were of the highlight reel variety, with both coming in the corner of the endzone against tight coverage where he made the catch in traffic, secured the ball and got his feet down to boot. Both plays were reviewed after being ruled as TDs, but both stood after replay confirmed the calls. Coffman actually played much of the 2nd half with a sprained left big toe (turf toe) that was bothering him after the game enough to have X-rays performed (they came back negative). His status for Saturday's game against Kansas State wasn't known as of Monday morning.

Coffman had yet another performance for the record books against Colorado, as he caught 7 passes for 50 yards and 1 TD (a ridiculous one-handed grab in the back of the end zone in the 1st quarter to make it 14-0 Tigers). While his numbers might not be eye-popping from the game, they certainly were historic in nature, as they gave him 220 career receptions, which makes him the NCAA's career record holder for all Div. I-A (FBS) tight ends.

The previous FBS record for catches by a tight end was 217, held by Louisville's Ibn Green (1996-99). Coffman entered the CU game with 213 grabs (already an MU record for all players), and he quickly went to work, tying Green's record by the end of the 1st quarter. The NCAA record-breaker came on a non-descript 4-yard reception from QB Chase Daniel in the 2nd quarter, but it was typical Coffman, as he made the grab in traffic on 3rd-and-1, and pushed the pile ahead for the first down that kept alive a drive that culminated in a TD to make it 28-0 Tigers.

After the Baylor game, Coffman now has 2,491 career receiving yards, which puts him in range of Green's FBS TE record of 2,830. He also holds MU's record for most receiving TDs (any position), with 27 entering the K-State contest.

Prior to the CU game, Coffman turned in an All-American performance in MU's loss at #1 Texas. The senior from Peculiar, Mo. caught 12 passes for 140 yards and 1 TD, and was seen breaking tackles, hurdling defenders and making difficult catches in traffic all night long. The receptions and yards marked a career high for Coffman, who also made history with his 3rd catch, which gave him the MU career record of 204, surpassing the previous mark of 203 formerly held by TE Martin Rucker (2004-07).

Coffman has 40 catches for 369 yards and 4 TDs in his last 4 outings, after catching 11 passes for 104 yards against Oklahoma State three games ago. One of those grabs included a spectacular catch on MU's opening drive

where he leaped backwards near the left sideline to snare a ball out of the air with one hand and bring it in for the catch — all while the OSU covering him was being flagged for pass interference. The gain went for 21 yards and extended MU's drive that resulted in a short field goal for a 3-0 lead.

He now has 4 100-yard outings in 9 games in 2008, to match his 120-yard performance against Illinois and 127-yard day against Nevada already this year.

Coffman is the NCAA Division I-A (FBS) active career leader for tight ends in both receptions (230) and yards (2,491), and he ranks #4 on the list among all players (see below chart). His career yardage total ranks 11th overall among all active players, and he is the only TE on the top 20 of both lists compiled by the NCAA.

His stats are enough to rank him 3rd in the NCAA in receptions among all players, and he also ranks 21st nationally among all players in yardage.

WOLFERT ON PACE FOR NCAA ACCURACY RECORD

Mizzou PK Jeff Wolfert has put up incredible numbers over three seasons of booting the ball, as he's made 215-of-225 (95.6%) combined kicks in 2006, 2007 and 2008. Those numbers break out to 52-of-62 (83.9%) on FGs and a perfect 163-of-163 on PATs (that's 100.0% for any non-math types out there).

In fact, Wolfert is on pace to break an NCAA career record for best accuracy for combined field goals and PATs. Wolfert's combined career mark of 95.6% is currently ahead of the record of 93.3% set by UCLA's John Lee from 1982-85 (116-of-117 PATs, 79-of-92 FGs). The minimum standard to qualify for this record is 50 career field goals.

His accuracy helped play a huge role last time out against Baylor, as he was crucial to MU's 31-28 win in Waco, Texas. Wolfert was perfect on all 4 PAT tries, but was called on for a 34-yard FG try with the game tied at 28-apiece with just over two minutes left. He drilled it, of course, accounting for the final score, as the Tiger defense forced a turnover on the ensuing Baylor possession to end the game.

Wolfert's kick was the first 4th-quarter game-winning FG for a Tiger kicker since 2005, when Adam Crossett booted a 26-yarder in OT to beat Iowa State in Columbia, 27-24.

MACLIN BREAKS MIZZOU CAREER ALL-PURPOSE RECORD

Mizzou's Mr. All-Everything WR/KR/PR Jeremy Maclin enters Saturday's game against Kansas State as the Big 12's #1 all-purpose player, with a league-best 189.67 average per game (that also ranks 2nd in the NCAA). He's coming off a 161-yard outing at Baylor where the Bear defense held him in check offensively, as he was held to 5 receptions for 31 yards (his lowest receiving total in 2008 since game #2 against SEMO, when he played just 1 quarter in a Tiger blowout win). But, Maclin contributed with 161 all-purpose yards overall, as he rushed 5 times for 26 yards and returned 5 kickoffs for 104 more yards.

One of those kickoff returns, his 2nd one in the 3rd quarter against Baylor, was historic in nature, as it pushed him past former Tiger great Brad Smith for the MU career record for most all-purpose yardage.

Maclin entered the game at Baylor with 4,322 career all-purpose yards, needing only 98 to pass Smith's mark of 4,419 from 2002-05. He now stands atop the chart with 4,483 entering the Kansas State game.

A year ago at Kansas State, Maclin erupted for an MU single-game record 360 all-purpose yards and 3 TDs, featuring 143 receiving yards (2 TDs) and 194 yards on kickoff returns, which included a 99-yard kickoff return for a TD (MU's first since 1982).

TIGERS LEAD NATION IN FEWEST FUMBLES

While all coaches preach ball security until the cows come home, Mizzou has taken that mantra to heart in 2008. The Tigers have fumbled just 5 times total in 2008, and they've run 624 plays from scrimmage — meaning they've fumbled just once every 124 plays on average. The fumbles (all being recovered by the opponents) have come in 3 games, with one in the opener against Illinois, and one last time out at Baylor, with the other three coming in game #4 against Buffalo.

