## Rev Jeremy Groombridge writes,

So the long, dark evenings are with us again and perhaps we feel low as we look ahead to the next few months with a degree of trepidation. It's understandable, and certainly a feeling expressed by the Psalmist, in Psalm 42, when he uttered: "Why, my soul, are you downcast? Why so disturbed within me?".

Externally, circumstances were negative and oppressing. He himself is depressed and full of turmoil. He feels forgotten. He looks back on good times, when he enjoyed worshipping God with others, and longs for a return to the days when he could join the people in procession to the house of God with glad shouts and songs of praise.

Sounds familiar? It certainly resonates with our present situation, doesn't it! But read on, for this is how he continues: "For I will yet praise him, my Saviour and my God..." Remember, this Psalm would have been used in public worship, and sung. It is entitled a *Maskil* which means there's an element of instruction and wisdom about it. You see, the Psalmist has an important message to convey - he is refusing to surrender to discouragement and despair. Rather, despite his struggle, he is keeping true to hope in God and allowing God to shape his emotions, affirming God's sovereign love throughout everything that he is experiencing.



This week, Sandra and I paid another visit to the RHS garden at Wisley. We happened to visit on one of the sunny autumn days, and were overwhelmed by the sheer beauty of the trees and shrubs in all their autumn glory. What better affirmation could there be of the great faithfulness of our God, in whom there is no shadow of turning, and to whom the seasons "join with all nature in manifold"

witness, to thy great faithfulness, mercy and love."

We've enjoyed a wonderful autumn so far, haven't we! Our harvest was especially colourful this year, and I was especially blessed when a friend of ours wrote a lovely, evocative poem to sum up the wonder of our God who maintains all the intricate balances and cycles of nature and bestows so many wonderful gifts upon us. 

## Slow-growing fruit. Take the long view...

From Andrew and Maria, a Mission Partner couple with Church Mission Society, working in Argentina. They are seeking justice and land rights for indigenous peoples, and settling of environmental conflicts.

#### They write:

For those whose missional calling is to Bible Translation and environmental advocacy and action, results only become clear over long periods of time. If we just look at what we have done recently, especially bearing in mind recent travel restrictions, it would be easy to despair. We get the sense we are doing nothing. Yet, looking back over 30 years of service it is abundantly clear that the fruits of our service, combined with that of many other people and organisations, tend to come over the long haul.

For example, some time ago we spent 4 years in Honduras. Our mission was to establish and develop a programme that would enable indigenous communities to secure legal rights to their ancestral lands and forests. We did what we could, but no land titles had been acquired by the time we left. Unbeknown to us, and some 23 years later, those claims we helped start resulted in the Honduran state ceding communal land titles to more than 10,000 square kilometres of jungle-covered territory in the region of La Moskitia. Some of our work even contributed to the creation of the Patuca National Park (3,700 sq kms), something we did not consider even in our wildest dreams at the time!

A similar pattern has just occurred in Argentina. A struggle for indigenous land rights is only now yielding results after more than 50 years. This process, which began with initial land surveys conducted by Bishop Pat Harris and Kevin Bewley and was often led by Anglican missionaries, has just recently yielded a high-profile ruling by the inter-American Court of Human Rights. This puts significant pressure on the Argentine state to provide not only land titles but also ensure the ecological restitution of forests degraded by cattle and illegal lumber extraction.

Bible Translation is another of those tasks that requires a commitment to the long-term. My grandfather started to translate portions of the Bible into Toba back in the late 1930s. Here again these efforts, with support from missionary organisations, have yielded significant fruit only after decades of effort. The New Testament has been translated into Toba and Chorote, and the whole Bible into Wichi. Interestingly the work around these tasks, which in the case of the Toba translation of the Old Testament is still ongoing, has also served to strengthen the recognition of indigenous languages and cultural identity within national society.

So, as we pray and seek God's kingdom, let us continue to do the little we can; for we know that if we do it for Christ, everything counts.



St Paul wrote, at Galatians 6:9, Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.

## Reedham Children's Trust-Croydon's oldest Children's charity

# "A good education is a fortune a child can never spend" Reverend Andrew Reed.

Reedham Children's Trust exists to promote the wellbeing and educational advancement of vulnerable children and young people in our society. Founded in 1844 by the Reverend Dr Andrew Reed, one of the great Victorian philanthropists, the Asylum for Fatherless Children opened in temporary accommodation in Richmond until the construction of The Reedham Orphanage near Purley was finished in 1858. In 1950 the orphanage became a school and continued until its closure in January 1980. The building was demolished, and the land sold to fund what is now the Reedham Children's Trust; today the office of the Trust is actually housed in the original entrance lodge to the orphanage.

