Martin writes ...

Dear Friends,

PRAYING TOGETHER

I hope you've noticed that we are holding three extra Prayer Meetings in All Saints in September; and if you've noticed, I hope you will want to come along so we can be all together in prayer.

"Why prayer?" you may ask. "Is there a crisis?" Well, it depends rather on how you define 'crisis'. Numbers attending All Saints have certainly been declining. I read only last week these sobering words:

'In the UK there are at least three major denominations on the brink of extinction as I write. Two of these organisations are currently trying to rebrand and restructure the way of their terminal decline which, of course, isn't working. But the Salvation Army [heard God's call to prayer]. In response they gave themselves to a year of 24-7 prayer. During those twelve months the tide began to turn, many Salvation Army churches began to grow again and the rains of renewal fell upon the ranks of William Booth's army. Again and again we see that there really is a big, fat, screaming "IF" hanging over the people of God in every generation: will we, or will we not, turn to God in prayer when the inevitable troubles come?'

However, 'crisis' also means "opportunities", and I believe we need to make prayer a practical priority in our church, so we can make the most of our opportunities. Here are some of them:

- * The current Sanderstead Team of All Saints, St Edmund's and St Antony's is under Review by two Archdeacons invited by the Bishop of Croydon from the diocese of Guildford. We need positive structural change.
- * Annalie Taylor starts this month as our Children & Families' Pastor. We want to help her to settle really well among us, so together we can bring the gospel of Jesus to younger generations.
- * We have brand new, excellent video screens, projector and cameras in All Saints - 21st Century technology to help us be an effective 21st Century church of Jesus Christ. We want it all to be for the praise of God. We're also waiting for the final go-ahead from the Diocesan Chancellor to remove the N Aisle pews, creating space for new things.

Will you come and pray? It's what all Christians need to do.

Fellow Trav'lers on the Road

Earlier this summer I was lucky enough to enjoy a cruise – my first one – from Southampton to the Norwegian Fjords. I wasn't expecting to meet so many people (over 3,000 passengers) on board—every meal and event spent with someone different! Surely this must be the fastest way of meeting fellow pilgrims on a wonderful, relaxing journey – albeit for the briefest of time. I must tell you that I didn't meet them all!!! Our life journeys are often like this – meeting someone new and enjoying (or not) a brief and sometimes meaningful relationship – some encounters last longer and become deeper with time.

We can read here in SPA News a few stories of pilgrimages or journeys: Paul Budgeon tells us of the life-changing experience of his pilgrimage to the Holy Land in February with Bishop Christopher, Bishop Karowei and others from our Diocese; Moira Roberts' recalls her journey through two-years of SPA training and the celebration of Ann Fahy's varied 16-year SPA ministry in her parish, as Archdeaconry SPA for Lambeth and on the Chaplaincy Team at Brixton Prison; and Wendy Stephens' work on the Chaplaincy team at High Down prison, the people she meets and ministers to in their often broken lives, bringing God's light into their darkness. They, too, are *her* companions on *her* journey, albeit for a comparatively short while.

All these experiences bring us into new relationships with one another – strangers to begin with but sometimes becoming life-long companions.

I am reminded of the hymn we often sing at our Commissioning & Re-dedication Service “*Brother, sister, let me serve you*” and in particular the second verse: “*We are pilgrims on a journey, fellow trav’llers on the road; we are here to help each other walk the mile and bear the load*”, bringing to mind those we serve in our ministry - the pilgrims in the song – indeed, fellow travellers on the road. We may not always spend a great deal of time together but our relationship with one another has a real quality of presence.

One of my favourite paintings is Caravaggio’s “Emmaus Supper” based on Luke’s Gospel (24:13-35). Often when we encounter a “stranger” we do not always recognise the Christ in that person—but as we get to know them more and listen to their story and even walk some of their journey with them, we come to realise that the Holy Spirit is alive in us all, through God’s grace and the love of Jesus. It is a huge privilege to become part of their life, and them ours, if only for a brief encounter.

At this time of year we have been taking time to enjoy the warmer, if not hotter, sunnier weather, and opportunities to get away or enjoy rest and relaxation at home, in our gardens, by the seaside or further afield in new and interesting places. We will have fresh encounters, whether on planes, trains, buses or just walking around taking in the scenery and listening to the sounds around us, opportunities to hear to the adventures of other “pilgrims”.

It is strange how, once I had the idea of basing this Summer issue of SPA News on “journey” or “pilgrimage”, so many opportunities and ideas have presented themselves in my daily reading, magazine articles, and conversations. It brings to mind the commission we were given as SPAs, “*To share Christ’s love in our communities and to witness within the structures of our society.*” How interesting and inspiring it is that we all become pilgrims as we are “*sent out in the power of the Spirit to live and work to His praise and glory*”. We know that we are not alone on this mission as we encounter others on our journeys of faith and caring. We have a Godly companion!