All five fumbles happened in opponent territory, with four coming from Tiger receivers.

No other team has put the ball on the ground fewer times than Mizzou, as MU stands tied with Middle Tennessee State for fewest total fumbles in the nation heading into the Kansas State game, with 5. Here's a quick look at the nation's team leaders...

SULAK LEADS NCAA IN FORCED FUMBLES

While the Tiger offense has proven trustworthy in holding onto the ball, Mizzou's disruptive DE Stryker Sulak has proven quite adept at getting the ball out from the grasp of opponents. The Rockdale, Texas native has forced 5 fumbles in 9 games in 2008, and that per-game average of 0.56 forced fumbles per game is tied for highest in the nation coming into Saturday's game against Kansas State.

Sulak had a strong game last time out against Baylor, as he notched 7 tackles (the most since opening the season with 8 tackles against Illinois) and was credited with a half QB sack, raising his career total to 18.5 (4th on the MU career list).

For his career, Sulak has forced 13 fumbles in 48 games as a Tiger. The next-most by any active Tiger is 5 forced fumbles by Ziggy Hood in 45 career games.

QUICK HITTERS

- — QB Chase Daniel has been named a National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete (and is a winner of an \$18,000 post-graduate scholarship). He is now one of 16 finalists for the Draddy Award, which is known as the "Academic Heisman." Daniel is also an O'Brien Award semi-finalist and a Lowe's Senior CLASS Award finalist...
- — PK Jeff Wolfert has been named a semi-finalist for the Lou Groza Award, which goes annually to the nation's top kicker, while LB Sean Weatherspoon has been named a quarterfinalist for the Lott Trophy, which goes to the nation's top defensive player...
- — QB Chase Daniel needs just 7 passing yards to reach 3,000 for the 3rd straight season (no Tiger QB had ever reached 3,000 passing yards prior to Daniel). His 26 TD passes in 2008 stand just 7 shy of his MU season record of 33 achieved in 2007, and his season completion percentage of 77.2% and QB rating of 176.30 are far and away ahead of the MU season records of 68.2% (his own in 2007) and 154.3 (Phil Johnson in 1990), respectively...
- — Daniel has accounted for 98 TDs in his Tiger career (88 passing, 10 rushing), and stands just 5 shy of breaking the MU career record of 102 set by former great Brad Smith (56 passing, 46 rushing)...
- — TE Chase Coffman has caught a pass in 40 consecutive games, which is an MU record, breaking the previous mark of 34 by WR Justin Gage (2000-02). Coffman, with 73 receptions so far in 2008, is approaching the MU single-season receptions mark of 84, set just last season by TE Martin Rucker. The NCAA FBS single-season receptions record for a TE is within view, too (90 by James Whelan of Kentucky in 1999)...
- — Coffman, with 819 receiving yards in 2008 entering the KSU game, needs just 16 yards to break the MU single-season yardage record for a TE. The mark was set in 2007 by All-American Martin Rucker, who had 834 receiving yards on 84 catches...
- — Both Coffman and WR Jeremy Maclin have 7 receiving TDs entering the K-State contest, and both are within reach of the MU single-season record of 10, held by WR Sean Coffey in 2004...
- — Maclin's 2008 9-game all-purpose yardage total of 1,707 entering the K-State game is already the 2nd-most in MU single-season history, trailing only his own record of 2,776 set last year as a freshman...
- — LB Brock Christopher has 294 career tackles entering the K-State game, and he's tied for 14th on the MU career tackles list. Next up on the chart is Lynn Evans, who had 316 tackles from 1972-74 and ranks 13th...
- — As a team, Mizzou ranks 3rd in the NCAA through 9 games in tackles for loss, averaging 8.81 per game. #1 on the list is Georgia Tech (8.89), followed by #2 Troy (8.88) then Mizzou in 3rd...
- — Mizzou is also 3rd in the NCAA in fewest punts, with 21 (averaging 42.29 per kick). Tulsa and Texas Tech are tied for the fewest punts in the land, with just 18 apiece, followed by Mizzou and Ball State at 21. Oklahoma State ranks 5th on the list, with just 22 punts so far...
- — Mizzou ranks 7th in fewest penalties per game, averaging just 3.78 flags against them (34 in 9 games).

PINKEL STANDS 3RD ON ALLTIME MU COACHING WINS LIST

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 8th season at MU and touts a career record of 129-76-3 (62.7%). The Illinois game to open the 2008 season was the 200th in Pinkel's head coaching career.

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 47-25 (65.3%) over the past 5+ seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006 and 2007, has an 8-year record in Columbia of 56-39 (59.0%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has won 28 of his last 37 games overall.

MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 56.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

For the efforts in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was also named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007.

Pinkel has led MU to 4 bowl games, and if his Tigers reach a 5th in 2008, he will join Devine (6 bowls), and Powers (5 bowls) as the only coaches to guide MU to 5 bowl games.

Pinkel has guided Mizzou to 4 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 12-2 in 2007), with those representing 4 of MU's 6 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

QUICK-STRIKE OFFENSE

If you like following the Tiger offense, you're best advised not to blink when they're on the field, because Mizzou strikes quickly when it's out there. MU is quickly disproving that winning the time of possession battle is the key to winning football — while Missouri is 6th the nation in total offense (514.11 ypg), they're doing it despite ranking 118th nationally in time of possession (25:53 average through 9 games).

In fact, in a survey of Div. I (FBS) SIDs, Mizzou is 3rd in the country in most TD drives of under two minutes in length, with 24.

Mizzou had 6 TD drives in this category against Nevada, while turning in 4 against Colorado, and adding 3 each against Nebraska, Buffalo and SEMO, 2 against Illinois and 1 each vs. Oklahoma State, Texas and Baylor. Here's a look at the NCAA leaders in this category:

JUST SEVEN THREE-AND-OUTS SO FAR FOR #1 OFFENSE

Mizzou's #1 offense, through its first 5 games in 2008, did not leave the field once having had to punt after a three-and-out possession, spanning 48 possessions through that stretch. After scoring a FG on their first series in game #6 against Oklahoma State, the streak ended at 49, as OSU forced the first 3-and-out of the season on MU's 2nd possession.

