Martin writes ...

The Gift

Many today miss the point of Christmas, as we become overwhelmed by all the frantic activity: not only the shopping, but also the card-sending, food-preparing, present-wrapping, carol-singing, sherry-drinking, mince-pie-eating and last-minute-panicking!



Sad to say, even Christians can find that it all goes by in a blur. So would you stop for just a minute, please, and think with me about what it means?

First, Christmas is the festival of God's gift. He gave his Son for us all. So we rejoice and sing with gladness for the baby Jesus born in a manger in Bethlehem. 'To us a child is born, to us a Son is given' (Isaiah 9:6).

Mild He lays His glory by, Born that man no more may die; Born to raise the sons of earth, Born to give them second birth. Let's sing and be amazed that God did this for us.

Secondly, Christmas proves God's love for us. Just as we give gifts to others to let them know we love them, so God has done so much more. We know God loves us because he gave his Son for us. God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son (John 3:16). Go on, stand in front of the bathroom mirror and say three times (or as many as necessary to believe it), "God gave Jesus because he likes me and loves me". Amazing, but true!

Thirdly, God wants to give us a whole lot more. Christmas is only the beginning of God's giving. There are also Good Friday (his sacrifice), Easter (victory over death) and Pentecost (gift of his Spirit to live in us). He gives us: forgiveness,

assurance, guidance, answered prayer, Christian friends, life without limits, love, peace, patience, hope, joy and more than could be listed here! See the words of St Paul at Romans 8:32: 'God did not spare his own Son Jesus. He gave him up for us all. So it's absolutely guaranteed that — because he gave his Son — he will carry on giving us absolutely everything'. We enjoy giving gifts. God loves giving, even more, and nobody can out-give God.

Become a Child on earth for me?

Trial of New Worship Patterns in 2019

In my letter of 18 October I updated you on the progress made in the two consultative groups set up to consider the shape of our Sunday morning worship services. I have promised to keep you up-to-date with developments, and am taking this opportunity to explain how we now propose to move forward. I am grateful to so many of you who have commented on these issues, both orally and in writing. The constructive nature of your contributions has been most heartening and encouraging.

It is important, as I explained in my last letter, to remember that we are seeking to ensure a healthy balance between the traditional worship and teaching that we already enjoy, with the need to introduce and develop more family-friendly styles of worship that are more in tune with the needs of the next generation. We are moving forward with this after much prayer and careful consideration of the needs across our congregations - both present and future.

Last Monday, the two consultative groups met together as a single body to consider a recommendation to the Church Council meeting later that day. They agreed to recommend a trial of new worship patterns to run from 28 April next year up to the end of June. I am pleased to inform you that this recommendation was approved by the Church Council.

The trial will give effect, broadly speaking, to the emerging thinking I described in paragraph 4 of my last letter. The attached annex shows how the services during this trial period will work. During the first full month of operation:

the first Sunday will begin at 9am with a traditional liturgical Holy Communion supported by the choir, followed by the new family-friendly service at 10.30am;

the second Sunday will begin with a said liturgical Holy Communion at 8am, followed by a non-eucharistic liturgical service with hymns at 9am, and the new family-friendly service at 10.30am with Holy Communion;

the third Sunday will follow the pattern of the first Sunday - ie 9am liturgical Holy Communion with choir, followed by the new family-friendly service at 10.30am;

the fourth Sunday will begin with a traditional liturgical said (ie no hymns) Holy Communion at 9am followed by the new family-friendly service at 10.30am;

The same pattern will be adopted for June, but because this is a "5-week month" there will be a said Holy Communion at 9am on the 30th, followed by the new family-friendly service at 10.30am. It is proposed that there should be coffee served between the 9am and 10.30am services.

You will see that we have added, taking note of the views of some members of the current 8.30 service, a said Communion service at 8am on the second Sunday. During the course of each month the 9am services will offer two choral Communion services, one said Communion service and one service of Morning Worship with hymns. Once a month Holy Communion will be celebrated in the new family-friendly service at 10.30am. In addition, of course, we recently re-introduced a midweek service of Holy Communion at 12.30 on the first Thursday of each month, to which all are welcome. This is a said service, using the traditional liturgy with which we are familiar.

I would stress that these changes are being made on a trial basis. In discussion with both consultative groups, it has become apparent that there are no clear-cut answers to questions about the timing of worship services. Just as there are many differing patterns of life on a Sunday morning for families with children, so our older folk have differing routines and preferences for the timing of Sunday morning activities. In making these changes we are seeking to cater for a wide variety of different needs and circumstances - but we are proposing to use this trial period to understand when the most appropriate times might be. If the trial shows us that other timings might be more appropriate, we are open to trialling different patterns before making permanent changes. One thing is very clear - we will need to keep all our services under constant review in the future, in order to ensure that they meet the changing requirements of people in all parts of our community.

We will take steps to ensure that as many aspects as possible of the new arrangements are evaluated - including the impacts on the choir, other musicians, wardens and service wardens, technical teams, those who serve coffee/tea, our monthly Sunday Lunch, clergy, and the impacts both on older members (including, importantly, such issues as mobility and transport), families who come to existing services, and potential newcomers.

