Thundering Herd Fall Notes

Notes at Middle Tennessee

Attendance for Saturday's game was 15,806.

Marshall senior offensive lineman Will Ulmer started his 49th career game, tied for No. 13 in school history.

Freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored twice in the first half, making him the 13th player in program history to score two or more touchdowns in three consecutive games. Ali has scored at least one touchdown rushing, receiving or on a return in all five games this season.

Senior receiver Willie Johnson recorded a season long 47-yard catch.

Junior linebacker Abraham Beauplan recorded his 100th career tackle.

Senior defensive lineman Jamare Edwards recorded his first solo sack of the season. He has 5.5 sacks for his career.

Senior defensive lineman T.J. Johnson recorded a solo sack and now has 2.5 for the season.

Senior safety Nazeeh Johnson intercepted a pass for the sixth time in his career.

Ali had his second career 100-yard rushing game.

Freshman quarterback Grant Wells had 300 yards passing for the fourth time this season and the sixth time in his career.

Sophomore receiver Corey Gammage eclipsed 1,000 career receiving yards.

Third Quarter Stinginess

Marshall allowed its first points in the third quarter in the loss at Middle Tennessee, although the Herd DEFENSE has still yet to yield any points in the third period.

Vroom!

Marshall ranks No. 4 in the nation in total offense at 539 yards per game and is seventh with 370 passing yards per game.

Marshall has:

- 13 plays of 40+ yards (second nationally)
- 101 plays of 10+ yards (5th nationally)
- 34 plays of 20+ yards (10th nationally)
- 16 of 30+ yards (11th nationally)

Individually, Ali leads the nation with his 13 touchdowns, 11 rushing scores and his 15.6 points per game.

Wells ranks No. 6 in the nation with his average of 341 passing yards per game.

Sacks and TFLs

Through five games, Marshall is No. 2 in the nation in total quarterback sacks (20) and in quarterback sacks per game (4.0). In overall tackles for loss, Marshall is No. 6 in the nation with 43 of them, and also No. 6 with an average of 8.6 per game.

Coin Toss Slide

Marshall has lost the coin toss in each of its first five games of 2021. The Thundering Herd won the toss prior to the final four games of the 2020 campaign.

Bowl Prowess

Marshall enters 2021 featuring a .750 winning percentage (12-4) in all NCAA-sanctioned bowl games, the highest mark nationally among programs that have made at least seven appearances. (The Thundering Herd also participated in the 1948 Tangerine Bowl, at which point it was not sanctioned). The leaders are below:

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 81.8 percent (171-38) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the fourth-highest mark in the country of any program that has played more than seven games in its current facility.

Hang on!

Since the beginning of the 2010 season, the Thundering Herd has posted a combined 87-57 (.604) record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 47-12 (.797). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 20-8 (.714). When the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 20-37 (.351).

Of Marshall's 144 games in that span, the Herd has

played 73 while committing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 55-18 (.753) in those games.

Marshall is 25-5 (.833) when it has a turnover margin of +2 or better.

Marshall has won nine in a row when winning the turnover battle by three or more.

Marshall is 27-7 (.794) when it has zero turnovers, and the Herd has won 14 of its last 17 when it does not make a miscue. Marshall has won 18 of its last 22 when winning the turnover battle and the 2020 win over Middle Tennessee was the 10th straight win when MU quarterbacks have two-plus touchdown passes without an interception.

The Thundering Herd had five takeaways in 2018 wins over Eastern Kentucky and Florida Atlantic, giving the program nine consecutive wins when it forces four or more turnovers.

First Blood

The Thundering Herd has now won 34 of its last 37 games when scoring first and has won 22 of its last 25 when leading after the first quarter. Related: since the beginning of the 2013 season, the Herd is 54-4 (.931) when scoring first.

Defensive Numbers to Know

The Herd has won 50 of its last 58 when holding offenses to 5.0 yards per play or fewer. The Herd has won 32 of its last 35 when allowing fewer than 300 yards. Twenty-one (21) times in the last 11-plus seasons has the Herd allowed 125 yards passing or fewer. Marshall is 18-3 (.857) in those games. Marshall is 33-4 (.892) when the defense does not allow a rushing touchdown.

Feel the Rush

The Herd is now 51-9 (.850) in the last eight-plus seasons when rushing for 150+ yards and 38-6 (.864) the last eight-plus years with 200+ on the ground. All-time, Marshall is 11-0 since 2010 when rushing for 300+ yards, as it did with 305 in the 33-31 win over Ohio in 2019. Marshall's 20 rushing first downs in the 2020 59-0 win over ECU was the most for the program since 24 versus Morris Harvey in 1925.

