


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ANGULAR VELOCITY OF PLANETS ACCORDING TO BHASKARACHARYA

Much like most of the asuras, the power got to Taraka's head and he went on to take over the world and no one could do anything to stand against him.

Back in the mountains where he resided, Shiva was as usual engaged in a deep tapas and would hardly notice Parvati; the daughter of Himavan who sought him as her consort. The king of all the devas, Indra, got together with Kamadeva to execute a little plan, the goal of which was to disrupt Shiva's deep state and charm him with serious

thoughts of love. So, Kamadeva slowly approached Shiva with intent to disturb his meditation, but right as he was about to make his move; Shiva's divine third eye opened, engulfing Kamadeva in primordial flames until he was burned to an ash. Rati, Kamadeva's wife, pleads and begs Shiva to forgive and restore Kamadeva, to which Shiva promised that he would be restored to life in the Dwapar yug.

After these events, Chitrakarma the commander of one of the Rudra Ganas (Lord Shiva's Ganas) started playing with the ash of the burnt Manmatha and fashioned a doll out of it. He took this doll to Lord Shiva. Lord Shiva's intentions are indeed unfathomable, because as soon as the doll neared him, it morphed into an actual little boy and the boy prostrated before Lord Shiva and Chitrakarma. Chitrakarma, who was overwhelmed with joy, gave the boy (Bhanda) the Upadesha of Shatta-Rudraya Mantra and asked him to undertake penance. More time passed and when the penance reached the fruition stage, Lord Shiva appeared before him. The boon he wanted was; "Any opponent that faces me shall do so with only half of their strength, while the other half would belong to me. And no weapon or creation should ever have the power to bind me into submission." Lord Shiva granted the boon and added, "I am also bestowing on you the boon of ruling the kingdom for sixty thousand years". After giving these boons, Lord Shiva quickly disappeared back to the mountains.

Bhanda joined the asuras and started doing just the opposite of Kamadeva's work; he spread hatred, made beings and people dry of energy. Bhandasura attacked Indra and conquered the heavens. Indra

then decided to pray to Tripura Sundari for 60000 years, at the end of which she finally agreed to help him. She took her army and marched towards the realm that was previously ruled by Indra. There, Tripura Sundari and her army faced Bhandasura and his full scale army. Devi's commanders dealt with Bhandasura's generals efficiently and crushed them, turning the tide of the war. An angry Bhandasura dispatched his 30 sons with a much much larger army. Tripura Sundari's Bala wanted to fight and take them all and in the following battle that ensued, the 30 sons of Bhandasura were swiftly taken, as they couldn't withstand the might. She then rained arrows upon arrows like hellfire, to the point where their vision and hearing were fully clouded by a flurry of arrows. Once that bout wiped out the entire force that was in front of her, she summoned her extensive form to continue the battle.

Tripura Sundari is also known as Lalita, meaning soft and beautiful. So Bhandasura laughed at her, saying that someone as beautiful and soft as her shouldn't be doing something such as battle. The battle between Bhandasura and Tripura Sundari was unconventional to say the least. It wasn't a direct handheld battle; Bhandasura conjured then reanimated older demons of great power, and Tripura Sundari would recreate the very forms that several of the great gods had taken to destroy those demons. Bhandasura created Hiranyakashipu (Asura), and she created Prahlada and Narasimha. Bhandasura created Ravana, and she made Rama. Bhandasura created Mahishasura, and She created durga. The battle between Mahishasura and Durga has

been beautifully described in the Brahmanda purana. Then one of the generals of Bhandasura, named Vishnukra, used a yantra called the Jayavighna, which took away the will to fight from the armies of Tripura Sundari. The Generals of Tripura Sundari Manthini and Dhanapta informed this to Her. But then Lord Ganesha, also known as the Vighneshwara, weakened the force of the Jayavighna yantra, and the armies got their strength back.

Vishnukra deploys the weapon called the Trishna astra, and the armies of Tripura Sundari become extremely thirsty. That's when Manthini suggests calling Sura Sindhu (The river of liquor) to quench the thirst of the entire army. And so finally, Tripura Sundari kills Bhandasura. Rati, the wife of Kamadeva or Bhandasura, pleads with her to restore his life. Because Kamadeva is the lord of desire and that there would be no desire without him, so she, in her infinite divinity and kindness, restores the life into Kamadeva in the Dwapara yuga.

She is Tripura Sundari. She is the iccha shakti (will), gyana shakti (wisdom) and kriya shakti (action) in this entire eternity.

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


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
