## **Thundering Herd Fall Notes**

### **Notes from Middle Tennessee**

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore running back Brenden Knox and senior lineman Levi Brown on offense, and senior linebacker Omari Cobb and senior lineman Channing Hames on defense.

After Saturday's win, Middle Tennessee trails the all-time series with Marshall, 5-4.

Marshall senior offensive lineman Levi Brown started his 42nd career game, which pushes him into the top 25 in program history in career starts. Brown is tied with Ryan Bee (2015-2018), Darryl Roberts (2010-14), Charles Henry (1971-74), Mark Brookover (1972-75) and John Spellacy (1985-88).

After Saturday's loss, Doc Holliday is 7-3 in Conference USA opens in 10 seasons as Marshall's head coach.

Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green threw an interception in the first quarter, snapping a streak of 59 consecutive pass attempts without an interception.

Also in the first quarter, MU QB Isaiah Green connected with tight end Armani Levias for a 75-yard touchdown. The catch was Levias' first touchdown this season, the fourth of his career and the longest reception of his career. On the play, Levias surpassed his single-game best for receiving yards (previously 69 yards at Virginia Tech in 2018). The 75-yard play is also Marshall's longest this season.

Marshall junior Jackson White, a quarterback and holder on special teams, completed his first career pass after an errant snap on a field goal attempt. White's pass went 6 yards and gave Marshall a first down. In the fourth quarter, White attempted – and completed – another pass on a fake field goal attempt.

Marshall quarterback Isaiah Green set a new single-game career-high for rushing yards with 95. Green's previous best game came on Sept. 14 against Ohio (50 yards). Green's rushing total is the third-most by a quarterback in the Doc Holliday era (since 2010).

On a third quarter play, Marshall senior defensive back Kereon Merrell recorded a sack and forced fumble when he hit Middle Tennessee quarterback Asher O'Hara on third down. That was the first sack and forced fumble in Merrell's career at Marshall.

Redshirt junior Simino Walden rushed for 12 yards on a play in the third quarter, Walden's first career carry.

The 48-yard reception by Marshall junior receiver Willie Johnson in the fourth quarter was his longest reception of the season.

Marshall senior linebacker Omari Cobb set a new single-game career high for tackles with 12.

### **Holliday Moves to the Top**

Marshall head coach Doc Holliday led the program for the 121st time against Middle Tennessee, moving past Cam Henderson (1935-49) for the top spot on MU's all-time list. The Herd's victory over Ohio was career win No. 72 for coach Doc Holliday. He currently sits second on the school's all-time list behind Bob Pruett (94, 1996-2004). Holliday (65) is also six wins shy of breaking Pruett's (70) school record for victories over FBS programs.

### **First Quarter Dominance**

Marshall's first quarter scoring advantage over the opposition since the beginning of the 2018 season is 139-66. Herd opponents have managed six touchdowns and eight field goals during that stretch (18 games). The Thundering Herd has now won 20 of its last 21 games when scoring first and has won 11 of its last 12 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 40-2 when scoring first.

### **<100**

Marshall has not allowed a 100-yard individual rusher in 17 of its last 19 games.

### **Stingy D**

The Herd has won 38 of its last 43 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 23 of its last 24 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Fourteen (14) times in Doc Holliday's eight-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 13-1 (.929) in those games. Marshall is 27-3 (.900) under Doc Holliday when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

### **Feel the Rush**

The Herd is now 39-6 (.867) in the last six-plus seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 31-5 (.861) the last six-plus years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 11-0 under Doc Holliday when rushing for 300+ yards, as it did with 305 in the 33-31 win over Ohio.

### **30+**

Marshall's 33 points in the win over Ohio makes the Herd 41-3 (.932) in its last 44 games when scoring 30+ points. All of those games are under Doc Holliday.

### **50+**

Marshall's 56-17 win over VMI in 2019 was the 17th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, two more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

### **Protecting the Home Turf**

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 82.1 percent (161-35) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fifth-highest mark in the country.

### **Herd Finishes under Holliday**

Since Doc Holliday became head coach in 2010,

the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 55-8 (.873) when it scores first, 50-8 (.862) when leading after the first quarter, 59-4 (.937) when leading at halftime and 59-4 (.937) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall was won 45 of its last 47 contests (2016 vs. Charlotte, 2018 vs. Middle Tennessee) when it has the halftime lead.