CHURCH REACHES OUT TO FLOOD VICTIMS IN INDIA

Posted on **15 August 2018**

USPG has sent emergency funds to support the relief work of the Church of South India (CSI) after torrential rains, landslides and flooding claimed dozens of lives in Kerala state.



CSI is providing villagers with food and emergency supplies after the heaviest rains in 50 years destroyed homes, schools and churches. The most affected dioceses were East Kerala, Malabar, Madhya Kerala and Cochin.

More than 118,000 people have been displaced by the floods over a period of less than 48 hours. As many as 606 relief camps have been opened at various locations to accommodate the flood victims. The proposed relief programme will give priority to the most vulnerable.'

CSI is providing 3,800 affected households with rice, wheat flour, coconut oil, dhal, sugar, salt and other supplies. CSI stated: 'Once normalcy is restored, soon after the relief work, a detailed study will be undertaken and a reconstruction plan will be evolved.'

Davidson Solanki, USPG International Programme Manager for Asia, said: 'USPG is standing in solidarity with the people of Kerala and CSI as it carries out relief operations. It is so important that we hold the affected communities in our thoughts and prayers.'

Summer in Sanderstead

21st to 23rd August 2018

The event can be counted a success entertaining 33 guests over the three days. Two others called off through ill health. The number of attendances was 79. One of the guests came from Barnet to stay with her sister so that she could attend. They were greeted on arrival and efficiently checked in, filling in a Next of Kin form which they put into a sealed envelope in case of need. There was no need and these envelopes were destroyed, unopened.

The format of the day was coffee and biscuits in the All Saints Large Hall on arrival followed by an ice breaker session. At 11:15 the more formal session started; these were craft work, chemistry Macbeth and a travelogue. A short break followed and all moved into the Small Hall for lunch at 12:30 which was preceded by a Reflection given by one of the clergy. The “in-house” volunteers ate with the guests attending at tables decorated with a lovely small dish of flowers. The guests were then free to return to the Large Hall to read, do one of the puzzles laid out or the jigsaw. In the afternoon the guests were entertained by singers on Tuesday, a magician on Wednesday and seated exercises on Thursday to finish the three-day event. Tea and cakes followed and all could go home. Several hoped to be with us next year “if we are still around”.

All guests were matched with their drivers and signed out before leaving the hall. Half of the guests required collection and return. There were a dozen drivers for the guests many of whom had walking frames.

We were extremely grateful for all the volunteers who made this happen. As well as the drivers, there were two pairs, one of whom served coffee and biscuits in the morning, the other tea and cakes in the afternoon. Cakes had been supplied by half a dozen or more. As well as the two Ice Breakers, there were essential helpers on the desk and serving at lunch and the flower arranger. Not all came from All Saints’ members.

This would not have happened without them and we cannot thank them enough.

All Saints RE-ORDERING

INSTALLATION OF SCREENS and REMOVAL OF NORTH AISLE PEWS

The new screens, projector and camera were installed in All Saints in early August and were used for the first time at the 10am service on 26 August. The screens made a real difference at that service as the congregation were able to see a display of photos taken by church members illustrating various aspects of our worship of God. The other centrepiece of the service was the blessing of the marriage of church members Stas and Lali and for the first time those sitting in the north aisle had a complete view of what was taking place in the chancel. The screens provide a wonderful opportunity to develop our worship and to make the church a more relevant space. They will be in use at the 10am service on Sunday 9 September when 2 baptisms will be taking place.

We are praying that there will be a positive outcome soon on the parallel proposal to replace the remaining north aisle pews with chairs. The Southwark Chancellor has asked for further advice from heritage organisations by the end of August before taking a decision on our faculty application.

We have an Autumn ahead of us rich in learning, prayer and friendship.



“Never neglect the reading of the Hebrew Scriptures”....a phrase drummed into me repeatedly by one of my tutors, Revd Georgie Heskins, during my training. Yet I find that many Christians have only limited understanding of the Old Testament, and even less of an appreciation of just how significant - and prophetic - are the first 39 books of the Bible.

On Sundays during September, October and November we will be looking at some passages from the book of Genesis and will be continuing to explore them in our Homegroups. I have prepared 7 study guides for each of the Homegroup sessions, which I hope will prompt discussion and help in exploring some of the great themes of the Old Testament. The sessions will cover:

Why we should study the Old Testament;

“Terms of agreement”: God’s covenant with Noah;

“Missing the mark”: Sin, its consequences and God’s grace;

“Tower of Confusion”: The chaos of Babel;

“Father of many nations”: God’s covenant with Abraham;

“Looking in the rearview mirror”: Lot’s wife;


“Don’t try this at home!”: Abraham and Isaac;

The sermons will be recorded. I hope you find the studies helpful - do let me know if any questions arise, and we will try to deal with them during the sermon on the following Sunday.


NEW LIFE for your old GARDEN TOOLS