30+

Marshall's 30 points in the loss at App State makes the Herd 52-5 (.912) in its last 57 games when scoring 30+ points.

50+

Marshall's 51-10 win over UMass in 2020 was the 19th time that the Thundering Herd reached the 50+-point

plateau under coach Doc Holliday, four more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Herd Finishes

Since 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 69-10 (.873) when it scores first, 61-10 (.859) when leading after the first quarter, 73-6 (.924) when leading at halftime and 74-7 (.914) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall has won 59 of its last 63 contests when it has the halftime lead.

Strong Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has lost just once to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is 13-1 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington (Rice, 2020). Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and two victories over UTSA (2013, 2018).

Feeling the Sunshine

Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Marshall is 15-4 in games contested in the state of Florida and/or against Florida schools.

Notes at App State

App State's offense had an interception and a lost fumble, giving Marshall a plus-two turnover margin. The Thundering Herd had won 10 consecutive games – dating back to 2015 - when having a turnover margin of plus-two or better.

Marshall senior tight end Xavier Gaines had his first career 100-yard game, finishing with a career-best 104 receiving yards. Gaines' receiving touchdown was his first this season.

Gaines had the first 100-yard receiving game by a Thundering Herd tight end since Gator Hoskins' 104-yard output on Dec. 17, 2013 vs. Maryland.

MU freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored for the fourth consecutive game.

Ali's 97-yard kickoff return for a touchdown was his first return of the season and was Marshall's first kickoff return for a touchdown since Keion Davis returned two of them for TDs against Miami (Ohio) on Sept. 2, 2017 (97 and 99 yards).

Herd receiver Shadeed Ahmed set career highs for receptions (four) and receiving yards (81).

Marshall senior receiver Willie Johnson's 41-yard catch was a season long.

The 61-yard punt by MU's Robert LeFevre tied a career long set last season.

Herd kicker Shane Ciucci saw his first action of the season, booting 3 of 4 field goals, including a career long of 46 yards.

Linebacker Eli Neal had his first career forced fumble and second career fumble recovery.

Defensive back Micah Abraham had his first interception this season (second of his career).

Notes vs. ECU

Attendance for Saturday's game at Joan C. Edwards Stadium was 24,833.

Marshall had won 10 consecutive games when scoring first.

The first quarter reception of 49 yards by Marshall's Corey Gammage is the longest of his career. Gammage also posted his first career 100-yard receiving game (180).

Thundering Herd running back Rasheen Ali scored on a 49-yard run in the third quarter, the longest run of his career. Ali also had his first career 100-yard rushing game (189). That rushing total is the most for a Marshall man since Brenden Knox ran for 220 yards at Florida Atlantic in 2019.

MU quarterback Grant Wells passed for at least 300 yards for the third consecutive game, the first Herd QB to accomplish that feat since Rakeem Cato, who threw for 300-plus yards against Purdue, Tulsa and Southern Miss during the 2012 season. Wells now has five career 300-yard passing games (13 career games).

Wells' 433 passing yards against East Carolina is the most for a Marshall man since Chase Litton threw for 486 yards at Charlotte in 2015.

Marshall cornerback Steven Gilmore recorded a second quarter sack, his first this season.

Senior defensive back Cory McCoy recovered his first fumble at Marshall (fourth of his collegiate career). McCoy also recorded his first sack at Marshall.

Herd receiver Willie Johnson had season highs in receptions (three) and receiving yards (66), and caught his 11th career touchdown.

MU running back Sheldon Evans had a career long reception of 56 yards and established a new career high with 65 receiving yards.

Notes vs. North Carolina Central

The Thundering Herd won its 11th consecutive home opener.

Marshall won by 30-plus points in the first two games of the season for the first time since 2013.

Marshall snapped the ball 101 times against the Eagles. The last time the Thundering Herd snapped the ball 100 times without overtime was in 2012 against Houston.

Grant Wells notched several career highs with his 48 attempts, 34 completions and his 344 yards.

Marshall running back Rasheen Ali caught nine passes for 55 yards and one TD. The only time a Marshall running back caught more passes in a game was when Ahmad Bradshaw snared 10 at UCF in 2005. Ali is the only one in the Herd book with 9.

Sixteen different Marshall players caught passes. The most different Herd receivers to catch passes prior to this game was 13 of them at West Virginia in 2012.