### Hang on!

It's easy to see why Herd Coach Doc Holliday talks about ball security so often. His ten Marshall teams have provided a strong indicator of why turnover margin is so important. Holliday's Herd teams have a combined 72-49 (.595) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 40-9 (.816). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 16-7 (.696). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 16-33 (.327).

Of Marshall's 121 games under Holliday, the Herd has played 59 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 44-15 (.746) in those games.

Marshall is 22-4 (.846) under Holliday when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better.

Marshall is 21-5 (.808) under Holliday when it has zero turnovers, and the Herd has won eight of its last nine when it does not make a miscue (Cincinnati, 2019). Marshall has won 11 of its last 12 (Cincinnati, 2019) when winning the turnover battle and the win over Ohio was the seventh straight win when the MU quarterbacks have two-plus touchdowns without an interception.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving Holliday nine consecutive wins when his team forces four or more turnovers.

### Perfect Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has never lost to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is a perfect 13-0 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington. Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

### Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2018 featuring an .846 winning percentage (12-2) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least five appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Doc Holliday is 6-0 in bowl games with the Thundering Herd and has appeared in 27 bowls since entering the coaching ranks.

### Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Doc Holliday is 12-3 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

### Notes from Cincinnati

The game captains for Marshall were sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green and junior offensive lineman Cain Madden on offense, and senior defensive lineman Marquis Couch and senior defensive lineman Channing Hames on defense. Green, Madden and Hames were captains for the first time.

The game against Cincinnati was the 120th in Doc Holliday's head coaching career at Marshall, making him the all-time leader in games coached in program history. Cam Henderson coached 119 games from 1935-1949.

After Saturday's win, Cincinnati leads the all-time series 9-4-1.

The official attendance was 32,192 – the 13th largest crowd in Joan C. Edwards Stadium history.

Cincinnati scored on its opening possession, the first time this season the Marshall defense allowed a first quarter touchdown.

The fourth quarter touchdown run by Marshall sophomore Sheldon Evans was the first of his career.

Junior receiver Willie Johnson scored on a 40-yard run in the fourth quarter, the longest rush by a Marshall player this season and the longest run of Johnson's career. It was also Johnson's first career touchdown run.

Marshall's Nazeeh Johnson (13) and Omari Cobb (11) each set career highs for tackles.

Sophomore linebacker Domenick Murphy had his first career fumble recovery.

### Notes from Ohio

True freshman Broc Thompson and redshirt freshman Corey Gammage received their first career starts at wide receiver. Marshall started three freshmen receivers for the first time this season.

Junior tight end Xavier Gaines lined up at quarterback for one play in the first quarter, and raced 26 yards for a touchdown to open scoring. The run was Gaines' longest of his career. Gaines finished with a career-high 52 rushing yards and a season-high 53 receiving yards. Gaines became the first Marshall player to have a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same game

since Hyleck Foster did so against Middle Tennessee in 2016.

Sophomore tight end Devin Miller caught his first collegiate touchdown pass. The 22-yard reception is also the longest of his college career.

Senior tight end Armani Levias tied a career-high with five receptions.

Brenden Knox led the way with 133 rushing yards. That's his fourth 100-yard rushing game in eight appearances carrying the ball. He has scored a rushing touchdown in five consecutive games. Knox's 100-yard effort is the 56th under Coach Doc Holliday. Devon Johnson had the most 100-yard rushing games under Holliday with 12.

Sophomore running back Sheldon Evans set a new career-high with 77 rushing yards. Sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green finished with 50 rushing yards, also a career best.

Senior linebacker Tyler Brown finished with seven tackles, his best single-game total in his collegiate career. He entered Saturday with seven career tackles.

Marshall was penalized only twice for a total of 20 yards - the two penalties are the fewest Marshall has incurred in a game since drawing only two flags against Miami (Ohio) in 2014.

Marshall had 305 rushing yards against the Bobcats, the 11th time the Herd has eclipsed 300 rushing yards as a team this decade. Marshall is 11-0 in those games.

