## Revd Jeremy Groombridge writes ...

You could be forgiven for wanting to take the whole of January off, after a busy December culminating in the festivities of the Christmas season. A few weeks ago - in the run-up to the busiest week of the season, actually, our central heating boiler decided to call it a day. We were left without heat or hot water - it's never great preparation for the 8.30 Holy Communion service to begin the day with a cold shower! So we reported the problem, and all our Job's comforters told us we'd be terribly lucky to get anyone out until well into the New Year. But to our amazement, an engineer came out the next morning - and all he did was to put his fingers on the two buttons marked "boost" and the boiler burst back into life! Sometimes, the most frustrating and bothersome problems have the simplest solutions!

That set me wondering. I'm no technical wizard, but I do know that I need to reboot my computer or smartphone from time to time - usually when, for one reason or another, the system seems to have become overloaded and has stopped working efficiently. Sometimes rebooting is necessary to recover from an error. So I hold down the big button and the little button at the same time, and wait until I get that wonderful little message: "System is re-initialising".

The Christian life would be so easy if at every stage, in every minute of every day my life was aligned to God's word, God's will and God's way. Yet we all know that, periodically, we need a time of refreshment, revival, renewal and rededication. It may be that a "hard boot" is necessary - allowing Jesus to shine into our lives (possibly even for the first time). Or it could be that a "soft-re-boot" is what's needed - to take some time in quiet contemplation and inviting God to show us where we need to make adjustments in our lives and become more like the person he desires us to be.

We've heard a lot in the past few months about "taking back control". But that, I suggest, is how to begin 2020 on the wrong foot. Instead, we are called to yield control to God, and ask him to re-boot our life so that we truly begin to reflect the love of Christ in our attitudes, behaviours and way of living day -by-day.

The beginning of a New Year is a good time to "re-boot". There's nothing wrong with saying to God that we've got ourselves into a bit of a bind, and inviting him to help us make a new start. Baptism is a bit like that, isn't it. Maybe just thinking back to our own baptism will be enough to redirect our own path and realign it with God's purpose for our life. Never underestimate the power and value of a periodic "re-boot"!

# Wanting more of Christ

#### Revd Canon Martin Greenfield writes ...

"Please, sir, I want some more".

You may recognise these famous words from Dickens's 'Oliver Twist'. Here's the passage:

The boy rose from the table; and advancing to the master, basin and spoon in hand, said: somewhat alarmed at his own temerity: "Please, sir, I want some more."

The master was a fat, healthy man; but he turned very pale. He gazed in stupefied astonishment on the small rebel for some seconds, and then clung for support to the copper. The assistants were paralysed with wonder; the boys with fear.

"What!" said the master at length, in a faint voice.

"Please, sir," replied Oliver, "I want some more."

The master aimed a blow at Oliver's head with the ladle; pinioned him in his arms; and shrieked aloud for the beadle...

Oliver Twist asked for more food. Not many of *us* will have made that request over the Christmas / New Year period, for most of us have had plenty to eat and drink. Some of us might even regret eating more than usual.

But there is one type of hunger that *is* good and necessary: a hunger for God who came to us in Jesus Christ. It is good to be hungry for more of Christ. St Paul wrote, "All I want is to know Christ, to experience his resurrection power in my life and to feel what it was like for him to suffer" (Philippians 3:10).

I wonder if you have ever prayed as Paul did, 'O God, I've come to know Christ in my life and I want MORE of him!'? It's not rude or presumptuous to ask God for more. Not at all. In fact it delights God's heart to hear us sincerely ask to know Christ better. It's good to be hungry, for we CAN have more!

Are you hungry to know Christ better? Why is it that so many are apparently quite content with a limited experience of Christ? Why are we satisfied with *last year's* experience?

Could this be your number one ambition for 2020 – to know more of Christ?

And what will you do about it?

Jesus said, "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied" (Matthew 5:6).

## Food Hub

#### Happy New Year, Everyone!

With the magnificent help of the Food Hub's volunteers, friends and supporters, we were able to provide food for **1,098 meals** for people in crisis at our **busiest ever session** on the Saturday before Christmas (21<sup>st</sup> Dec). 39 clients attended that morning and we provided food for a total of 122 people. These 1,098 meals took us past **3,000 meals provided in December** and **30,000 meals during 2019**.

Two days later (Mon 23<sup>rd</sup> Dec) volunteers delivered 150 Christmas turkey hampers to clients/families nominated by our Ticket Partner agencies through the **Christmas Lunch on Jesus** project, while earlier in December the agencies received presents to give to 200 needy children through **Toys for Joy**.

On behalf of the Trustees and Management Committee, we send enormous thanks to everyone who donated food, money and their time: our volunteers, churches, schools, businesses, Rotary, WI and uniformed organisations and many, *many* individuals and families throughout the local community.

Food donations in December were so huge that in January we are asking supporters to focus please on the following six items that we remain short of:

- Tins of Plain Meat Chicken, Ham, Corned Beef
- Cartons of Long Life Whole Milk
- Jars of Peanut Butter
- Strawberry & Raspberry Jam
- Packets of Dried Potatoes
- Unisex Shampoo

We thank God for his mighty provision and overall direction of the Food Hub and pray that Jesus will remain at the very heart of the work during 2020.

Hopefully, this will be my last prayer letter! I say that, because the plan is that once Steve and I have moved up to the Wirral, we will produce a joint monthly update. They are juxtaposed with Enrico Bossi's nimble *Scherzo*, which explores all the colours of the Royal Festival Hall organ.

Brooks goes on to celebrate the music of Louis Vierne, including the pugnacious Toccata in B flat minor, the *moto perpetuo* of the *Impromptu* and the éclat of the ever-popular *Carillon de Westminster*, in which the chimes of Big Ben thunder out in the Royal Festival Hall organ's pedals.
