Abilities See also Habits; Planning; Strengths & Weaknesses

Deep within the human spirit is a desire, and a capability, to do wonderful things. Because we were made in the image of God, we inherited from him the desire to create, to accomplish, to make things happen. But why would God give us these desires unless he also gave us the way to fulfill them? Abilities are God's gifts to enable us to carry out whatever he created us to do. As we use and sharpen these abilities, we find great joy in living out our God-given purposes. How we use or misuse these abilities ultimately determines our quality of life—quality defined, not as comfort or the accumulation of things, but as character, joy, and lasting satisfaction. Our goal is first to discover our abilities, then exercise them, and finally channel them toward good rather than evil. God has given all of us certain abilities. Life is more fulfilling when we exercise them for his Kingdom glory and purposes.

What if I don't feel like I have many abilities?

• EPHESIANS 4:11-13 | Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church... to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church... until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord.

God has empowered each of us with special abilities; no one is left empty-handed. But how we use these abilities is up to us.

Will God ever ask me to do something outside of my abilities?

• EXODUS 4:10-12 | But Moses pleaded... "O Lord, I'm not very good with words. I never have been, and I'm not now, even though you have spoken to me. I get tongue-tied, and my words get tangled." Then the LORD asked Moses, "Who makes a person's mouth? Who decides whether people speak or do not speak, hear or do not hear, see or do not see? Is it not I, the LORD? Now go! I will be with you as you speak, and I will instruct you in what to say." (See note on page 55.)

God will help us in important areas where we lack ability. If God is asking you to do something, he will give you the ability or extra resources to get the job done.

• EPHESIANS 3:18 | And may you . . . understand, as all God's people should, how wide, how long, how high, and how deep his love is.

The number of abilities you have is not related to the degree of love God has for you. God loves all believers wholly and unconditionally, so much so that he sent his own Son, Jesus, to die in our place so that we could live forever with him.

How should I use my abilities?

• 1 TIMOTHY 4:7-8 | Train yourself to be godly. "Physical training is good, but training for godliness is much better."

Properly exercising our abilities will help us grow spiritually.

• MATTHEW 25:21 | "Well done, my good and faithful servant. You have been faithful in handling this small amount, so now I will give you many more responsibilities." You can exercise your God-given abilities and become highly skilled at using them. But they will be truly impactful only if you use them to serve God and others.

Can God use my abilities even if they aren't "spiritual"?

• 1 KINGS 7:14, 40 | Huram was extremely skillful and talented in any work in bronze.... So at last Huram completed everything King Solomon had assigned him to make for the Temple of the LORD. (See note on page 307.)

Talents and abilities, though personal, become spiritual in purpose when used to honor God.

It's easy for me to be jealous when others seem to have more abilities than me. How do I deal with that?

• 2 CORINTHIANS 12:9-10 | I am glad to boast about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ can work through me. That's why I take pleasure in my weaknesses, and in the insults, hardships, persecutions, and troubles that I suffer for Christ. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

We really don't know why God hands out talents and abilities the way he does. But the Bible makes it clear that what God has given to each of us, if used faithfully, will accomplish great things. God often takes joy in using people the world thinks are lacking in ability or talent to accomplish his plans.

I am very good at what I do. Is it wrong to feel that way?

• 2 CORINTHIANS 3:5 | It is not that we think we are qualified to do anything on our own. Our qualification comes from God.

Rejoice in your God-given abilities, but let that rejoicing be poured out as a thank offering to the God who gave them. Without God, our abilities are dreams without power, cups without water, engines without fuel.

I want to be a great musician. Why didn't God give me the ability to do that?

• ROMANS 12:6 | God has given us different gifts for doing certain things well. (See note on page 1023.)

Our talents and abilities are gifts from God. It is better to be thankful for the gifts we have and to maximize them rather than to dream of gifts we do not have and to feel that God shortchanged us.

What if I never get to use my abilities?

• HEBREWS 11:26 | [Moses] thought it was better to suffer for the sake of Christ than to own the treasures of Egypt, for he was looking ahead to his great reward.

What is keeping you from using your abilities? Is it your own lack of discipline or circumstances beyond your control? If you are truly prevented by circumstances beyond your control, then take comfort in the fact that God still loves you, and the suffering that is keeping you from reaching your potential will bring you a great reward in heaven.

PROMISE FROM GOD

 MATTHEW 25:29 | "To those who use well what they are given, even more will be given, and they will have an abundance."

Abortion

What if you had never been born? How would the world be different? What would never have happened? If you are a parent, your children would never have been born . . . nor would their future children and grandchildren. Pregnancies may occur naturally or accidentally . . . or deliberately. Interrupting a pregnancy deliberately is called abortion, and it ranges from destruction of the fertilized egg to the dismemberment and forced ejection of a nearly full-term baby. A great controversy rages today concerning abortion, focusing on whether the unborn baby is truly a person and not just a developing physical body.

Does human life begin at conception, at birth, or at some point between the two? Who would argue that at birth the baby isn't fully a human being? But is the unborn child fully a human being? And are there any justifiable reasons for abortion? Most Christians would argue against abortion as a means of birth control. Some would argue that abortion is acceptable if it will save the life of the mother, in the case of rape or incest, or if the unborn child is thought to be brain damaged or deformed. Ultimately the core issue centers on the sacredness and value of human life because not a single person would deny that an unborn baby, if left to grow and develop in the womb, would eventually be born as a human being. Never in history has a human fetus been born as anything other than a human baby. So the real question is not whether the fetus is human or not, but what value we should place on human life, because an fetus is indeed destined to become a human life.

Does the Bible say anything about human qualities in the unborn child?

• PSALM 51:5 | I was born a sinner—yes, from the moment my mother conceived me. (See note on page 507.)

Abortion continued

Sinfulness—perhaps the most unmistakable human quality—is present not only at birth but even as far back as conception.

Is God actively involved in our development before birth?

• PSALM 139:13-16 | You made all the delicate, inner parts of my body and knit me together in my mother's womb. Thank you for making me so wonderfully complex! Your workmanship is marvelous—how well I know it. You watched me as I was being formed in utter seclusion. . . . You saw me before I was born. Every day of my life was recorded in your book. (See note on page 553.)

God is present continuously during the nine months of pregnancy—forming, watching, creating, and even scheduling each day of the unborn baby's life.

Does God have any personal relationship with the unborn child?

 JEREMIAH 1:5 | "I knew you before I formed you in your mother's womb. Before you were born I set you apart and appointed you as my prophet to the nations." (See note on page 665.)
 God knew each of us before we developed in our mothers' wombs. He establishes a purpose for us before we are even born.

Why is abortion such an important matter for all people to consider?

• GENESIS 9:6 | God made human beings in his own image. (See note on page 11.)

If the unborn child, at any stage of pregnancy, is a person, then terminating that pregnancy is ending the life of that child. God sees all human beings, regardless of age, as special creations with eternal value. God also makes it clear that killing another human being (i.e., intentionally ending that person's life) is one of the greatest sins against him.

Can God forgive me if I've had an abortion?

- PSALM 51:3, 10, 12 | I recognize my rebellion; it haunts me day and night.... Create in me a clean heart, O God.... Restore to me the joy of your salvation.
 Just as King David experienced the joy of total forgiveness after committing adultery and murder, so we can know God's forgiveness—for any sin—if we confess our sin to him.
- ISAIAH 1:18 | "Come now..." says the LORD. "Though your sins are like scarlet, I will make them as white as snow. Though they are red like crimson, I will make them as white as wool."
- **PSALM 103:3** | *He forgives all my sins.*
- 1 JOHN 1:9 | If we confess our sins to him, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all wickedness.
- EPHESIANS 3:18 | May you have the power to understand . . . how wide, how long, how high, and how deep his love is.
 - No sin is beyond God's forgiveness. No matter what you may have done in the past, let God restore you to wholeness.

Absence See also Grief; Loneliness; Regrets

We all experience absence in some way. Our friends or family members may leave us for a period of time, or maybe they were always absent from our lives. Sometimes our own absence causes us to miss important opportunities. And in difficult situations we can feel as though God is absent or has moved away from us. Whatever the cause, it is important to know that God is never absent. He sent his Holy Spirit to be present with us always.

Why do I sometimes feel that God is absent?

• PSALM 10:1 | O LORD, why do you stand so far away? Why do you hide when I am in trouble?