After last week's 31-28 at Baylor, in 92 total possessions with QB Chase Daniel at the helm this season, the #1 offense has scored 56 times, including 45 TDs and 11 FGs. The non-scores have resulted in just 15 punts (only 7 after just three plays), 5 lost fumbles, 8 interceptions, 4 missed FGs and 4 lost on downs.

In an amazing two-game stretch spanning the Southeast Missouri State and Nevada games, Daniel led the offense to scores on all 13 possessions in which he took the field (12 TDs and 1 FG). In those two games combined, Daniel had more TD passes (7) than incomplete passes (6). After scoring a TD and a FG on the first two drives of the Buffalo game, that streak was upped to 15 straight scoring drives. It ended on possession #3 of that game, when the drive stalled after 5 plays and a punt.

DANIEL LEADS THE WAY OFFENSIVELY

Mizzou senior QB Chase Daniel began the 2008 season on the short list of Heisman Trophy favorites, according to most prognosticators. Even though the Tigers suffered consecutive defeats to Oklahoma State and Texas, Daniel will have a chance to make some proverbial hay in the final stretch of the season, and he started that with a bang against Colorado, as he led MU to a 58-0 win, throwing for 302 yards and an MU-record 5 TDs on 31-of-37 passing. He led the Tigers to scores on 9-of-11 drives in which he took the field.

He followed with a solid day last time out at Baylor, as he completed 30-of-38 passes for 318 yards and 3 TDs (with 2 interceptions). With the game on the line, tied at 28-28 late in the game, Daniel calmly led the Tigers from their own 10-yardline down the field to set up what proved to be the game-winning field goal, on a 34-yarder by PK Jeff Wolfert with 2:36 left.

Through 9 games, Daniel has directed the Tigers to the nation's 6th-ranked outfit in total offense (514.11 ypg) and 4th-ranked scoring offense (45.56 ppg), while the Tigers rank 4th in the NCAA in passing (358.33 ypg) and 5th in pass efficiency (171.80 rating). Individually, after his BU game, he ranks 4th in the NCAA in total offense (350.22 ypg) and is 5th in pass efficiency (176.30 rating).

Daniel was 31-of-41 passing at Texas, throwing for 318 yards and 2 TDs, with 1 interception that came while he was trying to throw the ball away while being dragged down in the Tiger endzone. He had one TD taken away on a reversal by instant replay in the first half, as well. While the UT defense had Mizzou's number early on — forcing four straight punts to begin the game — Daniel and company scored on 5 of their last 7 possessions, with the only non-scores coming on the reversed TD pass that came on 4th down, and the aforementioned interception.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

Previously, Daniel completed 39-of-52 passes against OSU, and was forced to try and win the game through the air as the Cowboys shut down the previously potent Tiger rushing attack (64 yards as a team on 18 attempts). He had 3 passes intercepted on the night, which marked his first turnovers since the 2nd quarter of the season opener against Illinois. One of the INTs was bad fortune, as his 3rd-quarter pass to WR Danario Alexander deep in OSU territory in the 3rd quarter went through Alexander's hands, bounced off his facemask high into the air, and into the waiting arms of a Cowboy defensive back.

He had a 253-yard, 3-TD passing night in just 3 quarters of work at Nebraska, as the Tigers broke a 30-year losing streak in Lincoln, rolling to a 52-17 win. He completed an efficient 18-of-23 passes at Nebraska last time out, including TD passes of 58, 7 and 26 yards as he directed the Tiger offense to its 2nd-largest point total ever against the Huskers. Mizzou's #1 offense — which was pulled at the end of the 3rd quarter after the score stood 52-10 — scored on 6-of-7 possessions, with the only non-score coming on a missed 59-yard FG attempt at the halftime gun.

Against Buffalo, Daniel completed 20 consecutive passes at one point in the game, which broke the Big 12 Conference single-game record of 18, and was just 3 shy of the NCAA record for a game. He ended the day 36-of-43 passing for a career-high 439 yards with 2 TDs, and had potential yards and TDs taken away as the Tiger receivers uncharacteristically fumbled the ball away after catches three times deep in Buffalo territory — at the 12-yardline, at the 22-yardline and at the 38-yardline.

For his efforts, Daniel was named Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week, and he also took home the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback of the Week Award for the 2nd straight week — marking the first time in the award's existence that a player had won on consecutive weeks.

Against Nevada, Daniel was in another stratosphere, going 23-of-28 for 405 yards and 4 TDs. His 1st TD of the day, an 80-yarder to WR Jeremy Maclin, gave him enough career passing yards to break the MU record of 8,799 previously held by former great Brad Smith (2002-05). Daniel now has 9,845 passing yards for his career.

Daniel had a string of 15 straight possessions earlier this year where he led MU to a score (13 TDs, 2 FGs) spanning 3 games, playing just 1 1/2 quarters versus SEMO and 2 1/2 quarters vs. Nevada before being pulled, plus the first two drives last time out against Buffalo.

Daniel had about as perfect performance as you can have against SEMO in game #2, as he completed 16-of-17 passes for 245 yards and 3 TDs. He did all of this in just a quarter and a half of play, as he was pulled after MU scored to make it 42-0 with 8:45 remaining in the 2nd quarter! Daniel was in for 5 possessions against SEMO, and he led MU to 5 TD drives, with the longest consuming just 2:48 off the clock. In fact, those 5 scoring drives combined took just 9:35 off the clock in total.

In the 2008 season opener, Daniel threw for 323 yards and 3 TDs in helping lead Mizzou to a 52-42 win over 20th-ranked Illinois. The points were a record for Mizzou against a ranked opponent. Daniel had 369 yards of total offense on the night, as he burned the Illini for 46 rushing yards on just 9 attempts (5.1 avg.).

Daniel was his best in the middle of the game, when he led MU to 4 offensive TDs in a 5-possession span, bridging the 2nd and 3rd quarters. In that stretch, he had TD passes of 17 yards to TE Chase Coffman just before halftime, and followed with TD strikes of 4 yards and 21 yards to WR Tommy Saunders on consecutive 3rd-quarter possessions as MU took a commanding 45-20 lead with 2:50 left in the 3rd.

