



State of Tennessee

The undersigned Commissioner and Surveyor (duly authorized) have, agreeably to the terms of the late Cherokee Treaty concluded at the city of Washington on the twenty seventh day of February one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, surveyed and laid off to Edward Gunter two six hundred and forty acres of land on the North side of Tennessee River. Beginning at an ash, ironwood and yellow oak on the bank of the River; one hundred and twenty poles above said Gunter's ferry landing; thence North two hundred and ninety six poles to a post oak in the end of a glade; thence

At three hundred and twenty poles to a black gum
tree (crossing the public road at forty one poles, a branch
at ninety poles and Black's branch at one hundred and
sixty five poles) thence south three hundred and eight
poles to a stake on the bank of the river near a
marked ash and huckleberry; thence up the river as
it meanders three hundred, and thirty four poles to
the beginning: including the improvement as near the center
as possible. Surveyed the 9th day of February 1820.