Marshall's 39 first downs is a new Thundering Herd record. The previous record was 37 first downs, accomplished three different times.

Marshall's defense allowed NC Central only one third down conversion in 13 tries.

Notes at Navy

Charles Huff is the first Marshall head coach to open on the road and win.

The 42-point margin of victory is the largest in program history in a season opener against a Football Bowl Subdivision team, besting the 38-point win against Miami (Ohio) to open the 2013 season.

Marshall won by 42 points on the road for just the sixth time in its history.

Attendance for Saturday's game at Navy-Marine Corps Memorial Stadium was 30,121.

Marshall had three first-time starters on offense: sophomore receiver Shadeed Ahmed; freshman lineman Logan Osburn; and junior lineman Kendrick Sartor.

The Thundering Herd had six on defense who started their first game at Marshall: senior end Shane Simmons; junior linebacker Charlie Gray; sophomore safety E.J. Jackson; senior safety Cory McCoy; sophomore end Sam Burton; and freshman lineman Jayshaun Coffman.

Marshall won its regular season opener for the ninth consecutive season.

The Herd defense finished with nine sacks, the second most in a single game in program history (Record: 12, vs. Ohio, 1986).

Sophomore receiver Talik Keaton matched a career long reception of 47 yards on the first play of the game. Keaton also established a new single game career high for receiving yards (100).

Freshman running back Rasheen Ali scored his first collegiate touchdown. Ali finished the day with four touchdowns on the ground. The last Herd player with four rushing touchdowns in a game was Devon Johnson vs. FAU in 2014.

Senior linebacker Brian Cavicante recorded his first sack at Marshall.

Freshman defensive tackle Jayshaun Coffman recorded his first collegiate sack.

Senior defensive lineman T.J. Johnson recorded his first sack of the season and second of his Herd career.

Senior kicker Andrew Sanders scored the first points of his Marshall career.

Junior running back Sheldon Evans had his first career multi-touchdown game (two) and now has seven career touchdowns on the ground.

Sophomore linebacker Eli Neal recorded three sacks after compiling 1.5 total sacks in his first 23 games with the Herd.

Junior defensive back Steven Gilmore recorded his fourth career interception.

Sophomore receiver Corey Gammage established new career highs for receptions (seven) and receiving yards (94).

Junior defensive back Keylin Roach recorded his first interception at Marshall.

Freshman receiver E.J. Horton caught a 30-yard pass from Luke Zban, Horton's first career reception and

score.

The last time Marshall blocked two kicks in one game was in the 28-25 win at Florida International in 2018. In that game, Juwon Young blocked a Panther field goal attempt, and Brandon Drayton blocked a punt and fell on it in the end zone for a touchdown.

Football Gameday Experience Upgraded for Thundering Herd

Marshall Athletics announced significant changes in and around Joan C. Edwards Stadium aimed at enhancing the football gameday atmosphere for fans.

Marshall's 2021 home opener is set for Saturday, Sept. 11 against North Carolina Central. Kickoff is set for 6:30 p.m.

"Our objective this offseason was to explore every opportunity to improve the gameday experience for the best fans in college football," said Jeff O'Malley, the Interim Director of Athletics. "We have implemented changes to the pre-game environment outside of the stadium and added elements to the in-game experience that we know our fans will appreciate."

A list of the gameday improvements follows:

Thunder Street

A concert stage and food vendors highlight a new area on 20th Street between 3rd and 5th Avenue. Although West Lot pass-holders will still be able to access parking via the two 20th Street entrances, the area between those two gates will be closed to through traffic. That area will feature a concert series sponsored by West Virginia Lottery, as well as multiple food vendors, beer and an inflatable 'M' for fan photos. The inflatable 'M' is sponsored by Mountain Health Network.

Thunder Street will open four hours prior to kickoff and close 45 minutes prior to the start of the game. Through traffic on 20th Street will reopen at approximately halftime of the game.

Concessions

A new point-of-sale system will be available at all food concession vendor stands inside Joan C. Edwards Stadium. With this new technology, as well as improved operational infrastructure, there will be a substantial increase in speed of service for stadium guests. Additionally, two new vendors will occupy space within Joan C. Edwards Stadium this season: Midway Drive In, with its famous hot dogs and more, will occupy Stand No. 2 on the West concourse. Truckin' Cheesy, with its unique scrumptious fare, will

be located at Stand No. 9 on the East concourse.

AT&T Tower

As part of its continuing network investment to support growing demand for advanced wireless devices and services, AT&T is installing a new cell tower on the east side of Joan C. Edwards Stadium. This tower, when operational, will improve AT&T's coverage throughout the stadium and in the surrounding community.