- PSALM 13:1 | O LORD, how long will you forget me? Forever? How long will you look the other way?
- MATTHEW 28:20 | "And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." The greater your troubles, the farther away God can seem. In your darkest hour, you may feel that God has left you. In times like this, when it seems like God is absent, don't trust your feelings; trust God's promise that he will never leave you.
- ISAIAH 59:1-2 | Listen! The LORD's arm is not too weak to save you, nor is his ear too deaf to hear you call. It's your sins that have cut you off from God.
 - Sin is a wall that separates you from God. Sometimes it is our own persistent, willful sin that causes us to feel cut off from the Lord and to miss the joy of fellowship with him. Is God making you aware of sin in your life? If you persist in that sin, you may indeed feel that God is absent. Tear down the wall of sin by humble confession, and you will find God on the other side. Then through prayer and time with him, you will begin to sense his presence again, and you will see evidence of his work in your life.
- JAMES 4:7-8 | So humble yourselves before God.... Come close to God, and God will come close to you.
 - If you want to have restored fellowship with God, you need to have a humble attitude, confess your sins, and draw near to God. Humility puts you in sync with God.

Why is it important for us not to be absent in our relationships (from our families, from our jobs, from the church, etc.)?

- ECCLESIASTES 4:9-10 | Two people are better off than one, for they can help each other succeed. If one person falls, the other can reach out and help. But someone who falls alone is in real trouble.
 - Your presence provides physical and emotional support to others. Two or more can form a team and accomplish much more together than separately. When you need "a lift" emotionally, an inanimate object may not do much; sometimes it takes a smile, a kind word, a hug, or a touch from someone who cares.
- JOB 42:11 | Then all his brothers, sisters, and former friends came and feasted with him in his home. And they consoled him and comforted him because of all the trials.
- GENESIS 45:15 | Then Joseph kissed each of his brothers and wept over them, and after that they began talking freely with him.
- 2 CORINTHIANS 7:6 | But God, who encourages those who are discouraged, encouraged us by the arrival of Titus.
 - Your presence provides emotional support to others. When you need "a lift" emotionally, an inanimate object doesn't do much. It takes a smile, a kind word, a hug, a touch from someone who cares.
- **PSALM 34:3** | Come, let us tell of the LORD's greatness; let us exalt his name together.
- ACTS 1:14 | They all met together and were constantly united in prayer.

 Your presence provides spiritual support to others. God's people should meet together in God's presence for worship, prayer, and to encourage each other.
- GENESIS 37:18-29 | When Joseph's brothers saw him coming, they recognized him in the distance [and] made plans to kill him... But when Reuben heard of their scheme, he came to Joseph's rescue... Reuben was secretly planning to rescue Joseph... Some time later, Reuben returned to get Joseph out of the cistern. When he discovered that Joseph was missing, he tore his clothes in grief.
 - When you are absent, you miss crucial opportunities to help others. Much good can be done by just being there.
- MATTHEW 25:10 | "While they were gone to buy oil, the bridegroom came. Then those who were ready went in with him to the marriage feast, and the door was locked."

 When you are absent, you miss important opportunities that can change your life.
- HEBREWS 10:25 | And let us not neglect our meeting together, as some people do, but encourage one another.
 - Neglecting church may cause you to neglect God and his people.

Absence continued

How can I compensate for those times when my physical presence is not possible?

- 1 CORINTHIANS 5:3-4 | Even though I am not with you in person, I am with you in the Spirit. . . . I will be present with you in spirit, and so will the power of our Lord Jesus. When you are not physically present, you can still exercise your commitment to your relationship. Two caring people can provide emotional and spiritual support for each other at a distance.
- 2 JOHN 1:12 | I hope to visit you soon and talk with you face to face. Then our joy will be complete.
- 1 THESSALONIANS 2:17 | Dear brothers and sisters, after we were separated from you for a little while (though our hearts never left you), we tried very hard to come back because of our intense longing to see you again.
- 2 TIMOTHY 1:4 | I long to see you again, for I remember your tears as we parted. And I will be filled with joy when we are together again.
 - When you are away from your family—or your dearest friends—keep in touch with them as much as possible, praying for them along the way and looking forward to your reunion. There are many ways to connect with others from a distance.

Absolutes See Convictions; Truth

Abuse See also Addiction; Anger; Bitterness; Healing; Pain; Self-Esteem; Suffering

How wide is the circle of your influence and power? How many people, talents, possessions, or opportunities are in that circle? What we do with what we have is a reflection of who we are and how much we deserve to be entrusted with more. We can be good stewards of what is within our control, or we can abuse what has been entrusted to us. In its simplest form, abuse is poor stewardship of what has been entrusted to us. But it can be far more dangerous and damaging. Abuse may be violent or it may be as quiet as neglect or abandonment. Abuse can be aggressive, but it may also be regressive—a steady depreciation of human worth, like dripping water wearing down a rock.

Abuse may inflict pain or rob personhood; it may leave scars on the skin or lacerations on the heart. Its result may be superficial, the response to a careless comment, or it may be a lifetime wound resulting from a neglected or mismanaged trust. Abuse requires an abuser and a person who has been abused. But God grants healing—both physical and spiritual—through forgiveness and a new way to live. The abuser can change, becoming truly transformed by God's Spirit. The person who has been abused, through Christ, can forgive the abuser and find true healing. This allows the cycle of abuse, which can become multigenerational, to halt.

Will God forgive a person who is guilty of abuse?

- ACTS 2:21 | "But everyone who calls on the name of the LORD will be saved."
- LUKE 23:34 | "Father, forgive them, for they don't know what they are doing."
 God forgives all sins, not selected ones. His mercy is to anyone, regardless of that person's past.

• 2 CHRONICLES 33:6, 13 | Manasseh also sacrificed his own sons in the fire in the valley of the Ben-Hinnom. . . . when he prayed, the LORD listened to him and was moved by his request.

Manasseh was the most wicked king in Judah's history, abusive to the point that he burned his own sons on an altar. But later in life he sought God's forgiveness, and God did forgive him, transforming him into a man who did great things for his nation.

Is physical discipline of my child considered abuse?

- PROVERBS 29:15, 17 | To discipline a child produces wisdom, but a mother is disgraced by an undisciplined child. Discipline your children, and they will give you peace of mind. (See note on page 584.)
- PROVERBS 13:24 | Those who spare the rod of discipline hate their children. Those who love their children care enough to discipline them.

The Bible clearly advocates discipline of children, even physical discipline. But it must be measured and done with restraint and in love, in a manner that in never borders on abuse or physical harm. "Discipline" that comes from anger can often lead to abuse and violence.

What is the best way to prevent abuse?

• ROMANS 13:10 | Love does no wrong to others. (See note on page 1024.)

Love restrains us from abusing a loved one—physically or in any other way. This is not a roller-coaster love based on feelings, but a rock-solid commitment to protect and nurture regardless of the way you feel at a particular moment. Violence or abuse against a loved one is a clear signal that our love for that person is not genuine.

How do I begin to heal the wounds of abuse?

- MATTHEW 15:30 | And [Jesus] healed them all. (See note on page 877.)
 Only Jesus can truly heal broken lives.
- PROVERBS 11:14 | Without wise leadership, a nation falls; there is safety in having many advisers.
- PROVERBS 20:18 | Plans succeed through good counsel.
 Seek help from godly counselors.
- MATTHEW 5:44 | "Love your enemies! Pray for those who persecute you!"
 Forgiveness means praying for those who hate and hurt you. This releases you from the destructive emotions of anger, bitterness, and revenge.
- EPHESIANS 4:31 | Get rid of all bitterness, rage, anger, harsh words.

 An unforgiving attitude not only ruins your relationships, but it also poisons your soul. The person most hurt by unforgiveness is you.
- ROMANS 12:19 | Dear friends, never take revenge. Leave that to the righteous anger of God. For the Scriptures say, "I will take revenge; I will pay them back," says the LORD.
 Punishing evildoers is God's job, not yours, and God can be trusted to administer justice. Therefore you can remove yourself from the endless cycle of revenge and retaliation by forgiving.
- PHILIPPIANS 4:8 | Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise.
 As we fill our minds with thoughts about God, there is less room, and less time, to dwell on the past.

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- **PSALM 9:12** | *He does not ignore the cries of those who suffer.*
- PSALM 23:4 | Even when I walk through the darkest valley, I will not be afraid, for you are close beside me. Your rod and your staff protect and comfort me.

Accountability See also Boundaries; Commitment; Convictions; Discipline; Honesty & Integrity; Priorities; Self-Control

Accountability is giving an account of yourself to someone—where you've been, what you've been doing, who you've been with, how you will perform a certain task, or what your motives are. The one who is holding you accountable has the freedom, perhaps the right, to ask for a report. But don't most of us resent it when we are fully accountable? We may feel that it restricts us and forces us to expose dark corners of our lives we'd prefer to keep hidden.