The performance was a nice follow-up to his 2007 season, when Daniel continued to smash all sorts of Mizzou passing and total offense records, as he became the school's first-ever Heisman Trophy finalist (finishing 4th in balloting). He helped lead Mizzou to its 12-2 season as he threw for an MU-record 4,306 yards and 33 TDs.

Daniel ranked 7th in the NCAA a year ago in total offense (325.64 ypg) and was 15th overall in pass efficiency (147.89 rating), while amassing at least 300 passing yards in 8-of-14 games — including a pair of 400-yard performances (401 vs. Nebraska and 421 at Colorado).

Already at the top of numerous MU records lists, Daniel has a shot at reaching Smith's seemingly unreachable total offense career record of 13,088 yards, as Daniel has 12,021 entering the KSU game (needs 1,068 to break).

MACLIN LEADS BIG 12 IN ALL-PURPOSE YARDAGE OUTPUT

The Big 12 leader in all-purpose yardage so far, sophomore WR/KR/PR Jeremy Maclin also ranks 2nd in the NCAA with a per-game mark of 189.67 yards a game. In addition to his game-changing abilities on the Tiger return units, Maclin has really emerged as a consistent playmaker on offense, as he's caught a combined 57 balls for 780 yards and 6 TDs in the last 7 games. Here's a quick look at his last 7 games in terms of receiving production:

- vs. Nevada — 6 catches, 172 yards, 3 TDs (tied MU single-game record for receiving TDs)
- vs. Buffalo — 14 catches, 168 yards
- at Nebraska — 5 catches, 89 yards, 1 TD
- vs. Oklahoma State — 8 catches, 120 yards
- at Texas — 8 catches, 66 yards
- vs. Colorado — 11 catches, 134 yards, 2 TDs
- at Baylor — 5 catches, 31 yards

Maclin is coming off a 161-yard day at Baylor, which followed a 192-yard night in all-purpose output against Colorado. That total included 41 yards on 2 punt returns and 17 yards rushing. What made that total even more impressive is that he reached that without benefit of a single yard on kickoff returns. He can thank the Tiger defense for that, as MU shutout the Buffaloes, meaning that the only time they kicked off all night was the game-opening kick, and CU squibbed that one to a Tiger upback to avoid kicking to Maclin.

Maclin enters the KSU game ranked 13th in the NCAA in receptions per game (7.00) and is also 18th nationally in receiving yards per game, averaging a 92.33 yards a game to this point.

Previously, Maclin turned in a 197-yard night at #1 Texas, where he caught 8 passes for 66 yards and had 132 yards on 5 kickoff returns (26.4 avg.), including big returns of 50 and 39 yards that set the Tigers up in great field position.

After being shut out in catches during the first half of the OSU game, Maclin did all of his receiving damage in the 2nd half, as he caught 8 balls for 120 yards. Included in that was a 41-yard catch-and-run that set MU up deep in OSU territory in the 3rd quarter that he nearly took all the way. He ended the game with 223 all-purpose yards.

Prior to that, J-Mac had a game at Nebraska where he made people take notice before some people had even gotten to their seats. With MU facing a 3rd-and-5 from their 42-yardline, Maclin got free over the middle on a crossing route on the third play of the game, caught a ball in stride from QB Chase Daniel, and he eluded one would-be tackler, got to the left sideline and went untouched from there 58 yards for a score just :54 seconds into the game. That was a statement that the Tigers were there to stay, and they went on to an historic 52-17 victory.

Previously, Maclin had a 236-yard day in MU's Sept. 20th win over Buffalo. In the game, he grabbed a career-high 14 passes for 168 yards, and he also rushed twice for 25 yards — including a 16-yard TD that was a highlight-reel play, where he swept around right end, got the corner, and dove from the 4-yard line over traffic into the front corner of the endzone, while stretching the ball out over the pylon while flying out of bounds.

Prior to that, Maclin burned Nevada for a career-high 172 receiving yards, to go with an MU single-game record-tying 3 TDs. His 1st came on MU's 2nd possession, as he took a medium-depth crossing route from QB Chase Daniel, turned on the jets, made one move to get free down the left sideline, and he raced home untouched for an 80-yard score to make it 14-0 Tigers with 12:02 left in the 1st quarter. His 2nd TD might have been even more impressive, as he leapt high over a defender for a 14-yard TD grab with 1:31 left in the 1st half to make it 38-10 Tigers. On the play, he made the catch in coverage, and managed to tap one foot in bounds before falling out of bounds.

His record-tying TD was a display of pure speed, as he simply ran by the Nevada cornerback on a go route, and Daniel lofted a perfect ball that Maclin went and got for a 49-yard TD. For the day, Maclin had 239 all-purpose yards, his most since he set an MU single-game all-purpose record with 360 yards at Kansas State in 2007.

Another case in point for Maclin's game changing ability came in the 2008 season opener against 20th-ranked Illinois. In the 2nd quarter, Illinois had just taken a 13-10 lead on a sudden interception return for a TD, and all of a sudden the Illini are fired up and looking to pull the upset. What happens next on the ensuing kickoff? Maclin catches it at the Tiger 1-yardline, speeds up the right seam, using great blocking from upback Earl Goldsmith. He gets to the last line thanks to a clearing block from Goldsmith, fakes right near the MU 40-yardline to get the punter out of the way, cuts back left and he's off to the races untouched for a 99-yard TD to give the lead right back to Mizzou, 17-13. The Tigers never looked back, really, as that began a stretch where MU outscored Illinois 35-7 through late in the 3rd quarter on the way to the 52-42 win.

Additionally, his return score was the 4th of his career (2 kickoffs, 2 punts), and that makes him the MU career record holder for most combined kick return TDs. He entered the 2008 season co-holding the record with John Moseley (2 punt returns, 1 kickoff return), and Mike Fink (3 kickoffs).