To this day we aim to be as inclusive and innovative as our founder. Through long and short-term interventions we provide practical and motivational support in schools and communities, reducing the obstacles faced by vulnerable children and young people to enable them to gain the education, stability, resilience, skills and self-belief to fulfil their potential.

Our primary focus is within the London Borough of Croydon.

Our long-term project 'Achieving More' provides targeted early-intervention support to disadvantaged children and young people aged 4-16 and their families across Croydon, to address their risk of failing to access or progress in education. We work in partnership with schools to identify the pupils and families who would benefit the most from our high level of intensive support.

We support children like Kelly. Kelly was tired and distant in class. Upon visiting Mum at home, it became apparent why. For the last two years Kelly and her Mum had been sharing a single room in a shared property. There were issues with the heating and in the winter the room had become cold and damp. Mum said that the damp and cramped conditions had caused both her and Kelly to become ill. Their living conditions were impacting all parts of their lives, their physical and mental health, Kelly's education, her ability to make friends and mum's work. We are now working with Kelly and her Mum to find a suitable home and support Kelly in her studies at school.

We also provide places in modern nurturing boarding schools, when it is not feasible for the child to stay and study at home.

On a short-term basis, we offer a range of tutoring, mentoring and revision-based support.

# A letter to the Parishes from Christopher, Bishop of Southwark



Dear Colleagues,

27 October 2020

I am delighted to be able to share some good news with you. The Archbishops' Council has awarded the Diocese of Southwark a £600,000 sustainability funding grant to help us with the consequences of COVID. We are very grateful to the Archbishops' Council for this grant especially as it is given to us partly in recognition of the fact that our Diocesan finances are effectively managed. It also takes into account that, as we are a more recently founded Diocese, we have fewer historical resources compared to many other Dioceses. The Archbishops' Council, therefore, recognised that we did not in consequence have the same options to generate funds when COVID-19 struck.

Although we have been affected by reduced investment and fee income and faced restrictions on property rentals our parishes have been magnificent in the way that they have honoured their PSF pledges throughout the current year and this is what has impressed the Church Commissioners. I wish, therefore, to send my personal thanks and appreciation to all our parishes in acknowledgment of the way you have held faith with the wider Diocesan family and worked so hard to maintain regular PSF payments even when experiencing financial difficulties. I know that the cessation of hall hire income has had a significant impact on parish income as well as the reductions in giving from parishioners when they were furloughed or without income.

Since the introduction of Parish Support Fund, five years ago, parishes have maintained a magnificent pattern of fulfilling their pledges - over 99% in each of the last four years. At the moment of writing, even in this very challenging year, our parishes have given sacrificially and held faith with the Parish Support Fund and have maintained a rate of giving which means we have collected nearly 97% of what was pledged. That is truly magnificent and I am very grateful to you all. The Church Commissioners have given us this grant in recognition that our shortfall this year is as a result of COVID-19 and in reducing our deficit this will help us all. As a Diocese we have also taken action and reduced our core costs by a similar amount, which also helps to alleviate our deficit. We are looking forward to the future and strengthening our partnership working together.

We do need very much to remain vigilant as we prepare the budget for 2021, as we know it will not be an easy year either. Our capacity to fund mission and ministry across the Diocese will, as always, very much depend on the level of PSF pledges and giving; but my purpose in writing to you now is simply to express gratitude in the context of this good news.

With my thanks for our partnership in the Gospel, together with my prayers and blessing.

I started working at All Saints' around 15 years ago. I was the 'live in' Caretaker and stayed as such for 6 years. I thoroughly enjoyed the role but having started a family, felt it was right to have a change and so left to start a new job in Coulsdon. We still kept in contact with the church and had our son, Roman, christened there and attended family services when we could. In 2016, we were fortunate enough to purchase a flat and move back to Sanderstead and in 2017, our daughter, Evelyn (also christened at the Church in November 2019), was born.

After Jenna, my soon to be wife, had finished her maternity leave and after much deliberation, we decided it made financial sense for Jenna to go back to work and for me to leave my job and to take on childcare for a while. This was a priceless time for me and I really enjoyed spending time with my children. On 6th October 2018 we got married at All Saints' Church and had our reception in the Hall. On 8th October 2018, I started back Caretaking at the church halls on a part time basis which fitted in perfectly with childcare. It was great to be back working there and seeing all the Hall users again. Finally of course, you all know that ladies are very welcome at every Men's Group event!!




