Susan writes ...

By the time this is published we will be celebrating Jesus' resurrection but as I write Holy Week is fast approaching and we are preparing to remember the agony of Jesus' death. This is a time of year, which is charged with emotion – sadness, horror, weariness, confusion, amazement, joy and many more besides.



Often in this season certain films are shown or repeated on television portraying the life and death of Christ. They are often fairly comfortable 'Hollywood' viewing. But this isn't always the case. In recent weeks I have watched (or re-watched) several films including Mel Gibson's 'The Passion of the Christ' (2004). It was a film, which caused some controversy when first released not least due to the extreme violence it portrays but it is a reminder of the brutality, the agony and the love, which led to the Crucifixion. The film follows the last few days of Christ's life, through his eyes, and provides no comfort for those of a 'delicate' nature. However, the self-sacrifice; the love which led to Christ's death on the cross for our sins is all but spelt out for us and the climax of the film (not to give the story away too much) is of course, the Resurrection.

I have also watched Risen (2016) a film, which focuses on a Roman Tribune who is sent by Pilate to expedite Jesus' crucifixion and then three days later to search for his body as he investigates the rumours of a risen Jewish Messiah. The Tribune encounters the risen Christ and eventually acknowledges he will never be the same again.

Then most recently I have seen Mary Magdalene (2018). A film, which focuses on Mary and her encounters with Christ. The story of Mary is told in line with her being proclaimed "Apostle to the apostles" by the Roman Catholic Church in 2016.

Each of these films along with the many others that have been produced over the years have their critics yet each also serves to share something of the Christian message with their audiences.



The Crucifixion without the Resurrection would have meant little, and so important is the question put to the women at the tomb in Luke's Gospel 'Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he is risen!' (Luke. Ch 24 v 5-6). It is all too easy to focus on what is lost rather than what exists, or what is gained. Jesus certainly died on the cross but he rose again so that he will never be separated from those who believe; he is always with us. (cont.)

Mary Magdalene was deeply sad because she thought she'd lost for ever the person whom she loved so deeply and who had transformed her life. She stood outside weeping (John Ch 20 v 10-18) but the Lord came to her, called her by name, and showed her that he was alive and would be with her always. She was filled with joy.


The two disciples on the road to Emmaus were very confused (Luke Ch 24 v 13-35). The risen Christ came and explained the Scriptures to them and they saw everything clearly again.

The other disciples may well have felt frightened, weary or depressed. Their whole world seemed to have fallen apart. But then Jesus came and 'stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." At first they were 'startled and frightened', but when they realised Jesus really was with them, they were filled with 'joy and amazement' (Luke Ch 24 v 36-43).

The risen Christ still comes to us, however we may be feeling, and says, 'I am with you always.'

So this Easter, let our thanks and praise ring out 'He is risen, Alleluia!'

My walk reminded me that in ministry, we have those God-given cliff-top moments of seeing the bigger picture, which are quite often followed by times of feeling in the thick of it, finding our way on a slippery path, focusing on moving one step at a time.

I have to admit that without the family there, I would have taken one look at the weather conditions and opted to curl up on the sofa to watch the Winter Olympics. However, we spurred each other on and were rewarded by watching an amazing sunset. It made me ponder the importance of a team approach to the children and young people in our midst - a team that can spur each other on in all weather conditions. A team that includes parents and older members of our congregations, who can encourage each other to continue to walk with Jesus and get to know Him better as we journey alongside young people. A team that is willing to take a risk and step out in mission - a team that might be willing to risk a bear hunt!

Parish Weekend in Ashburnham 23 to 25 March 2018

Ashburnham is a beautiful place in Sussex, near Battle. A narrow road winds down a hill through woods, and suddenly you're approaching a little bridge, with a lake on either side, leading up to a surprisingly modest and modern house, set in 220 acres of land.

There were about 50 in our group, mostly from All Saints' but a few from St Edmund's and about ten folk from the Coppice Community Church in Bromley.

Peter and Davina Irwin-Clark led the weekend, with the theme of "Standing at the River."

At the Jabbok, we learnt about Jacob wrestling all night with God, when Jacob was at his wits' end – as we sometimes are, especially at 3 am.



Jacob persevered with the idea of God's faithfulness, and God never gave up on Jacob. In the end, because Jacob would not give up the struggle, God granted Jacob's wish to be blessed.

Peter and Davina reminded us that we do not always understand what God's plans are, but we are asked to trust him, anyway.

This isn't easy. At times, it can be extremely hard. Peter and Davina have two children who are grown up and happily married, but they spoke movingly about losing their son, Sebastian, to cot death when he was only six weeks old. This has had a profound impact on their lives and ministry.

At the Red Sea, we talked about how difficult it was for the Israelites to leave Egypt behind – where they had been slaves for more than 400 years. We, too, can find it hard to leave the familiar behind, even if it's "slavery."

But God says "I can change this – if you say you want it to change."

All that happened on the Saturday morning. We had free time in the afternoon. Some people went to Battle, others to Hastings, others for walks round the grounds.

In the evening, we sang Songs of Praise before enjoying a social time together. Katharine organised various quizzes and Pictionary. I joined a group playing the "Hat" game. It's a bit like charades and was great fun. Tony Robinson had us fooled when he talked of a black American preacher – who turned out to be Billy Graham.

On Sunday morning, at the Jordan, we were asked to look to the future, to the promised land. There may be difficulties. The Israelites faced two big obstacles: the river Jordan in full flood, and the fortress of Jericho. Both of them seemed impossible to deal with. But God asked the Israelites to trust him, and he led them through the Jordan. He also told them that the people in the fortress were more frightened than they were.

We, too, can put our trust in God.


