Jeremy writes...

"He is not here. He has arisen!"



It's been a long, dark year hasn't it! Sometimes, it's felt as dark and hopeless as any tomb could ever be. And Mary, visiting the tomb of Jesus on that first Easter morning, must have trudged her way in utter despair. Imagine the heaviness of her heart!



"The Morning of the Resurrection" by Sir Edward Burne-Jones

In an evocative, imaginative reconstruction of the scene, entitled "The Morning of the Resurrection" the Victorian artist, Sir Edward Burne-Jones, captures the power of historical interpretation through art and beauty.

The tomb is represented simply as a red stone casket in contrast to the traditional image of a rock sealed with a large stone.

Mary's face bears a look of ecstatic joy and wonder at the moment he utters her name. She herself appears to have dressed for a cold, bleak morning, probably with no expectation of seeing her risen Lord. In that moment of recognition, she clings to the rock for support.

The awareness and luminosity of the angels is beautifully captured, and whereas other artists portray the risen Christ in majestic splendour, Burne-Jones - remembering that Mary had just mistaken him for the gardener - emphasises his simplicity and humility - newly risen, yet to be glorified.

There is an indescribable beauty about Easter Sunday morning. For us, coming as it does after a year of being locked down and feeling as if the light of dawn would never arrive, it feels especially poignant. It tells of hope after despair, rejoicing after sadness, life after death.

There's an old hymn by Robert Lowry which we hardly ever sing nowadays, and it goes like this:

Low in the grave he lay, Jesus my Saviour,

waiting the coming day, Jesus my Lord!

Up from the grave he arose; with a mighty triumph o'er his foes; he arose a victor from the dark domain, and he lives forever, with his saints to reign. He arose! He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose!

Vainly they watch his bed, Jesus my Saviour, vainly they seal the dead, Jesus my Lord!

Death cannot keep its prey, Jesus my Saviour; he tore the bars away, Jesus my Lord!

Surely that's a good reason to rejoice this Eastertime: *He arose! Hallelujah! Christ arose*! I, for one, will go with that!