Fireworks

A new pre-game and in-game element will be fireworks and pyrotechnics. The displays will be included in the pre-game team entrance and following Thundering Herd touchdowns.

DJ Herd That

An exciting addition to the in-game environment is the debut of DJ Herd That, a student who won the opportunity to assist with in-game music selections. The DJ, sponsored by Dr. Pepper, will be located behind the student section on the walkway behind Section 119.

Additionally, the Thunder Walk will change slightly this season. Football players and staff will exit the buses on the corner of 20th Street and 3rd Avenue, walk down 20th Street toward the Thunder Street event area, and then enter the West Lot at the entrance closest to 3rd Avenue. The players will then walk through the West Lot, as in previous years, toward the northwest ramp and enter the stadium.

Re-entry will be allowed at Joan C. Edwards Stadium in 2021.

"We're really excited about the upcoming season, not only for a chance to hit the field but also the new fan engagement opportunities that we are rolling on this season," said Charles Huff, Marshall's first-year head football coach. "These additions will help improve the gameday experience for all fans and make gameday here in Huntington an elite experience for everyone."

The Sept. 11 regular season home opener will be broadcast by ESPN+. The Thundering Herd will also host East Carolina (Saturday, Sept. 18), Old Dominion (Saturday, Oct. 9), FIU (Saturday, Oct. 30), UAB (Saturday, Nov. 13) and WKU (Saturday, Nov. 27).

Thundering Herd By The Numbers

62 – In the last eight-plus seasons, the Marshall offense has scored 30 or more points 62 times. The Herd is 55-7 in those games and has won 21 of its last 23 when doing so.

59 – Marshall has won 59 of its last 63 games when holding the halftime lead.

54 – Since the beginning of the 2013 season, Marshall has won 54 of its last 58 games when scoring first.

50 – Marshall has won 50 of its last 58 contests when holding the opposition to 5.0 yards per play or fewer.

40 – The Marshall defense has allowed only three runs of 50-plus yards in the last four-plus seasons and hasn't allowed a 50+ yard carry in 40 of its last 42 games.

39 – In the past eight-plus seasons, Marshall quarterbacks have been interception-free 39 times. In those games, the Herd is 33-6.

38 – The Marshall offense has scored 40 or more points 38 times since 2010. The Herd is 34-4 in those games.

24 – Marshall has won 24 out of its last 25 games when rushing for at least 250 yards.

22 – Marshall has won 22 of its last 25 games when leading after the first quarter.

15 – Marshall has won 15 consecutive games when holding the opposition under 100 rushing yards.

10 – Marshall has won 10 of its last 11 games (dating back to 2015) when being +2 or better in turnover margin.

3 – Only three schools have a better current home stadium winning percentage than Marshall (of those who have played more than seven games): Alabama, Georgia Southern and Boise State. The Herd is 171-38 at Joan C. Edwards Stadium, which opened in 1991, winning at an .818 clip.

1 – The Marshall football program continues to rank No. 1 nationally in bowl winning percentage (minimum seven bowls to qualify). The Herd is 12-4 (.750) all-time in bowl games.

0 – The number of points Marshall's DEFENSE has allowed in the third quarter this season.

0 – The number of coin tosses Marshall has won in 2021.

Marshall vs. Ranked Opponents

Since moving to Division I-A (FBS) in 1997, the Herd has enjoyed three landmark victories against nationally-ranked opponents. Marshall as a Ranked Team

Since moving to Division I-A (FBS) in 1997, the Herd has faced 25 opponents as a member of the Associated Press Top 25, winning 21 times. Those game-by-game results are below.

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. – The Marshall coaching staff placed an emphasis on the team's offensive performance in the red zone and protecting the football. The Thundering Herd was a perfect 3-for-3 in its trips inside the 20, and there was nary a turnover at Joan C. Edwards Stadium on Saturday afternoon.

But in Marshall's 31-17 win against Old Dominion, the boys in the trenches deserve their share of the praise, too. On both sides of the ball, the Herd (3-3 overall, 1-1 C-USA) knocked the Monarchs around in trend-defying, record-breaking ways.

The Marshall offense gained 236 yards on the ground – 105 more yards than the ODU defense had allowed in any game this season, including games against Virginia and Virginia Tech. Meanwhile, the Herd defense recorded eight sacks, tied for the second-most in school history, and defensive end Darius Hodge tied a 33-year-old school record with four-and-a-half sacks.

