"Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart; you are serving the Lord Jesus and he will reward you." (Colossians 4:23-24)


So, let me simply say, thank you for all you do in the Church to shine the light of Jesus Christ in our community.

'Born that man no more may die'

That's how the great hymn-writer, Charles Wesley, expressed the significance of the birth of Jesus: He was born to put an end to death. I hope that this Christmas you will join in singing the whole of that wonderful carol: Hark the herald Angels Sing / Glory to the New born King. For the good news of Jesus Christ at Christmas is truly wonderful.



In the bible, Mary was told, You shall call his name 'Jesus' for he will save his people from their sins. St Paul proclaimed the Christian hope like this: I am convinced that not even death... will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord (Romans 8:39)

Death of course means 'separation'. That's why it's horrible. Death takes away those who are closest to us, part of our lives. It separates us from our friends, family and all whom we love. We say, 'They've been taken from us' or 'They've passed on'. Even those who are unconscious or in a coma are still 'with us'. At the moment of death, they are gone, separated, and not coming back. It is horrible, and Henry Scott Holland was most unhelpful to suggest that, 'Death is nothing at all'. Even though we have a wonderful hope in Jesus of resurrection life, death is decidedly NOT 'nothing at all'. The bible calls death the final enemy of the human race.

Only in Jesus is there hope. Outside Jesus there is none. Woody Allen wrote, 'I don't want to achieve immortality through my work; I want to achieve immortality through not dying. I don't want to live on in the hearts of my countrymen; I want to live on in my apartment'. In another quotation he said, 'I don't mind dying, I just don't want to be there when it happens'. But, though we might wish it, death does not just go away. Other religions provide no sure hope. Muslims celebrate Allah as merciful, but can have no certainty of forgiveness and acceptance by God. Hindus look forward to Reincarnation

(Karma) which is not good news at all. Who wants to be trapped in an endless cycle of rebirth and dying?

At the Cambridge Crematorium chapel, there is a Latin motto, Mors Janua Vitae, which means "Death is the Gate of Life". That however is pure sentiment and wishful thinking. Death, by itself, is final separation. The atheist philosopher Bertrand Russell wrote: 'The life of man is a long march through the night... One by one our comrades vanish from our sight, seized by the silent orders of omnipotent Death'. Without a solid faith in Jesus Christ, one is quite right, in the words of Dylan Thomas, to 'rage, rage against the dying of the light'.

BUT, and this is the real magic of Christmas, God loved the human race so much that he gave Jesus Christ to be born for us. He was truly human, one of us. He gave his life for sinners, and in the death and resurrection of Christ, we have a sure hope. He is the resurrection of all who believe. Because of Jesus, we are no longer separated from God's love; his love has won the victory. Not even death will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus!

Here's a verse of Wesley's carol:

Hail! the heaven-born Prince of Peace!
Hail! the Son of Righteousness!
Light and life to all He brings,
Risen with healing in His wings.
Mild He lays His glory by,
Born that man no more may die;
Born to raise the sons of earth,
Born to give them second birth
Hark! the herald angels sing,
"Glory to the newborn King"

I wonder, have you found this wonderful hope yet? Have you experienced the love of God in Jesus? Come and join in our carols and worship this Christmas. There's something for young and old. Let's bring our thanks to Jesus for defeating death and bringing us life.

Mission News Cyclone Idai

Trauma Healing Training following Cyclone Idai



In March this year one of the worst cyclones on record to hit Africa and the southern hemisphere ripped through Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe, killing over 1,300 people and leaving many more missing.

The cyclone traumatised whole communities, with many people displaced by flooding, losing their homes and livelihoods. Mothers' Union has so often been the first point of call when disaster strikes because we are uniquely embedded in communities to provide ongoing support and to continue journeying with those affected as they seek to heal, recover and rebuild.

Mothers' Union in southeast Africa saw this disaster as a call to action. With support from Mary Sumner House and funding from the Community of St Andrew Trust, provincial workers from Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe set up trauma healing workshops for clergy members and Mothers' Union leaders from the worst affected communities.

Two workshops were held; one in Blantyre, Malawi for participants from Chikwawa in Malawi and Chipinge and Chimanimani in Zimbabwe; another in Beira, Mozambique for those from that community. The workshops were 4 days long each and were led by an American Bible Society (ABS) certified trainer. They covered 5 core lessons following the ABS trauma healing curriculum which looks at how the church can help in times of crisis. The lessons are: 'If God loves us, why do we suffer?', 'How can the wounds of our hearts be healed?', 'What happens when someone is grieving?', 'Response: Taking your pain to the cross' and 'How can we forgive others?'

Participants of the workshops are now equipped to set up trauma healing groups in their communities to support those dealing with the psychological effects of the cyclone and all aspects of trauma. Because those who were chosen to be trained are leaders embedded in the most affected areas, they will able to identify and reach the most vulnerable. In collaboration with the church they are dedicated to cascading their newly acquired trauma healing skills within the community to reach all those that need support.

Please join us in praying for all those affected by Cyclone Idai who are rebuilding their lives, all those who lost loved ones or who have been injured that they would feel the loving comfort of our Lord now and always.