Although genuine accountability may be uncomfortable, it's necessary, for it keeps us honest, moral, and on the right path. It urges us to do what we should do, even if we prefer not to. If we answer to no one, aren't we free to go where our desires lead rather than where God leads—a dangerous game? Bosses may or may not do a good job of holding their employees accountable. Parents may or may not always do such a good job of holding their children accountable. How well do you hold yourself accountable to someone else? When we think no one is watching or no one will ask us tough questions, it's easy to do whatever we want. We are more prone to take the wrong path. But God is watching and he does hold us accountable. Fortunately, his motives are always pure. He wants to help us do what is good and what is best for us. If what we should do is not what we want to do, it is time to discover what God wants us to do.

What kinds of things am I accountable for?

- JOHN 3:18-19 | "There is no judgment against anyone who believes in him. But anyone who does not believe in him has already been judged for not believing in God's one and only Son. And the judgment is based on this fact: God's light came into the world, but people loved the darkness more than the light, for their actions were evil."
- JOHN 3:36 | "And anyone who believes in God's Son has eternal life. Anyone who doesn't obey the Son will never experience eternal life but remains under God's angry judgment."
- MATTHEW 3:8 | "Prove by the way you live that you have repented of your sins and turned to God."

You are accountable for your own disobedience to God.

- 2 KINGS 12:15 | No accounting of this money was required from the construction supervisors, because they were honest and trustworthy men.
- 2 KINGS 22:7 | "But don't require the construction supervisors to keep account of the money they receive, for they are honest and trustworthy men."

 You are accountable for your own character.
- PROVERBS 5:13 | Oh, why didn't I listen to my teachers? Why didn't I pay attention to my instructors?

You are accountable for your own spiritual growth.

• MATTHEW 12:36 | "And I tell you this, you must give an account on judgment day for every idle word you speak."

You are accountable for the words you speak.

• LUKE 12:43-47 | If the master returns and finds that the servant has done a good job, there will be a reward.... But what if the servant thinks, 'My master won't be back for a while,' and he begins beating the other servants, partying, and getting drunk?... A servant who knows what the master wants, but isn't prepared and doesn't carry out those instructions, will be severely punished.

You are accountable for the work you are given to do.

• 1 TIMOTHY 6:17 | Teach those who are rich in this world not to be proud and not to trust in their money, which is so unreliable. Their trust should be in God, who richly gives us all we need for our enjoyment.

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- LUKE 16:11 | "And if you are untrustworthy about worldly wealth, who will trust you with the true riches of heaven?"
- **PSALM 90:12** | Teach us to realize the brevity of life, so that we may grow in wisdom.
- EPHESIANS 5:15-16 | So be careful how you live. Don't live like fools, but like those who are wise. Make the most of every opportunity in these evil days.
 - You are accountable for your resources: how you spend your money, time, energy, and talents.

How do I become more accountable?

- PSALM 119:9, 66 | How can a young person stay pure? By obeying your word.... Now teach me good judgment and knowledge. (See note on page 542.)
- **PSALM 1:1** | *Oh, the joys of those who do not follow the advice of the wicked.*
- **PROVERBS 27:6** | Wounds from a sincere friend are better than many kisses from an enemy. To become more accountable, commit yourself to follow God's commands as outlined in his Word, the Bible. And choose wise friends who you can freely and safely give an account of yourself to.

What happens when there is no accountability?

- **JUDGES 17:6** | *The people did whatever seemed right in their own eyes.*
- 1 SAMUEL 13:11-12 | Saul replied, "I saw . . . you didn't arrive when you said you would. ... I felt compelled to offer the burnt offering myself." (See note on page 255.) Left unaccountable, we will almost always lean toward sin. The consequences of those sins will hurt not only us but many others, including God.

How can I choose people to hold me more accountable?

- 1 KINGS 12:8-11 | But Rehoboam rejected the advice of the older men and instead asked the opinion of the young men who had grown up with him.... The young men replied, "[Tell them] '... My father laid heavy burdens on you, but I'm going to make them even heavier!'"
- EXODUS 18:21-22 | "But select from all the people some capable, honest men who fear God and hate bribes.... They will help you carry the load, making the task easier for you." Friends are not always the best advisers, especially if their counsel is not consistent with God's Word, or if they tell you only what you want to hear.

How can I effectively hold someone else accountable?

• TITUS 1:7-8 | He must not be arrogant or quick-tempered.... He must live wisely and be just. He must live a devout and disciplined life.

If you are going to minister to others by holding them accountable, you must be wise, honest, godly, and trustworthy.

Is it really important for others to hold us accountable?

• **PROVERBS 12:15** | Fools think their own way is right, but the wise listen to others. Good advisers keep us from actions that can hurt us.

What if I don't want anyone to know certain things about me?

• JEREMIAH 23:24 | "Can anyone hide from me in a secret place? Am I not everywhere in all the heavens and earth?" says the LORD. (See note on page 688.)

What you withhold now is likely to be exposed at a later time. So why not seek advice now? Besides, God knows all the secrets in our hearts. If you're going to take accountability seriously, you cannot hide anything from the one who you are accountable to.

Does God really hold us accountable for all our actions?

• ECCLESIASTES 11:9 | Young people, it's wonderful to be young! Enjoy every minute of it. Do everything you want to do; take it all in. But remember that you must give an account to God for everything you do.

Enjoy life, but stay within God's guidelines. God will hold us accountable for everything we do. Who wants to explain ungodliness to a holy God on the Day of Judgment?

Addiction See also Desires; Guilt; Lust; Temptation

Who in his right mind would volunteer to become a slave, chained to a life of bondage? Yet that's just what addiction is: self-imposed slavery, selling oneself into bondage to habit or a substance. While we typically think of addiction as a problem related to drugs or alcohol, there are other addictions that can also be destructive. We may become addicted to work, addicted to gambling, or addicted to pornography. We all have our addictions, whether they are "minor" bad habits or dangerous dependencies. One thing we are all dangerously addicted to is sin. When it comes to rejecting God's way of living and doing what seems best to us—well, we are hooked.

So how do we break the chains of our sin addiction? Ironically, it is by submitting to the control of God and his Holy Spirit. We are still controlled, but his control is always for our benefit and health, not our destruction. God's transforming power is the only thing that can ultimately heal us from all addictions.

Can addiction involve more than substance abuse?

- 2 PETER 2:19 | [These false teachers] promise freedom, but they themselves are slaves of sin and corruption. For you are a slave to whatever controls you. (See note on page 1136.)

 The key to addiction is control. What controls you? Whenever we have a master, we are slaves. Addiction is relinquishing ourselves to the control of something or someone else.
- **ROMANS 3:23** | For everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard.
- COLOSSIANS 1:22 | You are holy and blameless as you stand before him without a single fault.
- 1 CORINTHIANS 6:11 | But you were cleansed; you were made holy; you were made right with God.
 - Sin is the most deeply ingrained addiction of every human being. You can't go to a clinic to overcome sin once and for all. But you can go to a person—Jesus Christ, the Son of God—to help you resist the sin in your life and to completely forgive what's left. When he forgives you, he looks at you as though you have never sinned, and when your life on earth is over, he will give you eternal life where you will be forever free from sin.
- ROMANS 8:5, 7 | Those who are dominated by the sinful nature think about sinful things. . . . For the sinful nature is always hostile to God. It never did obey God's laws, and it never will
 - You can be addicted to your own sinful nature, which can dominate your thoughts and actions.
- MATTHEW 19:21-22 | Jesus told him, "If you want to be perfect, go and sell all your possessions and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me." But when the young man heard this, he went away sad, for he had many possessions.
 - Possessions can be addictive.
- ROMANS 1:26-27 | That is why God abandoned them to their shameful desires. Even the women turned against the natural way to have sex and instead indulged in sex with each other. And the men, instead of having normal sexual relations with women, burned with lust for each other.
 - Sexual perversions can be addictive.
- PROVERBS 21:17 | Those who love pleasure become poor; those who love wine and luxury will never be rich.
 - Pleasure, a luxurious lifestyle, and wealth can be addictive.
- **PSALM 39:6** | *All our busy rushing ends in nothing.*
- MARK 6:31 | Then Jesus said, "Let's go off by ourselves to a quiet place and rest awhile."
 Work can be addictive. Make sure you find time to rest and refresh your body and spirit.

Does the Bible say anything about drugs?

- 1 CORINTHIANS 6:12-13 | You say, "I am allowed to do anything"—but not everything is good for you. And even though "I am allowed to do anything," I must not become a slave to anything. . . . [Our bodies] were made for the Lord, and the Lord cares about our bodies.
- 1 CORINTHIANS 6:19-20 | Don't you realize that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who lives in you and was given to you by God? You do not belong to yourself, for God bought you with a high price. So you must honor God with your body.
- 1 CORINTHIANS 10:31 | So whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God.