I realise that changing Sunday morning routines can be quite upsetting and unsettling. But, as I said in my last letter, we are doing this to enable more people to enjoy God's welcome so that no-one need feel excluded from Sunday worship. We have done what we can to accommodate the desires of many who welcome a liturgical or quiet style of worship on Sunday morning, whilst also recognising that many people have a desire to see the introduction of more contemporary worship. I hope you will agree that we have tried to take account of many different needs, expectations and preferences and that you will feel able to support the Church Council as we begin to implement these new arrangements.

Remembrance Day 2018 - from behind the scenes at St Edmund's

Preparations for this momentous day began some time before when our Church Warden Gill constructed a suitable memorial to be the focal point for the first ever outdoor Remembrance Day service at St Edmund's Church in Riddlesdown. We had worked closely with the Riddlesdown Resident's Association whose Chairman and other officers who attended and with The Royal British Legion Local Fundraising Team. The event was the culmination of their Poppies on Lamppost's initiative organised by The RRA and we were able to donate £91 to the RBL as a result of monies collected in various ways.

Saturday was a day of discussion and rehearsal concerning the safe placing of the loud speaker to be used for The Last Post and The Reveille –

"If dry it goes here and if wet...." Umbrella needed in case! There were certainly a few odd looks from passers-by as the volume of the machine was tested.

Inside the church the various copies of service sheets had been prepared and left ready for the three morning events – yes, there were two services prior to the special Remembrance for all.

Then it fell to the luckless person on the normal coffee rota to gauge how many people might take up the publicised invitation to stay for light refreshments after the outdoor service, and duly set out enough cups, saucers, mugs and biscuits —lots, as we knew there would be some youngsters taking part. Having done as much as seemed necessary by mid afternoon those involved departed feeling that we had thought of most eventualities.

Shortly afterwards a call came through to confirm that a troop of Beavers, Cubs and Scouts would arrive shortly before the ceremony. How many youngsters will there be? — between 20 and 50! Great news but a hasty recount of them and probable attendant parents/guardians and an unimaginable number of local residents sent our intrepid warden flying off to do her regular shopping trip with an additional and much longer list of extra soft drinks and yet more biscuits! Vicar Susan also made a dash to the parish office photocopier for further supplies of service sheets.

Come Sunday, Remembrance Day – people gathered and were joined by the troop from the Scout Hall who had processed along Mitchley Avenue escorted by PC David from our Safer Neighbourhood Police Team. (Credit is given to him for helping to clear falling leaves from the pavement and, dodging the traffic, prodded the blocked drain, trying to clear the enormous puddle that gave several people a good soaking!)

During the Remembrance service a mix of sun and wet squalls did not deter anyone from forming a large group round the Memorial cross – luckily no thunder but passing traffic added to the challenge for Vicar Susan and her reader Cllr Helen Redfern to be heard against the rain and wind but all went smoothly. Credit is also given to the young troop who performed their duties so well, especially mentioning the smallest and possibly youngest standard bearer valiantly succeeding as she held her rain sodden flag in the dipped position.

After a spirited rendering of the National Anthem drew the service to a close the young troopers and many others came inside for refreshments. Opening the kitchen hatch door it was daunting to find a long and very orderly queue forming and hearing much cheerful chatter. Amazingly and thankfully without any prompting our wonderful congregation members leapt into action making sure cups and glasses were filled and distributed safely in all directions, later washed, dried and generally cleared up - only about 6 biscuits left at the end. What a team we have – thanks be to all!! It was later estimated that there were only a few short of 100 people who came into church and maybe 20-30 others who had taken part but chose to go their own ways immediately after.



REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY AT ALL SAINTS

Remembrance Sunday was very special this year, as we commemorated the Centenary of the ending of the First World War. The Rainbows and Brownies had prepared a beautiful Garland of Remembrance from the names of all those shown on our War Memorial, and of course we were again joined by the soldiers who were "there but not there". The church was filled with folk - young and old - as we saw images of relatives of members of our own congregation displayed on the screens. The Handbell Ringers performed a special version of "In Flanders Fields", Myles McCarthy from the British Legion and Dennis King from the Sanderstead Residents Association read poems, the Guides, Brownies and Rainbows read passages of Scripture and Colin Snart recited the Exhortation and Kohima Epitaph.

The tools were taken in two very well loaded car boots to RHS Wisley at the end of October where they were gratefully received by RHS staff. The tools have now gone off to prison workshops at HMP Wandsworth where they are being renovated for eventual use in community projects and schools.

At last! At last! Good News from Matongo Dispensary in Tanzania!



Members of All Saints have joined other kind donors in realising a dream for the people of Matongo- the 'forgotten valley' in Tanzania's Mara Region. More than 10,000 people live in the valley, but have no health care- you may remember that the Mums here had to trudge over 9 miles in each direction to get to an ante-natal clinic. Samuel, the disabled boy never had the polio immunisation, which would have saved him from disability.

The Dispensary* is opening in January 2019. It's taken a long time- far too long- but at last all problems have been overcome. The local Butiama District Council will take over the building and provide the staff. It will make a huge difference to the lives of the people with:

- Ante-natal clinics
- Births supervised by trained midwives
- Mother and Baby clinics
- Routine immunisations
- HIV testing and counselling
- Malaria testing and treatment
- Hygienic circumcision for boys (reduces HIV risk and STIs)
- Anti-FGM education
- Care for the elderly

And much more- it will be life changing for this community.