The 5:42 that Marshall ate up in the final drive is the longest that the Herd has ever been able to ice the ball to protect a one-score lead. The 10 plays in that final drive matches the most Marshall has ever had in that same situation. That surpassed the previous mark of 4:56 that Marshall ate up at the end of the 27-21 win over Miami (Ohio) in 2001.

#### **Notes From Boise State**

The game captains were junior offensive lineman Alex Mollette and sophomore running back Brenden Knox on offense, and senior defensive back Chris Jackson and senior linebacker Omari Cobb on defense.

Marshall opened scoring with a touchdown run with 1:02 left of the first quarter, but the loss snaps the team's 19-game win streak when scoring first.

Senior linebacker Tyler Brown received his first career start. Friday night's game was Brown's 20th appearance at Marshall.

Sophomore running back Brenden Knox scored on a 13-yard run in the first quarter, extending his streak of consecutive games with a touchdown to four games, dating back to last season.

Senior defensive end Marquis Couch recorded his first sack of the season, which gave him 6.0 for his Marshall

career.

The third quarter interception by senior linebacker Omari Cobb is the first for him this season and the second of his career.

Fermin Silva, a senior playing in his second game at Marshall, was credited with his first sack with the Herd and forced a fumble on the same play that was recovered by fellow defensive lineman Sam Burton.

Boise State running back George Holani rushed for 103 yards, snapping Marshall's streak of not allowing an individual 100-yard rusher at 15 games.

#### **Notes from VMI**

Isaiah Green threw a career-high four touchdown passes against VMI. The last time a Marshall quarterback tossed more TD passes was when Chase Litton threw six against Morgan State in 2016. Green completed 18 of 28 passes for 238 yards with four scores and one interception. He also rushed eight times for 46 yards. Marshall's 56 points scored marked the Herd's most since that 62-0 win over Morgan State and the 620 yards of total offense were the Herd's most since gaining 630 yards at Charlotte in 2015.

Talik Keaton's 67-yard punt return (the 26th-longest in program history) for a touchdown against VMI was Marshall's first since Deandre Reaves' 69-yarder for a score against FIU in 2015 and also the longest punt return since that one by Reaves. Keaton's 109 punt return yards (5 att.) against the Keydets are the eighth-most in school history and were the most by a Marshall man since Damone Williams had five returns for 140 yards at Ohio in 1998.

Eleven different players had a reception and 29 players recorded a tackle.

The Herd did not allow a 100-yard rusher for the 15th consecutive game.

Running back Brenden Knox, who scored twice, has had at least one rushing touchdown in three consecutive games dating back to last season.

Linebacker Tyler Brown recorded his first career sack.

Artie Henry's 51-yard touchdown catch was the longest reception of his career.

Marshall had 35 first downs, its most since recording 31 against Akron on September 17, 2016.

#### **Obialo Named to Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List**

Marshall wide receiver Obi Obialo was named to the Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Watch List.

The honor recognizes the top offensive player in Division I football who also exhibits the enduring characteristics that define Earl Campbell: integrity, performance, teamwork, sportsmanship, drive,

community and tenacity; specifically, tenacity to persist and determination to overcome adversity and injury in pursuit of reaching goals. In addition, the nominee must meet one or more of the following criteria: born in Texas and/or graduated from a Texas High School and/or played at a Texas-based junior college or four-year college.

Obialo, a Coppell, Texas native, finished the season with 42 receptions for 505 yards and four touchdowns. In 2018, he was named a team captain four times and started all 13 games.

The Watch List announced today will be narrowed to up to 16 semifinalists in November and then up to 5 finalists in December. They will be selected by broadcasters, commentators, journalists, fans, and previous winners. The finalists will be brought to Tyler for The Earl Campbell Tyler Rose Award Banquet scheduled for January 15, 2020.

### **Beardall Named to Patrick Mannelly Award, Senior Bowl Watch Lists**

Matt Beardall has been selected to the Patrick Mannelly Award Watch List, an honor that is presented annually to the best long snapper in the FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision). Later in the fall, he was named to the Senior Bowl Watch List as well.

Beardall was a preseason All-Conference USA selection this season after garnering first-team honors a year ago. He enters 2019 having made 34 consecutive starts at the position.

The winner must be of senior standing, have started 75% of games in his senior year, snap on punts and placements, and demonstrate a strong mentality, notable athleticism, as well as speed, accuracy and consistency in their snaps.

