Christmas 2020—Light in the Darkness

You don't need me to remind you that 2020 has been a dark year, with huge problems with health, politics and the economy. Above everything is the environmental emergency of the climate crisis. As so often, it is the poor who suffer most. I do hope and pray that all our world leaders put the same effort into stopping our carbon pollution, as they've put into combatting COVID.

'Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light'. The light still shines, and that is our hope.

Remember the promises of scripture:

The light (of the eternal Son of God) shines in the darkness (John 1:5).

There was the true light, that shines on every person, coming into the world (John 1:9).

I am the light of the world. The person who follows me will not live in darkness, but will have the light of life (John 8:12)

So may we confidently pray:

'Without you, Lord Jesus, we walk about in darkness. But you are the true light. We turn to you again and find life. Come, Lord Jesus. Amen'



Church Services - Exceptional Circumstances

Livestreaming of worship will continue.

We continue to live in exceptional circumstances and, because of COVID, we need to be extremely cautious. A programme of vaccinations may soon begin, but we are still some months away from being safe. The relaxing of restrictions between August and October led to a multiplying of infections.

Looking at our situation in All Saints, we recognise that most of our congregation are in the "at-risk" category, either through underlying health issues or by being over 65 years (which includes both the clergy). For this reason, we need to continue to be cautious.

Therefore the clergy, wardens and Church Council have agreed the following:

- Times for Individual Prayer in Church on Thursday mornings (10.30am to 12.30pm) and Sunday afternoons (2-4pm) will continue.
- There will be a physical live and livestreamed service of Holy Communion on Christmas Eve, 11.30pm, subject to capacity and COVID protocols. **To register for this service (see page 21).**
- Likewise a physical service of HC will be held, at St Antony's, on Christmas Day at 9.30am, subject to protocols. Not livestreamed. To register for this service (see page 22).
- All other services will continue to be virtual and livestreamed, WITHOUT CONGREGATION, including on Sundays 6, 13 [Christingle], 20, 27 December and 3 January, as well as the Carol Service (which has been recorded), and the 5pm Crib Service (which will be livestreamed).

Of course I do realise that this is a difficult decision. Some of you will have wished to meet in church, physically, as normal, and will be disappointed. However, we are faced this year with exceptional circumstances and need to remain cautious. We are making great progress in our livestreaming abilities, and are encouraged that so many are joining in our worship services online from their homes. God has opened up for us new opportunities to share with others the message of hope through our Lord Jesus Christ.

There will be a Churches Together Advent Carol Service at Holy Family on 13th at 2pm. The service will be live streamed (Access via Holy Family website).

If you have access to the internet, do join in Sanderstead's 2020 Online ADVENTure https://calendar.myadvent.net/?id=c91b586038e1b7906e778ba33a5e5084 A very big `Thank you' to Anne Fixter, Chris Newman and all who have worked so hard and so creatively to produce high-quality videos of Christmas around the world.

We are making a big splash with publicity this year – there's a huge banner near the corner of Onslow Gardens, and a big Nativity Crib outside the church. Come and have a look! Plus, you can follow the Advent Trail in the churchyard, with Points to Ponder for each day in December.

Finally, let us continue to pray for our church and nation, and for all in our community who face particular problems. The Archbishops have called on Anglican Christians to be active in prayer. If you need any help at all, with anything, please contact me or Jeremy in the first instance.

I pray you all have a Happy Christmas and a joyful New Year.

May God shine his light on you all.

Biggin Hill & I. by Barbara Hodges



At the beginning of the year I promised Rosanne that I would write an article for the Parish News about my duties as a volunteer and the Battle of Britain Museum at Biggin Hill.

Fast forward 11 months and 2 lockdowns later I have fulfilled my promise. So much is different in our world, but give or take the masks, the gloves, the one way system and the table service in the café, the Museum and the Chapel are the same.

The Museum opened in February 2019 and initially I was assigned duties in the café, but following an inspection by Food Standards, volunteers were banned from the kitchen. I did a couple of sessions in the Museum, but felt woefully inadequate to respond to technical questions on aircraft engines and stalling speeds! In early May I did a 4 hour shift in the Chapel and felt comfortable immediately. Since then I have covered about 2 Sunday mornings per month and normally attend the Service there at 9.30am and remain there until about 1.30pm.

The original Chapel was constructed from 3 pre-fabricated huts that formed a singular rectangular unit. The unveiling and dedication of the Chapel was in September 1943. Sadly this building was destroyed by fire in 1946. Sir Winston Churchill felt strongly that a more permanent chapel should be built. Sufficient funds, essentially from private donations, were raised and in 1951 the present building was dedicated.

Much of the Chapel furniture such as the Communion silver, hymn boards, choir pews etc. were gifts in memory of those who died while serving at Biggin Hill or by local residents who are anxious to maintain a permanent memorial.

There are many interesting features in the Chapel and I recommend a

visit. The Chapel is open from Tuesday to Sunday and there is no charge for entry. There is a charge however for a visit to the Museum, currently \pounds 5.

