#### Jeremy writes ...

Like a candle flame, Flick'ring small in our darkness. Uncreated light shines through infant eyes

God is with us, alleluia, God is with us, alleluia, Come to save us, alleluia, Come to save us, alleluia, Alleluia!



As we celebrate, once again, the coming of Jesus Christ, God's Son, we remember his birth in the little town of Bethlehem - like a candle burning in pitch-darkness. The songwriter, Graham Kendrick, uses these simple words to testify to, *"The light that shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it...the true light, which enlightens everyone, is coming into the world"* (John 1).

Kendrick also wrote another well-known song: "Shine, Jesus, shine, Fill this land with the Father's glory. Blaze, Spirit, blaze, Set our hearts on fire". This Advent, as we welcome the light of the world, I'm sure many candles will be lit. Candles are so important and form a big part of our Christmas tradition. They are important, too, at other times. When we light our paschal candle each time we celebrate a baptism, we are reminded of the light of the risen Christ which we celebrate on Easter Sunday. We light smaller candles from it, and give the light to the newly baptised with the words: "God has delivered us from the dominion of darkness and has given us a place with the saints in light…you have received the light of Christ; walk in this light all the days of your life. Shine as a light in the world to the glory of God the Father."

At the time of writing this, at the end of November, I have already done two school Advent assemblies and the younger children are already getting excited about welcoming Jesus, the light of the world. Why is it, I wonder, that so many of us dread the run-up to Christmas? Even some members of the clergy aren't immune to complaining about the seasonal workloads and stresses! Maybe we all just put under too much pressure to conform to the commercial and secular trends and demands. Why not this year just stand back and enjoy the richness, the wonder and the rejoicing.

It's all too easy to get sucked into an endless round of activities at this time of the year. There are celebrations to enjoy on the recreation ground as the Sanderstead lights are switched on. There is a special Christmas Carol Memorial service which has been organised by our friends from Ebbutts. There are bell-ringing concerts, carol services, crib services, toddler services, a Midnight Communion and another Communion service on Christmas Day. There are Mother's Union meals, Home Group socials, carols to be sung at Waitrose, outreach activities happening or being planned by Home Groups - the list goes on. It's great to be a part of such a thriving, happy Church Community. But for goodness sake, remember the reason for the season! I, for one, intend to take some time to "stand and stare" and be in wonder at what God has done in the incarnation. The fact that God has come to be "with us" in Emmanuel never ceases to amaze me!

This month, we welcome back Martin and Emma from their Sabbatical. They've been enjoying some time ministering in Paris, and we look forward to hearing more from them - be gentle with them, and give them a smooth and welcoming re-entry!

Sandra and I are extremely grateful to you all for the support you have given us over the past three months. We, too, are looking forward to what God has in store for us in the coming year - who knows what is planned? As I reminded those who gathered recently at the Thanksgiving Service for our dear friend Ivy Robinson, our own navigational skills might not be terribly strong, but like her, we can know and trust the one who himself said, *"I am the Way, the Truth and the Life".* 

Have a wonderful, amazing and peaceful Christmas, a very Happy New Year and keep that light shining!

## **Fresh Encounters**



#### The Fellowship of the Holy Spirit

This was the theme of the most recent Fresh Encounters evening service at All Saints' Church. It was the third in a series of services exploring the prayer we know as The Grace. The first one, in September, looked at 'The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ'. The second, in October, was a joyful celebration of 'the Love of God', and this, the third, drew us in to 'The Fellowship of the Holy Spirit.'

The picture shows the focal point created in St Catherine's aisle. On the wall we see the doves, which symbolise the coming of the Holy Spirit to the assembled disciples at Pentecost. On the altar table is the Rublev icon of the Trinity and the fabrics pick up the colours of the three figures. There is also a chalice, reminding us that the chalice in the icon is inviting us to participate in the fellowship at the heart of the Trinity.

From the altar flows blue fabric with candles and sparkling pebbles. This represents the flow of the Holy Spirit out into the world, drawing us to the 'living water', which Jesus speaks of in John 7:37-39.

During the service we explored the fellowship of the Holy Spirit through passages of Scripture and poems. Music allowed us time to contemplate what it meant for each of us. We also heard excerpts from the works of Franciscan theologian Richard Rohr and from C. Baxter Kruger, who in his book The Shack Revisited, says this: **"To describe the Spirit is like trying to count the waves of the ocean or photograph the air." But "The Holy Spirit is about** *Life."* 

According to the scriptures, Jesus was conceived by the Holy Spirit, baptised in the Spirit, led and empowered by the Spirit, given great joy by the Spirit, cast out demons by the Spirit, heard his Father in the Spirit, and offered himself to the Father by the power of the Spirit. ...

