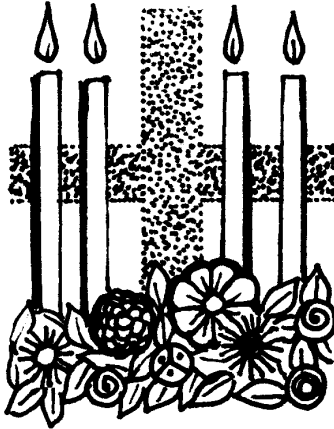

Welcome to St Mary's

Welcome to St Mary's for this service. The building is equipped with a hearing loop system, to take advantage of this please switch your hearing device to the T position. In this service we remember those whom we have loved but see no longer, those who have inspired us in our own lives and on our journey of faith. We gather to give thanks for their lives and to pray for them; that they might have the peace of God's Kingdom, and share in the promise that Christ offers to each of us. We pray that they may come to rest in the eternal peace of heaven sharing in the joy of all the Saints.

In this service we are reminded that we are united with them and all God's people both living and departed through our sharing in the life of Christ. We pray for those who have left this life as they pray for us, as together we journey as the people of God towards our final desire, full union with Him.

The Choir will sing various parts of the service, including the parts that are especially written for a requiem mass, to a setting by the West Dorset composer, Matthew Coleridge. This is not a concert or performance, but an offering to God of our worship. Their singing does not exclude us but gives us more space in which to worship and meditate on the mystery of God. As they sing focus on the promise of heaven, the place where we are one with God and pray that we may be united there with the departed for whom we pray today.

We are grateful to Matthew Coleridge for coming to conduct his Requiem. Thanks also to our Soprano Soloist Kea Waite, and to Solo Cellist Graham Vaughan.

We stand to sing

In our day of thanksgiving one psalm let us offer
for the saints who before us have found their reward;
when the shadow of death fell upon them, we sorrowed,

The Priest introduces the service and calls us to repentance of our sins, which we confess as the choir sings in Latin and Greek

Requiem aeternam dona eis, Domine, et lux perpetua luceat eis. Te decet hymnus, Deus, in Sion, et tibi reddetur votum in Jerusalem. Exaudi orationem meam; ad te omnis caro veniet.

Kyrie eleison, Christe eleison, Kyrie eleison.

Rest eternal grant them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine on them. To thee praise is due, O God, in Zion, and to thee vows are recited in Jerusalem. Hear my prayer; unto thee all flesh shall come. Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy.

We sit for the Sermon

We pray to God

Please kneel or sit for the intercessions, during which we pray, by name, for the departed. As you hear the name of a person you wish to pray for you may like to come and light a candle either at the votive stands or to place on the choir wall, this becomes a sign of your prayer and your offering to God of the people you carry in your heart..

The response in the intercessions is

Hear us, Risen Lord.

Our resurrection and our life.

The choir sings:

O Domine Jesu Christe, Rex gloriae, libera animas defunctorum de poenis inferni, et de profundo lacu: libera eas de ore leonis, ne absorbeat eas tartarus, ne cadant in obscurum. Hostias et preces tibi, Domine, laudis offerimus: tu suscipe pro animabus illis, quarum hodie memoriam facimus: fac eas, Domine, de morte transire ad vitam, Quam olim Abrahae promisisti, et semini ejus.

O Lord Jesus Christ King of Glory, free souls of the dead from punishment infernal and from deep pit free them from mouth of

lion nor let them drown in the depths of Hell nor let them fall into darkness. Sacrifices and prayers to you, Lord of praise we offer you receive for souls of those whom today we remember make them Lord to pass from death to life as you once promised to Abraham and his seed.

The Prayers conclude:

Hear us, O merciful Father,
our creator and redeemer,
by your power Christ conquered death and returned to you in glory.
May all your people who have gone before us in faith share his victory
and enjoy the vision of your glory for ever.
Amen.

We offer our lives to Christ

As the Altar is prepared we sing the hymn

Christ, enthroned in highest heaven,
hear us crying from the deep,
for the faithful ones departed,
for the souls of all that sleep;
as thy kneeling Church entreateth,
hearken, shepherd of the sheep.

They are thine, O take them to thee;
thou their hope, O raise them high;
in thy mercy ever trusting,
confident we make our cry;
that the souls whom thou hast purchased
may unto thy heart be nigh.

Let thy plenteous loving-kindness
on them evermore be poured;
let them through thy boundless mercy,
be to boundless life restored;
hearken to the gentle pleading

The Priest praises God for his mighty acts and the choir sing the song of the angels in heaven

Sanctus, sanctus, sanctus, Dominus Deus Sabaoth. Pleni sunt coeli et terra gloria tua. Hosanna in excelsis. Benedictus qui venit in nomine Domine. Hosanna in excelsis.

(Sanctus – Brian Moles, after Coleridge)

Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts. The heavens and earth are filled with thy glory.

Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

After the Priest has recalled the words of Jesus at the Last Supper

Great is the mystery of faith:

**All Christ has died: Christ is risen:
Christ will come again.**

The prayer continues and at the end all respond

Amen.

We pray as Jesus taught us

**Our Father, who art in heaven
Hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come;
Thy will be done: on earth as it is in heaven.
Give us this day our daily bread.
And forgive us our trespasses,
As we forgive those who trespass against us.
Lead us not into temptation;
but deliver us from evil.
For thine is the Kingdom,
the power, and the glory,
for ever and ever. Amen.**

We break the bread

We break this bread
to share in the body of Christ.
**Though we are many, we are one body,
because we all share in one bread.**

The choir sings:

Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccata mundi, dona eis requiem,
sempiternam requiem.

*Lamb of God, who taketh away the sins of the world, Grant
them rest, rest everlasting.*

Jesus is the Lamb of God
who takes away the sin of the world.
Blessed are those who are called to his supper.
**Lord, I am not worthy to receive you,
but only say the word, and I shall be healed.**

As communion is distributed, wherever you are pray that you may be aware of Christ's presence with you and that you will be blessed and comforted by it

If you are at Church please come forward to the Dais to receive standing – please respect other people's space. If you wish to receive where you are seated at the distanced seats, please remain standing until you have received.

During Communion the Choir will sing

Rex Tremendae majestatis, qui salvandos salvat gratis, Salva me fons pietatis.

*King of tremendous majesty, who freely saves those that are to be saved:
save me, the source of mercy.*

Lacrimosa dies illa, qua resurget ex favilla, Judicandus homo reus.

Full of tears will be that day when from the ashes shall arise the guilty man to be judged.

The following hymn may be sung:

Soul of my Saviour, sanctify my breast,
Body of Christ, be thou my saving guest,
Blood of my Saviour, bathe me in thy tide,
wash me with water flowing from thy side.

Strength and protection may thy passion be,
O blessed Jesu, hear and answer me;
deep in thy wounds, Lord, hide and shelter me,

so shall I never, never part from thee.

Guard and defend me from the foe malign,
in death's dread moments make me only thine;
call me and bid me come to thee on high
where I may praise thee with thy saints for ay.
