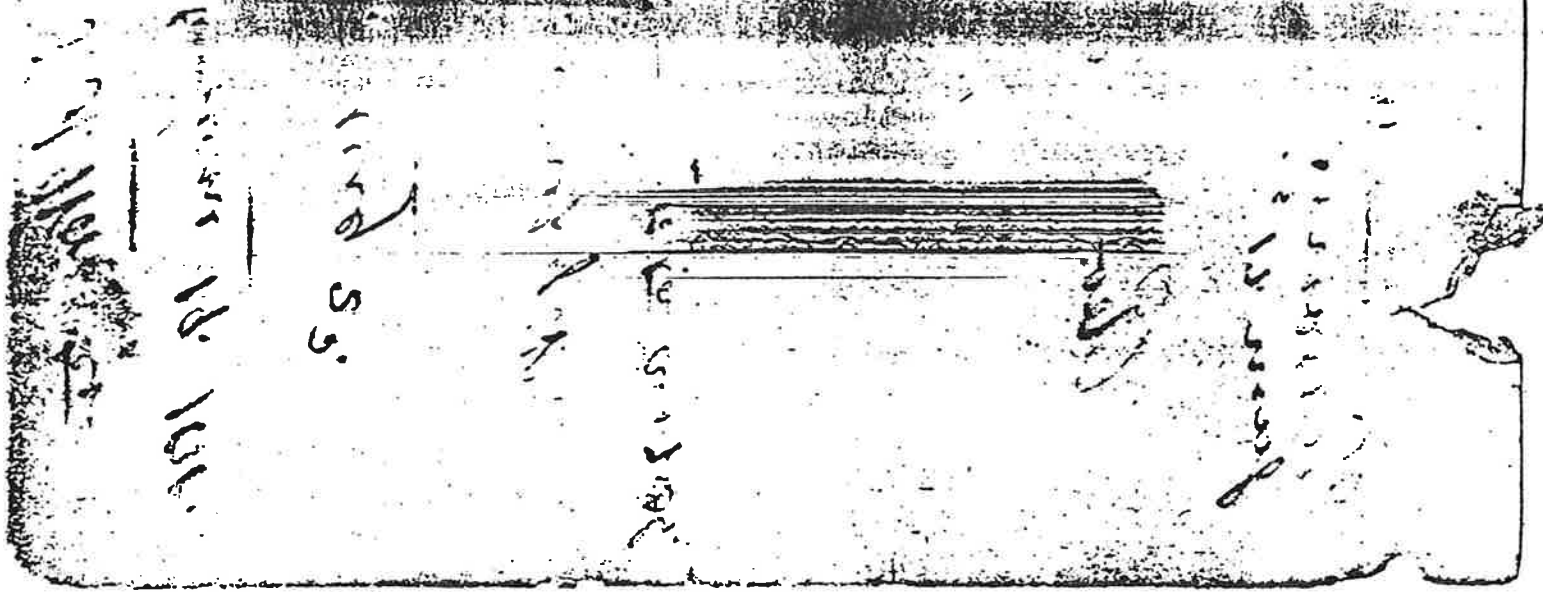

- 1 The artist will please correct deformities.
- 2 The name of the map was designed, of course, to be parallel with the margin.
- 3 In the name of the map place the last letter, Y, a little nearer to the S.
- 4 In the names of Vermont and New Hampshire reduce a little the size of the letters.
- 5 Let the little circles which represent cities and towns be about the size of that which represents the city of Charleston.
- 6 In names of rivers, let the letters be of about the size which they appear, viz. the size of minion small capitals, except the name of St. Francis river in Mississippi & Arkansas, and of Illinois or in Arkansas, D.V.F.S., which make in smaller letters.
- 7 Let the names of cities and towns be lettered as small as is consistent with being distinctly legible say about as they appear in the name of Philadelphia 00250.
- 8 In lettering with the pen I have been the less particular, because I suppose the artist can find better copies in the printed letters than I can give with the pen. The following list will help to show the forms of the letters,

which the artist will reduce to the required size. Of the letter G which occurs often, the large letter in the name of the map is the best specimen. For of the letter P.

Consonant sounds.

g nearly as in English, but approaching to k, and nearly as in English, but approaching to t.
 k, l, m, n, q, s, t, w, y, as in English.
 Syllables beginning with g, except s, have sometimes the power of k, and s, are sometimes
 sounded to, tu, tv; and syllables written with tl, except r, sometimes vary to dl.
