
The Cross

Jesus paid it all



At the heart of it is that passage of Scripture in 2 Corinthians 5:19 **"God was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself, not counting people's sins against them".** And in Colossians 1:20 we read: **"Jesus Christ made peace through his blood, shed on the cross".** This, surely, is the message of Easter - that Jesus Christ brought us to God in that wonderful act of reconciliation.

As early as the 16th century, William Tyndale was using the word "at-one-ment" to signify that, through Christ's life, death, burial, resurrection and ascension, we can become one with God and enjoy what it means to enter a right relationship with our Creator, cleansed from the stain, guilt and power of sin. And the wonderful thing we celebrate during Holy Week and Easter Sunday is that Jesus brought it all about.

The Parish of All Saints Sanderstead **NOT THE MINUTES of Annual General Meeting** 1st April 2020, 11.30am ONLINE VIRTUAL MEETING

Present: Rev Martin Greenfield, Rev Jeremy Groombridge, Dick Hibberd (Sec)

1. Introduction

The Secretary opened the meeting by welcoming people to the All Saints' first virtual online meeting. He apologised for a minor technical problem which meant that no-one else had received an invitation.

2. Apologies for absence

In the circumstances, it was decided that apologies should be assumed for everyone else on the electoral roll. The list of 161 names was read out by the Secretary. [Secretary's note: a snoring sound after about 47 names suggested that Jeremy may have dozed off]

3. Protocols to be followed for the conduct of a virtual meeting

The Secretary reported that the Church Representation Rules 2020 did not seem to cover the conduct of Virtual AGMs so it was unanimously agreed (by the Secretary) that in these exceptional circumstances, the quorum for the meeting be reduced to one. [Secretary's note: at this point Martin left the meeting as his microphone had curiously been muted].

4. Minutes of the annual meeting held on Sunday 7th April 2019

The minutes were unanimously approved as a correct record by the Secretary.

5. Matters arising

The Secretary decided that there were no matters arising.

6. Written Reports

The reports were all noted and accepted with additional comments as shown below:

6.1 DCC Secretary's report

It was unanimously agreed to formally record a vote of thanks to the Secretary for his interesting report and to thank him for all his hard work during the year.

6.2 Men's Group report

The meeting considered a suggestion that the name of the Men's group be changed to something more inclusive. Some people apparently felt that whilst ladies were welcome at every event, the name "Men's Group" may put some people off. This suggestion was welcomed and it was noted that younger people may also feel excluded. It was therefore agreed to change the name of the Men's Group to "Men's and Young Ladies Group" with immediate effect.

7. Nominations and elections

At this point, the Secretary invoked the second emergency protocol in respect of Covid 19 and it was unanimously agreed that all elected representatives should continue in office until further notice.

8. Any Other Business

The Secretary proposed and unanimously agreed that further emergency arrangements be invoked as follows:

- In order to facilitate Social Distancing, every alternate row of pews would be removed as a matter of urgency
- In future, to preserve Social Distancing, the congregation would be asked to wear face masks during coffee. [Good luck with that one]
- To minimise the chances of inadvertently spreading the disease, sermons would be limited to a maximum of three minutes until further notice
- Following the success of last night's Virtual Whisky Tasting, the Men's Group had decided that this should be a weekly activity to keep spirits up (or get them down as the case may be). In future however, a maximum of six different varieties would be sampled and sessions would not last beyond 2.00 am. [Secretary's note: at this point Jeremy woke up]

9. The Rector's address to the meeting

In his absence, this was deferred until next year.

10. The Meeting ended at 12.15pm.
