Jeremy writes ...

"Something Understood"

My studies of the poetry of George Herbert (1593-1633) recently took Sandra, Pat Seely and myself to Salisbury to an old friend of our church, Revd Canon Judy Rees. We spent a delightful day with her, lunching in



the Cathedral, then exploring the small church of St. Andrews, Bemerton, where Herbert served as priest for just three years before his death at the age of 40.

Herbert was one of the most influential exponents of a 17th century tradition of Christian poetry and prose in the emerging Church of England. He was a man of deep religious conviction, tireless devotion and prayerful meditation, probably best known by many today for his hymnal compositions such as "Let all the world in every corner sing", and "Teach me my God and King".

While in Bemerton, Judy invited me to recite Herbert's famous poem on Prayer from the lectern adjacent to his tomb in front of the altar. It was a deeply moving experience.

Prayer the church's banquet, angel's age,
God's breath in man returning to his birth,
The soul in paraphrase, heart in pilgrimage,
The Christian plummet sounding heav'n and earth
Engine against th' Almighty, sinner's tow'r,
Reversed thunder, Christ-side-piercing spear,
The six-days world transposing in an hour,
A kind of tune, which all things hear and fear;
Softness, and peace, and joy, and love, and bliss,
Exalted manna, gladness of the best,
Heaven in ordinary, man well drest,
The milky way, the bird of Paradise,
Church-bells beyond the stars heard, the soul's blood,
The land of spices; something understood.





In just 14 beautiful lines, without even using a main verb to turn it into a proper sentence, Herbert introduces a cascade of words to describe prayer in a vivid cascade of different thoughts, metaphors, images and concepts. The sonnet builds to a crescendo, then suddenly vaporises. It as if the writer has run out of words, simply describing prayer as "something understood" - ultimately indescribable, indefinable, intangible and beyond explanation.

Lent has given us a very special opportunity to experience a season of prayer, in preparation for Holy Week and Easter. As well as examining ourselves and coming to Christ with penitent hearts, we can experience the depth and breadth of that which cannot be defined, yet can be "something understood" - something which touches the deep and complex emotions of our innermost beings ("the soul in paraphrase").

We will soon be commemorating the events of Holy Week, using "Stations of the Cross" to follow Jesus on his agonising journey through the streets of Jerusalem. We will fall silent before the cross on which he was crucified, and experience the desolation as he lay in the cold, dark tomb. Then on Easter Sunday, our hearts will erupt with joy and gladness as we see the tombstone rolled away and celebrate his glorious resurrection!

Prayer, like our Lenten journey, is truly "the heart in pilgrimage". That journey takes us through times of darkness and pain, but ultimately transposes into a different tune of the "softness, and peace, and joy, and love, and bliss" which we experience on Easter Sunday. May God bless you all as you continue your journey - and may your experience of prayer bring you to that "place of spices; something understood".



Extracts from Address by The Bishop of Southwark, The Rt Revd Christopher Chessun, on 1st March at Diocesan Synod

...For here we are, at the beginning of Lent, in Synod: which is a word meaning the way together: from the Greek, *syn*, together, as in synergy; and *hodos*, a road or way or journey – as in *exodus*. We are today in Synod, on the road together and it is good to be here together!

This sense of journeying together is rightly something of which Christians are always conscious. The Apostles wandered the Mediterranean basin and well beyond, with St Thomas reaching India, fulfilling their great commission to go and baptise everywhere. The People of Israel were perhaps most themselves when they wandered in the desert and spent 40 years journeying to the Promised Land.

Abraham himself was a wandering Aramean. And we are keenly aware of this sense of journeying together in Lent. Ahead of us in the distance, drawing nearer as we walk together, is Calvary, the cross starkly visible against the dark sky. Beyond the brow of the hill, we know, for we have trod this way before, is the garden, the empty tomb, and the shore of the Lake where the Risen Christ beckons us to come and share breakfast with him. In Lent we walk the way of the Cross in the steps of our Lord.

Lent is when we should look deeply into the mirror of our souls and ask if we are truly what we were created to be: in other words we discipline ourselves so as not to point the finger at others but instead examine our own consciences. We strive to lay down ambition, fear, anxiety, status and security. We strive to look beyond ourselves to the needs of others – those who journey with us, and those who, as yet, have not the strength or the sense of direction for the journey.

These are themes to which we rightly return again and again, year by year, each year seeking eternal truth in the concrete reality of the world through which we journey....

So I say again, we are together on a journey - the great journey of the Christian life: towards the Cross, towards the empty tomb, towards the Mount of Olives where Jesus was taken up from the sight of the disciples and at length, after many, many Lents and Easters and Ascension-tides, to that City of Eternal Light that lies at the end of all our journeys. That eternal journey is what we are on, here and now, in this Synod. And I hope that that is reflected to some degree in the spirit in which we meet together.