The Bible doesn't specifically mention the kind of drug addiction common among many people today, but it does address putting things into your body that are harmful and that impair your ability to function. Taking drugs to get a high produces an artificial happiness or escape that is a cheap substitute for the true joy of being filled by the Holy Spirit. When the Holy Spirit controls your life, your joy is authentic and contagious.

Can I be devoted to God and other things too? Is that addiction?

MATTHEW 6:24 | "No one can serve two masters. For you will hate one and love the other."
 Devotion and addiction are different, but devotion can lead to addiction. You can be devoted to family and friends and to helping other people. You can be devoted to a worthy cause. This shows you care. But devotion becomes addiction when it so absorbs you that God is no longer your first priority and distracts you from spending time with him. You must evaluate who or what is most important to you. A clue to determining this is to see where you spend most of your time.

What is the best way to be free from my addictions and bad habits?

- ROMANS 6:16 | Don't you realize that you become the slave of whatever you choose to obey? You can be a slave to sin, which leads to death, or you can choose to obey God, which leads to righteous living.
 - Submission is a choice. We daily stand at the crossroads, choosing sinful ways or God's way. Choose wisely.
- ROMANS 12:2 | Don't copy the behavior and customs of this world, but let God transform you into a new person by changing the way you think. Then you will learn to know God's will for you, which is good and pleasing and perfect.
- 1 JOHN 4:4 | You belong to God, my dear children. You have already won a victory . . . because the Spirit who lives in you is greater than the spirit who lives in the world.
- 1 JOHN 5:4-5 | Every child of God defeats this evil world, and we achieve this victory through our faith. And who can win this battle against the world? Only those who believe that Jesus is the Son of God.

Freedom from addiction comes as you change your focus and the way you think. You do this by trusting Christ to transform you and empower you to resist temptation. While it is healthy and important to seek the help of others, with God's help, you have the ultimate power to overcome addiction. It's hard to focus on Christ when your eyes are fixed on this world. It's hard to focus on worldliness when your eyes are fixed on Christ.

If we shouldn't let anything control us, why do we submit to the Holv Spirit's control?

- GALATIANS 5:22-23 | But the Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. (See note on page 1063.)
- ROMANS 8:6 | Letting your sinful nature control your mind leads to death. But letting the Spirit control your mind leads to life and peace.
 - God's control is the only kind of control that produces completely positive results.

• JOHN 8:36 | So if the Son sets you free, you are truly free.

Adoption See also Family

Adoption is a beautiful expression of God's love for mankind. Adoption gives children a new life that they could not achieve on their own. In the same way, Jesus provided the way for us to have eternal life in heaven, a new life we could never achieve on our own. Just as parents lovingly teach and nurture an adopted child, God teaches and nurtures his children through the Holy Spirit. Just as adoptive parents welcome a boy or girl to become their own child, God welcomes us all to be adopted into his own family and to enjoy his blessings in this life and eternity. This hope in our spiritual adoption can sustain those of us who are experiencing the frustrations and joys of earthly adoption.

Is adopting a child right for me and my family? How can I know for sure?

- MATTHEW 18:5 | "And anyone who welcomes a little child like this on my behalf is welcoming me."
- PSALM 138:8 | The LORD will work out his plans for my life—for your faithful love, O LORD, endures forever.
- JEREMIAH 1:5 | I knew you before I formed you in your mother's womb. Before you were born I set you apart.

There are some things in life you can't know for sure, but the Bible is clear on this: God puts a high priority on loving children. If you adopt a child and welcome him or her into your heart and life, you are demonstrating the kind of love Christ showed for you.

I'm wading through all the paperwork to adopt a child. How can I deal with these months of anxious waiting?

- PSALM 37:4-5 | Take delight in the LORD, and he will give you your heart's desires. Commit everything you do to the LORD. Trust him, and he will help you.
- ISAIAH 60:1, 4-5 | "Arise, Jerusalem! Let your light shine for all to see. For the glory of the LORD rises to shine on you. . . . Look and see, for everyone is coming home! Your sons are coming from distant lands; your little daughters will be carried home. Your eyes will shine, and your heart will thrill with joy."

Waiting is never any fun, especially when the heart is involved. That's why it's important to imagine the end result: a child who your heart will "thrill with joy" over

How can I explain my decision to adopt?

- **PSALM 127:3** | Children are a gift from the LORD; they are a reward from him.
- MATTHEW 18:5 | "And anyone who welcomes a little child like this on my behalf is welcoming me."

If you choose to adopt, some people may not understand that decision. And this is especially true if the child is of different ethnicity than the adoptive parents. In such situations, the best thing you can do is lovingly explain that you made your decision carefully, that God loves all children equally, and that you believe God brought this child to your family for a particular purpose.

How has God adopted me?

- JOHN 1:12 | But to all who believed him and accepted him, he gave the right to become children of God.
- GALATIANS 4:4-5 | But when the right time came, God sent his Son... to buy freedom for us who were slaves to the law, so that he could adopt us as his very own children.
 When you accept Jesus Christ as your Savior, God adopts you into his family.

Why would God want to adopt me?

- 1 JOHN 3:1 | See how very much our Father loves us, for he calls us his children, and that is what we are!
- 1 THESSALONIANS 1:4 | We know, dear brothers and sisters, that God loves you and has chosen you to be his own people.
 - God chose you to be his adopted child because he loves you.
- EPHESIANS 1:5 | God decided in advance to adopt us into his own family by bringing us to himself through Jesus Christ. This is what he wanted to do, and it gave him great pleasure.
 - Adopting you as his child has always been part of God's plan since the beginning of time
- 1 PETER 2:9 | But you are not like that, for you are a chosen people. You are royal priests, a holy nation, God's very own possession. As a result, you can show others the goodness of God, for he called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.
 - God has adopted you to radiate his goodness to others.

What are some of my privileges as God's adopted child?

- 2 CORINTHIANS 6:18 | "And I will be your Father, and you will be my sons and daughters, says the LORD Almighty."
- EPHESIANS 2:18 | Now all of us can come to the Father through the same Holy Spirit because of what Christ has done for us.
 - You have a relationship with God the Father.
- EPHESIANS 2:19 | So now you Gentiles are no longer strangers and foreigners. You are citizens along with all of God's holy people. You are members of God's family.
- HEBREWS 2:11 | So now Jesus and the ones he makes holy have the same Father. That is why Jesus is not ashamed to call them his brothers and sisters.
 You belong to God's family.
- EPHESIANS 1:6-8 | So we praise God for the glorious grace he has poured out on us who belong to his dear Son... He has showered his kindness on us, along with all wisdom and understanding.
 - You are a beneficiary of God's kindness.
- EPHESIANS 3:6 | And this is God's plan: Both Gentiles and Jews who believe the Good News share equally in the riches inherited by God's children.
- MATTHEW 7:11 | "If you sinful people know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your heavenly Father give good gifts to those who ask him."
 You are a recipient of God's blessings and good gifts.
- 1 THESSALONIANS 2:12 | We pleaded with you, encouraged you, and urged you to live your lives in a way that God would consider worthy. For he called you to share in his Kingdom and glory.
- ROMANS 8:17 | And since we are his children, we are his heirs. In fact, together with Christ we are heirs of God's glory. But if we are to share his glory, we must also share his suffering. You have the privilege to share in Christ's glory and suffering.
- JOHN 14:2-3 | "There is more than enough room in my Father's home. If this were not so, would I have told you that I am going to prepare a place for you? When everything is ready, I will come and get you, so that you will always be with me where I am."
- 1 PETER 1:4 | And we have a priceless inheritance—an inheritance that is kept in heaven for you, pure and undefiled, beyond the reach of change and decay.
 - The privilege of being a child of God does not stop on earth but continues through eternity. You will always have a relationship with God. Even your inheritance is eternal, for you will live in his heavenly home with him forever!

Adoption continued

PROMISE FROM GOD

• EPHESIANS 1:4-5 | Even before he made the world, God loved us and chose us in Christ to be holy and without fault in his eyes. God decided in advance to adopt us into his own family by bringing us to himself through Jesus Christ. This is what he wanted to do, and it gave him great pleasure.