To return to the Chapel, the Sanctuary contains the Altar and the 6 panels of the Reredos on which are recorded the names of the 453 men who lost their lives on operations from the airfields in the Biggin Hill Sector. The Altar frontal is a copy of the original from 1943, and the Bible survives from the fire, but was only discovered in 1980.

One of the very special features in the Chapel are the 12 Hugh Easton stained glass windows. The details of these splendid designs are worthy of an article in their own right. All but one of the windows were given by individuals or companies in memory of specific people or groups of people. The exception is the window funded anonymously in memory of those who have no known grave.

The floor of the Chapel is unusual in that it is made from plywood off cuts. The official history disputes the story that these were offcuts from wooden propellers manufactured before and during the war before metal blades became standard. However, a visitor some years ago, who had been a carpenter at Biggin Hill validated the `off cuts' theory.

The font is an especially beautiful piece, the bowl is made from a single sheet of cast aluminium and has a glorious ring if struck gently.

St George's Room at the back of the Chapel is now part of the museum and contains a cornucopia of memorabilia. For the major festivals such as Battle of Britain and Remembrance Sundays, the glass doors are rolled back and chairs rolled in to double the capacity of the Chapel. I attend these services and have been privileged to construct flower arrangements which augment the beauty of the Chapel.

There is a regular service at the Chapel each Sunday at 9.30am which is attended by a rather sparse congregation, but they are always very welcoming and I have joined the Friends of Biggin Hill Chapel who have worked tirelessly over the years to maintain the Chapel and the Memorial Gardens until it was absorbed by the Museum authorities.

As at today's date (11 November) the Museum and the Chapel are closed, but I am sure they will re-open at the earliest opportunity.

Warlingham Almshouses looking for a new Trustee

The Trustees of Warlingham Almshouses are looking for a new Trustee from Sanderstead. You can find out more via Google. If you are interested in this, please contact the Rector. Here's a piece that was written fairly recently:

Harmon Atwood died more than 300 years ago. The almshouses associated with his name stand prominent on the north side of the school common They provide homes for 4 residents.

Harman Atwood built his almshouses in 1675 on the site of a "little old house" occupied by a Mr George Rowe. Two of the houses were to be allotted to the poor of Warlingham and one each to the parishes of Sanderstead and Chelsham. Two upper rooms were allocated to the curate, to be appointed by the vicar with the stipulation that the curate would have to be a bachelor.



Certain poor people living at Crewes were to be specifically excluded for some reason connected with the assessment for rates. 10 shillings a year was allocated to buy firewood and a box was to be placed on the door inviting charitable donations. Nowadays the Almshouses are administered through a Trust of 12 people appointed by the Churches and local Councils including the London Borough of Croydon. The original deeds of the almshouses are being held by the National Westminster Bank.

The Trustees employ a Warden. They have a Chairman and designate someone to be Secretary and someone to be Treasurer. The Trustees meet three or four times a year.

The trustees use their discretion when allocating the houses to new applicants. The original six units have been adapted and now there are only four. Residents do not pay rent, because charities cannot accept rent. Instead they pay for "maintenance". Normally they will be receiving their 'benefit' from the state and Tandridge Council also makes a contribution.

The Trustees also administer the Mission Room Hall which faces Chapel Road on the north side of the almshouses. At one time it was used for instruction on the catechism given by the curate. But then the hall was used as a school room. In 1807 there were 18 children by voluntary subscription and 12 'gratuitously educated' which would make 30. Goodman, writing in 1904, describes one teacher as a "well-loved little woman" called Sally Sampson who taught needlework, planted flowers around the school and was well remembered by some of his older contemporaries. Sally had served since 1815 and died around the time the room was enlarged in 1857. A new teacher was appointed. In 1874 a new school with 75 scholars was opened on the opposite side of the common. The hall was used as a laundry, then for the holding of Church Services and now as a Hall available for hire and bringing in an income of about £100 a year.

In 1901 some restoration work was carried out on the Almshouses and coins of Charles II NS William and Mary were found under the floor boards.

On the south side of the almshouses facing Leas Road there are two blue plaques. One on the west being a millennium mark given for environmental excellence and one on the east giving the date of the building as 1673. Charles Godman gives the date of building as 1875 and the date of the deed of gift as 18th November in that year, - just in time for it to be signed by the good Harman Atwood whose bones were interred the following year after his death on 16th February.

MU participates with daily prayer in the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence

Throughout the campaign, they will be joining around 6,000 organisations from approximately 187 countries who participate in the campaign, to raise awareness of, and call for an end to, gender-based violence in all forms and in all societies. With the increase of domestic abuse during the COVID19 pandemic this is an appropriate time to hold in prayer all who suffer from abuse.

A few Gender-Based Violence Facts & Figures

- In the year ending March 2019, in the UK and Ireland, 2.4 million adults aged 16 to 59 had experienced domestic abuse within the last year
- In the UK and Ireland 80 women were killed by a current or ex-partner between April 2018 and March 2019 a 27% on 2017/18.
- The UK police receive a call every minute about domestic abuse, 89 percent are about a woman being abused by a man .
- 20% of children in the UK have lived with an adult perpetrating domestic violence
- The overwhelming majority of domestic abuse cases are not prosecuted; in the UK only 8% will end in conviction.