It is for this reason that I have returned again and again during my now eight years serving you as Diocesan Bishop to the Gospel account of the Emmaus Road as a narrative for our journey and the Southwark Vision. We walk the road together and as we walk we come to know that Jesus is walking with us - though we may not at first fully realise this or indeed recognise Him walking with us along the way. And so the three words which encapsulate Southwark Vision, "walking, welcoming, growing" are very telling...

I commend to us, as a Synod, and as a Diocese, and as a Church, the Lenten discipline of listening. Listening is one of the most powerful things we can do and there is nothing weak about listening. Its strength is a strength of service, of co-operation, of true Christian love. And in listening we can very often transcend our own fears and anxieties for ourselves and leave them behind in our concern for and interest in the other. Disciplined listening is a practical way to enter into the reality of being Christ centred and outward focused.

In Southwark I believe it will be in large part by good listening that our unity is forged. As Bishop, alas, it often falls to me to speak! But the most productive encounters are those when it is possible to take time to listen attentively first, entering into a reality different from one's own: not necessarily agreeing or opposing, but simply listening. Time and again, this good listening gives rise to fruitful unity in ways we could not predict. Time and again, this kind of good listening, not proposing solutions or giving advice, but hearing to the full – time and again this listening is, by grace, healing....

Earlier in the week I sent a letter jointly with the Area Bishops to clergy encouraging our churches and congregations to pray for unity and for all our peoples and the peoples of Europe, whatever our personal views about Brexit.....

The issue for EU 27 citizens in London is not so much a legal and practical one – though these things have their due weight – but it is a matter of identity, of welcome, of being. Simply to be asked to register, when one thought one already belonged, is a very disturbing thing. It can leave one unsure how one stands with one's neighbours and friends. It can make one question who one is in this community.

There is a role for the Church here and it begins with listening. I hope there will also be a chance for some increased visibility too. I would like to put on display the good and faithful ministry of Clergy and Lay People in Southwark whose roots are elsewhere in Europe - indeed with the Windrush scandal still fresh in our minds, not forgetting those whose roots are beyond Europe. We shall always strive to honour the contribution of all in Southwark regardless of where they come from. As I have said before, our diversity is God's gift and blessing to us in this Diocese. It is very important we say this.

And so, first and foremost this Lent, may we listen well to one another, and form our estimation of each other with love and not with judgment. Secondly, if you are a lay person or a priest in this Diocese whose citizenship is in another country, and if these last months and years have made you wonder "am I part of this?", let me say, loudly and clearly, you are — you are dearly loved and appreciated by us all. We are all in this together. Through our baptism into the death and resurrection of Christ, all Christians, in all times and in all places, have become our brothers and sisters. We rejoice in this and we know, however our relations with our fellow European nations are reordered in the coming weeks, that in Christ there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free. Even so, Come Lord Jesus.


Annual General Meeting (AGM) Sunday 7th April


Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) Sunday 28th April

THE APOCALYPSE OF JESUS



The strange Book of Revelation, written in about 95AD, opens up a world in which Christians were under threat from the Roman Empire: some were suffering for their faith. Was it easier to fall in with the ways of the Empire with all its wealth and prosperity, as well as cruelty, than to hold fast in their faith? The prophet John records a vision of the Risen Jesus, which opens for him God's perspective on the Christian assemblies and on the Empire. Written in the sort of poetic literature sometimes called 'apocalyptic', John conveys his message encouraging the Christians to stay strong in their witness, whilst opening up the demonic realities behind the workings of totalitarian Empire, and looking towards God's

ultimate victory over all that is evil in the establishment of his kingdom.

Today we are subject to all the allurements of many different sorts of godless 'empires', tempting us to put other gods in the place of Jesus Christ. Can 'Revelation" encourage us in our struggles and witness in our very different world?



New Trial Services for May and June

In May and June, All Saints will be making changes to the pattern of Sunday Services, as many of you will know. In 2018, we took the decision that our mission priority should be Children and Families, with re-ordering of our buildings to support this. Our Children & Families Pastor, whom we appointed in September, is already making an impact in our various groups and out in the community through the local schools. We are making these changes in order to extend God's welcome to more people. We are not seeing many children and families at our current Sunday services.

I am grateful for the encouragement so far of the congregation, and ask for your continuing support. We shall need your feedback as we proceed, in order to assess the benefits and impact of the changes. A small group will be working to monitor things, while feedback forms will be made available for you to express your views.

In making these changes, we have particularly in mind all those who do not at present attend services at All Saints, or not very often. The former Archbishop William Temple used to say that the Church is the only organisation that exists for the benefit of its non-members. I hope you will all help advertise these services and invite your friends and neighbours.

As with almost all change, there will be new things to learn and get used to, and we shall need patience with one another. Some change may be unsettling, perhaps uncomfortable. As a church we need to be flexible as we reach out to new people, and not simply carry on doing things the same as before.

You will find details of May and June services in this April newsletter. I will say more on 7 April when we have our Annual Meeting. Please do speak with me if you have any questions. Thank you.