The award is determined by a committee comprised of former NFL long snappers, punters and kickers, special team coaches, as well as snapping instructors, NFL player agents and sportswriters.

Semifinalists are chosen on Monday, November 16 and finalists will be announced the following Monday.

The winner will be announced on Saturday, December 14.

### **Knox Named to Wuerffel Award Watch List**

Marshall running back Brenden Knox was named to the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy Watch List.

It was the second preseason honor for the Columbus, Ohio native, who was previously named to the AFCA Good Works Team Nominee List earlier this summer.

The Wuerffel Trophy, known as "College Football's Premier Award for Community Service," is presented each February in Fort Walton Beach. Named after 1996 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Danny Wuerffel from the University of Florida, the Wuerffel

Trophy is awarded to the FBS player that best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement.

Semifinalists for the award will be announced on November 5 and finalists will be announced on November 18. The formal announcement of the 2019 recipient will be made at the National Football Foundation's festivities in New York City on December 10. The presentation of the 2019 Wuerffel Trophy will occur at the 51st All Sports Association Awards Banquet on February 14, 2020 in Fort Walton Beach.

Knox, a second-team all-conference preseason pick by Athlon, exploded toward the end of 2018, ripping off 578 rushing yards and four touchdowns in the final five games of the season. In fact, his 297 rushing yards in December led all of college football. He averaged 115.6 yards per game in those final five games, which would have ranked No. 8 nationally for the entire season, but his rushing average includes production from all 13 games because he played on special teams.

### **Brown Adds Outland Trophy Honor**

Marshall center Levi Brown was named to the Outland Trophy's Watch List on Tuesday. The honor is given annually to the nation's top interior lineman (offensive or defensive).

It was the second preseason honor for the Thundering Herd's Franklin, Georgia native after he was given a Rimington Trophy Watch List (top center) nod last week.

Brown was also named a preseason All-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon earlier this summer.

The recipient of the 74th Outland Trophy will be announced during ESPN's The Home Depot College Football Awards on Dec. 12, live from the College Football Hall of Fame in Atlanta. The official presentation to the winner will be made at the NFID Outland Trophy Awards Dinner sponsored by Werner Enterprises and produced by the Greater Omaha Sports Committee on Jan. 15, 2020. Up to eight semifinalists will be named on Nov. 20 in Omaha and three finalists for the award will be announced on Nov. 25.

### **Jackson Named to Thorpe Award List**

Marshall defensive back Chris Jackson was named to the Jim Thorpe Award Preseason Watch List.

The honor is given annually to the best defensive back in college football.

Jackson, who was a preseason all-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon, earned postseason all-conference honors for the third consecutive season in 2018. He finished the year with 61 tackles (40 unassisted), one interception, 15 pass breakups and one fumble recovery.

The award recipient is selected by the Paycom Jim Thorpe Award National Selection Committee, which

boasts members of the NCFAA, an Oklahoma Sports Hall of Fame in-house award committee, former Paycom Jim Thorpe Award recipients, and sportswriters and college football journalists throughout the country.

The 2019 Paycom Jim Thorpe Award winner is selected from three finalists and will be announced at The Home Depot College Football Awards Presented by Gildan on Thursday, December 12, 2019, on ESPN. The Paycom Jim Thorpe Award commemorative banquet will be held on Tuesday, February 4, 2020, in Oklahoma City.

### **Brown, Levias Named to Preseason Watch Lists**

Marshall center Levi Brown (Rimington Trophy) and tight end Armani Levias (John Mackey Award) have each been named to preseason watch lists at their respective positions.

Brown, who has been named to the list three times, was named a preseason All-Conference USA selection by the league's coaches and Athlon this summer. Levias, who was named to Athlon's second team, caught 20 passes for 258 yards and three touchdowns in 2018.

Conference USA's media corps picked the Thundering Herd to win the East Division earlier this week, to the tune of 14 first-place votes. North Texas was the top selection in the West with 20.

### **Marshall Picked First in C-USA's East Division**

Marshall Football has been picked to win the East Division, according to a panel of media members in a poll conducted and released by the Conference USA office Tuesday afternoon.