Maclin ended the Illinois game with 234 all-purpose yards, in spite of the fact that Illinois was undoubtedly game-planning to keep him under wraps. The Illini did limit his damage on offense, as Maclin was held to 4 catches for 31 yards and 2 yards rushing on 3 attempts, but he made his mark clearly in the return game. In addition to the 99-yarder (his 2nd-career TD which makes him only one of 2 Tigers alltime to have more than 1 kickoff return for a TD — Mike Fink is the other, with 3, all in the 1973 season), Maclin had a punt return of 46 that he was

one defender away from breaking the distance as he took it to the Illinois 21-yardline. That return was cashed in on the very next play as Tiger QB Chase Daniel hit WR Tommy Saunders for a 21-yard TD with 2:50 left in the 3rd for a 45-20 Tiger lead.

Even despite having to leave the Illinois game early, Maclin's efforts were enough to earn him the Big 12 Conference Special Teams Player of the Week — marking the 3rd time in his young career that he's won the award.

In 2007, Maclin would go on to become arguably the nation's most dangerous all-purpose threat, as he was the only player in the FBS classification to score a TD via receiving (9), rushing (4), punt return (2) and kickoff return (1). His 2,776 all-purpose yards broke the NCAA single-season record for freshmen, and ranked as the 5th-highest single-season total in NCAA annals. His season total of 2,776 all-purpose yards smashed the previous MU season record of 1,621 by Devin West (1998), and it ranked Maclin 7th on the school CAREER all-purpose yardage chart.

For his efforts, Maclin was named a consensus 1st-Team All-American as an all-purpose player, becoming the first-ever freshman at Mizzou to earn 1st-Team All-American honors. He became the 9th Tiger to earn consensus 1st-Team All-American accolades, and he shared Big 12 Freshman-of-the-Year honors with Texas Tech WR Michael Crabtree.

Maclin's kickoff return for a TD in 2007 — a 99-yarder at Kansas State — was extremely historic, as it was MU's first kickoff return for a TD since 1982. That broke a string of futility for Mizzou that stretched 287 games and 976 kickoff returns without a score! Maclin ended that game with an MU single game record of 360 yards in the 49-32 win in Manhattan, Kan., and he broke the NCAA freshman season all-purpose record on the historic kickoff return.

His 2 punt returns for TDs in 2007 made him only the 4th Tiger in history to record 2 career punt returns for scores. And that's the school record, meaning that if he breaks one in 2008, he'll hold the record to himself.

When teams geared up to shut down Maclin in 2007, that simply opened up the running lanes for the Tigers, as Mizzou demolished the only 2 foes to hold Maclin to under 100 all-purpose yards. Against #22 Texas Tech, Maclin was held to 66 all-purpose yards, but the Tigers rushed for 212 yards in a 41-10 blowout. Similarly, in the Cotton Bowl against #25 Arkansas, the Razorbacks limited J-Mac to just 63 all-purpose yards, but then TB Tony Temple ran roughshod, going for a Cotton Bowl-record 281 yards and 4 TDs on his own, as the Tigers pounded Arkansas, 38-7.

COFFMAN CONTINUES ALL-AMERICAN PLAY AT TIGHT END

For the last 3 years, senior TE Chase Coffman has been one of the nation's top tight ends, yet he was often overshadowed by his own teammate, Martin Rucker, who ended his Tiger career in 2007 earning consensus 1st-Team All-American honors.

Now, with Rucker gone to the NFL (Cleveland Browns 4th-round draft pick), Coffman has his chance to shine as Mizzou's featured tight end. He's done just that all throughout 2008, as he's surpassed the 100-yard receiving mark 4 times already, with a career-high 140-yard outing (on a career-high 12 catches) and 1 TD at #1 Texas, to go with a 127-yard outing (with 1 TD) against Nevada, as well as a 120-yard, 1-TD game in the opener against 20th-ranked Illinois, and a 104-yard outing against #17 Oklahoma State.

One of the leading candidates for All-American honors, as well as the John Mackey Award, given annually to the nation's top tight end, Coffman enters the KSU game with a team-best 73 catches and has 819 yards, to go with 7 TDs.

Coffman had 10 catches for 75 yards and 2 highlight-reel TD catches last time out which were key plays in MU's 31-28 win at Baylor. Both of his catches came in the corner of the end zone in traffic, and saw him acrobatically catch the ball while getting his feet down in time — the first was from 3 yards out to cap the game's opening drive, while the last one was a clutch 13-yard grab on 3rd down in the 4th quarter to break a 21-all tie at the time. Coffman played quite a bit of the 2nd half with a sprained left big toe (turf toe).

Coffman had a 7-catch, 50-yard, 1-TD outing last time out against Colorado, and while the numbers don't pop off the page, they were historic in nature as he became the most prolific pass-catching TE in NCAA Div. I-A (FBS) history, breaking the career receptions record of 217 held by Louisville's Ibn Green (1996-99). Coffman entered the CU game with 213 career receptions (an MU career record for all players), and moved past Green for the NCAA mark with a 2nd-quarter grab.

Coffman grabbed 10 passes for 84 yards and 1 TD against Buffalo, and for his efforts, was named the John Mackey National Tight End of the Week — marking the 3rd time in his career he's taken home that weekly honor (once each previously in 2006 and 2007).

In MU's season-opening win over 20th-ranked Illinois, Coffman caught 9 passes for 120 yards and 1 TD — a key 17-yarder he grabbed with just :20 seconds remaining before halftime to give MU a 31-13 lead at half. In very limited action vs. SEMO, Coffman caught 3 passes for 48 yards.

In previous seasons, the numbers that Coffman, the son of former NFL tight end Paul Coffman, weren't exactly chopped liver, despite sharing time with Rucker. In 2007, Coffman caught 52 passes for 531 yards and 7 TDs, which by most standards are outstanding for a college tight end. However, those numbers were down slightly from his sophomore season where he grabbed 58 balls for 638 yards and 9 TDs.

Coffman was hampered for the last half of the 2007 season with bone spurs in his ankle that limited his mobility. He had to miss the Big 12 Championship game against Oklahoma, and that undoubtedly played a role in MU's 38-17 loss, as the Tigers uncharacteristically bogged down in the red zone, as they had to kick 3 field goals after reaching inside the Sooner 10-yardline. In MU's regular-season game at Oklahoma (a 41-31 loss in which MU led in the 4th quarter), Coffman proved effective against the Sooners, as he had a career-best 10 catches for 102 yards.

