### Revd Jeremy writes ...

Even if November isn't one of your favourite months, with its long, dark nights and freezing foggy mornings, there are some truly amazing things to enjoy. One of my childhood pleasures was to trudge through piles of leaves, carving out a temporary pathway only for it to disappear as the wind picked up and blew the leaves away again!

November can also provide valuable time to reflect. At the beginning of the month we remember those who have gone before us, and commemorate their lives in a Memorial Service. Only a week later, Remembrance Sunday gives us an opportunity to remember those who gave their lives to preserve our freedoms, the many whose lives were shattered by injury and loss, and members of our armed forces who protect us today. This year we will be remembering especially the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Monte Cassino on the Italian front, the Battles of Imphal and Kohima (preventing a Japanese invasion of India), the Great Escape (from the German POW camp Stalag Luft III in Poland), the D-Day Landings and the Arnhem Landings - to mention but a few familiar events.

Between those two events, with great firework displays and bonfires, we mark the failed Gunpowder Plot of 1605 and the attempt by Guy Fawkes (and others) to assassinate King James I. And later in the month out come the pumpkins as our American friends give thanks for the arrival and first harvest of the Pilgrim Fathers in the early 1620s. Straight after that, on 29 November, the retail world marks "Black Friday" and we all (well, some of us, anyway) rush out to get our pre-Christmas bargains.

Where is Jesus Christ in all this? Amidst all this frenetic activity, it might escape our notice that the end of November marks the climax of the Christian Liturgical Year with the Feast of Christ the King, which we will celebrate on the 24th. Christ, the King who chose to lay aside his majesty, to divest himself of the privileges of power, and to leave the place of highest honour which was his by right. Instead, he came to identify with his people, in all of the mess, pain and confusion that life brings to them. I often think that is one of the most meaningful times in our Christian calendar. Christ; known as the Messiah; the Anointed One; Son of Man; Son of David; Son of God; the Bridegroom; the Door; the Vine; the Lamb of God; the Mediator; the Great High Priest; the Lord; the Resurrection and the Life; the Alpha and Omega; the Word; image of the invisible God; firstborn of all creation; head of the body, the Church; the beginning, firstborn from the dead; fullness of God. All of these are amazing titles. But perhaps the most distinctive image, which we will acknowledge on the 29th, is Jesus as King. We celebrate his sovereignty over all creation, his supremacy as one of the Godhead, his rule over the nations, and his kingship of our lives.

And finally...on the same day, we will cast our eyes forward to Advent with the renowned Collect for "Stir up Sunday" (when, traditionally, you have to begin stirring up the ingredients for Christmas Pudding!):

Stir Up O Lord
The wills of your faithful people
that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works
may by you be plenteously rewarded
through Jesus Christ our Lord
AMEN

I hope and pray that this November is an enjoyable one for us all. Let's put aside our worries about Brexit, future plans for the parish, and all that, and let's use this month to bring forth much fruit!

### Worshipping the Lord with vigour and joy - Nigeria

On the last Sunday of October, I took trains to New Cross Gate in order to preach at the annual Harvest Thanksgiving of the Nigerian UK Chaplaincy. The Nigerian Chaplaincy meets for weekly worship at 1pm on Sundays at All Saints' Hatcham Park, New Cross. You may know that I enjoyed nine very happy years, from 1985 – 1994, as a lecturer with Church Mission Society at Trinity Theological College in Umuahia, midway between Port Harcourt and Enugu in the East. In our clergy vestry I've hung three group photos of some of the students I taught.

Joe, the Nigerian Chaplain, is a friend and former student. Perhaps I should give him his full title, as this is the Nigerian custom; he is the Ven Dr Joseph Ajaefobi. His doctorate is from Loughborough in Engineering. He and his family live in Northolt.

Being Anglicans, the worship had a recognisable liturgy, with robed clergy. In addition, being Nigerians, there was a far-less-Anglican shall we say, 'spontaneity'? The first hymn was, 'Great is thy faithfulness'. The priest started it off, unaccompanied, and all joined in while the keyboard player managed to catch up in time for the second verse and the singers came forward from the body of the church. [By the way, when I say "all", I mean all who had arrived at church on time (about 25). The congregation reached about 60 by near the end]. Also during the hymn, men came forward to twiddle with the amplifier and speakers, causing loud feedback! Ah, Nigeria!

However, such spontaneity really can give an emotional boost to the worship. In place of a psalm, a man came forward with microphone and led singing of joyful choruses. I think they were mostly in English, but I'm not sure; it was good and loud, and my hearing isn't as good as it was. Anyway, there was great encouragement to praise and thank the Lord, with words and also by clapping or moving to the music.

My sermon was on Keeping Faithful to the Lord, and I explained some things that can stop us: Forgetting God, Being Anxious, Materialism. One major reason why the Nigerian Chaplaincy is so needed is that thousands of Christian Nigerians fall away when they come to live in Britain. In many parts of the south of Nigeria, about 98% of the population is Christian; but when they move abroad, they find the UK church culturally alien. It is a huge mission field.

The fun part of a Nigerian harvest thanksgiving is always the offering, when people come up to place their gifts in a basket at the front, while the band leads in lively praise worship. On this day, the gifts were almost all of money; back in Nigeria, many gifts would be 'in kind', with vegetables, chickens, fruits, groceries, detergents and... pretty well anything!

I came away with a grocery bag of chicken & rice, cake, sweets and a bottle of red wine; but I also came away with renewed encouragement and commitment to continue to serve the Lord with faithfulness. The UK church is going through a difficult time, and numbers in many churches are declining. We need the joy, hope, vision and vigour of the Nigerian church.

Praise the Lord! Hallelujah, hallelujah, Amen!!