"That's a defense that nobody all year long, including Virginia and Virginia Tech, ran the ball on that defense like we were able to today," Marshall coach Doc Holliday said. "That offensive line, I've told you all along that I've liked our offensive line. They blocked that team out there better than anybody has all year."

ODU (1-5, 0-2) had held all five of its opponents under 150 rushing yards this season. Virginia Tech rushed for 131 yards on the ground on Sept. 9, and Virginia was held to a measly 69 rushing yards. But the Herd offensive line bullied the Monarchs' defense, and the three-headed sophomore rushing attack of running back Brenden Knox (104 yards), quarterback Isaiah Green (59 yards) and running back Sheldon Evans (50 yards) followed their lead.

Old Dominion entered Saturday afternoon's game allowing an average of 2.94 yards per rush attempt, but Marshall averaged 5.1 yards on 46 carries, which included two kneel-downs at the game's end.

"As an offensive line we're starting to gain more and more confidence every week knowing that we're able to go out and do what we do best and move people around from Point A to Point B, and have fun doing it," said Levi Brown, Marshall's starting center along the offensive line. "We've got a fun group of guys on our o-line who love doing what we do."

The defense had its way with the Monarchs, too.

ODU had 206 yards of total offense – 83 on the ground and 123 through the air. The Monarchs played two quarterbacks – Messiah deWeaver and Stone Smartt – and each player was sacked four times by the Marshall defense.

Hodge tied a school record set by Cecil Fletcher on Sept. 13, 1986 at Ohio. He also tied two others for the third-most sacks in Conference USA history, equaling the 4.5 sacks by Louisiana Tech's Houston Bates against Illinois in 2014, and FAU's Martin Wright against FIU in 2013. The league record is six, held by Memphis' Keaton Cromartie (1997 vs. Memphis).

"He's a talented guy," Holliday said. "He's good off the edge ... We're going to need that out of him the rest of the season. He's a high motor guy who plays hard."

Hodge started doing is damage early. The 6-foot-2, 238-pound sophomore from Wake Forest, North Carolina, sacked ODU quarterback Stone Smartt on the opening drive for a 3-yard loss to set up a third-and-long situation, and the Monarchs punted one play later. On ODU's third possession, Smartt was again tracked down by Hodge behind the line of scrimmage, this time for a 12-yard loss that turned a third-and-long situation into fourth-and-26 and another punt.

In the second quarter, sacked ODU quarterback Messiah deWeaver for a 6-yard loss on the Monarchs' third drive of the game. That sack forced a fourth down punt.

Hodge teamed with junior linebacker Tavante Beckett for a sack of deWeaver early in the third quarter, and then Hodge tied the record with another sack of deWeaver in the fourth quarter.

The Marshall offense avenged last Saturday's performance of production without points. The Herd scored first on a 1-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Isaiah Green to sophomore tight end Devin Miller that followed a 33-yard connection from junior tight end Xavier Gaines, his first career college completion, to freshman receiver Broc Thompson to the 1.

That lead swelled to 14-0 on a 17-yard run to the right by Green, who faked out the ODU defense and followed his receivers blocking downfield for a touchdown with 8:40 left of the second quarter. That put Marshall up 14-0.

The ODU offense finally broke through with 6:17 left of the second quarter when deWeaver found Aaron Moore down the right sideline for a 44-yard touchdown to make it 14-7. The teams traded field goals in the final 11 seconds, first Marshall and then ODU, to make it 17-10 at halftime.

Even though the Herd held a one-score lead, it dominated the first half statistically. Marshall had 13 first downs to ODU's four, and 233 yards of total offense to the Monarchs' 106.

Marshall dominated time of possession, 36:00 to 24:00, and gained 27 first downs to ODU's 11.

The Herd extended its lead to 14 points, 24-10, when junior receiver Willie Johnson took a pitch and ran 27 yards for a touchdown. Johnson came from the right side of the field and found a crease between the blocking of fellow receiver Tavin Richardson and left tackle Will Ulmer, who had kicked out on the play. It was Johnson's second rushing touchdown of the season.

ODU cut the deficit to 7 points, 24-17, on a 24-yard run by Kesean Strong with 7:01 left of the third quarter, but never threatened again. Knox scored on a 6-yard touchdown run with 3:55 left, punctuating a 10-play, 77-yard drive that chewed five minutes and 48 seconds off the clock.

The Herd had the ball for 10 minutes and 22 seconds of the final quarter.

"The offensive line kind of got into a groove," Knox said. "Everything went smoother in the second half."