Adversity See also Conflict; Enemies; Grief; Pain; Persecution; Racism & Prejudice; Spiritual Warfare; Stress; Suffering; Temptation; Worry

Troubles come with a multitude of names—accidents, afflictions, bereavement, calamities, difficulties, disappointments, disasters, failures, hard times, hurts, miseries, misfortunes, reversals, ruin, sufferings, tragedies, trials, tribulations, troubles, or woes. They can come unexpectedly or after repeated warnings. Adversities may be temporarily discomforting or permanently disabling, even life-threatening or life-taking. Some adversities merely take more effort to work through, while others permanently wound. Adversity literally means "something acting against you." Nowhere is this concept more clearly presented than in the Bible, which makes it clear that God himself sometimes sends adversity either as a punishment for sin or simply as a way to test and strengthen our character. Other times Satan sends adversity to tempt us to sin. And God allows it. And sometimes we bring adversity on ourselves by acting foolishly or sinfully. And finally, there is the adversity that comes out of nowhere through no fault of our own. The one thing you can count on about adversity is that it will come. We all will have troubles, so it is not a matter of will we or won't we—the issue is what we will do with adversity when it comes.

Does God actually send adversity into my life? Don't troubles just happen?

- DEUTERONOMY 28:20 | "The LORD himself will send on you curses, confusion, and frustration . . . for doing evil and abandoning me."
- JEREMIAH 21:14 | "I myself will punish you for your sinfulness, says the LORD." (See note on page 686.)
- HOSEA 4:9 | "So now I will punish both priests and people for their wicked deeds."

 Troubles do often "just happen" because we live in a sinful world, and God usually allows the cycle of sin to play itself out (for now). But just as a loving parent brings adversity into the life of a child through discipline, God may also bring adversity into our lives to correct us when we do wrong. This is for our benefit, not harm. God may also bring difficulties into our lives to strengthen and prepare us for life ahead.
- LAMENTATIONS 3:33 | He does not enjoy hurting people or causing them sorrow. (See note on page 725.)
- ROMANS 5:8 | But God showed his great love for us by sending Christ to die for us while we were still sinners.

God does not enjoy sending adversity into your life. His love for us is pure and intense; he does not want to see us suffer! But our suffering would be worse if he did not sometimes correct us.

Is there any way I can avoid trouble and adversity?

- JAMES 1:2-3 | When troubles of any kind come your way, consider it an opportunity for great joy. For you know that when your faith is tested, your endurance has a chance to grow.
- 2 CORINTHIANS 4:8 | We are pressed on every side by troubles, but we are not crushed. (See note on page 1049.)
 - Avoiding adversity may not be best for you. Though it may bruise you, adversity builds you up and strengthens your faith.

- EXODUS 5:6-8 | Pharaoh sent this order to the Egyptian slave drivers . . . : "Do not supply any more straw for making bricks. Make the people get it themselves! . . . They are lazy. That's why they are crying out, 'Let us go and offer sacrifices to our God.'" (See note on page 56.)
- 1 PETER 2:21 | God called you to do good, even if it means suffering, just as Christ suffered for you. He is your example.
 - Being faithful to God may actually bring adversity. Satan is our enemy, and he will try to stop us from following God. There are also people who oppose what is good and right. Adversity may be a sign that you are being faithful to God.
- **PROVERBS 13:21** | *Trouble chases sinners, while blessings reward the righteous.*
- GALATIANS 6:8 | Those who live only to satisfy their own sinful nature will harvest decay and death from that sinful nature. But those who live to please the Spirit will harvest everlasting life from the Spirit.
 - Avoiding sin helps you avoid a great deal of adversity.

What causes adversity in my life?

- ECCLESIASTES 2:22-23 | So what do people get in this life for all their hard work and anxiety? Their days of labor are filled with pain and grief.
 - Trouble is an inevitable by-product of fallen human life.
- EZEKIEL 22:14 | "How strong and courageous will you be in my day of reckoning?"
- PROVERBS 12:13 | The wicked are trapped by their own words, but the godly escape such trouble.

Trouble is often the result of our own poor decisions and sin.

• JONAH 1:3-4 | But Jonah got up and went in the opposite direction to get away from the LORD.... He found a ship leaving for Tarshish.... But the LORD hurled a powerful wind over the sea. (See note on page 815.)

We can expect to find ourselves in deep trouble if we insist on running away from God.

• PSALM 62:3-4 | So many enemies against one man—all of them trying to kill me.... They delight in telling lies about me.

Trouble is sometimes undeserved or caused by others.

Are there other benefits to adversity?

• 2 CHRONICLES 33:12 | But while in deep distress, Manasseh sought the LORD his God and sincerely humbled himself.

Adversity can humble us and lead us to God.

• 1 PETER 4:12-13 | Don't be surprised at the fiery trials you are going through.... for these trials make you partners with Christ in his suffering.

Adversity helps us understand Christ better because he suffered for us. This deepens our relationship with him.

Is God listening when I cry out because of my afflictions or troubles? Does he really hear and does he care?

• JONAH 2:2 | "I cried out to the LORD in my great trouble, and he answered me. I called to you from the land of the dead, and LORD, you heard me!" (See note on page 816.)

God's hotline is always open. Your call will never be rejected. God is never too busy with anything—even managing the world—to listen. He has both a listening ear and a caring

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heart.

- PSALM 46:1 | God is our refuge and strength, always ready to help in times of trouble.
- **PSALM 9:12** | He does not ignore the cries of those who suffer.

Adversity continued

- MATTHEW 11:28 | "Come to me, all of you who are weary and carry heavy burdens, and I will give you rest."
- 1 PETER 5:7 | Give all your worries and cares to God, for he cares about you.

Advice See also Decisions; Will of God; Wisdom

What should I do? This is a commonly asked question. In an age of conflicting claims and confusing directions, many search for wise counsel. Maybe that's why counselors are in such great demand and advice columnists are in every newspaper. There is a critical difference, however, between wise counsel and misleading advice that leads to destruction. Of all wisdom, God's wisdom is the best, for his is given with a perspective of ultimate truth and eternity. Who among us would not like to talk with someone who knows everything that will happen tomorrow and every tomorrow to come? We would do well to seek advice more often from the sources of divine wisdom: God and his Word.

Where do I look for good advice?

- 1 SAMUEL 8:6 | Samuel was displeased with their request and went to the LORD for guidance.
- JOB 12:13 | "But true wisdom and power are found in God; counsel and understanding are his."
- PSALM 32:8 | The LORD says, "I will guide you along the best pathway for your life. I will advise you and watch over you."
- JAMES 1:5 | If you need wisdom, ask our generous God, and he will give it to you. He will not rebuke you for asking.
- **PSALM 119:105** | Your word is a lamp to guide my feet and a light for my path.
- COLOSSIANS 3:16 | Let the message about Christ, in all its richness, fill your lives. Teach
 and counsel each other with all the wisdom he gives.
 Seek advice from God through prayer and reading his Word, the Bible.
- JOHN 16:13 | "When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all truth. He will not speak on his own but will tell you what he has heard. He will tell you about the future."

 God gave us his Son as our Counselor; both Jesus' life and words counsel us. God also gave us the Holy Spirit, who is called "the Counselor." He will stay with you at all times to give you wisdom and guide you in any circumstance.
- GENESIS 6:9 | Noah was a righteous man, the only blameless person living on earth at the time, and he walked in close fellowship with God.
- 1 KINGS 12:8-9 | But Rehoboam rejected the advice of the older men and instead asked the opinion of the young men who had grown up with him and were now his advisers. "What is your advice?" he asked them.
 - Family and friends have the potential to be excellent sources of advice as they often know us and our circumstances. However, be wary that kinship and association are not the basic criteria for good advice nor are they a guarantee for godly advice.
- TITUS 1:15 | Everything is pure to those whose hearts are pure.
 Seek advice from those who are faithful, godly, honest, and trustworthy. They can be counted on to give you counsel that comes from God's Word.

Why do I need advice from others? Why can't I just rely on my own wisdom?

- PROVERBS 12:15 | Fools think their own way is right, but the wise listen to others. (See note on page 568.)
 - Wisdom is the recognition of our own inadequacies. Foolishness is thinking we have none. It is wise to recognize our limitations rather than to discover them at the wrong time.
- PROVERBS 25:11 | Timely advice is lovely, like golden apples in a silver basket. There are few things as valuable as wise and timely advice.

How do I evaluate the advice of others?

- 2 CHRONICLES 22:4 | [Members of Ahab's family] became [Ahaziah's] advisers . . . and they led him to ruin.
- MATTHEW 7:16 | "You can identify them by their fruit, that is, by the way they act."
- 2 JOHN 1:9-10 | Anyone who wanders away from this teaching has no relationship with God. But anyone who remains in the teaching of Christ has a relationship with both the Father and the Son.

It is important to seek advice from those who love God and have a good knowledge of the Bible. When evaluating their advice, check it against the truth of God's Word. If it contradicts the Bible, avoid it at all costs.