The Thundering Herd welcomes back nine starters on offense and five on defense from a squad that finished 6-2 in the conference last season. Quarterback Isaiah Green was named co-Freshman of the Year after averaging 245 yards per game with 15 TD passes in 10 outings. In addition to four returning starters on the offensive line, led by senior All-C-USA C Levi Brown, the Herd brings back a pair of productive rushers in sophomore Brenden Knox (578 yards and 4 TDs in the final five games last year) and junior Tyler King (the team's leading rusher the last two seasons). The Marshall defense did not allow a 100-yard rusher all of last season and senior DL Channing Hames and LB Omari Cobb will lead the way up front, while CB Chris Jackson spearheads the secondary.

Marshall garnered 14 first-place votes, while FIU had nine and Florida Atlantic boasted three.

North Texas received 20 first-place votes in the West and is picked to win that division.

The 15th annual Conference USA Football Championship Game, pitting the champions of the East and West Divisions, will be held Saturday, Dec. 7.

### **Herd Has Four Named Preseason All-Conference**

Marshall Football had four student-athletes named preseason All-Conference USA Monday in an announcement made by the league office.

Center Levi Brown, defensive lineman Channing Hames, defensive back Chris Jackson and long snapper Matt Beardall were all recognized by the league's 14 head coaches.

Brown was a first-team pick at the end of last season and Jackson made the second team. Beardall was also named a first-team 2018 selection and Hames was also selected as a 2019 preseason first-team pick by Athlon.

The Thundering Herd will kick off its 2019 season on August 31 against VMI in Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

## **Thundering Herd By The Numbers**

**121** – Marshall head coach Doc Holliday has led the Thundering Herd in 121 games, moving him past Cam Henderson (1935-49) for the school's all-time record.

**49** – In the last six-plus seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 49 times. The Herd is 44-5 in those games, including 10 consecutive wins.

**37** – The Marshall offensive line has allowed only 39 sacks in the last two-plus seasons (30 games), and ranked in the top 25 nationally in fewest sacks allowed in each of the past two years.

**33** – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 33 times since 2010, Doc Holliday's first year with the program. The Herd is 29-4 in those games.

**29** – In the past six-plus seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 29 times. In those games, the Herd is 25-4.

**22** – The Marshall defense has allowed only two runs of 50-plus yards in the last two-plus seasons and hasn't allowed a 50+ yard carry in 22 of its last 23 games.

**21** – Since Doc Holliday took over as head coach, Marshall has won 21 out of 22 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.

**20** – The Marshall football team has now won 20 of its last 21 games (at Boise State) when scoring first.

**17** – The Marshall defense has not allowed a 100-yard rusher in 17 of its last 19 games (2019 at Boise State, Ohio).

**14** – Senior defensive lineman Channing Hames currently boasts 14 career sacks, the most of any returning Thundering Herd player. Hames, who was the New Mexico Bowl Defensive MVP in 2017, has 3.5 of his career sacks in Marshall's last two bowl games.

**7** – Consecutive bowl wins by the Marshall football team, the longest active streak in college football.

**6** – Marshall head coach Doc Holliday currently has 65 victories over FBS schools (72 total wins) as head coach of the Thundering Herd, six shy of breaking Bob Pruett's (1996-2004) all-time MU mark of 70 (94 total wins).

**4** – Marshall is one of four college football programs with bowl wins in five of the last six seasons, along with defending national champion Clemson and the Big Ten's Wisconsin.

**4** – Only four schools have a better (current home stadium) winning percentage than Marshall: Alabama, Boise State, Georgia Southern and Houston. The Herd is 161-35 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .821 clip.

**1** – With seven consecutive bowl wins, the Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum five bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-2 all-time in bowl games.

Since moving to Division I-A (FBS) in 1997, the Herd has enjoyed a pair of landmark victories against nationally-ranked opponents. ## Last Meeting vs. ODU (10/13/18)

**NORFOLK, Va.** – Foreman Field at S.B. Ballard Stadium, Old Dominion's football home, will undergo reconstruction after the season. A mostly new stadium will be built in its place, and the record books for the new venue will be wiped clean.

Marshall's final experience in the Monarchs' old digs was a good one. The Herd's defense is a big reason why. The run game provided a major assist.