Coffman had off-season surgery to clean up his ankle, and he was 100% this fall until suffering a broken pinky finger on his right hand in two-a-days. After practicing in pain for a couple of days, team trainers and doctors decided to have surgery to get a pin inserted in the finger to accelerate the healing process. Coffman missed less than a week of practice and looked like his old self the first day back, as he caught everything in sight.

Coffman was a 1st-Team Preseason Playboy All-American pick this past summer. The Peculiar, Mo. native enters the KSU game ranked 1st now on the MU career receptions chart, with 230 (his 12-catch outing at Texas moved him past Rucker, who previously held the mark with 203 catches), and is 2nd on the career receiving yardage chart, with 2,491 yards (he's only the 5th Tiger in history to reach the 2,000-yard receiving mark, and it's the most ever at MU among tight ends). He already holds the school career record for most career TD receptions, with 27, which he broke with a 3-TD performance at Colorado last season, when he caught 5 passes for 60 yards.

TIGERS HAVE BEEN CREAM OF THE BIG 12 NORTH CROP

Thanks to the research skills of resident MU football historian Tom Orf, we proudly pass along the following tidbits about Mizzou and the Big 12 Conference North Division...

WOLFERT BREAKS MU CAREER SCORING RECORD, ON PACE FOR NCAA KICKING ACCURACY MARK

One of the great “feel-good” stories in college football over the last 2+ years has to be that of senior PK Jeff Wolfert, who came from virtually nowhere to become one of the most reliable kickers in the nation. What’s so amazing about his story is that he won the MU starting kicking job in fall camp of 2006 after kicking in just 1 game in his entire life (in high school, at that). If you haven’t heard the story, please find it below.

Wolfert has put up incredible numbers over the last two+ years, as he’s made 215-of-225 (95.6%) combined kicks in 2006, 2007 and 2008. Those numbers break out to 52-of-62 (83.9%) on FGs and a perfect 163-of-163 on PATs (that’s 100.0% for any non-math types out there).

In fact, Wolfert is on pace to break an NCAA career record for best accuracy for combined field goals and PATs. Wolfert’s combined career mark of 95.6% is currently ahead of the record of 93.3% set by UCLA’s John Lee from 1982-85 (116-of-117 PATs, 79-of-92 FGs). The minimum standard to qualify for this record is 50 career field goals.

Here’s a look at the active kickers with a shot at breaking Lee’s mark (only those with 46 or more career made FGs are considered for this list)...

Wolfert broke the MU career scoring record with his 1st-quarter 18-yard FG Oct. 11th against Oklahoma State, as the kick broke a tie he held coming into the game with former great Brad Smith for the school scoring record of 284 points (2002-05). He now has 319 career points entering the Kansas State game after going a perfect 5-for-5 at Baylor, including the game-winning 34-yard field goal with just 2:36 left to account for MU’s 31-28 win in Waco. It was MU’s first game-winning field goal since 2005 against Iowa State.

That followed a perfect outing against Colorado where he went 10-for-10 against the Buffs (3-of-3 on FGs from 23, 44 and 46 yards and 7-of-7 on PATs).

Wolfert did have an uncharacteristic night against OSU as he missed two field goal tries — albeit one was from 52 yards at the halftime gun. The other was a shocker, as he had a 34-yard 2nd-quarter try blocked, marking the first kick he’s had a kick blocked in his career.

He made up for that by providing big contributions in a brand new way against the Cowboys, as he tried his hand at punting for the first time ever. Wolfert was called on to punt three times against OSU on rollout kicks, falling back on his days as a soccer player. The results were impressive, as he averaged 49.0 yards on those kicks, with only one of them returned, for just 6 yards. He had a 51-yarder at Texas that he boomed inside the UT 10-yardline last time out, and ended with 2 punts in the game for an average of 34.0 yards.

The Nebraska game did have one downside for the Overland Park, Kan., native, as he missed his first kick of any kind in Big 12 games — albeit one that should hardly count too much against him, as his miss was from 59 yards away at the halftime gun, on a kick that was just short and barely wide left. Up to that miss, Wolfert had connected on a perfect 95-of-95 combined career Big 12 kicks (27-of-27 FGs and 68-of-68 PATs).

Wolfert made 4 PATs and field goals of 26 and 48 yards against Buffalo. He was called on to kick a 53-yarder late in the game against the Bulls, and with a tough cross-wind to navigate, his kick had plenty of leg, but veered just wide left at the end.

The rare miss by Wolfert broke a string of 97 consecutive combined made kicks, as he had made all 33 of his kicks to that point in 2008 (27 PATs, 6 FGs) to go with his last 64 kicks of 2007 (48 PATs, 16 FGs) since his previous miss — a 3rd-quarter missed FG in game #4 in 2007 against Illinois State.

Earlier this season, Wolfert set an MU record with 9 PATs against Nevada. He also connected on both of his FG tries (27, 24) to go a perfect 11-of-11 on the day, in addition to handling kickoff duties (2 touchbacks, opponent return average of just 19.5 yds. on 11 kickoffs). For his efforts, Wolfert was named Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week.

It's the 2nd time he's won the award, as he claimed the award in 2007 after a big performance against Kansas.

Wolfert began his senior season with a bang, as he connected on all 7 of his extra points and on his only FG try — a 51-yarder against Illinois that would have been good from several yards farther away. His FG gave the Tigers a 10-6 2nd-quarter lead, and it made him only the 3rd kicker in Mizzou history to make more than one 50-yarder in his career (Tom Whelihan had 5 in 1985-86 and Jeff Jacke had 4 from 1988-92).

For his efforts a year ago, Wolfert was named an honorable mention All-American by Sports Illustrated, and he took home 1st-Team All-Big 12 honors in virtual unanimous fashion. Wolfert led MU with a single-season record 130 points, while making 21-of-25 FGs and 67-of-67 PATs.

Two of the bigger kicks he made in his career came in the epic border showdown against rival Kansas. With MU clinging to a dwindling 4th-quarter lead, Wolfert calmly made a pair of 43 yarders in frigid wintry conditions to help the Tigers hold on for a 36-28 win that catapulted them to #1 in the Associated Press and the BCS polls.