How do I give good advice to others?

- 1 SAMUEL 3:19 | As Samuel grew up, the LORD was with him, and everything Samuel said proved to be reliable. (See note on page 248.)
 - People listened to Samuel because Samuel had something important to say. But Samuel had something important to say because he had a good adviser—the Lord God himself.
- PHILIPPIANS 4:8 | Fix your thoughts on what is true, and honorable, and right, and pure, and lovely, and admirable. Think about things that are excellent and worthy of praise.
 In giving advice to others, have pure motives, point to God's Word, and don't use advice as an excuse to lecture. Pray about what you want to say, and have the other person's best interests in mind. Words are like medicine; they should be measured with care, for an overdose may do more harm than good.
- PSALM 1:1 | Oh, the joys of those who do not follow the advice of the wicked, or stand around with sinners, or join in with mockers.
 - Following evil advice leads to sorrow and disaster, robbing us of joy and satisfaction. Godly advice leads to good results, enriching our joy.

PROMISES FROM GOD

- PSALM 32:8 | "I will guide you along the best pathway for your life. I will advise you and watch over you."
- PROVERBS 18:4 | Wise words are like deep waters; wisdom flows from the wise like a bubbling brook.

Anger is a fire that burns and consumes—smoldering, flaming, at times white hot. Anger is passion. Of all emotions, it may well be the most passionate, for it has the power to fuel hatred and smother love. Anger itself is not necessarily bad; it is not necessarily wrong. God himself gets angry. What we need to consider is the object of our anger, the motive for our anger, and the outcome of our anger. Anger that is self-righteous, protects our pride, is self-centered, or demands its own way is dangerous. If allowed to continue unchecked, it will consume us. This kind of anger seeks harm and revenge; it seeks to destroy. Thus it can lead to bitterness and hatred, emotions that can cause violent behavior and obliterate compassion and forgiveness.

God's anger, however, is directed against sin and unrighteousness. He blazes hot against evil. His anger, like ours, becomes a consuming fire, but its focus is to eradicate the sin so that the sinner can be restored. Our anger often consumes others and even

ourselves; God's anger burns against evil and becomes a cleansing fire. The fires of our anger may aggravate our sinfulness and self-righteousness. His anger burns away sinfulness and allows the "gold" to emerge and make us fit for the Master's use.

Why do we usually get angry?

- NUMBERS 22:29 | "You have made me look like a fool!" Balaam shouted. (See note on page 144.)
 - We get angry when our pride is hurt.
- GENESIS 4:4-5 | The LORD accepted Abel and his gift, but he did not accept Cain and his gift. This made Cain very angry.
 - We get angry when someone else is preferred or acknowledged over us.
- 2 CHRONICLES 26:18-19 | "Get out of the sanctuary, for you have sinned...." Uzziah, who was holding an incense burner, became furious. (See note on page 404.)
- ESTHER 3:2-5 | But Mordecai refused to bow down or show [Haman] respect....[Haman] was filled with rage.
 - We get angry when we don't get our way.
- 1 SAMUEL 18:8 | This made Saul very angry. "What's this?" he said. "They credit David with ten thousands and me with only thousands. Next they'll be making him their king!"
 - We get angry when we become jealous of what others have or have done.
- 2 CHRONICLES 16:7-10 | "Because you have put your trust in the king of Aram instead of in the LORD your God, you missed your chance to destroy the army of the king of Aram." ... Asa became so angry with Hanani for saying this that he threw him into prison. (See note on page 396.)

We get angry when we are confronted about our sinful actions and are exposed.

What are the effects of anger?

- GENESIS 27:41-43 | Esau hated Jacob because their father had given Jacob the blessing. And Esau began to scheme: . . . "I will kill my brother, Jacob." But Rebekah heard about Esau's plans. So she sent for Jacob and told him, ". . . Flee."

 Anger isolates us from others.
- **PSALM 37:8** | Stop being angry! ... Do not lose your temper—it only leads to harm.
- JAMES 1:20 | Human anger does not produce the righteousness God desires.
 Anger produces ungodly actions and evil motives in us.
- 1 SAMUEL 20:30-31 | Saul boiled with rage at Jonathan.... "As long as that son of Jesse is alive, you'll never be king. Now go and get him so I can kill him!"
 - Anger blinds us to what is really good and right. Saul's jealous anger blinded him to the fact that God had already chosen David to be the next king because of his godly character. Anger in its strongest form can lead to murder.
- PROVERBS 15:1 | A gentle answer deflects anger, but harsh words make tempers flare.
 Anger leads to conflict and arguments.

When I am angry, what should I avoid?

- EPHESIANS 6:4 | Do not provoke your children to anger by the way you treat them. Avoid discipline in the heat of anger.
- JAMES 3:5 | The tongue is a small thing that makes grand speeches. But a tiny spark can set a great forest on fire.
 - Avoid speaking your mind when you are angry. You are likely to say something you will regret.
- 1 SAMUEL 19:9-10 | As David played his harp, Saul hurled his spear at David.

 Avoid acting on impulse in the heat of anger. You are likely to do something you will regret.

When is it okay to be angry?

- JOHN 2:15-16 | [Jesus] drove out the sheep and cattle, scattered the money changers' coins . . . and . . . told them, "Get these things out of here. Stop turning my Father's house into a marketplace!"
- NUMBERS 25:11 | "Phinehas... has turned my anger away from the Israelites by being as zealous among them as I was."

Anger at sin is not only appropriate but also necessary. It is a sign that our priorities are in line with God's, that we understand the destructive force of sin, and will confront it with the same passion that God does.

We all get angry at times, so what should we do about it?

- EPHESIANS 4:26-27 | And "don't sin by letting anger control you." Don't let the sun go down while you are still angry, for anger gives a foothold to the devil. (See note on page 1068.)

 Anger is like a skunk in the house. Don't feed it to encourage it to stay. And carefully try to get rid of it as soon as possible.
- MATTHEW 5:21-23 | "You have heard that our ancestors were told, 'You must not murder.' ... But I say, if you are even angry with someone, you are subject to judgment! ... Go and be reconciled to that person."
 - Confront those you are angry with in order to restore your relationship.
- 1 CORINTHIANS 13:5 | [Love] is not irritable, and it keeps no record of being wronged. Love is the mightiest weapon in overcoming anger.
- PROVERBS 11:29 | Those who bring trouble on their families inherit the wind. (See note on page 568.)
- EPHESIANS 6:4 | Do not provoke your children to anger by the way you treat them.

 To knowingly provoke your family to anger weakens the binding force—love—that bonds your family together. The control you seek actually enslaves you.

What causes God to get angry?

- ROMANS 1:18 | But God shows his anger from heaven against all sinful, wicked people who suppress the truth by their wickedness.
- DEUTERONOMY 4:25 | "Do not corrupt yourselves by making idols of any kind. This is evil
 in the sight of the LORD your God and will arouse his anger." (See note on page 163.)
 God cannot wink at or tolerate sin, for sin is a violation of his righteousness and his demands
 for holy living.
- JUDGES 2:12-14 | They abandoned the LORD.... This made the LORD burn with anger against Israel.
 - God's anger at our sin may result in discipline. The discipline is not designed to destroy, but to correct, redirect, and restore our relationship with him.

How can I stop God's anger against me?

- 2 CHRONICLES 12:12 | Because Rehoboam humbled himself, the LORD's anger was turned away. (See note on Humility on page 393.)
 - Humility before God quenches his anger.
- PSALM 30:5 | For his anger lasts only a moment, but his favor lasts a lifetime!
 Recognize God's discipline, stop your sinful actions, and enjoy a restored relationship with him.
- COLOSSIANS 3:12-15 | Since God chose you to be the holy people he loves, you must clothe yourselves with tenderhearted mercy, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. . . . Forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others. Above all, clothe yourselves with love. . . . And let the peace that comes from Christ rule in your hearts.
 - Confess your sins, commit to following God with all your heart, and clothe yourself with the character traits of God.

PROMISE FROM GOD

 PSALM 103:8 | The LORD is compassionate and merciful, slow to get angry and filled with unfailing love.

Anxiety See also Grief; Hope; Pain; Stress; Worry

Pressures in our lives can build and pull us in different directions. These pressures pull against our sense of well-being, and anxiety begins to overwhelm us. Trying to do too much work with too little time or too few resources can stretch us beyond our capacity. Trying to cope with the financial demands of life without adequate income can make us begin to feel desperate. Difficulties in marital relationships, or in work relationships can lead to deep anxiety and a sense of hopelessness. What is the answer? We need a perspective that comes from God. And we also need the help of wise counselors and friends who God can use to bring us his presence, wisdom, and hope.