The Thundering Herd gave ODU's previously high-powered offense fits and senior running back Anthony Anderson rushed for three touchdowns in a 42-20 win in front of a sellout crowd of 20,118. The victory improved Marshall to 4-2 overall and 2-1 in Conference USA, while Old Dominion dropped to 1-6 overall and 0-4 in league play.

The Monarchs entered Saturday's matchup with a fearsome offense led by junior quarterback Blake LaRussa and a pair of 6-foot-3, 210-pound weapons at receiver. But the defense of first-year coordinator Adam Fuller stymied LaRussa and ODU, and the home team did not score a touchdown in the opening half for the first time this season.

ODU entered Saturday averaging 476 yards and 39 points in the last three games, which included a two-touchdown upset of No. 13 Virginia Tech on this same field. The Monarchs didn't find the same success against their visitors on a beautiful, fall afternoon here.

The Marshall defense did not allow a touchdown until 3:29 of the third quarter, when LaRussa found one of those big outside targets – Travis Fulgham – in the back-right corner of the end zone to trim the deficit to 21-10. Until then, the Herd D had its way.

ODU came up empty-handed on its first five possessions, three of which ended in punts and two others in turnovers. It wasn't until a field goal in the twilight of the second quarter that the Monarchs managed to find points. Overall, seven of Old Dominion's first eight possessions did not end in points, something that had become commonplace for the Monarchs' offense.

Meanwhile, junior quarterback Alex Thomson rebounded from his FBS debut to lead the Herd to its third road win in three tries this season. He received help from senior receiver Tyre Brady, who again wowed with an array of catches, including his sixth touchdown reception of the season. Brady eclipsed 100 receiving yards for the third time this season and sixth time in two years.

The running game was led by Anderson, who sandwiched Brady's 3-yard touchdown reception with scores from 22 and 4 yards. He added a third rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter, also from 4 yards out, to give the Herd a two-touchdown cushion. Brady and Anderson have combined for 12 of Marshall's 21 offensive touchdowns this season.

The game was in doubt until 3:05 left of the fourth quarter. After ODU scored to make it 28-20, Marshall answered with another running back, sophomore Tyler King, who dazzled for 65 yards and a touchdown for a 35-20 lead. The run more than doubled the Herd's longest rush of the season.

Then, King confirmed the result after ODU turned the ball over on downs, and scored his second touchdown of the game with a 46-yard run to boost the score to 42-20. He ended the contest with an impressive 195 yards on the ground.

The expectation might have been a shootout from the outset, but the first quarter resulted in zero points.

Each team had three complete possessions in the opening quarter, with Marshall's ending in a punt, interception and punt. ODU's interception came one play after MU senior linebacker Frankie Hernandez stripped and recovered the ball to give the Herd choice field position at ODU's 18. The Monarchs' standout defender, Oshane Ximines, came up with the interception and returned it 14 yards, shifting the momentum ODU.

The teams exchanged punts, and then the Monarchs put together the most threatening drive of the opening frame. The Monarchs drove to the MU 10 until LaRussa's pass was batted in the air by senior defensive lineman Ryan Bee, and junior safety Malik Gant corralled the ball for his first career interception.

Marshall has not allowed a touchdown in the first quarter this season.

The Herd cracked the scoring column early in the second quarter. Thomson connected with sophomore receiver Willie Johnson on a 23-yard pass – Thomson's longest of his career at that point – and then Anderson broke free on the left side for a 22-yard touchdown run. Marshall entered Saturday's game with five rushing TDs on the season, but none longer than 5 yards.

Marshall padded its lead on its next possession, a 10-play, 60-yard drive that ended with Thomson lofting a perfectly placed ball in the back left corner of the end zone that was caught by Brady, who worked his way behind the defender and hauled in the ball while falling on his back. That made the score 14-0, Herd, with 8:33 left of the second quarter.

The MU defense almost blanked the vaunted ODU offense in the first half, but the Monarchs engineered a 14-play, 55-yard drive that culminated with a 30-yard field goal by Nick Rice. Marshall led at the half, 14-3, and limited an ODU offense that had scored in double digits in the first half in five of its first six games. ODU entered Saturday's game averaging 12.8 points in the first half in the first six games of the season, but failed to score a touchdown in the opening two quarters for the first time this season.

