## The Commemoration of the Lord's Entry into Jerusalem

For those who gather at the place where the procession starts at St Faith's

As the Clergy enter the Choir sing a setting of the following words in either Latin or English:

The Children of the Hebrews, carrying palms and olive branches, went forth to meet the Lord, crying out and saying. Hosanna in the Highest! Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. **Amen.** 

Grace mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

And also with you.

We give thanks for our 'palm crosses' and commit to walk with Christ in Holy Week

The Priest introduces the celebration, and all hold up their Palm crosses to be blessed.

#### We hear the Palm Gospel

We remain standing for the Gospel of the Lord's Entrance into Jerusalem, by tradition we turn to face the Gospel book.

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Hear the Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to... Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.

We walk with Christ

Let us go forth in peace, praising Jesus our Messiah, as did the crowds who welcomed him to Jerusalem. Thanks be to God.

Please follow the cross, servers and choir out of the Church and follow the instructions of the Stewards.

All glory, laud, and honour to thee, Redeemer, King, to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring.

Thou art the king of Israel, thou David's royal son, who in the Lord's name comest, the King and blessed one.

The company of angels are praising thee on high, and mortal men and all things created make reply.

The people of the Hebrews with palms before thee went: our praise and prayer and anthems before thee we present.

To thee before thy Passion they sang their hymns of praise: to thee now high exalted our melody we raise.

Thou didst accept their praises: accept the prayers we bring, who in all good delightest, thou good and gracious King.

Thy sorrow and thy triumph grant us, O Christ, to share, that to the holy city together we may fare.

For homage may we bring thee our victory o'er the foe, that in the conqueror's triumph this strain may ever flow:

Please stand

Those unable to stand throughout the narrative will be invited to stand for the final moments of Jesus' life. The Narrator will pause at the recollection of Jesus' death where it is traditional to genuflect or bow the head in silence.

The following response is used:

let us pray to the Lord. Lord, have mercy.

At the end after a period of stillness

Holy God, holy and strong, holy and immortal, have mercy upon us.

#### We share Christ's love and peace

The Priest introduces the Peace and then says

The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer one another a sign of peace

Be aware of all who share in this celebration and reflect on how we share Christ's peace in our lives and how we can show and share that peace with others.

We offer our lives to God

The gifts of bread and wine are prepared and offered to God – reflect on what you are offering to God today – what lies in your hearts ...

My song is love unknown, my Saviour's love to me, love to the loveless shown, that they might lovely be.

O, who am I that for my sake my Lord should take frail flesh, and die.

He came from his blest throne, salvation to bestow but men made strange, and none the longed-for Christ would know. But O, my friend, my friend indeed, who at my need his life did spend.

The Priest continues the prayer, asking that the Spirit may come upon the gifts and recalling the action of Jesus at the Last Supper

As communion is distributed, wherever you are pray that you may be aware of Christ's presence with you and that you will be blessed and comforted by it

At Communion if you wish to receive from the chalice – the common cup – please make your way to the Lady Chapel Altar(by Mary's statue). If you would rather have the host intincted in the wine by the Priest please come to the front centre.

During Communion the Choir will sing an anthem.