Should I be surprised by the anxiety I am experiencing in my life?

• JOHN 16:33 | "I have told you all this so that you may have peace in me. Here on earth you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because I have overcome the world."
Jesus warned us to expect stress and trouble in this life. This world is filled with trials and sorrows that generate deep seated anxiety. The key to dealing with anxiety is to not be surprised when it comes, but to learn how to respond when it comes. While there are many healthy and positive ways to handle anxiety, never neglect the spiritual help the Holy Spirit promises to provide if you ask.

What are some causes of anxiety?

- GENESIS 3:6, 23 | So she took some of the fruit and ate it. Then she gave some to her husband... and he ate it, too.... So the LORD God banished them from the Garden of Eden.
- GENESIS 44:18 | Then Judah stepped forward and said, "Please, my lord, let your servant say just one word to you. Please, do not be angry with me, even though you are as powerful as Pharaoh himself." (See note on Stress on page 44.)
- 2 SAMUEL 11:4; 12:13-14 | Then David sent messengers to get her; and when she came to the palace, he slept with her. . . . Nathan replied, ". . . the LORD has forgiven you, and you won't die for this sin. Nevertheless . . . your child will die."
- LUKE 22:56-62 | Finally she said, "This man was one of Jesus' followers!" But Peter denied it. "Woman," he said, "I don't even know him!"... At that moment the Lord turned and looked at Peter.... And Peter left the courtyard, weeping bitterly.
 - Anxiety can have roots in things we have done in the past. When we sin, we can bring anxiety along with sin's painful consequences into our lives.
- EXODUS 16:2-3 | The whole community of Israel complained about Moses and Aaron. "If
 only the LORD had killed us back in Egypt," they moaned. (See note on Stress on page 67.)
 Anxiety can build when we fail to trust God for help.
- MATTHEW 1:18-19 | Mary, was engaged to be married to Joseph. But before the marriage
 took place, while she was still a virgin, she became pregnant through the power of the
 Holy Spirit. Joseph, to whom she was engaged, was a righteous man and did not want to
 disgrace her publicly, so he decided to break the engagement quietly.
 Change often produces anxiety in our lives.
- JAMES 1:2-4 | Dear brothers and sisters, when troubles of any kind come your way, consider it an opportunity for great joy. For you know that when your faith is tested, your endurance has a chance to grow. So let it grow, for when your endurance is fully developed, you will be perfect and complete, needing nothing.

Adversity and the normal problems of life cause anxiety. Sometimes anxiety is the result of wounds from the past that were not your fault.

• PROVERBS 21:17 | Those who love pleasure become poor; those who love wine and luxury will never be rich.

Laziness and poor planning can lead to anxiety.

- COLOSSIANS 3:13 | Make allowance for each other's faults, and forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others.
 - Making mistakes can lead to anxiety in our lives and in the lives of our friends.
- 1 SAMUEL 25:17-20 | "You need to know this and figure out what to do, for there is going to be trouble for our master and his whole family. He's so ill-tempered that no one can even talk to him!" Abigail wasted no time. She quickly gathered 200 loaves of bread... 100 clusters of raisins, and 200 fig cakes. She packed them on donkeys and said to her servants, "Go on ahead. I will follow you shortly." But she didn't tell her husband Nabal what she was doing. As she was riding her donkey into a mountain ravine, she saw David and his men coming toward her.

Working against the clock, especially on an ongoing basis, can cause deep anxiety.

What are some of the dangers of anxiety?

- NUMBERS 11:10-14 | Moses heard all the families standing in the doorways of their tents whining, and the LORD became extremely angry. Moses was also very aggravated. And Moses said to the LORD, "Why are you treating me, your servant, so harshly? Have mercy on me! What did I do to deserve the burden of all these people? . . . I can't carry all these people by myself! The load is far too heavy!"
- 2 CORINTHIANS 1:8 | We think you ought to know, dear brothers and sisters, about the trouble we went through in the province of Asia. We were crushed and overwhelmed beyond our ability to endure, and we thought we would never live through it.
 - The intense demands of life have the potential to overwhelm you. The expectations, the criticism, and the scope of needs and responsibilities can threaten to crush even the strongest person.
- LUKE 10:40-41 | But Martha was distracted by the big dinner she was preparing. She came to Jesus and said, "Lord, doesn't it seem unfair to you that my sister just sits here while I do all the work? Tell her to come and help me." But the Lord said to her, "My dear Martha, you are worried and upset over all these details!"
- MATTHEW 13:22 | "The seed that fell among the thorns represents those who hear God's word, but all too quickly the message is crowded out by the worries of this life and the lure of wealth, so no fruit is produced."
 - Anxiety can cause you to focus on the trivial and miss the important. As pressure squeezes your perspective inward, you lose the big picture. Preoccupation with the issues of the moment can sometimes blind you to what's really important.

What can I do when I'm overwhelmed by anxiety?

- 2 CORINTHIANS 4:9 | We are hunted down, but never abandoned by God. We get knocked down, but we are not destroyed.
 - Keep going! Knowing that God is by your side during times of anxiety can help you to keep from giving up.
- PSALM 55:22 | Give your burdens to the LORD, and he will take care of you. He will not permit the godly to slip and fall. (See note on Stress on page 508.)
- ISAIAH 41:10 | "Don't be afraid, for I am with you. Don't be discouraged, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you. I will hold you up with my victorious right hand."
- PSALM 62:2 | He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress where I will never be shaken.
- JOHN 14:1 | "Don't let your hearts be troubled. Trust in God, and trust also in me."

Anxiety continued

- **HEBREWS 2:18** | Since he himself has gone through suffering and testing, he is able to help us when we are being tested.
- PHILIPPIANS 2:4 | Don't look out only for your own interests, but take an interest in others, too.
 - The first step in dealing with your anxiety is to bring it to the Lord. Only he brings true peace of heart and mind. God's availability and promises provide effective stress reducers.
- 2 SAMUEL 22:7 | But in my distress I cried out to the LORD.... He heard me from his sanctuary; my cry reached his ears.
- PSALM 86:7 | I will call to you whenever I'm in trouble, and you will answer me. Be persistent in prayer.
- MARK 6:31 | Then Jesus said, "Let's go off by ourselves to a quiet place and rest awhile." He said this because there were so many people coming and going that Jesus and his apostles didn't even have time to eat.
 - Take time to slow down and take a break from pressure-packed situations.
- 1 CORINTHIANS 6:19-20 | Don't you realize that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who lives in you and was given to you by God? You do not belong to yourself, for God bought you with a high price. So you must honor God with your body.
 - Take care of your body. Adequate rest, regular exercise, and proper nutrition are essential to dealing effectively with stress and anxiety.
- GALATIANS 6:9 | So let's not get tired of doing what is good. At just the right time we will reap a harvest of blessing if we don't give up.
 - Don't let stress and anxiety defeat you. When you are tired of doing good, it may be because you are just too tired.

Why do I need help from others? Why can't I just rely on my own strength?

- PROVERBS 12:15 | Fools think their own way is right, but the wise listen to others. (See note on Advice on page 568.)
 - Wisdom is the recognition of our own inadequacies. Foolishness is thinking we can handle all our problems on our own. It is wise to be aware of our tendency to become overcome by anxiety and to be prepared to deal with it. This involves building supportive relationships that can bring us help when we become overwhelmed.
- PROVERBS 25:11 | Timely advice is lovely, like golden apples in a silver basket.

 There are few things as valuable as wise and timely counsel. Sometimes the presence and help of a friend or counselor is just what we need to get through a time of deep anxiety.

How can I keep hoping when God doesn't seem to act?

- **PSALM 71:5** | *O Lord*, you alone are my hope.
 - Who but God controls the future? Who but God has a home for us that is eternal? Who but God forgives our sins? Who but God can give us a life that lasts forever? No wonder he is our hope!
- HEBREWS 11:1 | Faith shows the reality of what we hope for; it is the evidence of things we cannot see.
 - We have faith in God to do what he has promised, and we can be absolutely sure that he will. Unlike idle hopes, our hopes are built on the solid foundation of his trustworthiness.

Atheism See also Faith; Salvation

Atheism is the belief system that says there is no God. Atheists spend much time and energy trying to prove God doesn't exist. What we decide about the existence of God is literally a choice between life and death. And it is not enough to decide that he exists; we must then decide how we will respond to his clear message in the Bible.

What is atheism?