Marshall continues Conference USA play next Saturday, Oct. 20, when defending league Florida Atlantic visits Joan C. Edwards Stadium. The Owls are 3-3 overall and 1-1 in C-USA play, and had the Saturday off before traveling to Huntington for the Herd's Homecoming and a matchup of teams picked to finish first and second in the East Division.



## Doc Holliday Head Coach - Tenth Season (72-49 overall, 45-28 C-USA)

Coach John "Doc" Holliday, who has returned Marshall University football to the national picture, enters his 10th season leading the Thundering Herd.

Marshall protected its place as college football's winningest bowl program, by percentage, and extended the nation's longest bowl winning streak to seven games following its victory over USF in the 2018 Gasparilla Bowl. Six of those wins have come under Holliday, who has the most bowl wins by a coach in program history.

In 2018, the Thundering Herd won four of its last five games to finish 9-4, the 20th time in school history a team has won as many games. It has happened six times since the turn of the century, four in the last six seasons.

Marshall's three straight 10-win seasons from 2013-15 were also a first in the 20-season history of Conference USA football.

Holliday led a resurgence in 2017, improving the Thundering Herd by five games to reach yet another bowl game under his watch.

His 2015 Herd finished 10-3 with a win over Connecticut in the St. Petersburg Bowl. His 2014 and '15 teams – with a combined mark of 23-4 – had the best record among the Group of Five programs in the two-year College Football Playoff era.

In Holliday's seven MU seasons, he has built the Herd into a perennial Conference USA contender. His teams have sported 26 All-C-USA first team selections, 22 second-teamers, 39 honorable mention picks and 22 All-Freshman team selections. He has had nine players selected for C-USA's top individual player-of-the-year awards.

Holliday's 2014 Herd (13-1) grabbed the school's first C-USA Championship with a thrilling comeback, title-game win over Louisiana Tech. MU headed to the Boca Raton Bowl, where it routed Mid-American Conference champion Northern Illinois, 52-23. The Herd finished the season in the major polls – No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press media poll. It was Marshall's first appearance in the final polls since 2002.

The Herd coach was named the 2014 Conference USA Coach of the Year in voting by his peers and Marshall boasted a C-USA-record 10 all-conference first team selections.

Holliday received a six-year contract extension (through July 2021) for \$755,500 annually on April 8, 2015.

The 2014 title season followed a successful 2013, as Marshall went 10-4, won the C-USA East Division crown and downed ACC member Maryland in the Military Bowl – the Terps' last game before heading to the Big Ten.

In December 2014, Holliday was named the 15th annual Gazette-Mail Sportsman of the Year by Charleston Newspapers. In April 2015, the Herd coach was honored as the 2014 Lowell Cade Sportsman of the Year by The (Huntington) Herald-Dispatch.

And in concert with Herd Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, Holliday has helped bring about upgrades in the Marshall non-conference schedule, with home-and-homes against Louisville, Pitt, North Carolina State, Purdue, Navy, Boise State, Cincinnati, Appalachian State, East Carolina, Akron and Ohio and a 2018 game at South Carolina, which will yield the largest guarantee in school history (\$1.4 million).

Holliday, named as Herd coach on Dec. 17, 2009 in his first collegiate head coaching job, is widely regarded as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Since he has become a head coach, he has added a reputation for finding and hiring assistant coaches who have made a strong impact on his program. He has more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stops at Florida, North Carolina State and West Virginia, his alma mater.

In 2011, the Herd went 7-6 against the 16th-toughest schedule in the nation, a slate that was ranked second among non-BCS schools. Two of those victories came against eventual C-USA champion Southern Miss and Big East co-champ Louisville, the latter coming on the road for the program's first non-conference road win since the early 2000s. Marshall also won five Conference USA games, the most for the program since it had joined the league in 2005.

During his coaching career, Holliday has coached in 26 bowl games and three national championship games. He also has coached five All-Americans.

A native of Hurricane, W.Va., Holliday was born April 21, 1957. He was a three-year letter winner as a linebacker at West Virginia (1976-78) and has earned bachelor's (1979) and master's (1981) degrees from WVU. He won a West Virginia state wrestling title at 175 pounds (all divisions) in 1975 at Hurricane High.

Holliday and his wife, Diana, have four children – Meghan, Cade, Chase and Cody.