As for his backstory: Wolfert originally came to Mizzou as a diver on the men's swimming and diving team, but the former high school kicker gave up diving into water for jumping into the fire of placekicking. Wolfert was a soccer player in high school, and wanted to give kicking a try as a senior. He kicked two extra points in his first game that year, but then missed the rest of the year after breaking his hip on a kickoff in that same game.

After the injury, Wolfert decided to focus on diving collegiately, and he was a standout freshman diver on the Mizzou men's swimming and diving team during the 2004-05 school year. He produced a top-five performance on the platform and top-10 finishes on the 1 and 3-meter boards at the 2005 NCAA Zone Diving Championships. He also finished 4th in the 1-meter board, 5th on the 3-meter board and 6th on the platform at the Big 12 Championships.

But his dreams to kick a football never died, and he gave up his Mizzou swimming scholarship money and joined the football team as a walk-on for the 2005 season. He did not play in 2005, and figured that he would give kicking one more try in 2006, and if it didn't pan out, he'd return to the sport of diving, where a scholarship was waiting for him.

All of a sudden, that fall, Wolfert was very consistent kicking in scrimmages, and was named the starting placekicker for the season opener — despite his lack of experience, and the fact that the man who set the MU single-season kick scoring record of 81 points returned as a junior in 2006 (Adam Crossett).

The rest was history, and yes, he was awarded a football scholarship after the end of the 2006 season.

WASHINGTON 2ND IN BIG 12 IN SCORING AND RUSHING

Sophomore TB Derrick Washington has quickly answered the questions of people who wondered how Mizzou would replace departed 2-time 1,000-yard rusher Tony Temple. All Washington has done in his first 9 career starts is score 15 TDs (13 rushing, 2 receiving), and his per-game scoring average of 10.00 currently ranks the Big 12 Conference (8th in the NCAA), while he also ranks 2nd in the Big 12 in rushing as well (78.67 ypg), heading into the KSU game Saturday.

With 13 rushing TDs to date, he stands only 5 shy of the MU single-season record of 18 set in 2003 by Brad Smith. With 15 total TDs in 2008, Washington is just 4 shy of Smith's single-season total TD record of 19 (2003).

Washington just missed the 100-yard mark last time out at Baylor, as he ended with 97 yards on just 14 carries (a healthy 6.9 average per rush). He was held out of the endzone for the first time in 2008, as he'd had at least 1 TD in each game prior to that 31-28 win in Waco.

Against Colorado Mizzou gained 189 yards on the ground, with D-Wash accounting for 83 yards and 1 TD on 17 carries.

The production was good to see, as he'd been held in check the previous two weeks, as he carried a total of 15 times for 28 yards combined against Oklahoma State (8 rushes, 11 yards) and Texas (7 rushes, 17 yards).

Even though his yardage totals were down against OSU and Texas, Washington still contributed by adding a rushing TD in each game. His 2-yard TD run in the 3rd quarter at Texas on Oct. 18th marked the first rushing TD scored against Texas' stout run defense in 2008.

Washington was the offensive star of MU's 52-17 romp over Nebraska, as he rushed for a career-best 139 yards on just 14 carries, scoring twice on the ground, and adding a third score on a 7-yard TD pass from Chase Daniel. His two rushing scores were from 3 yards out in the 1st quarter and from 43 yards out in the 3rd quarter as he broke through the line untouched to put the Tigers up, 45-10 with 2:24 left in the period.

The Raymore, Mo. native has been a model of consistency early on, as he rushed for exactly 2 TDs in each of the first 5 games, adding single receiving TDs against SEMO and Nebraska.

Washington's collegiate starting debut couldn't have gone much better, as he ran for a 7-yard TD on MU's season-opening possession against Illinois to put the Tigers on top, 7-0. He added a 40-yard TD burst in the 2nd quarter that helped the Tigers start to pull away, and he ended the night with 130 yards on 19 carries — good for a salty average of 6.8 yards per try.

His 130 yards stood as the high-water mark in the Big 12 Conference on opening weekend, and he followed with a 67-yard, 2-TD outing against SEMO (on just 8 carries thanks to being pulled early due to MU's huge lead), followed

by 80 yards on 8 carries against Nevada (again being pulled early) and an 89-yard, 2-TD day against Buffalo.

Against Nevada, Washington opened scoring with a 59-yard burst on the first possession of the game to put MU up, 7-0 with 13:49 left in the 1st quarter. He later scored on a 2-yard run late in the 2nd quarter to mark his 3rd-straight multiple-TD game.

Against SEMO, D-Wash scored on a pair of 5-yard runs, and he also showed his versatility that has Tiger coaches so excited about his future, as he caught a 28-yard pass from QB Chase Daniel in the 1st quarter that made it 21-0.

Washington, who was used sparingly as a 3rd-down back mostly as a true freshman in 2007, showed against Illinois that he's got an effective combination of speed, strength and moves, as he was seen alternating between getting tough yards inside, making people miss, running out of attempted tackles, and getting around the edge for big gains. He added a run of 28 yards to his 40-yard TD earlier in the game.

Washington played in 12 games for Mizzou in 2007 and ran for 184 yards on 36 attempts while scoring 1 TD rushing. He also caught 10 passes for 70 yards in 2007 with 1 TD.

SPOON HAVING AN ALL-AMERICAN CAMPAIGN

Junior LB Sean Weatherspoon, had quite an impact to start the season — especially in terms of big plays. The Jasper, Texas, native had a monster game against Buffalo that saw him record a career-high 20 tackles, including 3 tackles for loss and half-QB sack. He also broke up a pass on the day, and for his efforts, was named the Big 12 Conference Defensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career.

Spoon was the ringleader in Mizzou's recent spirited defensive effort that saw the Tigers hold Nebraska to a season-low 17 points, with 7 of those coming on the last play of the game against the Tiger reserves. He finished the game with a game-high 9 tackles in Lincoln.

