Canon Martin Greenfield writes,

Dear friends,

I write at a time of great change in the parish of Sanderstead. Following decisions taken by the Church Council, the Team Ministry is to be dissolved, and St Edmund's Riddlesdown is to be transferred to the parish of St James Riddlesdown. There will be one Parochial Church Council for All Saints Sanderstead, with St Antony's. We are looking at new ways of co-operating across parish boundaries and of spreading the gospel of Jesus in Sanderstead, particularly to revive the work in Hamsey Green.

As well as these, we should expect and be ready to make further changes in the way we operate as a church. Especially in this uncertain time of COVID, we need to have organisational structures that are light and adaptable. Henry George wrote: "There is danger in reckless change but there is greater danger in blind conservation." So let us pray,

At this time, Lord, change our lives; change your church; lead and guide us in the way of your gospel.

Dear friends,

Following the new government guidelines I am pleased to tell you that church services can continue if the venue is following COVID-19 Secure guidelines. Therefore at All Saints we are able to continue to host more than 6 people in total but no one should mix in a group of greater than 6.



This means that when you visit All Saints for worship you must:

- follow the limits on the number of other people you should meet with as a group – no more than 6 people unless you all live together (or are in the same support bubble).
- avoid social interaction with anyone outside the group you are with, even if you see other people you know
- Provide your contact details to the organiser so that you can be contacted if needed by the NHS Test and Trace programme.

This means that upon arrival at All Saints' you will be shown by a Steward to your seat and you must stay in that seat throughout the service (except when it is a Communion Service and you go up to receive the Bread) and you can only have social interaction with anyone who is in the same household as yourself. You must NOT wander around the church having conversations with your friends.

I appreciate that this appears to be very draconian but I am doing the very best I can to keep everyone, especially the vulnerable, safe.

ADVENTure Online 2020 CHRISTMAS AROUND THE WORLD

In the past, we have used our garages to present Advent in a series of 24 displays around a central theme. This year we may not use garages, so we are having an ADVENTure online. Our theme will be **Christmas around the World** and each day we will be able to 'open' a new door of our online calendar to see a 5-minute film of how Christmas is celebrated in different countries. This will be followed-up with another click of the button with a question of the day and short explanation of the daily steps of Advent that Christians take towards Christmas.

Our Children & Families Pastor, Chris Newman, is using his expertise in setting up the online facilities that we have not done before. Mike & Anne Fixter are providing their knowledge of the community in and around Sanderstead, whom we hope will get involved. And we are all delving deep into our creative juices to present a positive and joyful experience of the build-up to the birth of Jesus.

As in previous years we will encourage the homegroups, individuals, other church-based groups, the uniformed organisations, as well as local schools, traders and groups to participate by taking a date in December and choosing a country where they either have first-hand knowledge of the Christmas traditions and celebrations, or wish to research.

We are launching the event by end of September with the training and information to be issued by early October. We would like the completed videos ready by mid-November with a short extension for the schools.

The changing role of All Saints caretaker Tony

I was taken on as a caretaker in December 2017. At the time my duties were to assist the full time caretaker and because I live on the premises I could check that all doors and windows were shut at night.

As we all know in March this year everybody's life changed overnight due to Covid19. As I was a resident, the church warden decided not to furlough me as I was still needed to keep an eye on the premises.

The first 4 weeks were very difficult for me because normally I am used to talking to people but under the lockdown there was nobody around. Even when I was walking around the Gruffy it was so quiet and empty, there were hardly any cars or people in sight when it is usually quite a busy intersection. Things began to change when P&I Fruits started renting the car park 2 days a week. To begin with the market was very busy and it broke the monotony of the previous weeks which was a great help to my mental wellbeing.



Eventually the government started to lift some of the restrictions of the

lockdown but the church and the halls remained closed. The church was the first to open and then the halls were given permission to reopen. Both premises had to be made Covid secure which took a lot of work by Paul and the church wardens to achieve this. The reason for this was we had to give the residents of Sanderstead the confidence that they would be safe as some of them were coming out of the shielding period.



Now that both premises have reopened, members of the church and patrons of the halls have some difficult decisions to make on whether to come back using these facilities. From my own point of view I have decided that it is more important to me to have a good quality of life so with the halls being reopened I can now go back to meeting and talking to people but always at a safe distance.

After talking to people who have already made the decision to return to worship and activities in the hall, the feedback I have received has all been positive in feeling safe in both settings.

My hope for the future is that we can return to some sort of normality but I understand every individual has to make up their own mind on their future. We have made the church and the halls as safe as possible for people to return and to meet up with friends whom they haven't seen since the beginning of lockdown. If anybody has any questions about the reopening, there is always somebody available to put your mind at rest.
