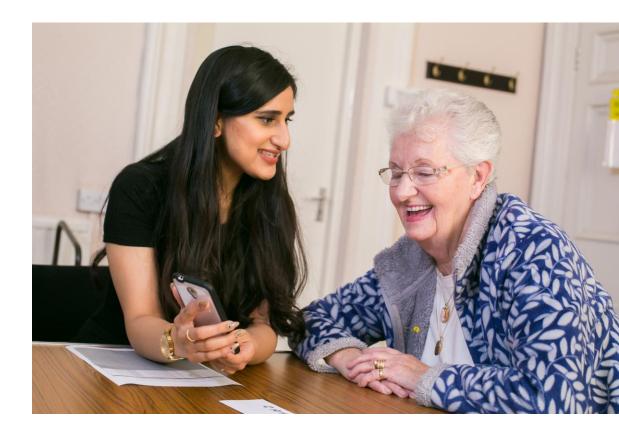
Model overview

Turf Works recruited and trained 5 young Digital Champions who now regularly support a local over 60's group with their digital skills.







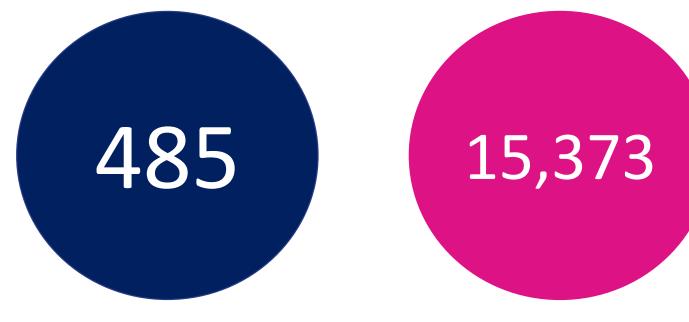
For example...