As the One who gives life, the Spirit is inherently about relationship.

From the day of Pentecost on, the Spirit is everywhere and in to everything, but never visible and always completely unpredictable. She is alive and powerful and constantly moving. She inspires witness to Jesus and works within the deepest trenches of the human heart and its wounds. Or, perhaps I should say, she works within the root system of the garden of our souls."

Moments of silence and personal reflection form an integral part of each Fresh Encounters service. On this occasion, a prayer meditation allowed us time to contemplate the fellowship of the Holy Spirit for ourselves.

The service ended with worship and with the Grace said together in a version that used simple movement to enhance the meaning of the words.

After taking time to ponder the words of The Grace at Fresh Encounters, that prayer will never again be simply some words to finish a meeting. The richness of its meaning will remain with us.

Fresh Encounters services happen at All Saints' Church once a month at 6pm. If you enjoy a thought provoking, contemplative, ecumenical service using the arts to draw us in to a fresh encounter with God, this is for you. Everyone is very welcome. Our congregation come from a variety of local and not so local Christian communities, some from as far away as Beckenham and Bexley to be with us. **We look forward to welcoming you at the next Fresh Encounters service on February 24**<sup>th</sup> **at 6pm.**

# "Come, let us age!" by Wanda Nash

#### **Book Review by Sheila Lovell**

Wanda was in her late seventies when she wrote this- her last book- because she was passionate about writing something candid yet positive about old age from a Christian perspective. She had an endearing love of the quirky, unusual & spontaneous, and an understanding of the profound. and poignant questions about life, and how to embrace them in the mature years. She was an original thinker yet considered herself to be a contemplative. She saw aging as a gift to be nurtured & even cherished rather than battled with & resented. It can be a chance to meet new learning curves, to enliven our skills of patience- letting go—leaving be—listening to others. We no longer have to be here & everywhere—recognise & remember tales of all I meet, or feel ashamed of having a senior moment as they are familiar to many of those with whom we spend time now. There can be a new sense of being enfolded & becoming enfolding, which is satisfying.

To begin to achieve this, Wanda says that we need to make an effort ourselves to achieve this state of mind, and what is helpful is to practise Christian Mindfulness which I personally find very helpful—that is, being present and aware—the practice of the presence of God—daily relaxation & meditation for as short a time as ten minutes twice a day, although it can be done for much longer.

What shines through all of Wanda's writing, both about aging, and latterly as she faces terminal illness, is her strong Christian faith & her confidence with Julian of Norwich, that,

"All shall be well & all shall be well & all manner of things shall be well".

#### DCC gives green light to installing screens at All Saints'

At its meeting on 21 November, the DCC approved the details of the scheme to install screens at All Saints', subject to endorsement by the PCC and obtaining the necessary faculty from the diocese.

The scheme will involve installing an electronically controlled drop down screen under the chancel arch which, when not in use, will be stored behind the top of the arch and so will not be visible from the nave area. There will be 2 small fixed screens attached to the walls at the front of the choir area of the chancel and 3 large mobile screens on stands (2 of which are already in church having been acquired for the recent Remembrance Sunday service) which will be used primarily in the North aisle, Lady Chapel and St Catherine's aisle areas. A projector for the drop down screen and a camera for transmitting services will be fitted at the back of the nave by the organ pipes, and the system will be controlled through a small table mounted mixer unit which will probably be operated at the back of the church. The total cost will be within the £25k earmarked for screens in the budget for the overall reordering project which is being financed through the Herbert legacy.

Once the screens are fully operational (which we hope will be within the next few months depending on the length of the faculty process) they will be visible from virtually every part of the church and will enable everyone to see what is going on during larger services and bring more impact and variety to our worship.


The DCC has in addition agreed that the faculty application should also cover removing the remaining seven rows of pews from the North Aisle to create some more flexible space. There are sufficient spare blue "St Catherine's" chairs available to provide replacement seating for services – similar chairs are already in use in the area behind the font where two rows of pews were removed a few years ago.

There will be regular updates on progress, and a plan showing the proposed location of the screens will be available in church shortly. In the meantime if you have any questions please contact Richard Bird Tel: 8657 – 1176 or email <u>birdrichard385@gmail.com</u>.