Through 9 games, Weatherspoon — who had no interceptions in his first two years — ranks 4th in the Big 12 and is still tied for 56th nationally with his 3 INTs (.33 p/g). He's coming off a 14-tackle game at Baylor where he had 2 TFLs and 1 QB sack. Spoon enters the Kansas State game ranked 2nd in the Big 12 and 6th nationally with his average of 10.78 tackles per game., and he also leads the Big 12 in tackles for loss and ranks 14th nationally, with an average of 1.50 per game.

Spoon was a game-changer in the 4th quarter of MU's 52-42 win over Illinois. In that game, he had 9 tackles on the night, including 1 tackle for loss, but his biggest plays came in the 4th quarter, when he intercepted a pair of Juice Williams passes while the Illini were trying to stage a late rally. His first pick came at the Tiger 26-yardline to snuff out an Illini threat with 10:20 left in the game and MU holding onto a 45-35 lead at the time.

On Illinois' next possession, Spoon made a pair of tackles, including a stop on 3rd down to force a punt, and on the Illini's next drive, he took things into his own hands, literally, when he caught a pass over the middle simultaneously with an Illini player. He ripped the ball out of the opposing player's hands, and went the other way, going 35 yards untouched into the endzone with 3:18 left in the game for a back-breaking TD that made it 52-35.

Weatherspoon's 4th quarter vs. Illinois was amazing, as 7 of his tackles came in the final 15 minutes, in addition to grabbing his 2 interceptions. He was named the Walter Camp National Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts against Illinois.

The next time out, Spoon was up to his old tricks again in game #2 against Southeast Missouri State.

Against SEMO, Weatherspoon intercepted a pass in the 2nd quarter and returned it untouched, 65 yards for a TD. That left him with the distinction of becoming the first Tiger in history to record INT returns for a touchdown in consecutive games. The MU career record for most INT returns for TDs is co-held by current senior FS William Moore (3 — 1 each in 2005, 2006, 2007) and former great Erik McMillan (3 in 1987).

He had a 12-tackle outing against Nevada in which the Tiger defense held the Wolf Pack to almost 200 yards below their pre-game average for total offense. Mizzou permitted 362 yards to Nevada, well below their average coming in of 558.50, which ranked them 6th in the NCAA prior to the game.

After earning playing time as a true freshman mostly in a reserve role and on special teams, Weatherspoon emerged on the scene in 2007 as a sophomore. He took over the starting spot at the weakside linebacker position a year ago, and from the get-go was a leader on the defense. He ended the year with a team-best 130 tackles, and was named a 1st-Team All-Big 12 performer by the Associated Press.

Spoon proved adept at getting his hands on the ball, as he broke up 8 passes on the year (2nd-most on the team), and had two more balls which he deflected on pass rushes that were intercepted by FS William Moore — including one which Moore returned 26 yards for a back-breaking TD in the Cotton Bowl against Arkansas.

RECORD RANKING RUN

•Mizzou's record run of consecutive weeks in the Associated Press top-10 came to an end this week after the loss to Oklahoma State, as the Tigers came in 11th in the latest A.P. poll. Prior to that, MU had been ranked in the Associated Press top-10 for 14 consecutive weeks, dating back to the 2007 seasons (including both the post-season 2007 and pre-season 2008 polls), and that is a record stay among the nation's elite for the Tiger program. Prior to that stretch, the longest string at Mizzou was 7 straight weeks in the top-10 in 1960 (see below for details)...

HEAD COACH GARY PINKEL

In his eighth year directing the Missouri Tiger football program, Head Coach Gary Pinkel has built a solid foundation that has transformed Mizzou from a once downtrodden program to one that finds itself among college football's elite.

Pinkel is in his 8th season at MU and touts a career record of 129-76-3 (62.7%). The Illinois game earlier this season was the 200th in Pinkel's head coaching career.

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 47-25 (65.3%) over the past 5 seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006 and 2007, has an 8-year record in Columbia of 56-39 (59.0%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has won 28 of his last 37 games overall.

MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 55.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

The 2007 season was one of historic proportions, as the Tigers won 11 regular-season games for the first-time ever, claimed the Big 12 North Division title (MU's first conference title in football since 1969), and ascended to the number-one ranking in both the Associated Press poll (for only the second time in MU history) and the BCS rankings (for the first time in history). The Tigers finished things off in style, by defeating #25 Arkansas by a 38-7 count in the 2008 AT&T Cotton Bowl, giving MU its first New Year's Day Bowl victory since 1966.

The Cotton Bowl win also gave the Tigers a school-record 12th win, and helped give Mizzou a final #4 ranking in the Associated Press season-ending poll, which is the highest a Tiger team has ever finished a season in the rankings.

For his outstanding achievements both on and off the field, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf.

Mizzou clearly caught the attention of the national football community in 2007, as the Tigers began the season unranked but quickly darted up the charts with wins over 2007 bowl teams such as Illinois, Texas Tech and Colorado. And after the Tigers defeated arch rival Kansas on Nov. 24th, Mizzou stood atop the college football world, ranked number one for the first and only time since 1960. Mizzou was featured on the covers of virtually every prominent national sporting publication, including *Sports Illustrated*, *The Sporting News* and *USA Today*.

His success has led to an increased commitment to his program from the University, as Pinkel was awarded with a new five-year contract in November of 2006 that will keep him on the Tiger sidelines through the 2011 season. With winning seasons in 2003 (8-5), 2005 (7-5), 2006 (8-5) and 2007 (11-2), Pinkel is the first MU coach to achieve four winning seasons since Warren Powers.

Pinkel and his program successfully built on the momentum created from a thrilling 38-31 win over South Carolina in the 2005 Independence Bowl that saw his Tigers overcome a 21-point deficit. The landmark win marked the largest come-from-behind win in school history, and it gave Mizzou only its second bowl win in the last 24 years.

Pinkel has led Mizzou to four bowl games, and that puts him in select company, as he joins Don Faurot, Dan Devine, and Warren Powers as the only coaches to guide MU to four bowl games. After beating Nebraska in 2007 for the 3rd time in 5 years, Pinkel became the first MU coach since Al Onofrio to defeat the Huskers three times. His Tigers also made history in 2008 with their landmark 52-17 win at Nebraska, as it was MU's first win in Lincoln since 1978.
