



State of Tennessee

The undersigned Commissioner and Surveyor duly authorized have agreed to the terms of the late Cherokee Treaty concluded at the City of Washington on the twenty seventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, surveyed and laid off to George Lowry six hundred and forty acres of land on the North side of Tennessee River, on Hollow Creek. Beginning at two elms and a horn beam, on the East side of said creek; thence East two hundred and twenty poles to a stake at the foot of a rocky mountain (crossing the Public road) at a

hundred and eight poles; thence South (crossing a  
rocky spur of said mountain) one hundred and sixty  
poles to a sugar tree; thence South sixty four degrees  
East twenty eight poles (along the foot of said mountain  
to a stake; thence East ninety poles to a hickory saw  
wood and forked beech, on the side of the mountain;  
thence South two hundred and twelve poles to a birch  
and elm; thence West three hundred and twenty poles  
to a hornbeam; (crossing said creek three times) thence  
North three hundred and seventy eight poles to the  
beginning (crossing the creek at one hundred and ninety  
four poles) including his improvement as near the end  
things as possible surveyd the 31<sup>st</sup> day of January 1820-
