Requiem Mass for Remembrance Sunday

In this service we gather to remember those who have given their lives in the service of peace and freedom in the many conflicts that have beset our world. Through the offering of the Eucharist we are reminded that we are united with them and all God's people both living and departed through our sharing in the life of Christ.

Today we remember, but we pray also for the strength and courage to turn from paths of war and violence and seek always reconciliation and peace, that those who have died in conflict may not have died in vain.





We stand to sing

All people that on earth do dwell, sing to the Lord with cheerful voice; him serve with fear, his praise forth tell, come ye before him, and rejoice.

We offer our lives to Christ

As the Altar is prepared we sing the hymn

If you are at Church and seated in the front rows, please come forward to the Dais to receive standing — please respect other people's space. If you wish to receive where you are seated at the distanced seats, please remain standing until you have received.