- **PSALM 14:1** | Only fools say in their hearts, "There is no God."
- ROMANS 1:20 | Ever since the world was created, people have seen the earth and sky. Through everything God made, they can clearly see his invisible qualities—his eternal power and divine nature. So they have no excuse for not knowing God.
- EPHESIANS 2:12 | In those days you were living apart from Christ.... You lived in this world without God and without hope.
 - Atheism says "There is no God." But all of creation speaks against that.

What are the characteristics of atheism?

- JEREMIAH 5:4 | "They don't know the ways of the LORD. They don't understand God's laws."
 - Living in ignorance of God. Intellectual atheism is a mind without the knowledge of God. Practicing atheism is a life without a relationship with God.
- JUDE 1:4 | I say this because some ungodly people have wormed their way into your churches, saying that God's marvelous grace allows us to live immoral lives. The condemnation of such people was recorded long ago, for they have denied our only Master and Lord, Jesus Christ.
- 1 JOHN 4:3 | But if someone claims to be a prophet and does not acknowledge the truth about Jesus, that person is not from God.
 - Denying Jesus Christ. Those who deny Jesus now will be denied access to heaven by Jesus at the time of judgment.
- JOHN 18:37 | Jesus responded, "... I was born and came into the world to testify to the truth. All who love the truth recognize that what I say is true."
- ROMANS 1:18 | But God shows his anger from heaven against all sinful, wicked people who suppress the truth by their wickedness.
- JEREMIAH 14:14 | Then the LORD said, "These prophets are telling lies in my name. I did not send them or tell them to speak. I did not give them any messages. . . . They speak foolishness made up in their own lying hearts."
 - Denying God's truth. There is a sharp line between what is true and what is not. To deny truth is, by default, to be living a lie, to be living by principles that have no purpose, no clear direction, no foundation that lasts, and no future.
- EXODUS 5:2 | "Is that so?" retorted Pharaoh. "And who is the LORD? Why should I listen to him and let Israel go? I don't know the LORD."
- 2 KINGS 18:32-35 | "Don't listen to Hezekiah when he tries to mislead you by saying, 'The LORD will rescue us!' Have the gods of any other nations ever saved their people

OLD TESTAMENT

Genesis

IN THE BEGINNING — the beginning of all beginnings—everything was fresher than the earliest morning and newer than a baby's next breath. God spoke, and new worlds emerged. God breathed, and new life began. God created, and a new garden grew with pristine purity. A new dynamic called love and marriage blossomed in that garden, and it would lead to a new wonder called children and family. A new utopia had begun. The whole wide universe, and the tiny corner called Eden, was bathed in honeymoon freshness. It was the dawn of all things wonderful, the dawn of everything bright and beautiful.

Genesis is the book of new beginnings—new, wonderful beginnings. But it is also the book of new beginnings that were far less than wonderful because of another new dynamic called choice. God gave his creatures the ability to choose the course their lives would take, and they did not choose wisely. And so began the dark presence of the evil one, the dark shadow called temptation, and the dark woundedness called sin.

Many today are tired of the same old thing—the same job, the same routines, the same responsibilities, the same load of debt, the same limitations, the same sickness or injury, perhaps even the sameness in marriage or family life. If only we could choose a new course in life. If only we could get away from it all, perhaps even get away from everyone and every-

thing familiar—out of debt, out of the neighborhood, out of the chains of sameness. If only we could jump-start a new tomorrow today.

In our quest for newness, many jump ship, leaving home and family behind, just to find that the new beginning is only the other side of the same old coin. Old oppression is exchanged for new oppression. Old problems are bartered for new ones until it seems that the new is worse than the old.

When we embark on a new beginning, how do we know which way it will take us? Genesis is the book to study for answers. It lays out the principles for new beginnings (new relationships, new rules, new jobs, new directions) within the boundaries of God's timeless and unchanging truths for successful

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living. Newness will always be exciting, and ultimately satisfying, if we stay within the guidelines for living that are laid down by God in this book and in the rest of the Bible. You will then find your beginnings as fresh and bright as the dawn of creation. But new beginnings without God—outside his guidelines for living—will be as dark and devastating as the expulsion from Eden, which led to a new world of pain, work, sweat, and sin.

Read the book of Genesis to gain a new perspective on what appear to be the same old things. Let the tyranny of the ordinary become fresh and vital. When you do chart a new beginning in your life, use the guidelines for new beginnings presented in Genesis. Then you will have renewed hope and zest with each new morning by running with God, not from him.

Key verses in Genesis

1:1 *In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.*

1:27 So God created human beings in his own image . . . male and female he created them.

9:12-17 Then God said, "I am giving you a sign of my covenant with you and with all living

creatures, for all generations to come. I have placed my rainbow in the clouds. . . . Never again will the floodwaters destroy all life. . . . Yes, this rainbow is the sign of the covenant I am confirming with all the creatures on earth."

15:6 And Abram believed the LORD, and the LORD counted

The Account of Creation

• Rest GENESIS 2:1-3

Why would the omnipotent God of the universe rest following his work of creation? Surely it wasn't because the Almighty was physically tired! Our clue is that God, in ceasing from his work, called his rest "holy." God also knew that we would need to cease from our work to care for our spiritual needs. Work is good, but it must be balanced by regular attention to worship and the health of our souls. Do you observe regular times for worship and spiritual refreshment?

Sexuality

GENESIS 2:24

When the unity candle is lit at a wedding, it symbolizes a unique relationship—leaving father and mother and joining as bride and groom in such a way that the two become one. We don't fully understand sexual union, but we do know that God intended it to bond married people together in a way different from any other relationship. This physical intimacy is designed to be experienced exclusively and uniquely within marriage, and it is a model of the vulnerability and unity that should be experienced in all other aspects of marriage.

Our fallen world has come to view sex simply as an act of pleasure rather than a doorway to deepest vulnerability and sharing. That is why sex outside of marriage is so wrong: It destroys the proper view and function of sex as the ultimate act of intimacy that two people can experience together. A casual view of sex devalues it and takes away one of the most powerful channels of communication between a husband and wife. When sex is seen simply as a physical act, it loses its power to bond two people together. Lack of intimacy is one of the great destroyers of a marriage. Use all of the resources God has given you to keep sex alive in your marriage, functioning as it was designed to function.

Temptation

GENESIS 3:1-6

The first key to understanding temptation is recognizing the power and cunning of the tempter. Notice that the serpent does not approach Eve with something obviously evil but with a lovely piece of fruit. He then twists God's command just enough to make it seem to Eve as if God didn't really mean what he had commanded. Hidden behind these obvious "benefits" was the lie that Eve could become like God by violating God's specific command. How often Satan uses this deceptive strategy with us! How does Satan most often employ temptation in your life? Pray that God will help you cling to his will and recognize the lies of the one who would destroy your soul.

The last chapter of the creation story is still going on. God isn't through yet with his creative process, for in each conception and birth, he teams up with man and woman to create new life. There is something in the sexual act that goes far beyond the pleasure of the act itself, something that is a blending and bonding of not only husband and wife but God also, for his divine creative process makes conception and birth possible. In creating a child together, a couple has joined God in bringing a living soul into the world. This is proof enough that sex in marriage should be celebrated as holy, not as shameful or merely something to be endured.

Motives

GENESIS 4:3-5

Your motives are everything to God. The condition of your heart is essential to the condition of your relationship with him. Coming to God out of obligation, or just to keep him from getting angry at you, or to placate him to get something you really want shows that you want a relationship with God for the wrong reasons. Coming to God with a humble desire to know him and what he wants for you is more about loving and pleasing him than yourself. It is quite likely that God rejected Cain's sacrifice because Cain's motives were self-centered. When your motives are selfish, even seeminaly right behavior can become inappropriate. Don't let right actions be wasted by wrong motives. You will soon find your actions to be futile. But right motives always produce meaningful action, even in the smallest things. More important, when you pursue spiritual life with self-serving motives, you rob yourself of the joy God intends.

Great Bible Stories for Discovering God's Truth

God chose to convey his truth in many different ways when he inspired Scripture. He gave us songs in the book of Psalms, short and pithy wisdom sayings in the book of Proverbs, powerful visions in the prophets, and heavy theological discussions in the New Testament letters. But a large part of Scripture is told in the form of stories. In both the Old and New Testaments, there are hundreds of stories that show us who God is, how he relates to us, and how he wants us to live. These stories also show us what happens when we decide to reject God and go our own way.

We usually remember details of stories really well, whether we read the story or listened to it. Stories call us to do more than just think about truth. They help us to engage with the truth in the context of real life. They help us to feel and instinctively know the truth. That's probably why Jesus did much of his teaching through telling stories and using everyday illustrations. And the Gospel writers seem to have really enjoyed showing who Jesus is by recounting what he did, rather than just recording what he said. Take some time to step into these stories that God has given us.