Thompson led Herd receivers with career-highs in receptions (six) and receiving yards (91). Beckett paced the defense with a career-high 14 tackles, and he, safety Brandon Drayton, defensive end Marquis Couch, defensive tackle Channing Hames, linebacker Tyler Brown and defensive lineman Jamare Edwards each contributed to the total of eight sacks.



Charles Huff (2-3 Overall, 0-1 C-USA) Head Coach - First Season

Charles Huff was named Marshall's head football coach on January 17, 2021.

An elite recruiter and developer of talent, Huff's proven track record bolstered head coach Nick Saban's staff for the 2019 and 2020 seasons.

In his inaugural season in Tuscaloosa, Huff helped Najee Harris rush for a career-best 1,224 yards on 209 carries with 13 rushing touchdowns while catching 27 passes for 304 yards and seven more scores. Brian Robinson Jr. added 441 rushing yards and five scores while then-freshman Keilan Robinson added 254 yards and two touchdowns. In 2020, Harris was a consensus All-American who led the nation in total touchdowns (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and points (180). He also ranked third nationally in rushing yards (1,466) and holds the school record for total touchdowns (57), rushing touchdowns (46) and rushing yards (3,843).

Huff arrived in Tuscaloosa after one season (2018) as the assistant head coach, run-game coordinator and running backs coach at Mississippi State. He boasts 16 years of coaching experience on both the NFL and college levels with stops at Penn State (2014-17), Western Michigan (2013), the Buffalo Bills (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), Hampton (2010), Maryland (2009) and Tennessee State (2006-08).

His one season in Starkville produced an effective rushing attack that averaged 223.6 yards per game to rank second in the SEC and 20th nationally. Kylin Hill and Aeris Williams carried the load at running back, averaging 6.3 and 6.2 yards per carry, respectively, while quarterback Nick Fitzgerald led the team in rushing with 1,121 yards and 13 touchdowns.

A native of Denton, Maryland, Huff spent four seasons (2014-17) as Penn State's running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He recruited and developed one of the game's most electrifying players in running back Saquon Barkley, who in 2018 became the highest drafted NFL running back since Reggie Bush went No. 2 overall in 2006.

Barkley, who was called with the second overall pick by the New York Giants in the 2018 draft, produced a dynamic rookie season, rushing for 1,307 yards and 11 touchdowns. He added 91 receptions for 721 yards and four more scores to amass 2,028 yards from scrimmage on his way to Offensive Rookie of the Year honors at season's end.

Numerous records fell at the running back position and on special teams under Huff's guidance at Penn State. Barkley, a 2017 consensus All-American, became the first Big Ten running back in history to win Offensive Player of the Year honors twice. A Walter Camp National Player of the Year finalist, Barkley ranked second nationally in all-purpose yards in 2017 (2,329). He broke four school career records, including rushing touchdowns (43), total touchdowns (53), all-purpose yards (5,538) and consecutive games with a touchdown (15) in just three seasons.

The 2016 campaign saw the Nittany Lions claim the Big Ten Championship and it was Huff who mentored two record-breakers. Barkley broke the Penn State sophomore record for rushing yards (1,496), all-purpose yards (1,972) and points scored (132), while junior kicker Tyler Davis collected All-Big Ten first-team honors after tying the league's single-season record for kicking points (128) and breaking the school record for field goals by a junior (22) and consecutive field goals made (18).

Huff recruited Barkley to Penn State, and his freshman season of 2015 was spectacular. The Freshman All-American broke the school's single-season freshman rushing record with 1,076 yards. He was named the Big Ten Network's Big Ten Freshman of the Year in the process.

He spent the 2013 season at Western Michigan as the running backs coach and helped the unit nearly double its rushing yards from 2012. The Broncos ran for 1,394 yards in 2013 after running for just 735 yards the year before.

Huff spent the 2012 season in the NFL as the assistant running backs coach for the Buffalo Bills. He helped C.J. Spiller to his first career 1,000-yard rushing campaign and a Pro Bowl invitation.

In 2011, Huff was on James Franklin's 2011 staff at Vanderbilt as the offensive quality control coach. Huff and Franklin also worked together at Maryland in 2009, when Huff was the assistant offensive line coach. Huff also mentored NFL first-round pick Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie as the tight ends and special teams coach at Tennessee State from 2007-08.

Huff graduated in 2005 from Hampton University where he served as a team captain, starting 12 games at center as a senior in 2005. He also played guard, fullback and tight end in his career.
